Title: An act relating to Purple Heart license plates.

Brief Description: Authorizing the issuance of Purple Heart license plates for more than one motor vehicle.

Background: A registered owner of a motor vehicle in Washington State who has served in the armed forces and has been awarded a Purple Heart medal may qualify for a Purple Heart license plate. Purple Heart license plates must be issued without the payment of an additional special license plate fee. Surviving spouses or domestic partners may also qualify for a Purple Heart license plate.

Summary of Bill (Recommended Substitute): Qualified individuals are eligible to buy additional plates at a cost of \$40 for the initial fee, and \$30 upon renewal. The original plates will remain free of charge. Revenue must be deposited into the Veterans' Stewardship Account for the following:

- providing programs and services for homeless veterans;
- establishing memorials honoring veterans; and
- maintaining a future state veterans' cemetery.

This analysis was prepared by non-partisan legislative staff for the use of legislative members in their deliberations. This analysis is not a part of the legislation nor does it constitute a statement of legislative intent.

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EFFECT OF CHANGES MADE BY TRANSPORTATION COMMITTEE (**Recommended Substitute**): The specialty plate fee exempt vehicle is changed from the first vehicle to one motor vehicle. An effective date of July 1, 2017 is added.
