- 1 AN ACT Relating to establishing the joint task force on permit
- 2 streamlining; creating new sections; providing an expiration date; and
- 3 declaring an emergency.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** (1) The joint task force on permit
- 6 streamlining is created to evaluate the effectiveness of state land
- 7 use, planning, environmental, and permitting statutes to coordinate and
- 8 streamline permit review processes and to consider whether any changes
- 9 are needed to these laws to facilitate such coordination and
- 10 streamlining.
- 11 (2) The joint task force shall consist of the following ten
- 12 legislative members:
- 13 (a) Five members of the house of representatives, three from the
- 14 majority party and two from the minority party, appointed by the
- 15 speaker of the house of representatives; and
- 16 (b) Five members of the senate, three from the majority party and
- 17 two from the minority party, appointed by the majority leader of the
- 18 senate.

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- (3) The joint task force may appoint an advisory committee of 1 advisors and experts to provide input on various subjects. 2 purposes of this subsection, "advisors and experts" includes, but is 3 4 not limited to, representatives of: Cities; counties; environmental groups; business organizations; developers; building industry; land use 5 planners, attorneys, and consultants; tribes; the office of the 6 7 governor; and state agencies with planning functions and/or permit 8 authority.
- 9 (4) Members of the joint task force shall be reimbursed for travel 10 expenses as provided in RCW 44.04.120. The staff of senate committee 11 services and the office of program research of the house of 12 representatives shall staff the joint task force.
- 13 (5) The joint task force shall be cochaired by one senator and one 14 state representative appointed by the senate majority leader and the 15 speaker of the house of representatives respectively.
- (6) Any final findings, conclusions, or recommendations of the joint task force must be agreed to by a majority of the members; however, minority findings, conclusions, or recommendations may be included that are submitted by any member or group of members.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) The joint task force on permit streamlining shall consider the following objectives:
- 22 (a) Development of a coordinated permit process for all required 23 project permits. This process must be applied with certainty, 24 consistency, and assurance of swift permit action, while taking into 25 account environmental protection and best management practices;
- 26 (b) Improvement in the coordination of state and local agencies in 27 reviewing and responding to project permit applications;
- (c) Reduction in delays associated with project permit review so that permit decisions are made in a timely and predictable manner; and
- 30 (d) Enhancement of state and local agencies' responsiveness to 31 concerns about project review processes and decisions from project 32 permit applicants or interested parties.
- 33 (2) The joint task force shall make recommendations for legislation 34 and policy regarding the objectives identified in subsection (1) of 35 this section.

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- 1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 3.** The joint task force shall commence May 1,
- 2 2002, and present a final report and any legislative proposals to the
- 3 legislature by January 10, 2003.
- 4 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** This act is necessary for the immediate
- 5 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
- 6 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
- 7 immediately.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** This act expires June 1, 2003.

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
