1 AN ACT Relating to designating kimchi day; amending RCW 1.16.050; 2 and creating a new section.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

The legislature finds that kimchi is a 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. 5 traditional Korean dish with a long, rich history beginning over 6 2,000 years ago during the time of the three kingdoms of Korea. 7 "Kimjang," the process by which kimchi is prepared, has been recognized as an intangible cultural heritage of humanity by the 8 United Nations educational, scientific, and cultural organization. 9 10 Kimchi is found for sale across the United States at major retailers 11 and is becoming an international staple as an excellent source of 12 probiotics, filate, beta-carotene, choline, potassium, calcium, and 13 vitamins A, C, and K, many of which contribute to lower rates of 14 stroke, cancer, and diabetes. The legislature further finds that 15 South Korea celebrates "national kimchi day" on November 22nd, 16 representing the 11 major ingredients and 22 health benefits of the 17 dish. The states of California, Virginia, and Hawaii also recognize November 22nd as kimchi day. The legislature intends to join these 18 19 governments by recognizing November 22nd of each year as "kimchi day." 20

1 Sec. 2. RCW 1.16.050 and 2024 c 76 s 3 are each amended to read 2 as follows:

3 (1) The following are state legal holidays:

4 (a) Sunday;

5 (b) The first day of January, commonly called New Year's Day;

6 (c) The third Monday of January, celebrated as the anniversary of 7 the birth of Martin Luther King, Jr.;

8 (d) The third Monday of February, to be known as Presidents' Day 9 and celebrated as the anniversary of the births of Abraham Lincoln 10 and George Washington;

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(e) The last Monday of May, commonly known as Memorial Day;

12 (f) The nineteenth day of June, recognized as Juneteenth, a day 13 of remembrance for the day the African slaves learned of their 14 freedom;

(g) The fourth day of July, the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence;

17 18 (h) The first Monday in September, to be known as Labor Day;

(i) The eleventh day of November, to be known as Veterans Day;

(j) The fourth Thursday in November, to be known as Thanksgiving Day;

(k) The Friday immediately following the fourth Thursday in
November, to be known as Native American Heritage Day; and

(1) The twenty-fifth day of December, commonly called ChristmasDay.

25 (2) Employees of the state and its political subdivisions, except 26 employees of school districts and except those nonclassified employees of institutions of higher education who hold appointments 27 or are employed under contracts to perform services for periods of 28 less than twelve consecutive months, are entitled to one paid holiday 29 per calendar year in addition to those specified in this section. 30 Each employee of the state or its political subdivisions may select 31 32 the day on which the employee desires to take the additional holiday provided for in this section after consultation with the employer 33 pursuant to guidelines to be promulgated by rule of the appropriate 34 personnel authority, or in the case of local government by ordinance 35 36 or resolution of the legislative authority.

37 (3) Employees of the state and its political subdivisions, 38 including employees of school districts and those nonclassified 39 employees of institutions of higher education who hold appointments 40 or are employed under contracts to perform services for periods of

1 less than twelve consecutive months, are entitled to two unpaid holidays per calendar year for a reason of faith or conscience or an 2 organized activity conducted under the auspices of a religious 3 denomination, church, or religious organization. This includes 4 employees of public institutions of higher education, including 5 6 community colleges, technical colleges, and workforce training 7 programs. The employee may select the days on which the employee desires to take the two unpaid holidays after consultation with the 8 employer pursuant to guidelines to be promulgated by rule of the 9 appropriate personnel authority, or in the case of local government 10 by ordinance or resolution of the legislative authority. 11 If an 12 employee prefers to take the two unpaid holidays on specific days for a reason of faith or conscience, or an organized activity conducted 13 under the auspices of a religious denomination, church, or religious 14 organization, the employer must allow the employee to do so unless 15 16 the employee's absence would impose an undue hardship on the employer 17 employee is necessary to maintain public safety. Undue or the hardship shall have the meaning established in rule by the office of 18 19 financial management under RCW 43.41.109.

(4) If any of the state legal holidays specified in this section 20 21 are also federal legal holidays but observed on different dates, only 22 the state legal holidays are recognized as a paid legal holiday for 23 employees of the state and its political subdivisions. However, for port districts and the law enforcement and public transit employees 24 25 of municipal corporations, either the federal or the state legal holiday is recognized as a paid legal holiday, but in no case may 26 both holidays be recognized as a paid legal holiday for employees. 27

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(5) Whenever any state legal holiday:

(a) Other than Sunday, falls upon a Sunday, the following Mondayis the legal holiday; or

31 (b) Falls upon a Saturday, the preceding Friday is the legal 32 holiday.

33 (6) Nothing in this section may be construed to have the effect 34 of adding or deleting the number of paid holidays provided for in an 35 agreement between employees and employers of political subdivisions 36 of the state or as established by ordinance or resolution of the 37 local government legislative authority.

38 (7) The legislature declares that the following days are 39 recognized as provided in this subsection, but may not be considered 40 legal holidays for any purpose:

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1 (a) The thirteenth day of January, recognized as Korean-American 2 day; (b) The twelfth day of October, recognized as Columbus day; 3 (c) The ninth day of April, recognized as former prisoner of war 4 recognition day; 5 6 (d) The twenty-sixth day of January, recognized as Washington 7 army and air national guard day; (e) The seventh day of August, recognized as purple heart 8 9 recipient recognition day; (f) The second Sunday in October, recognized as Washington state 10 11 children's day; 12 (g) The sixteenth day of April, recognized as Mother Joseph day; (h) The fourth day of September, recognized as Marcus Whitman 13 14 day; 15 (i) The seventh day of December, recognized as Pearl Harbor 16 remembrance day; (j) The twenty-seventh day of July, recognized as national Korean 17 18 war veterans armistice day; (k) The nineteenth day of February, recognized as civil liberties 19 20 day of remembrance; (1) The thirtieth day of March, recognized as welcome home 21 22 Vietnam veterans day; (m) The eleventh day of January, recognized as human trafficking 23 24 awareness day; 25 (n) The thirty-first day of March, recognized as Cesar Chavez 26 day; (o) The tenth day of April, recognized as Dolores Huerta day; 27 (p) The fourth Saturday of September, recognized as public lands 28 29 day; (q) The eighteenth day of December, recognized as blood donor 30 31 day; 32 (r) The fifteenth day of May, recognized as water safety day; 33 (s) The ninth day of March, recognized as Billy Frank Jr. day; 34 ((and)) (t) The date corresponding with the second new moon following the 35 36 winter solstice, or the third new moon following the winter solstice 37 should an intercalary month intervene, recognized as the lunar new 38 year; and

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
