ESHB 3127 - S AMD 409

Strike everything after the enacting clause and insert the following:

"NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that expanding 3 4 activity in educational research, educational restructuring, and 5 educational improvement initiatives has produced and continues to 6 produce much valuable information. The legislature finds that such information should be shared with the citizens and educational 7 8 community of the state as widely as possible. The legislature further 9 finds that students and schools benefit from increased parental, quardian, and community involvement in education and increased 10 11 knowledge of and input regarding the delivery of public education. The 12 legislature further finds that increased community involvement with, knowledge of, and input regarding the public education system is 13 14 particularly needed in low-income and ethnic minority communities.

15 The legislature finds that the center for the improvement of 16 student learning, created by the legislature in 1993 under the auspices of the superintendent of public instruction, has not been allocated 17 funding since the 2001-2003 biennium, and in effect no longer exists. 18 It is the intent of the legislature to reactivate the center for the 19 20 improvement of student learning, and to create an educational ombudsman 21 to increase parent, quardian, and community involvement in public 22 education and to serve as a resource for parents and students and as an 23 advocate for students in the public education system.

24 **Sec. 2.** RCW 28A.300.130 and 1999 c 388 s 401 are each amended to 25 read as follows:

(1) ((Expanding activity in educational research, educational restructuring, and educational improvement initiatives has produced and continues to produce much valuable information. The legislature finds that such information should be shared with the citizens and

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educational community of the state as widely as possible.)) 1 То 2 facilitate access to information and materials on educational improvement and research, the superintendent of public instruction, to 3 the extent funds are appropriated, shall establish the center for the 4 improvement of student learning. ((The primary purpose of the center 5 is to provide assistance and advice to parents, school board members, 6 7 educators, and the public regarding strategies for assisting students in learning the essential academic learning requirements pursuant to 8 RCW 28A.630.885.)) The center shall work in conjunction with ((the 9 academic achievement and accountability commission)) 10 parents, educational service districts, institutions of higher education, and 11 12 education, parent, community, and business organizations.

13 (2) The center, in conjunction with other staff in the office of 14 the superintendent of public instruction, shall:

15 (a) ((Serve as a clearinghouse for the completed work and 16 activities of the academic achievement and accountability commission;

(b)) Serve as a clearinghouse for information regarding successful educational improvement and parental involvement programs in schools and districts, and information about efforts within institutions of higher education in the state to support educational improvement initiatives in Washington schools and districts;

22 (((-))) (b) Provide best practices research ((and advice)) that can be used to help schools develop and implement: Programs and practices 23 24 improve instruction ((of the essential academic learning to 25 requirements under section 701 of this act); systems to analyze student assessment data, with an emphasis on systems that will combine 26 27 the use of state and local data to monitor the academic progress of each and every student in the school district; comprehensive, school-28 wide improvement plans; school-based shared decision-making models; 29 programs to promote lifelong learning and community involvement in 30 education; school-to- work transition programs; programs to meet the 31 32 needs of highly capable students; programs and practices to meet the diverse needs of students based on gender, racial, ethnic, economic, 33 and special needs status; research, information, and technology 34 35 systems; and other programs and practices that will assist educators in helping students learn the essential academic learning requirements; 36

37 (((d) Develop and distribute, in conjunction with the academic 38 achievement and accountability commission, parental involvement materials, including instructional guides developed to inform parents of the essential academic learning requirements. The instructional guides also shall contain actions parents may take to assist their children in meeting the requirements, and should focus on reaching parents who have not previously been involved with their children's education;

7 (e) Identify obstacles to greater parent and community involvement 8 in school shared decision making processes and recommend strategies for 9 helping parents and community members to participate effectively in 10 school shared decision making processes, including understanding and 11 respecting the roles of school building administrators and staff;

12 (f)) (c) Develop and maintain an internet web site to increase the 13 availability of information, research, and other materials;

14 ((g) Take other actions to increase public awareness of the 15 importance of parental and community involvement in education;

16 (h))) (d) Work with appropriate organizations to inform teachers, 17 district and school administrators, and school directors about the 18 waivers available and the broadened school board powers under RCW 19 28A.320.015;

20 ((((i))) (e) Provide training and consultation services, including 21 conducting regional summer institutes;

(((j) Address methods for improving the success rates of certain ethnic and racial student groups)) (f) Identify strategies for improving the success rates of ethnic and racial student groups with disproportionate academic achievement;

26 (g) Work with parents, teachers, and school districts in 27 establishing a model absentee notification procedure that will properly 28 notify parents when their student has not attended a class or has 29 missed a school day. The office of the superintendent of public 30 instruction shall consider various types of communication with parents 31 including, but not limited to, electronic mail, phone, and postal mail; 32 and

33 (((+))) (h) Perform other functions consistent with the purpose of 34 the center as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section.

35 (3) The superintendent of public instruction((, after consultation 36 with the academic achievement and accountability commission,)) shall 37 select and employ a director for the center.

(4) The superintendent may enter into contracts with individuals or 1 2 organizations including but not limited to: School districts; educational service districts; educational organizations; teachers; 3 higher education faculty; institutions of higher education; state 4 agencies; business or community-based organizations; 5 and other individuals and organizations to accomplish the duties 6 and 7 responsibilities of the center. In carrying out the duties and responsibilities of the center, the superintendent, whenever possible, 8 shall use practitioners to assist agency staff as well as assist 9 educators and others in schools and districts. 10

(5) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 11 report to the legislature by September 1, 2007, and thereafter 12 13 biennially, regarding the effectiveness of the center for improvement 14 of student learning, how the services provided by the center for improvement of student learning have been used and by whom, and 15 recommendations to improve the accessibility and application of 16 knowledge and information that leads to improved student learning and 17 greater family and community involvement in the public education 18 19 system.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) There is hereby created the office of the education ombudsman within the office of the governor for the purposes of providing information to parents, students, and others regarding their rights and responsibilities with respect to the state's public elementary and secondary education system, and advocating on behalf of elementary and secondary students.

26 (2)(a) The governor shall appoint an ombudsman who shall be a 27 person of recognized judgment, independence, objectivity, and integrity 28 and shall be qualified by training or experience or both in the 29 following areas:

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(i) Public education law and policy in this state;

31 (ii) Dispute resolution or problem resolution techniques, including 32 mediation and negotiation; and

33 (iii) Community outreach.

(b) The education ombudsman may not be an employee of any school
 district, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, or
 the state board of education while serving as an education ombudsman.

(3) Before the appointment of the education ombudsman, the governor
 shall share information regarding the appointment to a six-person
 legislative committee appointed and comprised as follows:

4 (a) The committee shall consist of three senators and three members 5 of the house of representatives from the legislature.

6 (b) The senate members of the committee shall be appointed by the 7 president of the senate. Two members shall represent the majority 8 caucus and one member the minority caucus.

9 (c) The house of representatives members of the committee shall be 10 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives. Two members 11 shall represent the majority caucus and one member the minority caucus.

(4) If sufficient appropriations are provided, the education 12 13 ombudsman shall delegate and certify regional education ombudsmen. The 14 education ombudsman shall ensure that the regional ombudsmen selected are appropriate to the community in which they serve and hold the same 15 qualifications as in subsection (2)(a) of this section. The education 16 17 ombudsman may not contract with the superintendent of public instruction, or any school, school district, or current employee of a 18 school, school district, or the office of the superintendent of public 19 instruction for the provision of regional ombudsman services. 20

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **sec. 4.** The education ombudsman shall have the 22 following powers and duties:

23 То develop parental involvement materials, (1)including instructional quides developed to inform parents of the essential 24 academic learning requirements required by the superintendent of public 25 26 instruction. The instructional guides also shall contain actions parents may take to assist their children in meeting the requirements, 27 and should focus on reaching parents who have not previously been 28 involved with their children's education; 29

30 (2) To provide information to students, parents, and interested 31 members of the public regarding this state's public elementary and 32 secondary education system;

33 (3) To identify obstacles to greater parent and community 34 involvement in school shared decision-making processes and recommend 35 strategies for helping parents and community members to participate 36 effectively in school shared decision-making processes, including understanding and respecting the roles of school building
 administrators and staff;

3 (4) To identify and recommend strategies for improving the success
4 rates of ethnic and racial student groups with disproportionate
5 academic achievement;

6 (5) To refer complainants and others to appropriate resources,
7 agencies, or departments;

8 (6) To facilitate the resolution of complaints made by parents and 9 students with regard to the state's public elementary and secondary 10 education system;

11 (7) To perform such other functions consistent with the purpose of 12 the education ombudsman; and

(8) To consult with representatives of the following organizations
and groups regarding the work of the office of the education ombudsman,
including but not limited to:

16 (a) The state parent teacher association;

17 (b) Certificated and classified school employees;

18 (c) School and school district administrators;

19 (d) Parents of special education students;

20 (e) Parents of English language learners;

21 (f) The Washington state commission on Hispanic affairs;

22 (g) The Washington state commission on African-American affairs;

23 (h) The Washington state commission on Asian Pacific American 24 affairs; and

25 (i) The governor's office of Indian affairs.

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 5.** (1) Neither the education ombudsman nor any 27 regional educational ombudsmen are liable for good faith performance of 28 responsibilities under this chapter.

(2) No discriminatory, disciplinary, or retaliatory action may be 29 taken against any student or employee of any school district, the 30 31 office of the superintendent of public education, or the state board of education, for any communication made, or information given or 32 disclosed, to aid the education ombudsman in carrying out his or her 33 duties and responsibilities, unless the same was done without good 34 35 faith or maliciously. This subsection is not intended to infringe upon 36 the rights of a school district to supervise, discipline, or terminate

an employee for other reasons or to discipline a student for other
 reasons.

3 (3) All communications by the education ombudsman or the 4 ombudsman's staff or designee, if reasonably related to the education 5 ombudsman's duties and responsibilities and done in good faith, are 6 privileged and that privilege shall serve as a defense to any action in 7 libel or slander.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 6. The education ombudsman shall treat all 8 matters, including the identities of students, complainants, and 9 individuals from whom information is acquired, as confidential, except 10 as necessary to enable the education ombudsman to perform the duties of 11 the office. Upon receipt of information that by law is confidential or 12 privileged, the ombudsman shall maintain the confidentiality of such 13 information and shall not further disclose or disseminate the 14 information except as provided by applicable state or federal law. 15

NEW SECTION. Sec. 7. The education ombudsman shall report on the 16 accomplishment of the office and 17 work and advise and make recommendations to the governor, the legislature, and the state board 18 of education annually. The initial report to the governor, the 19 20 legislature, and the state board of education shall be made by September 1, 2007, and there shall be annual reports by September 1st 21 each year thereafter. The annual reports shall provide at least the 22 23 following information:

24 (1) How the education ombudsman's services have been used and by 25 whom;

(2) Methods for the education ombudsman to increase and enhancefamily and community involvement in public education;

(3) Recommendations to eliminate barriers and obstacles tomeaningful family and community involvement in public education; and

30 (4) Strategies to improve the educational opportunities for all 31 students in the state, including recommendations from organizations and 32 groups provided in section 4(8) of this act.

33 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 8.** Sections 3 through 7 of this act constitute 34 a new chapter in Title 43 RCW. NEW SECTION. Sec. 9. If specific funding for the purposes of this act and section 2 of this act, referencing this act and section 2 of this act by bill or chapter number and section number, is not provided by June 30, 2006, in the omnibus appropriations act, section 2 of this act is null and void."

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6 On page 1, line 1 of the title, after "education;" strike the 7 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 28A.300.130; adding a 8 new chapter to Title 43 RCW; and creating new sections."

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
