- 1 AN ACT Relating to tuition-setting authority and accountability for
- 2 the use of tuition at institutions of higher education; amending RCW
- 3 28B.15.031, 28B.15.066, 28B.15.067, 28B.15.069, and 28B.15.100; adding
- 4 a new section to chapter 28B.15 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** Public higher education funding is a shared
- 7 responsibility between the state, students, and the public colleges and
- 8 universities. Periodic increases in state funding, state financial
- 9 aid, and tuition must be authorized to provide quality higher education
- 10 for the citizens of Washington. It is the intent of the legislature to
- 11 authorize the governing boards to establish tuition rates, to make
- 12 colleges and universities responsible to provide quality programs, and
- 13 to provide state fund appropriations so that tuition increases can
- 14 support program improvements.
- 15 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28B.15.031 and 1996 c 142 s 2 are each amended to read
- 16 as follows:
- 17 The term "operating fees" as used in this chapter shall include the
- 18 fees, other than building fees, charged all students registering at the

state's colleges and universities but shall not include fees for short 1 courses, self-supporting degree credit programs and courses, marine 2 station work, experimental station work, correspondence or extension 3 4 courses, and individual instruction and student deposits or rentals, disciplinary and library fines, which colleges and universities shall 5 have the right to impose, laboratory, gymnasium, health, technology and 6 7 student activity fees, or fees, charges, rentals, and other income derived from any or all revenue producing lands, buildings and 8 9 facilities of the colleges or universities heretofore or hereafter 10 acquired, constructed or installed, including but not limited to income from rooms, dormitories, dining rooms, hospitals, infirmaries, housing 11 or student activity buildings, vehicular parking facilities, land, or 12 13 the appurtenances thereon, or such other special fees as may be 14 established by any college or university board of trustees or regents 15 from time to time. All moneys received as operating fees at any 16 institution of higher education shall be deposited in a local account 17 containing only operating fees revenue and related interest: PROVIDED, That a minimum of three and one-half percent of operating fees shall be 18 19 retained by the institutions((, except the technical colleges,)) for 20 the purposes of RCW 28B.15.820. Local operating fee accounts shall not be subject to appropriation by the legislature or allotment procedures 21 22 under chapter 43.88 RCW.

It is the intent of the legislature that:

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In making appropriations from the state's general 26 27 institutions of higher education, each appropriation shall conform to the following: 28

- (1) The appropriation shall not be reduced by the amount of operating fees revenue estimated to be collected from students enrolled at the state-funded enrollment level specified in the omnibus biennial 31 operating appropriations act;

- 7 (1) Tuition fees shall be established under the provisions of this 8 chapter.
- 9 (2) ((Academic year tuition for full-time students at the state's institutions of higher education for the 1997-98 academic year, other than the summer term, shall be as provided in this subsection.

 - (4) For the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, the University of Washington shall use at least ten percent of the revenue received from the difference between a four percent increase in tuition fees and the actual increase charged to law students to assist needy low and middle-income resident law students. For the 1997-98 and 1998-99 academic years, the University of Washington shall use at least ten percent of the revenue received from the difference between a four percent increase in tuition fees and the actual increase charged to nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident students not in graduate, law, or first professional programs to assist needy low and middle-income resident undergraduate students and all other resident students not enrolled in graduate, law, or first professional programs. This requirement is in addition to the deposit requirements of the institutional aid fund under RCW 28B.15.820.
 - (5)) (a) For the 2003-04 academic year and each academic year thereafter, the governing boards of the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the state board for community and technical colleges may reduce or increase full-time tuition fees for resident undergraduate students, including summer school students. Percentage increases in full-time tuition fees may exceed the fiscal growth factor. Reductions or increases may be made for all or portions of an institution's programs, campuses, courses, or

- 1 students. Reductions and increases for resident undergraduate students
 2 at the community and technical colleges are limited to no more than ten
 3 percent per year starting with the 2003-04 academic year.
- 4 (b) For the 2003-04 academic year and each academic year thereafter, the governing boards of the state universities, the 5 regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the state board 6 7 for community and technical colleges may reduce or increase full-time 8 tuition fees for all students other than resident undergraduates, including summer school students. Percentage increases in full-time 9 tuition fees may exceed the fiscal growth factor. Reductions or 10 increases may be made for all or portions of an institution's programs, 11 campuses, courses, or students. 12
- (3) The legislature shall continue to fund the state need grant 13 14 program to support changes in overall program eligibility, increases in enrollments, and changes in tuition. The legislature shall increase 15 funding for the state need grant program to support annual tuition 16 increases of up to ten percent. If any undergraduate resident tuition 17 rate is increased in excess of ten percent, the state universities, the 18 19 regional universities, and The Evergreen State College are responsible for providing funds from local revenues to state need grant recipients 20 to cover the increased costs in tuition and fees resulting from the 21 tuition increase above ten percent. The amount provided per student 22 shall be at the same proportion as the increase in the underlying state 23 24 need grant for the tuition and fees increase up to ten percent. This amount of local need grant support shall be carried forward into 25 26 following years and adjusted for any future tuition and state need grant program changes. The state universities, the regional 27 universities, and The Evergreen State College shall submit a report to 28 29 the office of financial management and the higher education coordinating board at the conclusion of each academic year, describing 30 how state and institutional funds were awarded to state need grant 31 recipients. 32
- 33 (4) The tuition fees established under this chapter shall not apply 34 to high school students enrolling in participating institutions of 35 higher education under RCW 28A.600.300 through ((28A.600.395)) 36 28A.600.400.
- NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** A new section is added to chapter 28B.15 RCW to read as follows:

(1) In recognition of increasing authority at the state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen State College, to promote accountability these institutions shall permit entering freshmen and resident students enrolled in one hundred twenty semester hour or one hundred eighty quarter hour programs to enter into an agreement with the institution to guarantee that the student will be able to graduate in four years. Resident students transferring from other institutions of higher education may have an individual agreement developed by an academic advisor establishing a guaranteed graduation date based on the degree program to be undertaken, credits accepted toward program requirements, and term of arrival at the four-year institution of higher education.

- (2)(a) The state universities, the regional universities, and The Evergreen State College shall guarantee that a student enrolled in a four-year course of study will be able to graduate in four years if they meet the requirements of this subsection. Guarantees for students transferring from other institutions of higher education shall be individually developed and a guaranteed graduation date established based on the student meeting the requirements of this subsection (2).
- (b) To secure the guarantee in this subsection (2), each student and an academic advisor of that institution of higher education must enter an agreement establishing a graduation action plan for an approved course of study before enrollment.
- (c) Students are responsible to complete courses successfully and in a timely manner to maintain progress required by the graduation action plan. Students with agreements under this section, however, are not restricted any differently than other students from attending, enrolling in courses, or graduating.
- (d) Students are responsible for gaining acceptance into the degree program specified in their graduation action plan. Degree program admissions policies and procedures are not affected by the provisions of this section.
- 33 (e) The state universities, the regional universities, and The
 34 Evergreen State College are responsible for providing students with
 35 access to courses, or approved substitute courses, necessary for
 36 students to meet the requirements of their graduation action plans.
 37 Four-year institutions of higher education may provide priority
 38 enrollment to students with guaranteed graduation dates under the
 39 provisions of this section.

- (3) If a student with an existing guarantee under a graduation 1 2 action plan desires to change degree programs, the four-year 3 institution of higher education shall determine if the existing 4 guarantee can remain in force and, if so, will develop a new graduation action plan. If the four-year institution of higher education cannot 5 accommodate a student's change of degree program made after the student 6 7 completes more than fifteen credit hours, the institution is not under 8 an obligation to change the guarantee or the graduation action plan 9 under which it was established.
- (4) Should a four-year institution of higher education be unable to provide the necessary courses, preventing a student from graduating in the quarter established in the graduation action plan, the institution 12 shall waive all tuition and fees for additional courses necessary to meet the requirements of the graduation action plan that must be taken 14 15 after the guaranteed graduation date. Enrollment in required courses 16 without charging any tuition or any fees is the full extent of the remedy available to a student under the guarantee. 17
- (5) The state universities, the regional universities, and The 18 19 Evergreen State College shall report annually, by December 15th, to the office of financial management, the higher education coordinating 20 board, and the fiscal committees and the higher education committees of 21 the legislature, the number of students who have approved graduation 22 action plans, the number of students who have graduated by the 23 24 guaranteed graduation date, and waivers provided under this section 25 during the prior academic year.

- 28 (1) ((As used in this section, each of the following subsections is 29 a separate tuition category:
- 30 (a) Resident undergraduate students and all other resident students not in first professional, graduate, or law programs; 31
- 32 (b) Nonresident undergraduate students and all other nonresident 33 students not in first professional graduate or law programs;
- 34 (c) Resident graduate students;
- (d) Resident law students; 35

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- 36 (e) Nonresident graduate students;
- (f) Nonresident law students; 37
- 38 (g) Resident first professional students; and

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- 2 (2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, as used in this 3 section "first professional programs" means programs leading to one of 4 the following degrees: Doctor of medicine, doctor of dental surgery, 5 or doctor of veterinary medicine.
 - (3)) The building fee for each academic year shall be a percentage of total tuition fees. This percentage shall be calculated by the higher education coordinating board and be based on the actual percentage the building fee is of total tuition for each tuition category in the 1994-95 academic year, rounded up to the nearest half percent.
- $((\frac{4}{1}))$ (2) The governing boards of each institution of higher 12 education, except for the technical colleges, shall charge to and 13 14 collect from each student a services and activities fee. A governing 15 board may increase the existing fee annually, consistent with budgeting procedures set forth in RCW 28B.15.045, by a percentage not to exceed 16 17 the annual percentage increase in student tuition fees for ((the applicable tuition category)) resident undergraduate students: 18 19 PROVIDED, That such percentage increase shall not apply to that portion 20 of the services and activities fee previously committed to the repayment of bonded debt. These rate adjustments may exceed the fiscal 21 growth factor. For the 2003-04 academic year, the services and 22 activities fee shall be based upon the resident undergraduate services 23 24 and activities fee in 2002-03. The services and activities fee committee provided for in RCW 28B.15.045 may initiate a request to the 25 26 governing board for a fee increase.
 - (((5))) (3) Tuition and services and activities fees consistent with subsection (((4))) (2) of this section shall be set by the state board for community and technical colleges for community college summer school students unless the community college charges fees in accordance with RCW 28B.15.515.
- ((\(\frac{(+6)}{(+6)}\)) (\(\frac{4}{4}\)) Subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, each governing board of a community college may charge such fees for ungraded courses, noncredit courses, community services courses, and self-supporting courses as it, in its discretion, may determine, consistent with the rules of the state board for community and technical colleges.

- Sec. 7. RCW 28B.15.100 and 1999 c 321 s 2 are each amended to read as follows:
- 3 (1) The governing boards of the state universities, the regional 4 universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges 5 shall charge to and collect from each of the students registering at the particular institution for any quarter or semester such tuition 6 7 fees and services and activities fees, and other fees as such board shall in its discretion determine. The total of all fees shall be 8 9 rounded to the nearest whole dollar amount: PROVIDED, That such 10 tuition fees ((for other than the summer term)) shall be ((in the amounts for the respective institutions as otherwise set forth in)) 11 established in accordance with RCW 28B.15.067. 12
- (2) Part-time students shall be charged tuition and services and 13 activities fees proportionate to full-time student rates established 14 15 for residents and nonresidents: PROVIDED, That except for students registered at community colleges, students registered for fewer than 16 17 two credit hours shall be charged tuition and services and activities fees at the rate established for two credit hours: PROVIDED FURTHER, 18 19 That, subject to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, residents of Idaho 20 or Oregon who are enrolled in community college district number twenty for six or fewer credits during any quarter or semester may be exempted 21 from payment of all or a portion of the nonresident tuition fees 22 23 differential upon a declaration by the higher education coordinating 24 board that it finds Washington residents from the community college 25 district are afforded substantially equivalent treatment by such other 26 states.
- 27 (3) Full-time students registered for more than eighteen credit hours shall be charged an additional operating fee for each credit hour 28 29 in excess of eighteen hours at the applicable established per credit 30 hour tuition fee rate for part-time students: PROVIDED, That, subject 31 to the limitations of RCW 28B.15.910, the governing boards of the state universities and the community colleges may exempt all or a portion of 32 33 the additional charge, for students who are registered exclusively in 34 first professional programs in medicine, dental medicine, veterinary 35 medicine, doctor of pharmacy, or law, or who are registered exclusively 36 in required courses in vocational preparatory programs.
