SENATE BILL 5315

State of Washington 66th Legislature 2019 Regular Session

By Senators Wellman, Dhingra, Hasegawa, Saldaña, and Van De Wege; by request of Office of Financial Management

Read first time 01/17/19. Referred to Committee on Early Learning & K-12 Education.

AN ACT Relating to increasing student support staff in the prototypical school funding model; amending RCW 28A.150.260 and 28A.400.007; and providing an effective date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.150.260 and 2018 c 266 s 101 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 The purpose of this section is to provide for the allocation of 8 state funding that the legislature deems necessary to support school 9 districts in offering the minimum instructional program of basic 10 education under RCW 28A.150.220. The allocation shall be determined 11 as follows:

12 (1)The governor shall and the superintendent of public 13 instruction may recommend to the legislature a formula for the 14 distribution of a basic education instructional allocation for each 15 common school district.

(2) (a) The distribution formula under this section shall be for allocation purposes only. Except as may be required under subsections (4) (b) and (c) and (9) of this section, chapter 28A.155, 28A.165, 28A.180, or 28A.185 RCW, or federal laws and regulations, nothing in this section requires school districts to use basic education instructional funds to implement a particular instructional approach or service. Nothing in this section requires school districts to maintain a particular classroom teacher-to-student ratio or other staff-to-student ratio or to use allocated funds to pay for particular types or classifications of staff. Nothing in this section entitles an individual teacher to a particular teacher planning period.

7 (b) To promote transparency in state funding allocations, the superintendent of public instruction must report state per-pupil 8 allocations for each school district for the general apportionment, 9 10 special education, learning assistance, transitional bilingual, highly capable, and career and technical education programs. The 11 12 superintendent must also report state general apportionment per-pupil allocations by grade for each school district. The superintendent 13 must report this information in a user-friendly format on the main 14 15 page of the office's web site and on school district apportionment 16 reports. School districts must include a link to the superintendent's 17 per-pupil allocations report on the main page of the school district's web site. In addition, the budget documents published by 18 19 the legislature for the enacted omnibus operating appropriations act must report statewide average per-pupil allocations for general 20 21 apportionment and the categorical programs listed in this subsection.

(3) (a) To the extent the technical details of the formula have 22 23 been adopted by the legislature and except when specifically provided as a school district allocation, the distribution formula for the 24 25 basic education instructional allocation shall be based on minimum staffing and nonstaff costs the legislature deems necessary to 26 27 support instruction and operations in prototypical schools serving 28 high, middle, and elementary school students as provided in this section. The use of prototypical schools for the distribution formula 29 30 does not constitute legislative intent that schools should be 31 operated or structured in a similar fashion as the prototypes. 32 Prototypical schools illustrate the level of resources needed to operate a school of a particular size with particular types and grade 33 levels of students using commonly understood terms and inputs, such 34 as class size, hours of instruction, and various categories of school 35 staff. It is the intent that the funding allocations to school 36 districts be adjusted from the school prototypes based on the actual 37 number of annual average full-time equivalent students in each grade 38 39 level at each school in the district and not based on the grade-level 40 configuration of the school to the extent that data is available. The

1 allocations shall be further adjusted from the school prototypes with 2 minimum allocations for small schools and to reflect other factors 3 identified in the omnibus appropriations act.

4 (b) For the purposes of this section, prototypical schools are 5 defined as follows:

6 (i) A prototypical high school has six hundred average annual 7 full-time equivalent students in grades nine through twelve;

8 (ii) A prototypical middle school has four hundred thirty-two 9 average annual full-time equivalent students in grades seven and 10 eight; and

(iii) A prototypical elementary school has four hundred average annual full-time equivalent students in grades kindergarten through six.

(4) (a) (i) The minimum allocation for each level of prototypical school shall be based on the number of full-time equivalent classroom teachers needed to provide instruction over the minimum required annual instructional hours under RCW 28A.150.220 and provide at least one teacher planning period per school day, and based on the following general education average class size of full-time equivalent students per teacher:

(ii) The minimum class size allocation for each prototypical high 28 school shall also provide for enhanced funding for class size 29 reduction for two laboratory science classes within grades nine 30 through twelve per full-time equivalent high school student 31 multiplied by a laboratory science course factor of 0.0833, based on 32 the number of full-time equivalent classroom teachers needed to 33 provide instruction over the minimum required annual instructional 34 35 hours in RCW 28A.150.220, and providing at least one teacher planning period per school day: 36

(b) (i) Beginning September 1, 2019, funding for average K-3 class 1 2 sizes in this subsection (4) may be provided only to the extent of, 3 and proportionate to, the school district's demonstrated actual class 4 size in grades K-3, up to the funded class sizes. 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1 In addition to the amounts provided in (a) of this (b) 2 subsection, beginning in the 2014-15 school year, the omnibus 3 appropriations act shall provide the following minimum allocation for each annual average full-time equivalent student in grades nine 4 through twelve for the following materials, supplies, and operating 5 6 costs, to be adjusted annually for inflation: 7 Per annual average 8 full-time equivalent student 9 in grades 9-12 10 11 \$39.02

16 (9) In addition to the amounts provided in subsection (8) of this 17 section and subject to RCW 28A.150.265, the omnibus appropriations 18 act shall provide an amount based on full-time equivalent student 19 enrollment in each of the following:

(a) Exploratory career and technical education courses forstudents in grades seven through twelve;

(b) Preparatory career and technical education courses for
students in grades nine through twelve offered in a high school; and
(c) Preparatory career and technical education courses for
students in grades eleven and twelve offered through a skill center.

(10) In addition to the allocations otherwise provided under this section, amounts shall be provided to support the following programs and services:

29 (a) (i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for 30 students who are not meeting academic standards through the learning 31 assistance program under RCW 28A.165.005 through 28A.165.065, allocations shall be based on the district percentage of students in 32 grades K-12 who were eligible for free or reduced-price meals in the 33 prior school year. The minimum allocation for the program shall 34 35 provide for each level of prototypical school resources to provide, on a statewide average, 2.3975 hours per week in extra instruction 36 with a class size of fifteen learning assistance program students per 37 38 teacher.

1 (ii) In addition to funding allocated under (a)(i) of this subsection, to provide supplemental instruction and services for 2 3 students who are not meeting academic standards in qualifying schools. A qualifying school means a school in which the three-year 4 rolling average of the prior year total annual average enrollment 5 6 that qualifies for free or reduced-price meals equals or exceeds 7 fifty percent or more of its total annual average enrollment. The minimum allocation for this additional high poverty-based allocation 8 must provide for each level of prototypical school resources to 9 provide, on a statewide average, 1.1 hours per week in extra 10 11 instruction with a class size of fifteen learning assistance program 12 students per teacher, under RCW 28A.165.055, school districts must distribute the high poverty-based allocation to the schools that 13 generated the funding allocation. 14

(b)(i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for 15 students whose primary language is other than English, allocations 16 17 shall be based on the head count number of students in each school who are eligible for and enrolled in the transitional bilingual 18 instruction program under RCW 28A.180.010 through 28A.180.080. The 19 minimum allocation for each level of prototypical school shall 20 21 provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 4.7780 hours per week in extra instruction for students in grades kindergarten 22 23 through six and 6.7780 hours per week in extra instruction for students in grades seven through twelve, with fifteen transitional 24 25 bilingual instruction program students per teacher. Notwithstanding 26 other provisions of this subsection (10), the actual per-student allocation may be scaled to provide a larger allocation for students 27 28 needing more intensive intervention and a commensurate reduced allocation for students needing less intensive intervention, as 29 30 detailed in the omnibus appropriations act.

31 To provide supplemental instruction and services for (ii) 32 students who have exited the transitional bilingual program, allocations shall be based on the head count number of students in 33 each school who have exited the transitional bilingual program within 34 the previous two years based on their performance on the English 35 proficiency assessment and are eligible for and enrolled in the 36 transitional bilingual instruction program 37 under RCW The minimum allocation for each prototypical 38 28A.180.040(1)(g). 39 school shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average,

3.0 hours per week in extra instruction with fifteen exited students
per teacher.

3 (c) To provide additional allocations to support programs for highly capable students under RCW 28A.185.010 through 28A.185.030, 4 allocations shall be based on 5.0 percent of each school district's 5 6 full-time equivalent basic education enrollment. The minimum allocation for the programs shall provide resources to provide, on a 7 statewide average, 2.1590 hours per week in extra instruction with 8 fifteen highly capable program students per teacher. 9

10 (11) The allocations under subsections (4)(a), (5), (6), and (8) 11 of this section shall be enhanced as provided under RCW 28A.150.390 12 on an excess cost basis to provide supplemental instructional 13 resources for students with disabilities.

(12) (a) For the purposes of allocations for prototypical high schools and middle schools under subsections (4) and (10) of this section that are based on the percent of students in the school who are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, the actual percent of such students in a school shall be adjusted by a factor identified in the omnibus appropriations act to reflect underreporting of free and reduced-price meal eligibility among middle and high school students.

(b) Allocations or enhancements provided under subsections (4), (7), and (9) of this section for exploratory and preparatory career and technical education courses shall be provided only for courses approved by the office of the superintendent of public instruction under chapter 28A.700 RCW.

(13) (a) This formula for distribution of basic education funds shall be reviewed biennially by the superintendent and governor. The recommended formula shall be subject to approval, amendment or rejection by the legislature.

30 (b) In the event the legislature rejects the distribution formula 31 recommended by the governor, without adopting a new distribution 32 formula, the distribution formula for the previous school year shall 33 remain in effect.

34 (c) The enrollment of any district shall be the annual average 35 number of full-time equivalent students and part-time students as 36 provided in RCW 28A.150.350, enrolled on the first school day of each 37 month, including students who are in attendance pursuant to RCW 38 28A.335.160 and 28A.225.250 who do not reside within the servicing 39 school district. The definition of full-time equivalent student shall 40 be determined by rules of the superintendent of public instruction

and shall be included as part of the superintendent's biennial budget request. The definition shall be based on the minimum instructional hour offerings required under RCW 28A.150.220. Any revision of the present definition shall not take effect until approved by the house ways and means committee and the senate ways and means committee.

6 (d) The office of financial management shall make a monthly 7 review of the superintendent's reported full-time equivalent students 8 in the common schools in conjunction with RCW 43.62.050.

9 Sec. 2. RCW 28A.400.007 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 13 s 904 are each 10 amended to read as follows:

(1) In addition to the staffing units in RCW 28A.150.260, the superintendent of public instruction must provide school districts with allocations for the following staff units if and to the extent that funding is specifically appropriated and designated for that category of staffing unit in the omnibus operating appropriations act.
