State of Washington57th Legislature2001 Regular SessionBy Senators Kohl-Welles, Jacobsen and Horn; by request of Governor

Read first time 02/01/2001. Referred to Committee on Higher Education.

AN ACT Relating to tuition setting authority and the use of tuition higher education; amending RCW 28B.15.031, 28B.15.066, 28B.15.067, 28B.15.069, and 28B.15.100; and creating new sections.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. It is the intent of the legislature to 6 establish a permanent tuition policy for the state's public 7 institutions of higher education. This policy recognizes that funding higher education is a shared responsibility of the state, the 8 institutions of higher education, and the students and families served. 9 10 This policy should maintain affordable tuition levels and predictable tuition rates so students and their families can plan and pay for 11 12 access to public higher education. This policy should also extend 13 tuition setting authority to institutions of higher education and the 14 state board for community and technical colleges so they can respond to 15 individual priority needs not addressed by the legislature. The legislature further intends that tuition revenue be used by each 16 17 institution of higher education to provide student access to quality 18 learning opportunities.

1 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.15.031 and 1996 c 142 s 2 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

3 The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the 4 fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the 5 state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for short courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine 6 7 station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension 8 courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or rentals, 9 disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall 10 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, technology and student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income 11 derived from any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and 12 facilities of the colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter 13 acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income 14 15 from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing 16 or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or 17 the appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be established by any college or university board of trustees or regents 18 19 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any 20 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, 21 That a minimum of three and one-half percent of operating fees shall be 22 retained by the institutions((, except the technical colleges,)) for 23 24 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. Local operating fee accounts shall not 25 be subject to appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures 26 under chapter 43.88 RCW.

27 **Sec. 3.** RCW 28B.15.066 and 2000 c 152 s 2 are each amended to read 28 as follows:

29 It is the intent of the legislature that:

In making appropriations from the state's general fund to institutions of higher education, each appropriation shall conform to the following:

(1) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of operating fees revenue estimated to be collected from students enrolled at the state-funded enrollment level specified in the omnibus biennial operating appropriations act;

37 (2) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of38 operating fees revenue collected from students enrolled above the

1 state-funded level((, but within the over-enrollment limitations,))

2 specified in the omnibus biennial operating appropriations act; and 3 (3) The general fund state appropriation shall not be reduced by 4 the amount of operating fees revenue collected as a result of waiving 5 less operating fees revenue than the amounts authorized under RCW 6 28B.15.910. State general fund appropriations shall not be provided 7 for revenue foregone as a result of or for waivers granted under RCW 8 28B.15.915.

9 **Sec. 4.** RCW 28B.15.067 and 1997 c 403 s 1 are each amended to read 10 as follows:

(1) Tuition fees shall be established under the provisions of thischapter.

(2) ((Academic year tuition for full-time students at the state's
institutions of higher education for the 1997-98 academic year, other
than the summer term, shall be as provided in this subsection.

16 (a) At the University of Washington and Washington State
17 University:

18 (i) For resident undergraduate students and other resident students 19 not in graduate, law, or first professional programs, two thousand nine 20 hundred eighty-eight dollars;

21 (ii)(A) For nonresident undergraduate students and other 22 nonresident students at the University of Washington not in graduate, 23 law, or first professional programs, ten thousand two hundred seventy-24 eight dollars;

(B) For nonresident undergraduate students and other nonresident
 students at Washington State University not in graduate or first
 professional programs, nine thousand eight hundred seventy dollars;

1 (b) At the regional universities and The Evergreen State College:

2 (i) For resident undergraduate and all other resident students not
3 in graduate programs, two thousand two hundred eleven dollars;

4 (ii) For nonresident undergraduate and all other nonresident
5 students not in graduate programs, eight thousand six hundred forty-six
6 dollars;

7 (iii) For resident graduate students, three thousand seven hundred
8 twenty-six dollars; and

9 (iv) For nonresident graduate students, eleven thousand nine 10 hundred seventy-six dollars.

11 (c) At the community colleges:

12 (i) For resident students, one thousand three hundred eleven 13 dollars; and

14 (ii) For nonresident students, five thousand five hundred eighty-15 six dollars.

16 (3) Academic year tuition for full-time students at the state's 17 institutions of higher education beginning with the 1998-99 academic 18 year, other than the summer term, shall be as provided in this 19 subsection unless different rates are adopted in the omnibus 20 appropriations act.

21 (a) At the University of Washington and Washington State
22 University:

23 (i) For resident undergraduate students and other resident students
24 not in graduate, law, or first professional programs, three thousand
25 one hundred eight dollars;

26 (ii)(A) For nonresident undergraduate students and other 27 nonresident students at the University of Washington not in graduate, 28 law, or first professional programs, eleven thousand one hundred thirty 29 dollars;

30 (B) For nonresident undergraduate students and other nonresident 31 students at Washington State University not in graduate or first 32 professional programs, ten thousand two hundred sixty-six dollars;

33 (iii) For resident graduate students, five thousand forty-six
34 dollars;

35 (iv) For nonresident graduate students, thirteen thousand ninety36 two dollars;

37 (v) For resident law students, five thousand three hundred seventy 38 six dollars;

- 1 (vi) For nonresident law students, thirteen thousand seven hundred
 2 eighty-two dollars;
- 3 (vii) For resident first professional students, eight thousand four
 4 hundred thirty-six dollars; and
- 5 (viii) For nonresident first professional students, twenty-one

- 7 (b) At the regional universities and The Evergreen State College:
 8 (i) For resident undergraduate and all other resident students not
 9 in graduate programs, two thousand two hundred ninety-eight dollars;

10 (ii) For nonresident undergraduate and all other nonresident 11 students not in graduate programs, eight thousand nine hundred ninety-12 one dollars;

13 (iii) For resident graduate students, three thousand eight hundred 14 seventy-six dollars; and

15 (iv) For nonresident graduate students, twelve thousand four 16 hundred fifty six dollars.

- 17 (c) At the community colleges:
- 18 (i) For resident students, one thousand three hundred sixty-two 19 dollars; and
- 20 (ii) For nonresident students, five thousand eight hundred eight 21 dollars.

(4) For the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, the University of 22 Washington shall use at least ten percent of the revenue received from 23 24 the difference between a four percent increase in tuition fees and the 25 actual increase charged to law students to assist needy low and middleincome resident law students. For the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic 26 years, the University of Washington shall use at least ten percent of 27 the revenue received from the difference between a four percent 28 29 increase in tuition fees and the actual increase charged to nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident students not in 30 graduate, law, or first professional programs to assist needy low and 31 32 middle-income resident undergraduate students and all other resident students not enrolled in graduate, law, or first professional programs. 33 34 This requirement is in addition to the deposit requirements of the institutional aid fund under RCW 28B.15.820. 35 36 (5))) (a) For the 2001-02 academic year and each academic year

- 37 thereafter, the governing boards of the state universities, the
 38 regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the state board
- 39 for community and technical colleges may reduce or increase full-time

operating fees for resident undergraduate students. Increases for resident undergraduate students may be in excess of the fiscal growth factor but are limited to no more than ten percent a year and no more than a total of forty percentage points over any consecutive six-year period. Reductions or increases may be made for all or portions of an institution's programs including but not limited to time of day, day of the week, campus, program type, degree, and delivery method.

(b) For the 2001-02 academic year and each academic year 8 thereafter, the governing boards of the state universities, the 9 regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the state board 10 for community and technical colleges may reduce or increase full-time 11 operating fees for all students other than resident undergraduates, 12 including summer school students. Increases may be in excess of the 13 14 fiscal growth factor. Reductions or increases may be made for all or 15 portions of an institution's programs including but not limited to time of day, day of the week, campus, program type, degree, and delivery 16 17 method.

(3) Students receiving state need grants should not be deprived of 18 19 access to higher education due to increases in tuition rates. The legislature shall retain the responsibility to appropriate funds to the 20 state need grant program to support changes in overall program 21 eligibility levels and increased enrollments. For academic year 2001-22 02, institutions of higher education must dedicate a portion of their 23 24 revenues to support state need grants to need grant recipients. At a minimum, each institution of higher education shall dedicate sufficient 25 26 revenues to need grants sufficient to maintain the ratio of total state need grant awards to students at that institution of higher education 27 28 to total tuition charged those students receiving state need grants at 29 that institution of higher education for the prior academic year. 30 Revenues dedicated for institutional support of state need grant recipients shall be retained by each institution of higher education 31 for support of students enrolled at that institution. Institutional 32 expenditures of tuition revenues for need grants under chapter . . ., 33 34 Laws of 2001 (this act) shall be in addition to tuition revenues contributed to the institutional financial aid fund required by RCW 35 28B.15.820 and in addition to tuition payments waived under RCW 36 28B.15.740. The institutions of higher education shall report to the 37 higher education coordinating board on the financial aid paid according 38

to this section in a manner determined by the board. This subsection
 does not apply after June 30, 2002.

3 (4) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall not apply 4 to high school students enrolling in participating institutions of 5 higher education under RCW 28A.600.300 through 28A.600.395.

6 Sec. 5. RCW 28B.15.069 and 1997 c 403 s 2 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

8 (1) ((As used in this section, each of the following subsections is
9 a separate tuition category:

10 (a) Resident undergraduate students and all other resident students
11 not in first professional, graduate, or law programs;

12 (b) Nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident

13 students not in first professional graduate or law programs;

14 (c) Resident graduate students;

15 (d) Resident law students;

16 (e) Nonresident graduate students;

17 (f) Nonresident law students;

18 (g) Resident first professional students; and

19 (h) Nonresident first professional students.

20 (2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, as used in this
21 section "first professional programs" means programs leading to one of
22 the following degrees: Doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery,
23 or doctor of veterinary medicine.

(3)) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the building fee is of total tuition for each tuition category in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.

30 (((4))) (2) The governing boards of each institution of higher education, except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and 31 32 collect from each student a services and activities fee. A governing 33 board may increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting 34 procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for the 35 36 applicable tuition category: PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall not apply to that portion of the services and activities fee 37 previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. The services and 38

activities fee committee provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a
 request to the governing board for a fee increase.

3 (((5))) <u>(3)</u> Tuition and services and activities fees consistent 4 with subsection (((4))) <u>(2)</u> of this section shall be set by the state 5 board for community and technical colleges for community college summer 6 school students unless the community college charges fees in accordance 7 with RCW 28B.15.515.

8 (((6))) <u>(4)</u> Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, each 9 governing board of a community college may charge such fees for 10 ungraded courses, noncredit courses, community services courses, and 11 self-supporting courses as it, in its discretion, may determine, 12 consistent with the rules of the state board for community and 13 technical colleges.

14 **Sec. 6.** RCW 28B.15.100 and 1999 c 321 s 2 are each amended to read 15 as follows:

16 (1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges 17 18 shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at 19 the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board 20 shall in its discretion determine. The total of all fees shall be 21 rounded to the nearest whole dollar amount: PROVIDED, That such 22 23 tuition fees ((for other than the summer term)) shall be ((in the 24 amounts for the respective institutions as otherwise set forth in)) 25 established in accordance with RCW 28B.15.067.

(2) Part-time students shall be charged tuition and services and 26 activities fees proportionate to full-time student rates established 27 for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, That except for students 28 29 registered at community colleges, students registered for fewer than 30 two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and activities fees at the rate established for two credit hours: PROVIDED FURTHER, 31 That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, residents of Idaho 32 33 or Oregon who are enrolled in community college district number twenty 34 for six or fewer credits during any quarter or semester may be exempted from payment of all or a portion of the nonresident tuition fees 35 36 differential upon a declaration by the higher education coordinating board that it finds Washington residents from the community college 37

district are afforded substantially equivalent treatment by such other
 states.

3 (3) Full-time students registered for more than eighteen credit 4 hours shall be charged an additional operating fee for each credit hour 5 in excess of eighteen hours at the applicable established per credit hour tuition fee rate for part-time students: PROVIDED, That, subject 6 to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards of the state 7 universities and the community colleges may exempt all or a portion of 8 the additional charge, for students who are registered exclusively in 9 10 first professional programs in medicine, dental medicine, veterinary medicine, doctor of pharmacy, or law, or who are registered exclusively 11 12 in required courses in vocational preparatory programs.

13 Sec. 7. The office of financial management shall NEW SECTION. 14 convene representatives from the public baccalaureate institutions, the 15 state board for community and technical colleges, and the higher education coordinating board to identify options to address increases 16 in the state need grant program related to operating fee increases and 17 18 to make agreed-upon recommendations by November 1, 2001, to appropriate 19 committees of the legislature.

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
