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- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 74.15.311 and 2013 c 105 s 3 are each amended to 5 read as follows:
  - (1) The secretary is authorized to license resource and assessment centers if the agency meets the following requirements:
- 8 (a) There is a demonstrated need in the local community for a 9 resource and assessment center; and
- 10 (b) The resource and assessment center will be primarily staffed 11 by trained volunteers((; and
- 12 (c) The resource and assessment center demonstrates it is not 13 financially dependent on reimbursement from the state to operate)).
  - (2) The department may adopt rules to specify licensing requirements for resource and assessment centers. Rules adopted by the department shall allow:
- 17 (a) A sufficient number of trained volunteers to meet staffing 18 requirements;
- 19 (b) Flexibility in hours of operation and not require the 20 resource and assessment center to be open if there are no children in 21 its care; and

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(c) The ability to operate in a residential area.
