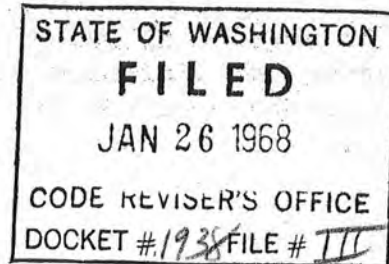

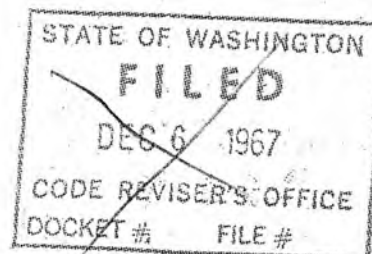
Dear Mr. White:

Page 35 Administrative Code 36-12-320 (12)

New Rule required under 1967 Administrative Procedures Act
amendment 2, Chapter 237, Laws of 1967:

" The State Athletic Commission composed of three members
appointed by the governor is generally responsible for the
supervision, licensing and control of all boxing contests
and wrestling matches or exhibitions conducted within the state.
The commission functions through announced periodic official
commission meetings, throughout the state, which are open to the
public, and conducts hearings in accordance with the practice
and procedural rules, WAC 36-08-010 through WAC 36-08-520 where
required. State inspectors are appointed by the commission to
perform various duties as contained in WAC 36-12-190. The commission
also employs a secretary. Submissions, inquiries and requests
may be directed to the athletic Commission secretary, in care
of the commission office, 210 East Union, Olympia, Washington
98501 (telephone 753-6478).

Rule .04.140-On page 2 of the mimeographed sheet the following
rule is to be deleted:

" When a boxer is knocked out, the referee shall perform a full
ten second count. Except in the final round of a bout, when a
round in any boxing contest shall terminate before a contestant
who has been knocked down shall risen from the floor of the ring,
the time-keeper's count shall be continued. If the fallen
contestant shall fail to rise before the count of ten, he shall
be considered to have lost the bout by a knockout in the round
lately concluded".
