- 1 AN ACT Relating to chiropractic care; and amending RCW 18.25.005
- 2 and 18.25.006.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 18.25.005 and 1994 sp.s. c 9 s 102 are each amended to 5 read as follows:
- 6 (1) Chiropractic is the practice of health care that deals with the 7 diagnosis or analysis and care or treatment of the vertebral 8 subluxation complex and its effects, articular dysfunction, and 9 musculoskeletal disorders, all for the restoration and maintenance of 10 health and recognizing the recuperative powers of the body.
- (2) Chiropractic treatment or care includes the use of procedures 11 12 involving spinal adjustments, and extremity manipulation ((insofar as 13 any such procedure is complementary or preparatory to a chiropractic 14 spinal adjustment)). Chiropractic treatment also includes the use of 15 heat, cold, water, exercise, massage, trigger point therapy, dietary 16 advice and recommendation of nutritional supplementation ((except for 17 medicines of herbal, animal, or botanical origin)), the normal regimen 18 and rehabilitation of the patient, first aid, and counseling on 19 hygiene, sanitation, and preventive measures. Chiropractic care also

- 1 includes such physiological therapeutic procedures as traction and 2 light, but does not include procedures involving the application of 3 sound, diathermy, or electricity.
- 4 (3) As part of a chiropractic differential diagnosis, a 5 chiropractor shall perform a physical examination, which may include 6 diagnostic x-rays, to determine the appropriateness of chiropractic 7 care or the need for referral to other health care providers. The 8 chiropractic quality assurance commission shall provide by rule for the 9 type and use of diagnostic and analytical devices and procedures 10 consistent with this chapter.
- 11 (4) Chiropractic care shall not include the prescription or 12 dispensing of any medicine or drug, the practice of obstetrics or 13 surgery, the use of x-rays or any other form of radiation for 14 therapeutic purposes, colonic irrigation, or any form of venipuncture.
- 15 (5) Nothing in this chapter prohibits or restricts any other 16 practitioner of a "health profession" defined in RCW 18.120.020(4) from 17 performing any functions or procedures the practitioner is licensed or 18 permitted to perform, and the term "chiropractic" as defined in this 19 chapter shall not prohibit a practitioner licensed under chapter 18.71 20 RCW from performing medical procedures, except such procedures shall 21 not include the adjustment by hand of any articulation of the spine.
- 22 **Sec. 2.** RCW 18.25.006 and 1994 sp.s. c 9 s 103 are each amended to 23 read as follows:
- Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter.
  - (1) "Department" means the department of health.
- 27 (2) "Secretary" means the secretary of the department of health or 28 the secretary's designee.
  - (3) "Chiropractor" means an individual licensed under this chapter.
- 30 (4) "Commission" means the Washington state chiropractic quality 31 assurance commission.
- 32 (5) "Vertebral subluxation complex" means a functional defect or 33 alteration of the biomechanical and physiological dynamics in a joint 34 that may cause neuronal disturbances, with or without displacement 35 detectable by x-ray. The effects of the vertebral subluxation complex 36 may include, but are not limited to, any of the following: Fixation, 37 hypomobility, hypermobility, periarticular muscle spasm, edema, or 38 inflammation.

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- "Articular dysfunction" 1 an alteration the means of 2 biomechanical and physiological dynamics of a joint of the axial or 3 appendicular skeleton.
- 4 (7) "Musculoskeletal disorders" means abnormalities of the muscles, bones, and connective tissue.

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- (8) "Chiropractic differential diagnosis" means a diagnosis to 6 7 determine the existence of a vertebral subluxation complex, articular 8 dysfunction, or musculoskeletal disorder, and the appropriateness of 9 chiropractic care or the need for referral to other health care 10 providers.
- (9) "Chiropractic adjustment" means chiropractic care of a 11 complex, articular 12 vertebral subluxation dysfunction, or Such care includes manual or mechanical 13 musculoskeletal disorder. 14 adjustment of any vertebral articulation and contiguous articulations 15 beyond the normal passive physiological range of motion.
  - (10) "Extremity manipulation" means a corrective thrust or maneuver applied to a joint of the appendicular skeleton. ((The use of extremity manipulation shall be complementary and preparatory to a chiropractic spinal adjustment to support correction of a vertebral subluxation complex and is considered a part of a spinal adjustment and shall not be billed separately from or in addition to a spinal adjustment.))

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
