1 AN ACT Relating to recreational vehicle appurtenances; and adding
2 a new section to chapter 46.44 RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** A new section is added to chapter 46.44 RCW
5 to read as follows:

6 Motor homes, travel trailers, and campers may exceed the maximum
7 width established under RCW 46.44.010 if the excess width is
8 attributable to appurtenances that do not extend beyond the body of the
9 vehicle by more than four inches, or if an awning, by more than six
10 inches. As used in this section, "appurtenance" means an appendage
11 that is installed by a factory or a vehicle dealer and is intended as
12 an integral part of the motor home, travel trailer, or camper.
13 "Appurtenance" does not include an item temporarily affixed or attached
14 to the exterior of a vehicle for the purpose of transporting the item
15 from one location to another. "Appurtenance" does not include an item
16 that obstructs the driver's rearward vision.
