1 AN ACT Relating to school safety drills; and amending RCW 2 28A.320.125.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.320.125 and 2013 c 14 s 1 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (1) The legislature considers it to be a matter of public safety 7 for public schools and staff to have current safe school plans and place, fully consistent with federal procedures law. The 8 in legislature further finds and intends, by requiring safe school plans 9 10 to be in place, that school districts will become eligible for 11 federal assistance. The legislature further finds that schools are in a position to serve the community in the event of an emergency 12 resulting from natural disasters or man-made disasters. 13

14 (2) Schools and school districts shall consider the guidance 15 provided by the superintendent of public instruction, including the 16 comprehensive school safety checklist and the model comprehensive 17 safe school plans that include prevention, intervention, all hazard/ 18 crisis response, and postcrisis recovery, when developing their own 19 individual comprehensive safe school plans. Each school district 20 shall adopt, no later than September 1, 2008, and implement a safe 1 school plan consistent with the school mapping information system
2 pursuant to RCW 36.28A.060. The plan shall:

3 (a) Include required school safety policies and procedures;

4 (b) Address emergency mitigation, preparedness, response, and 5 recovery;

6 (c) Include provisions for assisting and communicating with 7 students and staff, including those with special needs or 8 disabilities;

9 (d) Use the training guidance provided by the Washington 10 emergency management division of the state military department in 11 collaboration with the Washington state office of the superintendent 12 of public instruction school safety center and the school safety 13 center advisory committee;

14 (e) Require the building principal to be certified on the 15 incident command system;

16 (f) Take into account the manner in which the school facilities 17 may be used as a community asset in the event of a community-wide 18 emergency; and

(g) Set guidelines for requesting city or county law enforcement agencies, local fire departments, emergency service providers, and county emergency management agencies to meet with school districts and participate in safety-related drills.

23 (3) To the extent funds are available, school districts shall 24 annually:

(a) Review and update safe school plans in collaboration withlocal emergency response agencies;

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(b) Conduct an inventory of all hazardous materials;

(c) Update information on the school mapping information systemto reflect current staffing and updated plans, including:

(i) Identifying all staff members who are trained on the national
 incident management system, trained on the incident command system,
 or are certified on the incident command system; and

(ii) Identifying school transportation procedures for evacuation, to include bus staging areas, evacuation routes, communication systems, parent-student reunification sites, and secondary transportation agreements consistent with the school mapping information system; and

38 (d) Provide information to all staff on the use of emergency39 supplies and notification and alert procedures.

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1 (4) To the extent funds are available, school districts shall 2 annually record and report on the information and activities required 3 in subsection (3) of this section to the Washington association of 4 sheriffs and police chiefs.

5 (5) School districts are encouraged to work with local emergency 6 management agencies and other emergency responders to conduct one 7 tabletop exercise, one functional exercise, and two full-scale 8 exercises within a four-year period.

9 (6) ((Schools shall conduct no less than one safety-related drill 10 each month that school is in session. Schools shall complete no less than one drill using the school mapping information system, three 11 drills for lockdowns, one drill for shelter-in-place, three drills 12 for fire evacuation in accordance with the state fire code, and one 13 other safety-related drill to be determined by the school. Schools 14 15 should consider drills for earthquakes, tsunamis, or other high-risk 16 local events. Schools shall document the date and time of such 17 drills.)) (a) Due to geographic location, schools have unique safety challenges. It is the responsibility of school principals and 18 administrators to assess the threats and hazards most likely to 19 impact their school, and to practice three basic functional drills, 20 shelter-in-place, lockdown, and evacuation, as these drills relate to 21 those threats and hazards. Some threats or hazards may require the 22 use of more than one basic functional drill. 23

24 (b) Schools shall conduct at least one safety-related drill per 25 month, including summer months when school is in session with 26 students. These drills must teach students three basic functional 27 drill responses:

28 (i) "Shelter-in-place," used to limit the exposure of students 29 and staff to hazardous materials, such as chemical, biological, or 30 radiological contaminants, released into the environment by isolating 31 the inside environment from the outside;

32 <u>(ii) "Lockdown," used to isolate students and staff from threats</u> 33 <u>of violence, such as suspicious trespassers or armed intruders, that</u> 34 <u>may occur in a school or in the vicinity of a school; and</u>

35 (iii) "Evacuation," used to move students and staff away from
 36 threats, such as fires, oil train spills, or tsunamis.

37 <u>(c) The drills described in (b) of this subsection must</u>
38 <u>incorporate the following requirements:</u>

39 (i) Use of the school mapping information system in at least one 40 of the safety-related drills; and (ii) A pedestrian evacuation drill for schools in mapped tsunami
 hazard zones.

3 (d) The drills described in (b) of this subsection may
4 incorporate an earthquake drill using the state-approved earthquake
5 safety technique "drop, cover, and hold."

6 (e) Schools shall document the date, time, and type (shelter-in7 place, lockdown, or evacuate) of each drill required under this
8 subsection (6), and maintain the documentation in the school office.

9 <u>(f)</u> This subsection <u>(6)</u> is intended to satisfy all federal 10 requirements for comprehensive school emergency drills and 11 evacuations.

12 (7) Educational service districts are encouraged to apply for 13 federal emergency response and crisis management grants with the 14 assistance of the superintendent of public instruction and the 15 Washington emergency management division of the state military 16 department.

17 (8) The superintendent of public instruction may adopt rules to 18 implement provisions of this section. These rules may include, but 19 are not limited to, provisions for evacuations, lockdowns, or other 20 components of a comprehensive safe school plan.
