- The administrative regions of the department shall develop protocols with the respective school districts in their regions specifying specific strategies for communication, coordination, and collaboration regarding the status and progress of foster children placed in the region, in order to maximize the educational continuity and achievement for foster children. The protocols shall include methods to assure effective sharing of information consistent with RCW
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW
- 21 (1) The department shall establish an oversight committee composed 22 of staff from the children's administration of the department, the 23 office of the superintendent of public instruction, and advocacy 24 agencies to develop strategies for maintaining foster children in the 25 schools they were attending at the time they entered foster care.
