- 1 AN ACT Relating to child care grants for state institutions of
- 2 higher education; and adding a new chapter to Title 28B RCW.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. Two Washington accounts for student child
- 5 care in higher education are established. The higher education
- 6 coordinating board and the state board for community and technical
- 7 colleges shall administer the programs. Through these programs the
- 8 boards may award on a competitive basis child care grants to state
- 9 institutions of higher education to encourage programs to address the
- 10 need for high quality, accessible, and affordable child care for
- 11 students at higher education institutions. The university or college
- 12 administration and student government association, or its equivalent,
- 13 of each institution receiving the award shall contribute financial
- 14 support in an amount equal to the child care grant received by the
- 15 institution.
- 16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** The institution of higher education shall be
- 17 eligible to receive the grant for a period not exceeding two years.
- 18 After the expiration of any two-year grant, the institution may reapply

- to receive subsequent grant awards or a continuation of the grant 1
- 2 awarded the prior two years.
- 3 NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. The higher education coordinating board 4 shall administer the program for four-year institutions of higher education. The state board for community and technical colleges shall 5 administer the program for community and technical colleges. 6 7 higher education coordinating board and the state board for community and technical colleges shall have the following powers and duties in 8 9 administering each program:
- 10 (1) To adopt rules necessary to carry out the program;
- 11 (2) To establish one or more review committees to assist in the 12 evaluation of proposals for funding. The review committee shall include but not be limited to individuals from the Washington 13 14 association for the education of young children, the child care 15 coordinating committee, and the child care resource and referral 16 network;
 - (3) To establish each biennium specific guidelines for submitting grant proposals consistent with the overall goals of the program. During the 1999-2001 biennium the guidelines shall be consistent with the following desired outcomes of increasing access to child care for students, addressing the demand for infant and toddler care, providing affordable child care alternatives, creating more cooperative preschool programs, creating models that can be replicated at other institutions, creating a partnership between university or college administrations and student government, or its equivalent and increasing efficiency and innovation at campus child care centers;
- (4) To establish guidelines for an allocation system based on 27 factors that include but are not limited to: The amount of money 28 available in the trust fund; characteristics of the institutions including the size of the faculty and student body; and the number of child care grants received; 31
- (5) To solicit grant proposals and provide information to the 32 33 institutions of higher education about the program; and
- 34 (6) To establish reporting, evaluation, accountability, monitoring, and dissemination requirements for the recipients of the grants. 35
- Sec. 4. Two accounts for student child care in 36 NEW SECTION. higher education are established in the custody of the state treasurer. 37

- 1 Moneys in the accounts may be spent only for the purposes of section 1
- 2 of this act. Disbursements from one of the accounts shall be on the
- 3 authorization of the higher education coordinating board and
- 4 disbursements from the other account shall be on the authorization of
- 5 the state board for community and technical colleges. The accounts are
- 6 subject to the allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but no
- 7 appropriation is required for disbursements.
- 8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** Sections 1 through 4 of this act constitute
- 9 a new chapter in Title 28B RCW.
