- 13 appropriated from the general fund--state for fiscal year 2001 solely
- 14 for allocation to Sound Transit regional transit authority for the King
- 15 street rail maintenance facility to be built in partnership with
- 16 Amtrak. The appropriation in this subsection is conditioned on the
- 17 execution of agreements between the department of transportation,
- 18 Amtrak, Sound Transit, and other participating parties that will assure
- 19 that the maintenance and operation of the maintenance facility will not
- 20 require state funding except for billings for maintenance of state-
- 21 owned passenger trains.
- 22 (2) The sum of fifteen million dollars is appropriated from the
- 23 state general fund for fiscal year 2000 solely for allocation to Sound
- 24 Transit regional transit authority as a state contribution to the
- 25 extension of Sounder passenger rail service to Everett.
- 26 (3) The amounts appropriated in this section constitute a transfer
- 27 of local government costs under RCW 43.135.060(2).
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 504. This act is necessary for the immediate
- 29 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
- 30 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
- 31 immediately.
