1 AN ACT Relating to containing the scope and costs of the diabetes
2 epidemic in Washington; adding a new chapter to Title 70 RCW; and
3 creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The health care authority, department of
6 social and health services, and department of health shall
7 collaborate to identify goals and benchmarks while also developing
8 individual agency plans to reduce the incidence of diabetes in
9 Washington, improve diabetes care, and control complications
10 associated with diabetes.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** The health care authority, department of
12 social and health services, and department of health shall each
13 submit a report to the governor and the legislature by December 31,
14 2019, and every second year thereafter, on the following:

15 (1) The financial impact and reach diabetes of all types is
16 having on programs administered by each agency and individuals
17 enrolled in those programs. Items included in this assessment must
18 include the number of lives with diabetes impacted or covered by
19 programs administered by the agency, the number of lives with
20 diabetes and family members impacted by prevention and diabetes

1 control programs implemented by the agency, the financial toll or
2 impact diabetes and its complications places on these programs, and
3 the financial toll or impact diabetes and its complications places on
4 these programs in comparison to other chronic diseases and
5 conditions;

6 (2) An assessment of the benefits of implemented programs and
7 activities aimed at controlling diabetes and preventing the disease.
8 This assessment must also document the amount and source for any
9 funding directed to the agency for programs and activities aimed at
10 reaching those with diabetes;

11 (3) A description of the level of coordination existing between
12 the agencies on activities, programmatic activities, and messaging on
13 managing, treating, or preventing all forms of diabetes and its
14 complications;

15 (4) A development or revision of detailed action plans for
16 battling diabetes with a range of actionable items for consideration
17 by the legislature. The plans must identify proposed action steps to
18 reduce the impact of diabetes, prediabetes, and related diabetes
19 complications. The plan must also identify expected outcomes of the
20 action steps proposed in the following biennium while also
21 establishing benchmarks for controlling and preventing relevant forms
22 of diabetes; and

23 (5) An estimate of costs and resources required to implement the
24 plan identified in subsection (4) of this section.

25 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** Sections 1 and 2 of this act constitute a
26 new chapter in Title 70 RCW.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** If specific funding for the purposes of
28 this act, referencing this act by bill or chapter number, is not
29 provided by June 30, 2016, in the omnibus appropriations act, this
30 act is null and void.
