3 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature intends to reconstitute the 4 state board of education and to refocus its purpose; to abolish the 5 academic achievement and accountability commission; to assign policy 6 and rule-making authority for educator preparation and certification to 7 the professional educator standards board and to clearly define its 8 purpose; and to align the missions of the state board of education and 9 the professional educator standards board to create a collaborative and effective governance system that can accelerate progress towards 10 11 achieving the goals in RCW 28A.150.210.

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PART 1

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 101. A new section is added to chapter 28A.305
15 RCW to read as follows:

16 (1) The membership of the state board of education shall be 17 composed of the superintendent of public instruction and fifteen 18 members who are residents of the state of Washington as follows:

19 (a) Five members elected by school district directors. Three of 20 the members elected by school district directors shall be residents of 21 western Washington and two members shall be residents of eastern 22 Washington;

23 (b

(b) Seven members appointed by the governor;

(c) One member elected at-large by the members of the boards of directors of all private schools in the state meeting the requirements of RCW 28A.195.010; and

(d) Two students selected in a manner determined by the state boardof education.

1 (2) Initial appointments shall be for terms from one to four years 2 in length, with the terms expiring on the second Monday of January of 3 the applicable year. As the terms of the first appointees expire or 4 vacancies on the board occur, the governor shall appoint or reappoint 5 members of the board to complete the initial terms or to four-year 6 terms, as appropriate.

7 (a) Appointees of the governor must be individuals who have 8 demonstrated interest in public schools and are supportive of 9 educational improvement, have a positive record of service, and who 10 will devote sufficient time to the responsibilities of the board.

(b) In appointing board members, the governor shall consider the diversity of the population of the state.

(c) All appointments to the board made by the governor are subjectto confirmation by the senate.

15 (d) No person may serve as a member of the board, except the 16 superintendent of public instruction, for more than two consecutive 17 full four-year terms.

(3) The governor may remove an appointed member of the board for 18 neglect of duty, misconduct, malfeasance, or misfeasance in office, or 19 20 for incompetent or unprofessional conduct as defined in chapter 18.130 In such a case, the governor shall file with the secretary of 21 RCW. 22 state a statement of the causes for and the order of removal from 23 office, and the secretary of state shall send a certified copy of the 24 statement of causes and order of removal to the last known post office address of the member. 25

26 (4)(a) The chair of the board shall be elected by a majority vote 27 of the members of the board.

(b) Eight voting members of the board constitute a quorum for thetransaction of business.

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(c) All members except the student members are voting members.

(5) Members of the board appointed by the governor who are not public employees shall be compensated in accordance with RCW 43.03.240 and shall be reimbursed for travel expenses incurred in carrying out the duties of the board in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 102. A new section is added to chapter 28A.305
36 RCW to read as follows:

37 The election of state board of education members by school

directors and private school board members shall be conducted by the office of the superintendent of public instruction for the members of the state board who begin serving on January 1, 2006, and thereafter.

(1) The superintendent shall adopt rules for the conduct of 4 elections, which shall include, but need not be limited to: 5 The definition of the eastern Washington and western Washington geographic 6 7 regions of the state for the purpose of determining board member positions; the weighting of votes cast by the number of students in the 8 school director's school district or board member's private school; 9 election and dispute resolution procedures; the process for filling 10 vacancies; and election timelines. The election timeline shall include 11 12 calling for elections no later than the twenty-fifth of August, and 13 notification of the election results no later than the fifteenth of 14 December.

15 (2) State board member positions one and two shall be filled by 16 residents of the eastern Washington region and positions three, four, 17 and five shall be filled by residents of the western Washington region.

18 (3) A school director shall be eligible to vote only for a 19 candidate for each position in the geographic region within which the 20 school director resides.

21 (4) Initial terms of the individuals elected by the school 22 directors shall be for terms of two to four years in length as follows: Two members, one from eastern Washington and one from western 23 24 Washington, shall be elected to two-year terms; two members, one from 25 eastern Washington and one from western Washington, shall be elected to four-year terms; and one member from western Washington shall be 26 27 elected to a three-year term. The term of the private school member shall be two years. All terms shall expire on the second Monday of 28 January of the applicable year. 29

30 (5) No person employed in any public or private school, college, 31 university, or other educational institution or any educational service 32 district superintendent's office or in the office of the superintendent 33 of public instruction is eligible for membership on the state board of 34 education. No member of a board of directors of a local school 35 district or private school may continue to serve in that capacity after 36 having been elected to the state board.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 103. A new section is added to chapter 28A.305
 RCW to read as follows:

By October 15th of each even-numbered year, the state board of education and the professional educator standards board shall submit a joint report to the legislative education committees, the governor, and the superintendent of public instruction. The report shall address the progress the boards have made and the obstacles they have encountered, individually and collectively, in the work of achieving the goals in RCW 28A.150.210.

10 **Sec. 104.** RCW 28A.305.130 and 2002 c 205 s 3 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

12 The purpose of the state board of education is to adopt statewide 13 policies that promote achievement of the goals of RCW 28A.150.210; 14 implement a standards-based accountability system; and provide 15 leadership in the creation of an education system that respects the 16 diverse cultures, abilities, and learning styles of all students. In 17 addition to any other powers and duties as provided by law, the state 18 board of education shall:

(1) <u>Until January 1, 2006, approve</u> or disapprove the program of courses leading to teacher, school administrator, and school specialized personnel certification offered by all institutions of higher education within the state which may be accredited and whose graduates may become entitled to receive such certification.

(2) Until January 1, 2006, conduct every five years a review of the 24 program approval standards, including the minimum standards for 25 26 teachers, administrators, and educational staff associates, to reflect research findings and assure continued improvement of preparation 27 teachers, administrators, and 28 programs for educational staff 29 associates.

30 (3) <u>Until January 1, 2006, investigate the character of the work</u> 31 required to be performed as a condition of entrance to and graduation 32 from any institution of higher education in this state relative to such 33 certification as provided for in subsection (1) of this section, and 34 prepare a list of accredited institutions of higher education of this 35 and other states whose graduates may be awarded such certificates.

36 (4) <u>Until January 1, 2006:</u>

(a) ((The state board of education shall)) Adopt rules to allow a 1 2 teacher certification candidate to fulfill, in part, teacher preparation program requirements through work experience 3 as а classified teacher's aide in a public school or private school meeting 4 the requirements of RCW 28A.195.010. The rules shall include, but are 5 not limited to, limitations based upon the recency of the teacher б 7 preparation candidate's teacher aide work experience, and limitations based on the amount of work experience that may apply toward teacher 8 preparation program requirements under this chapter((-)); and 9

10 (b) ((The state board of education shall)) Require that at the time of the individual's enrollment in a teacher preparation program, the 11 12 supervising teacher and the building principal shall jointly provide to 13 the teacher preparation program of the higher education institution at which the teacher candidate is enrolled, a written assessment of the 14 performance of the teacher candidate. The assessment shall contain 15 such information as determined by the state board of education and 16 17 shall include: Evidence that at least fifty percent of the candidate's work as a classified teacher's aide was involved in instructional 18 activities with children under the supervision of a certificated 19 teacher and that the candidate worked a minimum of six hundred thirty 20 21 hours for one school year; the type of work performed by the candidate; 22 and a recommendation of whether the candidate's work experience as a classified teacher's aide should be substituted for teacher preparation 23 24 program requirements. In compliance with such rules as may be established by the state board of education under this section, the 25 teacher preparation programs of the higher education institution where 26 27 the candidate is enrolled shall make the final determination as to what teacher preparation program requirements may be fulfilled by teacher 28 aide work experience. 29

30 (5) <u>Until January 1, 2006, supervise the issuance of such</u> 31 certificates as provided for in subsection (1) of this section and 32 specify the types and kinds of certificates necessary for the several 33 departments of the common schools by rule or regulation in accordance 34 with RCW 28A.410.010.

35 (6) <u>Hold regularly scheduled meetings at such time and place within</u> 36 <u>the state as the board shall determine and may hold such special</u> 37 <u>meetings as may be deemed necessary for the transaction of public</u> 38 <u>business.</u>

(7) Form committees as necessary to effectively and efficiently
 conduct the work of the board.

3 (8) Seek advice from the public and interested parties regarding
4 the work of the board.

(9) For purposes of statewide accountability, the board shall:

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(a) Adopt and revise performance improvement goals in reading, 6 writing, science, and mathematics, by subject and grade level, once 7 assessments in these subjects are required statewide; academic and 8 technical skills, as appropriate, in secondary career and technical 9 education programs; and student attendance, as the board deems 10 appropriate to improve student learning. The goals shall be consistent 11 12 with student privacy protection provisions of RCW 28A.655.090(7) and 13 shall not conflict with requirements contained in Title I of the 14 federal elementary and secondary education act of 1965, or the requirements of the Carl D. Perkins vocational education act of 1998, 15 each as _amended. The goals may be established for all students, 16 economically disadvantaged students, limited English proficient 17 students, students with disabilities, and students from 18 disproportionately academically underachieving racial and ethnic 19 backgrounds. The board may establish school and school district goals 20 21 addressing high school graduation rates and dropout reduction goals for students in grades seven through twelve. The board shall adopt the 22 goals by rule. However, before each goal is implemented, the board 23 24 shall present the goal to the education committees of the house of representatives and the senate for the committees' review and comment 25 in a time frame that will permit the legislature to take statutory 26 27 action on the goal if such action is deemed warranted by the <u>legislature;</u> 28

(b) Identify the scores students must achieve in order to meet the 29 standard on the Washington assessment of student learning and, for high 30 school students, to obtain a certificate of academic achievement. The 31 board shall also determine student scores that identify levels of 32 student performance below and beyond the standard. The board shall 33 consider the incorporation of the standard error of measurement into 34 35 the decision regarding the award of the certificates. The board shall set such performance standards and levels in consultation with the 36 superintendent of public instruction and after consideration of any 37 recommendations that may be developed by any advisory committees that 38

may be established for this purpose. The initial performance standards 1 2 and any changes recommended by the board in the performance standards for the tenth grade assessment shall be presented to the education 3 4 committees of the house of representatives and the senate by November 30th of the school year in which the changes will take place to permit 5 the legislature to take statutory action before the changes are 6 7 implemented if such action is deemed warranted by the legislature. The legislature shall be advised of the initial performance standards and 8 any changes made to the elementary level performance standards and the 9 middle school level performance standards; 10

(c) Adopt objective, systematic criteria to identify successful 11 12 schools and school districts and recommend to the superintendent of 13 public instruction schools and districts to be recognized for two types 14 of accomplishments, student achievement and improvements in student achievement. Recognition for improvements in student achievement shall 15 include consideration of one or more of the following accomplishments: 16 (i) An increase in the percent of students meeting standards. The 17 level of achievement required for recognition may be based on the 18 achievement goals established by the legislature and by the board under 19 (a) of this subsection; 20

21 (ii) Positive progress on an improvement index that measures
22 improvement in all levels of the assessment; and

(iii) Improvements despite challenges such as high levels of 23 24 mobility, poverty, English as a second language learners, and large numbers of students in special populations as measured by either the 25 percent of students meeting the standard, or the improvement index. 26 27 When determining the baseline year or years for recognizing individual schools, the board may use the assessment results from the initial 28 years the assessments were administered, if doing so with individual 29 schools would be appropriate; 30

31 (d) Adopt objective, systematic criteria to identify schools and school districts in need of assistance and those in which significant 32 numbers of students persistently fail to meet state standards. In its 33 deliberations, the board shall consider the use of all statewide 34 35 mandated criterion-referenced and norm-referenced standardized tests; (e) Identify schools and school districts in which state 36 37 intervention measures will be needed and a range of appropriate intervention strategies after the legislature has authorized a set of 38

intervention strategies. After the legislature has authorized a set of intervention strategies, at the request of the board, the superintendent shall intervene in the school or school district and take corrective actions. This chapter does not provide additional authority for the board or the superintendent of public instruction to intervene in a school or school district;

7 (f) Identify performance incentive systems that have improved or 8 have the potential to improve student achievement;

9 (g) Annually review the assessment reporting system to ensure 10 fairness, accuracy, timeliness, and equity of opportunity, especially 11 with regard to schools with special circumstances and unique 12 populations of students, and a recommendation to the superintendent of 13 public instruction of any improvements needed to the system;

14 (h) Include in the biennial report required under section 103 of 15 this act, information on the progress that has been made in achieving 16 goals adopted by the board.

(10) Accredit, subject to such accreditation standards and 17 procedures as may be established by the state board of education, all 18 schools that apply for accreditation, and approve, subject to the 19 provisions of RCW 28A.195.010, private schools carrying out a program 20 21 for any or all of the grades kindergarten through twelve: PROVIDED, 22 That no private school may be approved that operates a kindergarten PROVIDED FURTHER, That no public or private schools 23 program only: 24 shall be placed upon the list of accredited schools so long as secret societies are knowingly allowed to exist among its students by school 25 26 officials: PROVIDED FURTHER, That the state board may elect to require 27 all or certain classifications of the public schools to conduct and participate in such preaccreditation examination and evaluation 28 processes as may now or hereafter be established by the board. 29

30 (((7))) <u>(11)</u> Make rules and regulations governing the establishment 31 in any existing nonhigh school district of any secondary program or any 32 new grades in grades nine through twelve. Before any such program or 33 any new grades are established the district must obtain prior approval 34 of the state board.

35 (((8))) <u>(12)</u> Prepare such outline of study for the common schools 36 as the board shall deem necessary, <u>and in conformance with legislative</u> 37 <u>requirements</u>, and prescribe such rules for the general government of

the common schools, as shall seek to secure regularity of attendance, prevent truancy, secure efficiency, and promote the true interest of the common schools.

4 (((9))) (13) Continuously reevaluate courses and other requirements
5 and adopt and enforce regulations within the common schools so as to
6 meet the educational needs of students ((and)).

7 <u>(14) Evaluate course of study requirements and</u> articulate with the 8 institutions of higher education<u>, work force representatives, and early</u> 9 <u>learning policymakers and providers to coordinate</u> and unify the work of 10 the public school system.

11 (((10))) <u>(15)</u> Carry out board powers and duties relating to the 12 organization and reorganization of school districts ((under RCW 13 28A.315.010 through 28A.315.680 and 28A.315.900)).

14 (((11))) <u>(16)</u> Hear and decide appeals as otherwise provided by law.
15 ((The state board of education is given the authority to)) <u>(17)</u>
16 <u>P</u>romulgate information and rules dealing with the prevention of child
17 abuse for purposes of curriculum use in the common schools.

(18) Hire an executive director and an administrative assistant to 18 reside in the office of the superintendent of public instruction for 19 administrative purposes. Any other personnel of the board shall be 20 appointed as provided by RCW 28A.300.020. The executive director, 21 administrative assistant, and all but one of the other personnel of the 22 board are exempt from civil service, together with other staff as now 23 24 or hereafter designated as exempt in accordance with chapter 41.06 RCW. (19) Adopt a seal that shall be kept in the office of the 25 superintendent of public instruction. 26

27 **Sec. 105.** RCW 28A.505.210 and 2001 c 3 s 3 are each amended to 28 read as follows:

29 School districts shall have the authority to decide the best use of 30 student achievement funds to assist students in meeting and exceeding 31 the new, higher academic standards in each district consistent with the 32 provisions of chapter 3, Laws of 2001.

33 (1) Student achievement funds shall be allocated for the following 34 uses:

35 (a) To reduce class size by hiring certificated elementary 36 classroom teachers in grades K-4 and paying nonemployee-related costs 37 associated with those new teachers;

(b) To make selected reductions in class size in grades 5-12, such
 as small high school writing classes;

3 (c) To provide extended learning opportunities to improve student 4 academic achievement in grades K-12, including, but not limited to, 5 extended school year, extended school day, before-and-after-school 6 programs, special tutoring programs, weekend school programs, summer 7 school, and all-day kindergarten;

(d) To provide additional professional development for educators, 8 including additional paid time for curriculum and lesson redesign and 9 alignment, training to ensure that instruction is aligned with state 10 standards and student needs, reimbursement for higher education costs 11 related to enhancing teaching skills and knowledge, and mentoring 12 13 programs to match teachers with skilled, master teachers. The funding shall not be used for salary increases or additional compensation for 14 existing teaching duties, but may be used for extended year and 15 extended day teaching contracts; 16

17 (e) To provide early assistance for children who need18 prekindergarten support in order to be successful in school;

(f) To provide improvements or additions to school building facilities which are directly related to the class size reductions and extended learning opportunities under (a) through (c) of this subsection.

(2) Annually on or before May 1st, the school district board of 23 24 directors shall meet at the time and place designated for the purpose 25 of a public hearing on the proposed use of these funds to improve student achievement for the coming year. Any person may appear or by 26 27 written submission have the opportunity to comment on the proposed plan for the use of these funds. No later than August 31st, as a part of 28 the process under RCW 28A.505.060, each school district shall adopt a 29 plan for the use of these funds for the upcoming school year. 30 Annually, each school district shall provide to the citizens of their 31 32 district a public accounting of the funds made available to the district during the previous school year under chapter 3, Laws of 2001, 33 how the funds were used, and the progress the district has made in 34 increasing student achievement, as measured by required state 35 36 assessments and other assessments deemed appropriate by the district. 37 Copies of this report shall be provided to the superintendent of public

2 commission)).

3 Sec. 106. RCW 28A.655.070 and 2004 c 19 s 204 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 The superintendent of public instruction shall develop (1) 6 essential academic learning requirements that identify the knowledge 7 and skills all public school students need to know and be able to do based on the student learning goals in RCW 28A.150.210, develop student 8 9 assessments, and implement the accountability recommendations and requests regarding assistance, rewards, and recognition of the 10 11 ((academic achievement and accountability commission)) state board of 12 education.

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(2) The superintendent of public instruction shall:

(a) Periodically revise the essential academic learning
requirements, as needed, based on the student learning goals in RCW
28A.150.210. Goals one and two shall be considered primary. To the
maximum extent possible, the superintendent shall integrate goal four
and the knowledge and skill areas in the other goals in the essential
academic learning requirements; and

20 Review and prioritize the essential academic learning (b) 21 requirements and identify, with clear and concise descriptions, the grade level content expectations to be assessed on the Washington 22 23 assessment of student learning and used for state or federal accountability purposes. 24 The review, prioritization, and 25 identification shall result in more focus and targeting with an 26 emphasis on depth over breadth in the number of grade level content expectations assessed at each grade level. Grade level content 27 expectations shall be articulated over the grades as a sequence of 28 expectations and performances that are logical, build with increasing 29 30 depth after foundational knowledge and skills are acquired, and 31 reflect, where appropriate, the sequential nature of the discipline. The office of the superintendent of public instruction, within seven 32 working days, shall post on its web site any grade level content 33 34 expectations provided to an assessment vendor for use in constructing 35 the Washington assessment of student learning.

36 (3) In consultation with the ((academic achievement and 37 accountability commission)) state board of education, the

superintendent of public instruction shall maintain and continue to 1 2 develop and revise a statewide academic assessment system in the content areas of reading, writing, mathematics, and science for use in 3 the elementary, middle, and high school years designed to determine if 4 each student has mastered the essential academic learning requirements 5 identified in subsection (1) of this section. School districts shall б 7 administer the assessments under guidelines adopted bv the superintendent of public instruction. The academic assessment system 8 shall include a variety of assessment methods, including criterion-9 10 referenced and performance-based measures.

(4) If the superintendent proposes any modification to the essential academic learning requirements or the statewide assessments, then the superintendent shall, upon request, provide opportunities for the education committees of the house of representatives and the senate to review the assessments and proposed modifications to the essential academic learning requirements before the modifications are adopted.

(5)(a) The assessment system shall be designed so that the results under the assessment system are used by educators as tools to evaluate instructional practices, and to initiate appropriate educational support for students who have not mastered the essential academic learning requirements at the appropriate periods in the student's educational development.

(b) Assessments measuring the essential academic learning requirements in the content area of science shall be available for mandatory use in middle schools and high schools by the 2003-04 school year and for mandatory use in elementary schools by the 2004-05 school year unless the legislature takes action to delay or prevent implementation of the assessment.

(6) By September 2007, the results for reading and mathematics shall be reported in a format that will allow parents and teachers to determine the academic gain a student has acquired in those content areas from one school year to the next.

33 (7) To assist parents and teachers in their efforts to provide 34 educational support to individual students, the superintendent of 35 public instruction shall provide as much individual student performance 36 information as possible within the constraints of the assessment 37 system's item bank. The superintendent shall also provide to school 38 districts:

1 (a) Information on classroom-based and other assessments that may 2 provide additional achievement information for individual students; and

3 (b) A collection of diagnostic tools that educators may use to 4 evaluate the academic status of individual students. The tools shall 5 be designed to be inexpensive, easily administered, and quickly and 6 easily scored, with results provided in a format that may be easily 7 shared with parents and students.

8 (8) To the maximum extent possible, the superintendent shall 9 integrate knowledge and skill areas in development of the assessments.

10 (9) Assessments for goals three and four of RCW 28A.150.210 shall 11 be integrated in the essential academic learning requirements and 12 assessments for goals one and two.

(10) The superintendent shall develop assessments that are directly related to the essential academic learning requirements, and are not biased toward persons with different learning styles, racial or ethnic backgrounds, or on the basis of gender.

17 (11) The superintendent shall consider methods to address the 18 unique needs of special education students when developing the 19 assessments under this section.

20 (12) The superintendent shall consider methods to address the 21 unique needs of highly capable students when developing the assessments 22 under this section.

(13) The superintendent shall post on the superintendent's web site
 lists of resources and model assessments in social studies, the arts,
 and health and fitness.

WASHINGTON PROFESSIONAL EDUCATOR STANDARDS BOARD

28 **Sec. 201.** RCW 28A.410.210 and 2000 c 39 s 103 are each amended to 29 read as follows:

30 The purpose of the professional educator standards board is to 31 establish policies and requirements for the preparation and 32 certification of educators that provide standards for competency in 33 professional knowledge and practice in the areas of certification; a 34 foundation of skills, knowledge, and attitudes necessary to help 35 students with diverse needs, abilities, cultural experiences, and 36 learning styles meet or exceed the learning goals outlined in RCW

1 <u>28A.150.210; knowledge of research-based practice; and professional</u> 2 <u>development throughout a career.</u> The Washington professional educator 3 standards board shall:

4 (1) Establish policies and practices for the approval of programs
5 of courses, requirements, and other activities leading to educator
6 certification including teacher, school administrator, and educational
7 staff associate certification;

8 (2) Establish policies and practices for the approval of the 9 character of work required to be performed as a condition of entrance 10 to and graduation from any educator preparation program including 11 teacher, school administrator, and educational staff associate 12 preparation program as provided in subsection (1) of this section;

13 (3) Establish a list of accredited institutions of higher education 14 of this and other states whose graduates may be awarded educator 15 certificates as teacher, school administrator, and educational staff 16 associate and establish criteria and enter into agreements with other 17 states to acquire reciprocal approval of educator preparation programs 18 and certification, including teacher certification from the national 19 board for professional teaching standards;

20 <u>(4) Establish policies for approval of nontraditional educator</u>
21 preparation programs;

22 (5) Conduct a review of educator program approval standards at 23 least every five years, beginning in 2006, to reflect research findings 24 and assure continued improvement of preparation programs for teachers, 25 administrators, and school specialized personnel;

26 (6) Specify the types and kinds of educator certificates to be 27 issued and conditions for certification in accordance with subsection 28 (1) of this section and RCW 28A.410.010;

29 (7) Establish prospective educator assessment systems as necessary, 30 including the prospective teacher assessment system for basic skills 31 and subject knowledge that shall be required to obtain residency 32 certification pursuant to RCW 28A.410.220 through 28A.410.240;

33 (8) Hear and determine educator certification appeals as provided 34 by RCW 28A.410.100;

35 (9) Apply for and receive federal or other funds on behalf of the 36 state for purposes related to the duties of the board;

37 (10) Adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW that are necessary for the 38 effective and efficient implementation of this chapter; 1 (11) Maintain data concerning educator preparation programs and 2 their quality, educator certification, educator employment trends and 3 needs, and other data deemed relevant by the board;

(e) Where apparent that adequate regulation cannot be achieved by means other than licensing, the regulation should implement a system of licensing.

TRANSFER OF POWERS AND DUTIES

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 301.
