HB 1341 by Representatives Orcutt, O'Brien, Mielke, Lovick and Anderson

Restricting access to work programs for offenders who pose a threat to minors.

Provides that offenders convicted of any sex offense or any crime against a minor, or having any other court imposed restriction denying them access to minors, may not participate in any project or program under this act in or near the buildings, grounds, or facilities of schools during hours when minor children are present.

Provides that no state or local corrections agency may allow an offender to participate in any project or program under this act in or near the buildings, grounds, or facilities of schools during hours when minor children are present unless the agency performed a complete and thorough criminal background check on the offender.

Exempting active military personnel and veterans from hunter education certificate requirements.

Declares that the hunter education certificate requirements of RCW 77.32.155 do not apply to: (1) All active military personnel permanently stationed at a military installation within the state of Washington; and

(2) All residents of the state of Washington who have received an honorable discharge or received a discharge for medical reasons with an honorable record from federal military service.

Requires all persons born after January 1, 1972, when purchasing any hunting license for the first time, and who qualify for the exemption to the hunter education certificate requirements provided by this act, to provide identification or paperwork authenticating their active military service or of their discharge from military service.

Finds that: (1) The ability to respond to emergency situations by many of Washington state's fire protection jurisdictions have not kept up with the state's needs, particularly in urban regions;

(2) Providing a fire protection service system requires a shared partnership and responsibility between the federal, state, local, and regional governments and the private sector;

(3) There are efficiencies to be gained by regional fire protection service delivery while retaining local control; and

(4) Timely development of significant projects can best be achieved through enhanced funding options for regional fire protection service agencies, using already existing tax authority to address fire protection emergency service needs and new authority to address critical fire protection projects and emergency services.

Provides that, if approved by the majority of the voters within its boundaries voting on the ballot proposition, a regional fire protection service authority may impose a sales and use tax of up to 0.5 percent of the selling price or value of the article used in the case of a use tax. The tax authorized by this act is in addition to the tax authorized by RCW 82.14.030 and must be collected from those persons who are taxable by the state under chapters 82.08 and 82.12 RCW upon the occurrence of any taxable event within the taxing district.

(2) The unlawful advertisement, use of telecommunications services, and provision of household goods moving services by unlicensed household goods carriers constitutes an unfair trade practice and unfair competitive advantage over properly licensed and regulated household goods carriers and exposes unsuspecting consumers to the risk of theft, fraud, deception, and other forms of dishonesty.

Declares that the termination, alteration, or refusal of telecommunications services utilized by unlicensed household goods carriers is essential to ensure the public safety and welfare.

SB 5355 by Senators Brandland, Jacobsen, Esser, Rasmussen, Parlette, Swecker, Sheahan, McCaslin and Mulliken

Eliminating voluntary intoxication as a consideration for mental state.

Declares that no act committed by a person while in a state of voluntary intoxication shall be deemed less criminal by reason of his or her condition, nor shall a state of voluntary intoxication be taken into consideration in determining the existence of a mental state which is an element of the offense.

Provides that the enrollment of these persons is subject to the following conditions: (1) Such persons shall register for and be enrolled in courses on a space-available basis and no new course sections shall be created as a result of the registration;

(2) Enrollment information on persons registered under this act shall be maintained separately from other enrollment information and shall not be included in official enrollment reports, nor shall such persons be considered in any enrollment statistics that would affect budgetary determinations; and

(3) Persons registering on a space-available basis shall be charged a registration fee of not less than five dollars.

Provides that, any person claiming benefits who knowingly gives false information required in any claim or application under Title 51 RCW is guilty of a class B felony if the benefits received based on false information exceed the benefits actually due or authorized by at least one thousand dollars; and is a class C felony if the benefits received exceed the benefits actually due or authorized by less than one thousand dollars.

SB 5361 by Senators Reardon, Doumit, Schmidt and Kohl-Welles

Creating family development accounts for low-income wage earners.

Provides that a family development account may be established by or on behalf of an eligible low-income wage earner for the purpose of enabling the recipient to accumulate funds for a qualified purpose described in this act.

Declares that a qualified purpose is one or more of the following, as provided by the qualified entity providing assistance to the low-income wage earner: (1) Postsecondary expenses paid from a family development account directly to an eligible educational institution;

(2) Qualified acquisition costs with respect to a qualified principal residence for a qualified first-time home buyer, if paid from a family development account directly to the persons to whom the amounts are due;

(3) Amounts paid from a family development account directly to a business capitalization account which is established in a federally insured financial institution and is restricted to use solely for qualified business capitalization expenses.

Appropriates the sum of five hundred thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be necessary, for the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2005, from the general fund to the department of community, trade, and economic development for the purposes of this act.

Providing property tax relief to widows or widowers of honorably discharged veterans.

Provides that an application for exemption under this act must be accompanied by the following documentation to substantiate the request for the exemption and any other documentation required by the county in which the exemption is sought: (1) The deceased veteran's DD 214 report of separation, or its equivalent, that must be under honorable conditions;

(2) A copy of the applicant's certificate of marriage to the deceased;

(3) A copy of the deceased veteran's death certificate; and

(4) A letter from the United States veterans' administration certifying that the death of the veteran meets the requirements of this act.

Requires the Washington state department of veterans affairs to assist an eligible widow or widower in the preparation and submission of an application and the procurement of necessary substantiating documentation to satisfy the pertinent county assessor's or other designated official's requirements for obtaining the property tax exemption under this act.

Providing an ongoing funding source for the community economic revitalization board's financial assistance programs.

Specifies that this act provides a partial funding solution by directing that beginning July 1, 2005, the interest earnings generated by the public works assistance account shall be used to fund the community economic revitalization board's financial assistance programs.

Promoting economic development and community revitalization.

Recognizes that the state as a whole benefits from investment in public infrastructure because it promotes community and economic development. Public investment stimulates business activity and helps create jobs; stimulates the redevelopment of brownfields and blighted areas in the inner city; lowers the cost of housing; and promotes efficient land use.

Finds that these activities generate revenue for the state and that it is in the public interest to invest in these projects

through a credit against the state sales and use tax to those local governments that can demonstrate the expected returns to the state.

SB 5365 by Senators Benton, Prentice, Doumit, Keiser and Winsley; by request of Governor Locke

Addressing violations connected with the offer, sale, or purchase of securities.

Creates the securities prosecution fund in the state treasury and shall consist of all fines received by the division of securities under RCW 21.20.400(2), 21.20.110, and 21.20.395 and all undistributed funds from orders of disgorgement and restitution under RCW 21.20.110(8) and 21.20.390(6).

Provides that expenditures from this fund may be used solely for administering the fund and for payment of costs, expenses, and charges incurred in the preparation, initiation, and prosecution of criminal charges for violations of chapters 21.20, 21.30, 19.100, and 19.110 RCW.

Provides that any person who willfully violates any provision of chapter 21.20 RCW except RCW 21.20.350, or who willfully violates any rule or order under this chapter, or who willfully violates RCW 21.20.350 knowing the statement made to be false or misleading in any material respect, is guilty of a class B felony.

Provides that any person who knowingly alters, destroys, shreds, mutilates, or conceals a record, document, or other object, or attempts to do so, with the intent to impair the object's integrity or availability for use in an official proceeding under this chapter, shall upon conviction be fined not more than five hundred thousand dollars or imprisoned not more than ten years, or both. The fines paid under this provision shall be deposited into the securities prosecution fund.

Provides that a person who, in an administrative action by the director, is found to have knowingly or recklessly violated an administrative order issued under RCW 21.20.110 or 21.20.390 shall pay an administrative fine in an amount not to exceed twenty-five thousand dollars for each violation.

Requires the fines paid under this act to be deposited into the securities prosecution fund.

(2) Prevent or arrest the decay of selected areas due to the inability of existing financing methods to provide needed public infrastructure improvements; and

(3) Encourage private investment designed to promote and facilitate the orderly redevelopment of selected areas.

SB 5369 by Senators Winsley, Haugen, Hale, Oke and McCaslin

Regulating automated traffic safety cameras.

Declares that the use of automated traffic safety cameras is subject to the following regulations: (1) The appropriate local legislative authority must first enact an ordinance allowing for their use to detect one or more of the following: Speeding, stoplight, or railroad crossing violations.

(2) Automated traffic safety cameras may take pictures of the vehicle and vehicle license plate only and only while an infraction is occurring.

(3) The law enforcement agency having jurisdiction shall plainly mark the locations where an automated traffic safety camera is used by placing signs on street locations that clearly indicate to a driver that he or she is entering a zone where traffic laws are enforced by an automated traffic safety camera.

(4) A notice of an infraction must be mailed to the registered owner of the vehicle within fourteen days of the infraction occurring.

(5) A person receiving an automated traffic infraction notice based on evidence detected by an automated traffic safety camera may respond to the notice by mail.

Requests the Washington state supreme court to amend the Infraction Rules for Courts of Limited Jurisdiction to conform to this act.

Asks the court to create an automated traffic infraction notice that is consistent with this act.

Provides that by July 1, 2004, a city, code city, and county must designate land that is zoned exclusively for the development of newly constructed manufactured housing communities as defined in RCW 59.20.030.

Provides that, after the effective date of this act, these entities may not designate a new manufactured housing community as a nonconforming use, and may not order the removal or phased elimination of an existing manufactured housing community because of its status as a nonconforming use.

Imposing impact fees on manufactured housing communities.

Recognizes the difficulty of determining development costs for different types of housing and wants to ensure manufactured housing communities pay fair impact fees as affordable housing.

Directs the staffs of the senate committee on labor, commerce, and financial institutions and the house of representatives committee on local government and housing to study the manner in which local governments impose impact fees on manufactured housing communities compared to other residential development. The study shall be completed no later than January 2004.

The following money must be deposited into this account: (1) Amounts received from the federal government under Public Law 107-252 (October 29, 2002), known as the "Help America Vote Act of 2002," including any amounts received under subsequent amendments to the act;

(2) Amounts appropriated or otherwise made available by the state legislature for the purposes of carrying out activities for which federal funds are provided to the state under Public Law 107-252, including any amounts received under subsequent amendments to the act;

(3) Such other amounts as may be appropriated by the legislature to the account.

SB 5375 by Senators Doumit, Oke, Haugen, Swecker, Prentice, Hale, Reardon and Rasmussen

Improving the efficiency and predictability of the hydraulic project approval program.

Finds that federal review of proposed in-water projects under provisions of the endangered species act are in most conditions the equivalent of requirements under the state's hydraulic project approval process, and that requiring projects to receive dual approvals causes project delays, is redundant, and may lead to conflicting project conditions.

Finds that it would benefit the department of fish and wildlife, the regulated community, and the fisheries resources of the state if this important regulatory program were improved with measures to improve its efficiency and predictability, as well as its coordination with the many local, state, and federal fish and habitat protection statutes and regulatory programs that have been created since the inception of the hydraulic project approval program.

Declares an intent to improve the process of regulating construction in state waters with policy measures that improve predictability for entities that work in state waters, and make the best use of limited state resources by ensuring that regulatory reviews of in-water construction are made in an efficient manner.

SB 5376 by Senator Prentice

Describing the route of SR 99.

Provides for the alignment of the route of SR 99.

Declares that an employee is entitled to take paid time off only after completing the first six consecutive months of work for an employer. An employee taking paid time off shall comply with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement or employer policy applicable to the purpose for which the leave is taken.

Revising rules for public access to dependency hearings.

Declares that if the court finds that there is reasonable cause to believe that the health, safety, or welfare of the child would be jeopardized by conducting a public hearing, the court may exclude the public. In addition, both parents may request that the court exclude the public, subject to the court's discretion.

Clarifying the definition of ordinary high water mark.

Requires the department to issue optional permits in the form of a decal, label, or other identifier at the request of owners of inherently low-emission vehicles that will entitle the operator of the vehicle to use special lanes as specified in RCW 46.16.165 and 47.52.025, regardless of the number of occupants.

Directs the department to open these lanes to use by single-occupant inherently low-emission vehicles at times or locations when the addition of these vehicles would not unduly contribute to congestion or impede the flow of traffic. The inherently low-emission vehicle must also display a decal, label, or other identifier issued by the department of licensing under this act authorizing the use of the lanes.

Requires the department of transportation to work with the Federal Highway Administration to develop a program to allow hybrid vehicles in special lanes provided for in RCW 46.16.165 and 47.52.025, regardless of the number of occupants.

Requires the notice to specify the acts constituting the drug or alcohol violation and must state that the rental agreement terminates in not less than forty-eight hours after delivery of the notice, at a specified date and time.

Requires the notice to also state that the tenant can cure the drug or alcohol violation by a change in conduct or otherwise within twenty-four hours after delivery of the notice.
