## ADOPTED AS AMENDED 02/28/2006

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that vaccinations and 3 4 immunizations are among the most important public health innovations of The centers for disease control and 5 the last one hundred years. 6 prevention placed vaccinations at the top of its list of the ten 7 greatest public health achievements of the twentieth century. In its 8 efforts to improve public health in the world's poorest countries, the 9 Bill and Melinda Gates foundation has identified childhood immunization 10 as a cost-effective method of improving public health and saving the 11 lives of millions of children around the world.

12 Fortunately, in Washington, safe and cost-effective vaccinations against childhood diseases are widely available through both public and 13 14 private resources. The vaccines that the Washington state department of health provides to meet the requirements for the recommended 15 16 childhood vaccination schedule through its universal childhood vaccine program are screened for thimerosal and preference is given toward the 17 18 purchase of thimerosal-free products. The department of health currently provides thimerosal-free products for 19 all routinelv 20 recommended childhood vaccines. Regardless of the absence of 21 thimerosal in childhood vaccines in Washington, scientifically reputable organizations such as the centers for disease control and 22 23 prevention, the national institute of medicine, the American academy of pediatrics, the food and drug administration, and the world health 24 organization have all determined that there is no credible evidence 25 26 that the use of thimerosal in vaccines poses a threat to the health and 27 safety of children.

Notwithstanding these assurances of the safety of the vaccine supply, the legislature finds that where there is public concern over the safety of vaccines, vaccination rates may be reduced to the point

1 that deadly, vaccine-preventable, childhood diseases return. This 2 measure is being enacted to maintain public confidence in vaccine 3 programs, so that the public will continue to seek vaccinations and 4 their health benefits may continue to protect the people of Washington.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 70.95M RCW 6 to read as follows:

7 (1) Beginning July 1, 2007, a person who is known to be pregnant or 8 who is under three years of age shall not be vaccinated with a mercury-9 containing vaccine or injected with a mercury-containing product that 10 contains more than 0.5 micrograms of mercury per 0.5 milliliter dose.

11 (2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, an influenza 12 vaccine may contain up to 1.0 micrograms of mercury per 0.5 milliliter 13 dose.

14 (3) The secretary of the department of health may, upon declaration 15 of a public health emergency, suspend the requirements of this section 16 for the duration of the emergency."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Adds legislative findings regarding the benefits of vaccines and the safety of vaccines.

Removes the prohibition on providing mercury-containing vaccines that are not licensed by the Food and Drug Administration and extends the prohibition to vaccines that contain up to 0.5 micrograms of mercury per 0.5 milliliter dose, except for influenza vaccines which may contain up to 1.0 micrograms of mercury per 0.5 milliliter dose. Extends the application date of the prohibition by one year.
