1 AN ACT Relating to elections by mail in small precincts; and  
2 reenacting and amending RCW 29.36.120.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 **Sec. 1.** RCW 29.36.120 and 1994 c 269 s 1 and 1994 c 57 s 48 are  
5 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

6 (1) At any primary or election, general or special, the auditor of  
7 a county ((auditor)) with a population of less than five hundred  
8 thousand may, in any precinct having fewer than two hundred active  
9 registered voters at the time of closing of voter registration as  
10 provided in RCW 29.07.160, conduct the voting in that precinct by mail  
11 ballot. In a county with a population of five hundred thousand or  
12 more, the auditor may, in a precinct having fewer than one hundred  
13 active registered voters, conduct the voting by mail ballot. For any  
14 precinct ((having fewer than two hundred active registered voters))  
15 where voting at a primary or a general election is conducted by mail  
16 ballot under this subsection, the county auditor shall, not less than  
17 fifteen days prior to the date of that primary or general election,  
18 mail or deliver to each active and inactive registered voter within  
19 that precinct a notice that the voting in that precinct will be by mail

1 ballot, an application form for a mail ballot, and a postage prepaid  
2 envelope, readdressed to the issuing officer. A mail ballot shall be  
3 issued to each voter who returns a properly executed application to the  
4 county auditor no later than the day of that primary or general  
5 election. For all subsequent mail ballot elections in that precinct  
6 the application is valid so long as the voter remains active and  
7 qualified to vote. In determining the number of registered voters in  
8 a precinct for the purposes of this section, persons who are ongoing  
9 absentee voters under RCW 29.36.013 shall not be counted. Nothing in  
10 this section may be construed as altering the vote tallying  
11 requirements of RCW 29.62.090.

12 A registered voter may file written notice with the county auditor  
13 requesting that he or she vote at a normal polling place, rather than  
14 by mailed ballot under this subsection, and the county auditor shall  
15 assign the voter to vote at a normal polling place in another nearby  
16 precinct at any subsequent election, held sixty or more days after the  
17 notice was filed, if the auditor conducts an election by mailed ballot  
18 under this section in the voter's precinct. The county auditor shall  
19 notify the voter by mail of the location of the nearby precinct where  
20 he or she shall vote at such elections.

21 (2) At any nonpartisan special election not being held in  
22 conjunction with a state primary or general election, the county, city,  
23 town, or district requesting the election pursuant to RCW 29.13.010 or  
24 29.13.020 may also request that the election be conducted by mail  
25 ballot. The county auditor may honor the request or may determine that  
26 the election is not to be conducted by mail ballot. The decision of  
27 the county auditor in this regard is final.

28 In no instance shall any special election be conducted by mail  
29 ballot in any precinct with two hundred or more active registered  
30 voters, or one hundred or more active registered voters in a county  
31 with a population of five hundred thousand or more, if candidates for  
32 partisan office are to be voted upon.

33 For all special elections not being held in conjunction with a  
34 state primary or state general election where voting is conducted by  
35 mail ballot, the county auditor shall, not less than fifteen days prior  
36 to the date of such election, mail or deliver to each active registered  
37 voter a mail ballot and an envelope, readdressed to the issuing  
38 officer. The auditor shall send each inactive voter either a ballot or  
39 an application to receive a ballot. The auditor shall determine which

1 of the two is to be sent. If the inactive voter returns a voted  
2 ballot, the ballot shall be counted and the voter's status restored to  
3 active. If the inactive voter completes and returns an application, a  
4 ballot shall be sent and the voter's status restored to active.

5 ~~((2))~~ (3) For a two-year period beginning on June 9, 1994, and  
6 ending two years after June 9, 1994, the county auditor may conduct the  
7 voting in any precinct by mail for any primary or election, partisan or  
8 nonpartisan, using the procedures set forth in RCW 29.36.120 through  
9 29.36.139.

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
