1 AN ACT Relating to medical assistance for breast and cervical
2 cancer treatment for low-income women; reenacting and amending RCW
3 74.09.510; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 **Sec. 1.** RCW 74.09.510 and 1997 c 59 s 14 and 1997 c 58 s 201 are
6 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

7 Medical assistance may be provided in accordance with eligibility
8 requirements established by the department, as defined in the social
9 security Title XIX state plan for mandatory categorically needy persons
10 and: (1) Individuals who would be eligible for cash assistance except
11 for their institutional status; (2) individuals who are under twenty-
12 one years of age, who would be eligible for medicaid, but do not
13 qualify as dependent children and who are in (a) foster care, (b)
14 subsidized adoption, (c) a nursing facility or an intermediate care
15 facility for the mentally retarded, or (d) inpatient psychiatric
16 facilities; (3) the aged, blind, and disabled who: (a) Receive only a
17 state supplement, or (b) would not be eligible for cash assistance if
18 they were not institutionalized; (4) categorically eligible individuals
19 who meet the income and resource requirements of the cash assistance

1 programs; (5) individuals who are enrolled in managed health care
2 systems, who have otherwise lost eligibility for medical assistance,
3 but who have not completed a current six-month enrollment in a managed
4 health care system, and who are eligible for federal financial
5 participation under Title XIX of the social security act; (6) children
6 and pregnant women allowed by federal statute for whom funding is
7 appropriated; (7) other individuals eligible for medical services under
8 RCW 74.09.035 and 74.09.700 for whom federal financial participation is
9 available under Title XIX of the social security act; ~~((and))~~ (8)
10 persons allowed by section 1931 of the social security act for whom
11 funding is appropriated; and (9) women who are: (a) Under sixty-five
12 years of age; (b) have been screened for breast and cervical cancer
13 under the national breast and cervical cancer early detection program
14 administered by the department of health or tribal entity and have been
15 identified as needing treatment for breast or cervical cancer; and (c)
16 are not otherwise covered by health insurance. Medical assistance
17 provided under this subsection is limited to the period during which
18 the woman requires treatment for breast or cervical cancer, and is
19 subject to any conditions or limitations specified in the omnibus
20 appropriations act.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** This act is necessary for the immediate
22 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the
23 state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect
24 July 1, 2001.

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
