ESHB 3127 - S COMM AMD

ADOPTED AS AMENDED 03/02/06

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that expanding 3 4 activity in educational research, educational restructuring, and 5 educational improvement initiatives has produced and continues to 6 produce much valuable information. The legislature finds that such information should be shared with the citizens and educational 7 community of the state as widely as possible. The legislature further 8 finds that students and schools benefit from increased parental, 9 quardian, and community knowledge of and input regarding the delivery 10 of public education. The legislature further finds that increased 11 12 knowledge of and input regarding the public education system is particularly needed in low-income and ethnic minority communities. 13

14 The legislature finds that the center for the improvement of 15 student learning, created by the legislature in 1993 under the auspices 16 of the superintendent of public instruction, has not been allocated funding since the 2001-2003 biennium, and in effect no longer exists. 17 18 It is the intent of the legislature to reactivate the center for the improvement of student learning, and to create an educational ombudsman 19 20 to serve as a resource for parents and students and as an advocate for 21 students in the public education system.

22 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.300.130 and 1999 c 388 s 401 are each amended to 23 read as follows:

(1) ((Expanding activity in educational research, educational restructuring, and educational improvement initiatives has produced and continues to produce much valuable information. The legislature finds that such information should be shared with the citizens and educational community of the state as widely as possible.)) To facilitate access to information and materials on educational

improvement and research, the superintendent of public instruction, to 1 2 the extent funds are appropriated, shall establish the center for the improvement of student learning. ((The primary purpose of the center 3 is to provide assistance and advice to parents, school board members, 4 5 educators, and the public regarding strategies for assisting students in learning the essential academic learning requirements pursuant to 6 7 RCW 28A.630.885.)) The center shall work in conjunction with ((the academic achievement and accountability commission)) 8 parents, educational service districts, institutions of higher education, and 9 education, parent, community, and business organizations. 10

11 (2) The center, in conjunction with other staff in the office of 12 the superintendent of public instruction, shall:

13 (a) ((Serve as a clearinghouse for the completed work and 14 activities of the academic achievement and accountability commission;

(b)) Serve as a clearinghouse for information regarding successful educational improvement and parental involvement programs in schools and districts, and information about efforts within institutions of higher education in the state to support educational improvement initiatives in Washington schools and districts;

(((c))) <u>(b)</u> Provide best practices research ((and advice)) that can 20 21 be used to help schools develop and implement: Programs and practices instruction ((of the essential academic learning 22 to improve requirements under section 701 of this act)); systems to analyze 23 24 student assessment data, with an emphasis on systems that will combine the use of state and local data to monitor the academic progress of 25 each and every student in the school district; comprehensive, school-26 27 wide improvement plans; school-based shared decision-making models; programs to promote lifelong learning and community involvement in 28 education; school-to- work transition programs; programs to meet the 29 needs of highly capable students; programs and practices to meet the 30 diverse needs of students based on gender, racial, ethnic, economic, 31 32 and special needs status; research, information, and technology systems; and other programs and practices that will assist educators in 33 helping students learn the essential academic learning requirements; 34

35 (((d) Develop and distribute, in conjunction with the academic 36 achievement and accountability commission, parental involvement 37 materials, including instructional guides developed to inform parents 38 of the essential academic learning requirements. The instructional 1 guides also shall contain actions parents may take to assist their 2 children in meeting the requirements, and should focus on reaching 3 parents who have not previously been involved with their children's 4 education;

5 (e) Identify obstacles to greater parent and community involvement 6 in school shared decision-making processes and recommend strategies for 7 helping parents and community members to participate effectively in 8 school shared decision-making processes, including understanding and 9 respecting the roles of school building administrators and staff;

10 (f)) (c) Develop and maintain an internet web site to increase the 11 availability of information, research, and other materials;

12 ((g) Take other actions to increase public awareness of the 13 importance of parental and community involvement in education;

14 (h))) (d) Work with appropriate organizations to inform teachers, 15 district and school administrators, and school directors about the 16 waivers available and the broadened school board powers under RCW 17 28A.320.015;

18 ((((i))) (e) Provide training and consultation services, including 19 conducting regional summer institutes;

20 (((j) Address methods for improving the success rates of certain 21 ethnic and racial student groups)) (f) Identify strategies for 22 improving the success rates of ethnic and racial student groups with 23 disproportionate academic achievement;

24 (g) Work with parents, teachers, and school districts in 25 establishing an absentee notification procedure that will properly 26 notify parents when their student has not attended a class or has 27 missed a school day. The office of the superintendent of public 28 instruction shall consider various types of communication with parents, 29 including but not limited to, electronic mail, phone, and postal mail; 30 and

31 (((+))) (h) Perform other functions consistent with the purpose of 32 the center as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section.

33 (3) The superintendent of public instruction((, after consultation 34 with the academic achievement and accountability commission,)) shall 35 select and employ a director for the center.

(4) The superintendent may enter into contracts with individuals or
organizations including but not limited to: School districts;
educational service districts; educational organizations; teachers;

higher education faculty; institutions of higher education; state 1 business or community-based organizations; 2 agencies; and other individuals and organizations to accomplish the duties 3 and responsibilities of the center. In carrying out the duties and 4 responsibilities of the center, the superintendent, whenever possible, 5 shall use practitioners to assist agency staff as well as assist 6 educators and others in schools and districts. 7

(5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 8 report to the legislature by September 1, 2007, and thereafter 9 biennially, regarding the effectiveness of the center for improvement 10 of student learning, how the services provided by the center for 11 improvement of student learning have been used and by whom, and 12 13 recommendations to improve the accessibility and application of knowledge and information that leads to improved student learning and 14 greater family and community involvement in the public education 15 16 system.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) The state board of education shall 17 establish an education ombudsman for all common school students in this 18 The purpose of the education ombudsman is to provide 19 state. 20 information to parents, students, and others regarding their rights and 21 responsibilities with respect to the state's public elementary and secondary education system, and to advocate on behalf of elementary and 22 23 secondary students.

(2)(a) The state board of education shall conduct a request for 24 proposals process and select the entity that will operate the education 25 26 ombudsman's program. Entities eligible to apply for selection include, 27 but are not limited:

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(i) Education service districts;

29 (ii) Private, nonprofit educational organizations;

(iii) Private, nonprofit community-based organizations; and 30

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(iv) Federally recognized Indian tribes.

(b) Entities not eligible to serve as the education ombudsman are 32 school districts, schools, or the superintendent of public instruction, 33 34 or any employee of a school district, school, or the superintendent of public instruction. 35

36 (3) The state board of education shall enter into a contract with the entity selected pursuant to this section to establish and operate 37

the education ombudsman's program. The term of any contract between the state board of education and the entity selected shall not be greater than two years and may be renewed for terms of no longer than two years.

(4) The education ombudsman shall contract with educational service 5 districts, nonprofit education or community organizations, or federally 6 7 recognized tribes to provide education ombudsman services throughout the state. The education ombudsman shall delegate and certify regional 8 The education ombudsman shall ensure that the 9 education ombudsmen. regional ombudsmen selected are appropriate to the community in which 10 The education ombudsman may not contract with the 11 they serve. superintendent of public instruction, or any school, school district, 12 13 or current employee of a school, school district, or the office of the 14 superintendent of public instruction for the provision of regional 15 ombudsman services.

16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 4.** The education ombudsman shall have the 17 following powers and duties:

develop parental involvement materials, 18 (1)including То instructional guides developed to inform parents of the essential 19 20 academic learning requirements required by the superintendent of public 21 instruction. The instructional quides also shall contain actions parents may take to assist their children in meeting the requirements, 22 23 and should focus on reaching parents who have not previously been 24 involved with their children's education;

(2) To provide information to students, parents, and interested members of the public regarding this state's public elementary and secondary education system;

To identify obstacles to greater parent and community 28 (3) involvement in school shared decision-making processes and recommend 29 strategies for helping parents and community members to participate 30 31 effectively in school shared decision-making processes, including understanding and respecting the roles of 32 school building administrators and staff; 33

34 (4) To identify and recommend strategies for improving the success
35 rates of ethnic and racial student groups with disproportionate
36 academic achievement;

(5) To refer complainants and others to appropriate resources,
agencies, or departments;

3 (6) To facilitate the resolution of complaints made by parents and 4 students with regard to the state's public elementary and secondary 5 education system; and

6 (7) To perform such other functions consistent with the purpose of 7 the education ombudsman.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. (1) The education ombudsman and any regional 9 education ombudsmen shall have training or experience or both in the 10 following areas:

11 (a) Public education law and policy in this state;

(b) Dispute resolution or problem resolution techniques, includingmediation and negotiation; and

14 (c) Community outreach.

15 (2) The education ombudsman may not be an employee of any school 16 district, the office of the superintendent of public education or the 17 state board of education while serving as an education ombudsman.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. (1) Neither the education ombudsman nor any 19 regional educational ombudsmen are liable for good faith performance of 20 responsibilities under this chapter.

(2) No discriminatory, disciplinary, or retaliatory action may be 21 taken against any student or employee of any school district, the 22 office of the superintendent of public education, or the state board of 23 education, for any communication made, or information given or 24 25 disclosed, to aid the education ombudsman in carrying out his or her duties and responsibilities, unless the same was done without good 26 faith or maliciously. This subsection is not intended to infringe upon 27 28 the rights of a school district to supervise, discipline, or terminate 29 an employee for other reasons or to discipline a student for other 30 reasons.

31 (3) All communications by the education ombudsman or the 32 ombudsman's staff or designee, if reasonably related to the education 33 ombudsman's duties and responsibilities and done in good faith, are 34 privileged and that privilege shall serve as a defense to any action in 35 libel or slander.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. The education ombudsman shall treat all 1 matters, including the identities of students, complainants, and 2 individuals from whom information is acquired, as confidential, except 3 as necessary to enable the education ombudsman to perform the duties of 4 5 the office. Upon receipt of information that by law is confidential or privileged, the ombudsman shall maintain the confidentiality of such 6 7 information and shall not further disclose or disseminate the information except as provided by applicable state or federal law. 8

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. (1) When developing the request for 10 proposals under section 3 of this act, the state board of education 11 shall confer with each of the following:

12 (a) The Washington state commission on Hispanic affairs;

13 (b) The Washington state commission on African-American affairs;

14 (c) The Washington state commission on Asian Pacific American 15 affairs; and

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(d) The governor's office of Indian affairs.

17 (2) The state board of education may establish subcommittees as it 18 desires, and may invite nonmembers to serve on these subcommittees to 19 provide ongoing consultation to the ombudsman.

(3) Nonlegislative members of the committee shall be reimbursed for
travel expenses under RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. The state board of education shall advise and make recommendations to the legislature and the governor biennially. The state board of education shall provide a preliminary report to the legislature and the governor by September 1, 2007. Thereafter, the state board of education shall provide biennial reports to the legislature and the governor regarding:

28 (1) How the education ombudsman's services have been used and by 29 whom;

30 (2) Methods for the education ombudsman to increase and enhance31 family and community involvement in public education;

32 (3) Recommendations to eliminate barriers and obstacles to
33 meaningful family and community involvement in public education; and
34 (4) Strategies to improve the educational opportunities for all

35 students in the state.

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. Sections 3 through 9 of this act are each
added to chapter 28A.305 RCW.

3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 11.** Sections 3 through 9 of this act expire 4 June 30, 2008.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 12. If specific funding for the purposes of 6 this act and section 2 of this act, referencing this act and section 2 7 of this act by bill or chapter number and section number, is not 8 provided by June 30, 2006, in the omnibus appropriations act, section 9 2 of this act is null and void."

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10 On page 1, line 1 of the title, after "education;" strike the 11 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.300.130; adding new 12 sections to chapter 28A.305 RCW; creating new sections; and providing 13 an expiration date."

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
