1 AN ACT Relating to outdoor recreation; amending RCW 79A.05.351; 2 and adding a new section to chapter 43.06 RCW.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 79A.05.351 and 2007 c 176 s 2 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (1) The outdoor education and recreation grant program is hereby 7 subject to the availability of funds in the outdoor created, education and recreation account. The commission shall establish and 8 implement the program by rule to provide opportunities for public 9 10 agencies, private nonprofit organizations, formal school programs, 11 nonformal after-school programs, and community-based programs to 12 receive grants from the account. Programs that provide outdoor 13 education opportunities to schools shall be fully aligned with the 14 state's essential academic learning requirements.

(2) The program shall be phased in beginning with the schools and 15 16 students with the greatest needs in suburban, rural, and urban areas 17 of the state. The program shall focus on students who qualify for and reduced-price lunch, 18 free who likely to fail are most academically, or who have the greatest potential to drop out of 19 20 school.

1 (3) The director shall set priorities and develop criteria for 2 the awarding of grants to outdoor environmental, ecological, 3 agricultural, or other natural resource-based education and 4 recreation programs considering at least the following:

5 (a) Programs that contribute to the reduction of academic failure 6 and dropout rates;

7 (b) Programs that make use of research-based, effective
8 environmental, ecological, agricultural, or other natural resource9 based education curriculum;

10 (c) Programs that contribute to healthy life styles through 11 outdoor recreation and sound nutrition;

12 (d) Various Washington state parks as venues and use of the 13 commission's personnel as a resource;

14 (e) Programs that maximize the number of participants that can be 15 served;

(f) Programs that will commit matching and in-kind resources;

17 (g) Programs that create partnerships with public and private 18 entities;

(h) Programs that provide students with opportunities to directlyexperience and understand nature and the natural world; ((and))

(i) Programs that include ongoing program evaluation, assessment,
 and reporting of their effectiveness; and

23 (j) Programs that utilize veterans for at least fifty percent of 24 program implementation or administration.

25 (4) The director shall create an advisory committee to assist and 26 advise the commission in the development and administration of the outdoor education and recreation program. The director should solicit 27 representation on the committee from the office of the superintendent 28 of public instruction, the department of fish and wildlife, the 29 business community, outdoor organizations with an interest 30 in 31 education, and any others the commission deems sufficient to ensure a 32 cross section of stakeholders. When the director creates such an advisory committee, its members shall be reimbursed from the outdoor 33 education and recreation program account for travel expenses 34 as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060. 35

36 (5) The outdoor education and recreation program account is 37 created in the custody of the state treasurer. Funds deposited in the 38 outdoor education and recreation program account shall be transferred 39 only to the commission to be used solely for the commission's outdoor 40 education and recreation program purposes identified in this section

1 including the administration of the program. The director may accept gifts, grants, donations, or moneys from any source for deposit in 2 the outdoor education and recreation program account. Any public 3 agency in this state may develop and implement outdoor education and 4 recreation programs. The director may make grants to public agencies 5 б and contract with any public or private agency or person to develop and implement outdoor education and recreation programs. The outdoor 7 education and recreation program account is subject to allotment 8 9 procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but an appropriation is not required for expenditures. 10

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 43.06
12 RCW to read as follows:

(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 13 specific purpose, the governor must maintain a senior policy advisor 14 to the governor to serve as a state lead on economic development 15 issues relating to the outdoor recreation sector of the state's 16 17 The advisor focus economy. must on promoting, increasing participation in, and increasing opportunities for outdoor recreation 18 in Washington, with a particular focus on achieving economic 19 20 development and job growth through outdoor recreation.

(2) The success of the advisor must be based on measurable results relating to economic development strategies that more deliberately grow employment and outdoor recreation businesses, including:

(a) Strategies for increasing the number of new jobs directly or indirectly related to outdoor recreation, with a short-term goal of increasing employment in the sector by ten percent above the one hundred ninety-nine thousand jobs estimated to be connected to outdoor recreation as of 2015; and

30 (b) Strategies for increasing the twenty-one billion dollars of 31 consumer spending in Washington, and the four and one-half billion 32 dollars of spending from out-of-state visitors, estimated to be 33 connected to outdoor recreation as of 2015.
