1 AN ACT Relating to exempting United States food and drug 2 administration nonpublic information from disclosure under the state 3 public disclosure act; reenacting and amending RCW 42.56.380; adding 4 a new section to chapter 15.130 RCW; and creating a new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the United 7 States food and drug administration has stopped sharing nonpublic information with the Washington state department of agriculture and 8 9 has indicated that unless the state can protect nonpublic food and 10 drug administration information from disclosure consistent with 11 federal law, the food and drug administration may discontinue future 12 contracts and cooperative agreements with the Washington state department of 13 agriculture for food safety, feed safety, rapid 14 response, and laboratory programs. The legislature further finds that 15 the loss of these contracts and cooperative agreements would result 16 in significant reductions in state food safety funding, staffing, and 17 infrastructure. The loss of certain nonpublic information diminishes 18 the department of agriculture's ability to respond to food-related 19 public health emergencies degrades the department and of 20 agriculture's capacity to support the movement of state agricultural 21 products in interstate and international commerce. The legislature

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1 therefore intends to exempt United States food and drug administration nonpublic information from disclosure under the state 2 public disclosure act when the department of agriculture obtains such 3 information or records in the course of a federal contract or 4 commissioning agreement entered into under the authority of chapter 5 6 15.130 RCW, the food safety and security act.

7 Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 15.130 NEW SECTION. RCW under the subchapter heading "general provisions" to read as 8 9 follows:

The following information or records obtained from the federal 10 food and drug administration pursuant to a contract or commissioning 11 agreement is exempt from public inspection and copying under chapter 12 42.56 RCW to the extent it is exempt from disclosure under 5 U.S.C. 13 Sec. 552, the federal freedom of information act: Trade secrets; 14 15 confidential commercial information; information under the federal 16 deliberative process privilege; information compiled for law 17 enforcement purposes; and information expressly required to be kept confidential by other federal laws. 18

Sec. 3. RCW 42.56.380 and 2018 c 170 s 1 and 2018 c 106 s 11 are 19 each reenacted and amended to read as follows: 20

21 The following information relating to agriculture and livestock 22 is exempt from disclosure under this chapter:

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(1) Business-related information under RCW 15.86.110;

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(2) Information provided under RCW 15.54.362;

(3) Production or sales records required to determine assessment 25 26 levels and actual assessment payments to commodity boards and commissions formed under chapters 15.24, 15.26, 15.28, 15.44, 15.65, 27 15.66, 15.74, 15.88, 15.115, 15.100, 15.89, and 16.67 RCW or required 28 29 by the department of agriculture to administer these chapters or the 30 department's programs;

31 Consignment information contained (4) phytosanitary on certificates issued by the department of agriculture under chapters 32 15.13, 15.49, and 15.17 RCW or federal phytosanitary certificates 33 34 issued under 7 C.F.R. 353 through cooperative agreements with the animal and plant health inspection service, United States department 35 of agriculture, or on applications for phytosanitary certification 36 37 required by the department of agriculture;

1 (5) Financial and commercial information and records supplied by persons (a) to the department of agriculture for the purpose of 2 conducting a referendum for the potential establishment of a 3 commodity board or commission; or (b) to the department 4 of agriculture or commodity boards or commissions formed under chapter 5 6 15.24, 15.28, 15.44, 15.65, 15.66, 15.74, 15.88, 15.115, 15.100, 7 15.89, or 16.67 RCW with respect to domestic or export marketing activities or individual producer's production information; 8

9 (6) Information obtained regarding the purchases, sales, or 10 production of an individual American ginseng grower or dealer, except 11 for providing reports to the United States fish and wildlife service 12 under RCW 15.19.080;

13 (7) Information collected regarding packers and shippers of 14 fruits and vegetables for the issuance of certificates of compliance 15 under RCW 15.17.140(2) and 15.17.143;

16 (8) Financial statements obtained under RCW 16.65.030(1)(d) for 17 the purposes of determining whether or not the applicant meets the 18 minimum net worth requirements to construct or operate a public 19 livestock market;

(9) Information submitted by an individual or business to the 20 21 department of agriculture under the requirements of chapters 16.36, 22 16.57, and 43.23 RCW for the purpose of herd inventory management for animal disease traceability. This information includes 23 animal ownership, numbers of animals, locations, contact information, 24 25 movements of livestock, financial information, the purchase and sale 26 of livestock, account numbers or unique identifiers issued by government to private entities, and information related to livestock 27 disease or injury that would identify an animal, a person, or 28 29 location. Disclosure to local, state, and federal officials is not public disclosure. This exemption does not affect the disclosure of 30 31 information used in reportable animal health investigations under 32 chapter 16.36 RCW once they are complete;

33 (10) Results of testing for animal diseases from samples 34 submitted by or at the direction of the animal owner or his or her 35 designee that can be identified to a particular business or 36 individual;

37 (11) Records of international livestock importation that can be 38 identified to a particular animal, business, or individual received 39 from the United States department of homeland security or the United

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States department of agriculture that are not disclosable by the
federal agency under federal law including 5 U.S.C. Sec. 552;

3 (12) Records related to the entry of prohibited agricultural 4 products imported into Washington state or that had Washington state 5 as a final destination received from the United States department of 6 homeland security or the United States department of agriculture that 7 are not disclosable by the federal agency under federal law including 8 5 U.S.C. Sec. 552; ((and))

9 (13) Information obtained from the federal government or others 10 under contract with the federal government or records obtained by the 11 department of agriculture, in accordance with RCW 15.135.100; ((and))

12 (14) Hop grower lot numbers and laboratory results associated 13 with the hop grower lot numbers where this information is used by the 14 department of agriculture to issue export documents; and

15 (15) Information or records obtained pursuant to a food and drug 16 administration contract or commissioning agreement, in accordance 17 with section 2 of this act.

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
