3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 1.** The definitions in this section apply 4 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires 5 otherwise.

6 (1) "Eligible student" means a resident student who is enrolled 7 in an accredited doctor of medicine or doctor of osteopathic medicine 8 program in the state, is making satisfactory progress, and has 9 declared an intention to work as a physician in a rural underserved 10 area in Washington following residency.

11 (2) "Medical student loan" means a loan that is approved by the 12 office and awarded to a participant under the program.

13 (3) "Office" means the office of student financial assistance.

(4) "Participant" means an eligible student who has received amedical student loan under the program.

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(5) "Program" means the medical student loan program.

17 (6) "Rural underserved area" means a rural county as defined in 18 RCW 82.14.370 that is also designated by the health resources and 19 services administration as a medically underserved area or having a 20 medically underserved population.

21 NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. The medical student loan program is established to increase the physician workforce in rural underserved 22 23 areas in Washington state. The program must be funded exclusively with private funding for the purpose of providing medical student 24 25 loans. State funding may be used for the administration of the 26 The office shall administer the program and has program. the 27 following powers and duties:

28 (1) To design and implement a low interest medical student loan 29 program with the following elements:

30 (a) A low interest rate, comparable to or more favorable than the 31 federal direct loan program, with interest charges that begin to

1 accrue once the participant finishes his or her medical residency
2 program;

3 (b) An annual loan limit not to exceed forty thousand dollars and 4 no more than the participant's estimated cost of attendance as 5 determined by his or her medical program;

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(c) Loan repayments that do not commence until:

7 (i) Six months after the participant completes his or her medical8 residency program; or

9 (ii) Six months after a participant leaves his or her doctor of 10 medicine program, doctor of osteopathic medicine program, or medical 11 residency program before completing; and

(d) An interest rate of at least twelve percent plus capitalized interest that was deferred during the participant's doctor of medicine or doctor of osteopathic medicine program, and residency program, if the participant does not work as a physician in a rural underserved area in Washington for three years following completion of his or her medical residency program;

18 (2) To establish an application, selection, and notification19 process for awarding medical student loans to eligible students;

(3) To define the terms of repayment, including applicableinterest rates, fees, and deferments;

(4) To collect and manage repayments on the medical studentloans;

(5) To solicit and accept grants and donations from nonstatepublic and private sources for the program;

(6) To exercise discretion to revise repayment obligations in
 certain cases, such as economic hardship or disability;

28 (7) To publicize the program; and

29 (8) To adopt necessary rules.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) The medical student loan account is 31 created in the custody of the state treasurer. Only the executive 32 director of the office or the executive director's designee may 33 authorize expenditures from the account. No appropriation is required 34 for expenditures from the account for medical student loans. An 35 appropriation is required for expenditures from the account for costs 36 associated with program administration by the office.

37 (2) The office shall deposit into the account all moneys received
 38 for the program. Revenues to the account consist of moneys received
 39 for the program by the office, including grants and donations, and
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1 receipts from participant repayments, including principal and 2 interest.

(3) Expenditures from the account may be used solely for medical 3 student loans to participants in the program established by this 4 chapter and costs associated with program administration by the 5 б office.

7 **Sec. 4.** (1) The office shall submit an annual NEW SECTION. report regarding the program to the governor and the appropriate 8 committees of the legislature in accordance with the reporting 9 10 requirements in RCW 43.01.036.

(a) The number of applicants for medical student loans; 13

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(b) The number of participants in the program;

(c) The number of participants in the program who complete their 15 medical program; 16

17 (d) The number of participants in the program who are placed in 18 employment;

19 (e) The nature of that employment, including the type of job; whether the job is full-time, part-time, or temporary; and the income 20 21 range;

(f) Whether the participant is working in a rural underserved 22 23 area, and what percent of the participant's patients are served by 24 medicaid, the children's health insurance program, apple health, or 25 other programs with similar eliqibility requirements;

26 (g) Demographic profiles of both applicants and participants;

27 (h) The amount of the private funding collected for the program; 28 and

(i) An estimate of when the program will be self-sustaining. 29

30 (3) The annual report must be submitted by December 1st of each year after July 1, 2020. 31

32 Sec. 5. RCW 28B.145.005 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 13 s 1 are each 33 amended to read as follows:

34 The legislature finds that, despite increases in degree 35 production, there remain acute shortages in high employer demand of study, particularly in the science, 36 programs technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) and health care fields of study. 37 According to the workforce training and education coordinating board, 38 Code Rev/PW:jcm 3 S-5961.2/18 2nd draft

seventeen percent of Washington businesses had difficulty finding job applicants in 2010. Eleven thousand employers did not fill a vacancy because they lacked qualified job applicants. Fifty-nine percent of projected job openings in Washington state from now until 2017 will require some form of postsecondary education and training.

6 Ιt is the intent of the legislature to provide jobs and 7 opportunity by making Washington the place where the world's most productive companies find the world's most talented people. 8 The legislature intends to accomplish this through the creation of the 9 opportunity scholarship and the opportunity expansion programs to 10 11 help mitigate the impact of tuition increases, increase the number of baccalaureate degrees in high employer demand and other programs and 12 advanced degrees in health professions needed in service obligation 13 14 areas, and invest in programs and students to meet market demands for a knowledge-based economy while filling middle-income jobs with a 15 16 sufficient supply of skilled workers.

 27 other programs of study as determined by the board.

28 (((4))) (5) "Eligible expenses" means reasonable expenses 29 associated with the costs of acquiring an education such as tuition, 30 books, equipment, fees, room and board, and other expenses as 31 determined by the program administrator in consultation with the 32 council and the state board for community and technical colleges.

16 (((+8))) (9) "Program administrator" means a ((college scholarship 17 organization that is a)) private nonprofit corporation registered 18 under Title 24 RCW and qualified as a tax-exempt entity under section 19 501(c)(3) of the federal internal revenue code((, with expertise in 20 managing scholarships and college advising)).

21 (((-9))) (10) "Resident student" has the same meaning as provided 22 in RCW 28B.15.012.

23 (11) "Service obligation" means an obligation by the participant 24 to be employed in a service obligation area in the state for a 25 specific period to be established by the board.

26 <u>(12) "Service obligation area" means a location that meets one of</u> 27 <u>the following conditions:</u>

3 **Sec. 7.** RCW 28B.145.020 and 2014 c 208 s 2 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 (1) The opportunity scholarship board is created. The board 6 consists of eleven members:

7 (a) Six members appointed by the governor. For three of the six 8 appointments, the governor shall consider names from a list provided 9 by the president of the senate and the speaker of the house of 10 representatives; and

(b) Five foundation or business and industry representatives 11 appointed by the governor from among the state's most productive 12 industries such as aerospace, manufacturing, health care, information 13 technology, engineering, agriculture, and others, as 14 well as philanthropy. 23 (a) A list of the eligible advanced degree programs and service
24 obligation areas;

25 <u>(b) The number of participants in eligible advanced degree</u> 26 programs, the number of participants completing their service 27 obligations in a service obligation area, and the number of 28 participants who have completed their service obligation; and

29 (c) The number of participants who did not complete their service 30 obligation who now owe a repayment obligation and the reasons why the 31 participants did not complete their service obligations.

32 **Sec. 8.** RCW 28B.145.030 and 2014 c 208 s 3 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

(1) The program administrator((, under contract with the council, 34 shall staff the board and)) shall ((have)) provide administrative 35 support to execute the duties and responsibilities provided in this 36 chapter, including but not limited to publicizing the program, 37 38 selecting participants for the opportunity scholarship award, distributing opportunity scholarship awards, and achieving the 39 Code Rev/PW:jcm 7 S-5961.2/18 2nd draft

1 maximum possible rate of return on investment of the accounts in 2 subsection (2) of this section, while ensuring transparency in the 3 investment decisions and processes. Duties, exercised jointly with 4 the board, include soliciting funds and setting annual fund-raising 5 goals. The program administrator shall be paid an administrative fee 6 as determined by the board.

In any year in which the office of financial management 7 reports that the state has not made progress toward this goal, no new scholarships may be awarded. (iii))) (iv) An amount equal to at least fifty percent of all 23 grants and contributions must be deposited into the scholarship 24 25 account until such time as twenty million dollars have been deposited 26 into the account, after which time the private donors may designate whether their contributions must be deposited to the scholarship, the 27 28 advanced degrees pathways, or the endowment accounts. The annual amount shall be at least 30 31 one thousand dollars or the amount determined under (e) of this subsection, but may be increased on an income-based, sliding scale 32 basis up to the amount necessary to cover all reasonable annual 33 eligible expenses as assessed pursuant to (d) of this subsection, or 34 to encourage participation in baccalaureate degree programs 35 or 36 eligible advanced degree programs identified by the board;

(i) Notify institutions of scholarship recipients who will attend their institutions and inform them of the terms of the students' eligibility;

18 (j) Establish a required service obligation for participants 19 enrolled in an eligible advanced degree program, and establish a 20 process for verifying a participant's employment in a service 21 obligation area; and

22 (k) Establish a repayment obligation and appeals process for participants who serve less than the required service obligation, 23 unless the program administrator determines the circumstances are 24 beyond the participant's control. If the participant is unable to pay 25 the repayment obligation in full, the participant may enter into 26 payment arrangements with the program administrator. The program 27 administrator is responsible for the collection of repayment 28 obligations on behalf of participants who fail to complete their 29 service obligation. 30

31 (3) With respect to the opportunity expansion program, the 32 program administrator shall:

33 (a) Assist the board in developing and implementing an 34 application, selection, and notification process for making 35 opportunity expansion awards; and

36 (b) Solicit and accept grants and contributions from private37 sources for opportunity expansion awards.

38 Sec. 9. RCW 28B.145.040 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 13 s 5 are each 39 amended to read as follows:

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(1) The opportunity scholarship program is established.

2 (2) The purpose of this scholarship program is to provide 3 scholarships that will help low and middle-income Washington residents earn baccalaureate degrees in high employer demand and 4 other programs of study and advanced degrees in health professions 5 6 needed in service obligation areas, and encourage them to remain in 7 the state to work. The program must be designed for ((both)) students starting at two-year institutions of higher education and intending 8 to transfer to four-year institutions of higher education ((and)), 9 students starting at four-year institutions of higher education, and 10 11 students enrolled in an eligible advanced degree program.

12 (3) The opportunity scholarship board shall determine which 13 programs of study, including but not limited to high employer demand 14 programs, are eligible for purposes of the opportunity scholarship. 15 For eligible advanced degree programs, the board shall limit 16 scholarships to eligible students enrolling in programs that lead to 17 credentials in health professions needed in service obligation areas.

18 (4) The source of funds for the program shall be a combination of private grants and contributions and state matching funds. A state 19 match may be earned under this section for private contributions made 20 21 on or after June 6, 2011. A state match, up to a maximum of fifty million dollars annually, shall be provided beginning the later of 22 January 1, 2014, or January 1st next following the end of the fiscal 23 24 year in which collections of state retail sales and use tax, state 25 business and occupation tax, and state public utility tax exceed, by 26 ten percent the amounts collected from these tax resources in the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2008, as determined by the department 27 28 of revenue.

29 **Sec. 10.** RCW 28B.145.090 and 2014 c 208 s 4 are each amended to 30 read as follows:

(1) The board may elect to have the state investment board invest 31 the funds in the scholarship account, the advanced degrees pathways 32 33 and the endowment account described under account, RCW 28B.145.030(2)(b). If the board so elects, the state investment board 34 35 has the full power to invest, reinvest, manage, contract, sell, or 36 exchange investment money in the ((two)) accounts. All investment and 37 operating costs associated with the investment of money shall be paid 38 under RCW 43.33A.160 and 43.84.160. With the exception of these expenses, the earnings from the investment of the money shall be
 retained by the accounts.

3 (2) All investments made by the state investment board shall be 4 made with the exercise of that degree of judgment and care under RCW 5 43.33A.140 and the investment policy established by the state 6 investment board.

7 (3) As deemed appropriate by the state investment board, money in 8 the scholarship<u>, advanced degrees pathways</u>, and endowment accounts 9 may be commingled for investment with other funds subject to 10 investment by the state investment board.

11 (4) Members of the state investment board shall not be considered 12 an insurer of the funds or assets and are not liable for any action 13 or inaction.

14 (5) Members of the state investment board are not liable to the 15 state, to the fund, or to any other person as a result of their 16 activities as members, whether ministerial or discretionary, except 17 for willful dishonesty or intentional violations of law. The state 18 investment board in its discretion may purchase liability insurance 19 for members.

(6) The authority to establish all policies relating to the 20 21 scholarship account, the advanced degrees pathways account, and the endowment account, other than the investment policies as provided in 22 subsections (1) through (3) of this section, resides with the board 23 and program administrator acting in accordance with the principles 24 25 set forth in this chapter. With the exception of expenses of the 26 state investment board in subsection (1) of this section, disbursements from the scholarship account, the advanced degrees 27 pathways account, and the endowment account shall be made only on the 28 29 authorization of the opportunity scholarship board or its designee, and moneys in the accounts may be spent only for the purposes 30 31 specified in this chapter.

32 (7) The state investment board shall routinely consult and 33 communicate with the board on the investment policy, earnings of the 34 accounts, and related needs of the program.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. Sections 1 through 4 of this act 36 constitute a new chapter in Title 28B RCW."

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1 On page 1, line 2 of the title, after "students;" strike the 2 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28B.145.005, 3 28B.145.010, 28B.145.020, 28B.145.030, 28B.145.040, and 28B.145.090; 4 and adding a new chapter to Title 28B RCW."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Modifies the name of the account to the Advanced Degrees Pathways Account. Requires that state match funds transferred into the Advanced Degrees Pathways Account cannot exceed \$1 million per biennium. Makes technical corrections.

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
