## HOUSE BILL REPORT 2ESSB 5291

### As Passed House - Amended:

**Title:** An act relating to immunizations at long-term care facilities.

**Brief Description:** Requiring certain immunizations of staff and residents of long-term care facilities.

# Brief Summary of Second Engrossed Substitute Bill (As Amended by House)

 Long-term care facilities are required to offer access to immunizations to all residents annually.

### **Background:**

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommend all persons 65 and older, and others in high risk groups be immunized annually for influenza and pneumococcal disease.

House Bill Report - 1 - 2ESSB 5291

Several states require residents of nursing homes and other long-term care facilities be offered immunization for these illnesses.

### **Summary of Amended Bill:**

Nursing homes are required to offer access to immunizations for pneumococcal disease to all residents on an annual basis. The vaccinations may be offered on-site or elsewhere. Long-term care facilities are required to inform residents verbally and in writing of the benefits of these vaccinations.

**Appropriation:** None.

Fiscal Note: Available.

**Effective Date of Amended Bill:** Ninety days after adjournment of session in which bill is passed.

**Testimony For:** Residents and employees of long-term care facilities would benefit from immunizations.

**Testimony Against:** This legislation is unnecessary because the Department of Social and Health Services currently provides information to long-term care facilities on the benefits of, and need for, immunizations.
