- 10 **Sec. 2.** RCW 29A.04.321 and 2004 c 271 s 106 are each amended to 11 read as follows:
- (1) All state, county, city, town, and district general elections 12 13 for the election of federal, state, legislative, judicial, county, city, town, and district officers, and for the submission to the voters 14 15 of the state, county, city, town, or district of any measure for their adoption and approval or rejection, shall be held on the first Tuesday 16 17 after the first Monday of November, in the year in which they may be A statewide general election shall be held on the first 18 Tuesday after the first Monday of November of each year. However, the 19 20 statewide general election held in odd-numbered years shall be limited 21 to (a) city, town, and district general elections as provided for in 22 RCW 29A.04.330, or as otherwise provided by law; (b) the election of federal officers for the remainder of any unexpired terms in the 23 24 membership of either branch of the Congress of the United States; (c) 25 the election of state and county officers for the remainder of any 26 unexpired terms of offices created by or whose duties are described in 27 Article II, section 15, Article III, sections 16, 17, 19, 20, 21, 22, 28 and 23, and Article IV, sections 3 and 5 of the state Constitution and 29 RCW 2.06.080; (d) the election of county officers in any county

- governed by a charter containing provisions calling for general county elections at this time; and (e) the approval or rejection of state measures, including proposed constitutional amendments, matters pertaining to any proposed constitutional convention, initiative measures and referendum measures proposed by the electorate, referendum bills, and any other matter provided by the legislature for submission to the electorate.
 - (2) A county legislative authority may((, if it deems an emergency to exist,)) call a special county election by presenting a resolution to the county auditor ((at least forty-five days)) prior to the proposed election date. Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, a special election called by the county legislative authority shall be held on one of the following dates as decided by such governing body:
 - (a) The first Tuesday after the first Monday in February;
 - (b) The second Tuesday in March;
 - (c) The fourth Tuesday in April;
 - (d) The third Tuesday in May;

- (((5))) (6) This section shall supersede the provisions of any and 1 2 all other statutes, whether general or special in nature, having different dates for such city, town, and district elections, the 3 purpose of this section being to establish mandatory dates for holding 4 elections except for those elections held pursuant to a home-rule 5 charter adopted under Article XI, section 4 of the state Constitution. 6 7 This section shall not be construed as fixing the time for holding primary elections, or elections for the recall of any elective public 8 9 officer.
- 10 **Sec. 3.** RCW 29A.04.330 and 2004 c 266 s 6 are each amended to read 11 as follows:
- 12 (1) All city, town, and district general elections shall be held 13 throughout the state of Washington on the first Tuesday following the 14 first Monday in November in the odd-numbered years.

This section shall not apply to:

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- (a) Elections for the recall of any elective public officer;
- (b) Public utility districts, conservation districts, or district elections at which the ownership of property within those districts is a prerequisite to voting, all of which elections shall be held at the times prescribed in the laws specifically applicable thereto;
- (c) Consolidation proposals as provided for in RCW 28A.315.235 and nonhigh capital fund aid proposals as provided for in chapter 28A.540 RCW.

- **Sec. 4.** RCW 29A.24.040 and 2003 c 111 s 604 are each amended to 30 read as follows:
 - A candidate may file his or her declaration of candidacy for an office by electronic means on a system specifically designed and authorized by a filing officer to accept filings.
 - (1) Filings that are received electronically must capture all information specified in RCW ((29A.24.030)) 29A.24.031 (1) through (4).
- 36 (2) Electronic filing may begin at 9:00 a.m. the ((fourth)) third

- 1 Monday in ((July)) May and continue through 4:00 p.m. the following 2 Friday.
- 3 (3) In case of special filing periods established in this chapter, 4 electronic filings may be accepted beginning at 9:00 a.m. on the first 5 day of the special filing period through 4:00 p.m. the last day of the 6 special filing period.
- 7 **Sec. 5.** RCW 29A.24.050 and 2003 c 111 s 605 are each amended to 8 read as follows:

Except where otherwise provided by this title, declarations of candidacy for the following offices shall be filed during regular business hours with the filing officer no earlier than the ((fourth)) third Monday in ((July)) May and no later than the following Friday in the year in which the office is scheduled to be voted upon:

- (1) Offices that are scheduled to be voted upon for full terms or both full terms and short terms at, or in conjunction with, a state general election; and
- 17 (2) Offices where a vacancy, other than a short term, exists that 18 has not been filled by election and for which an election to fill the 19 vacancy is required in conjunction with the next state general 20 election.

Filings for a nonpartisan office shall be reopened for a period of three normal business days, such three-day period to be fixed by the election officer with whom such declarations of candidacy are filed and notice thereof given by notifying press, radio, and television in the county and by such other means as may now or hereafter be provided by law whenever before the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to a primary:

(1) A void in candidacy occurs;

- 35 (3) A nominee for judge of the superior court entitled to a

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Filings for a nonpartisan office (other than judge of the supreme court or superintendent of public instruction) shall be reopened for a period of three normal business days, such three-day period to be fixed by the election officer with whom such declarations of candidacy are filed and notice thereof given by notifying press, radio, and television in the county and by such other means as may now or hereafter be provided by law, when:

- (1) A void in candidacy for such nonpartisan office occurs on or after the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to a primary but prior to the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday before an election; or
- (2) A nominee for judge of the superior court eligible after a contested primary for a certificate of election by Article 4, section 29, Amendment 41 of the state Constitution, dies or is disqualified within the ten-day period immediately following the last day allotted for a candidate to withdraw; or
- (3) A vacancy occurs in any nonpartisan office on or after the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to a primary but prior to the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday before an election leaving an unexpired term to be filled by an election for which filings have not been held.
- The candidate receiving a plurality of the votes cast for that office in the general election shall be deemed elected.
- 28 **Sec. 8.** RCW 29A.24.191 and 2004 c 271 s 167 are each amended to 29 read as follows:

A scheduled election shall be lapsed, the office deemed stricken from the ballot, no purported write-in votes counted, and no candidate certified as elected, when:

33 (1) In an election for judge of the supreme court or superintendent 34 of public instruction, a void in candidacy occurs on or after the 35 ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to a primary, public filings and the 1 primary being an indispensable phase of the election process for such 2 offices;

- (2) Except as otherwise specified in RCW 29A.24.181, a nominee for judge of the superior court entitled to a certificate of election pursuant to Article 4, section 29, Amendment 41 of the state Constitution dies or is disqualified on or after the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to a primary;

- 11 Sec. 9. RCW 29A.24.210 and 2005 c 2 s 10 (Initiative Measure No. 872) are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

Filings for a partisan elective office shall be opened for a period of three normal business days whenever, on or after the first day of the regular filing period and before the ((sixth)) eleventh Tuesday prior to an election, a vacancy occurs in that office, leaving an unexpired term to be filled by an election for which filings have not been held.

Any special three-day filing period shall be fixed by the election officer with whom declarations of candidacy for that office are filed. The election officer shall give notice of the special three-day filing period by notifying the press, radio, and television in the county or counties involved, and by any other means as may be required by law.

Candidacies validly filed within the special three-day filing period shall appear on the primary or general election ballot as if filed during the regular filing period.

The procedures for filings for partisan offices where a vacancy occurs under this section or a void in candidacy occurs under RCW ((29A.24.140)) 29A.24.141 must be substantially similar to the procedures for nonpartisan offices under RCW ((29A.24.150)) 29A.24.151 through ((29A.24.170)) 29A.24.171.

- **Sec. 10.** RCW 29A.40.070 and 2004 c 266 s 13 are each amended to 33 read as follows:
- (1) Except where a recount or litigation under RCW ((29A.68.010))

 29A.68.011 is pending, the county auditor shall have sufficient absentee ballots available for absentee voters of that county, other

than overseas voters and service voters, at least twenty days before any primary, general election, or special election. The county auditor must mail absentee ballots to each voter for whom the county auditor has received a request nineteen days before the primary or election at least eighteen days before the primary or election. For a request for an absentee ballot received after the nineteenth day before the primary or election, the county auditor shall make every effort to mail ballots within one business day, and shall mail the ballots within two business days.

- (2) ((The county auditor shall make every effort to mail ballots to overseas and service voters earlier than eighteen days before a primary or election)) At least thirty days before any primary, general election, or special election, the county auditor shall mail ballots to all overseas and service voters. A request for a ballot made by an overseas or service voter after that day must be processed immediately.
- (3) Each county auditor shall certify to the office of the secretary of state the dates the ballots prescribed in subsection (1) of this section were available and mailed.
- (4) If absentee ballots will not be available or mailed as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section, the county auditor shall immediately certify to the office of the secretary of state when absentee ballots will be available and mailed. Copies of this certification must be provided to the county canvassing board, the press, jurisdictions with issues on the ballot in the election, and any candidates.
- (5) If absentee ballots were not available or mailed as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section, for a reason other than a recount or litigation, the county auditor, in consultation with the certification and training program of the office of the secretary of state, shall submit a report to the office of the secretary of state outlining why the deadline was missed and what corrective actions will be taken in future elections to ensure that absentee ballots are available and mailed as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section.
- (6) Failure to have absentee ballots available and mailed as prescribed in subsection (1) of this section does not by itself provide a basis for an election contest or other legal challenge to the results of a primary, general election, or special election.

Sec. 11. RCW 29A.56.030 and 2003 c 111 s 1403 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

The name of any candidate for a major political party nomination for president of the United States shall be printed on the presidential preference primary ballot of a major political party only:

- (1) By direction of the secretary of state, who in the secretary's sole discretion has determined that the candidate's candidacy is generally advocated or is recognized in national news media; or
- (2) If members of the political party of the candidate have presented a petition for nomination of the candidate that has attached to the petition a sheet or sheets containing the signatures of at least one thousand registered voters who declare themselves in the petition as being affiliated with the same political party as the presidential candidate. The petition shall be filed with the secretary of state not later than ((the thirty ninth day)) sixty days before the presidential preference primary. The signature sheets shall also contain the residence address and name or number of the precinct of each registered voter whose signature appears thereon and shall be certified in the manner prescribed in RCW 29A.72.230 and 29A.72.240.

The secretary of state shall place the name of the candidate on the ballot unless the candidate, at least ((thirty-five)) fifty-two days before the presidential preference primary, executes and files with the secretary of state an affidavit stating without qualification that he or she is not now and will not become a candidate for the office of president of the United States at the forthcoming presidential election. The secretary of state shall certify the names of all candidates who will appear on the presidential preference primary ballot to the respective county auditors on or before the fourth Tuesday in April of each presidential election year.

- **Sec. 12.** RCW 29A.60.190 and 2004 c 266 s 18 are each amended to read as follows:
- (1) ((On the tenth day after a special election or primary and on the fifteenth day after a)) Fifteen days after a primary, special election, or general election, the county canvassing board shall complete the canvass and certify the results. Each absentee ballot that was returned before the closing of the polls ((on the date of the primary or election for which it was issued)), and each absentee ballot

- ((with)) bearing a postmark on or before the date of the ((primary or))
 election ((for which it was issued)) and received on or before the date
 on which the ((primary or)) election is certified, must be included in
 the canvass report.
- 5 (2) At the request of a caucus of the state legislature, the county 6 auditor shall transmit copies of all unofficial returns of state and 7 legislative primaries or elections prepared by or for the county 8 canvassing board to either the secretary of the senate or the chief 9 clerk of the house of representatives.
- **Sec. 13.** RCW 29A.64.070 and 2003 c 111 s 1607 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

12 After the original count, canvass, and certification of results, 13 the votes cast in any single precinct may ((not)) be recounted and the 14 results recertified not more than once for a primary and not more than 15 twice for a special or general election.

- Sec. 14. RCW 27.12.355 and 1987 c 138 s 1 are each amended to read as follows:
- (1) As provided in this section, a rural county library district, island library district, or intercounty rural library district may withdraw areas from its boundaries, or reannex areas into the library district that previously had been withdrawn from the library district under this section.
- (2) The withdrawal of an area shall be authorized upon: (a) Adoption of a resolution by the board of trustees requesting the withdrawal and finding that, in the opinion of the board, inclusion of this area within the library district will result in a reduction of the district's tax levy rate under the provisions of RCW 84.52.010; and (b) adoption of a resolution by the city or town council approving the withdrawal, if the area is located within the city or town, or adoption of a resolution by the county legislative authority of the county within which the area is located approving the withdrawal, if the area is located outside of a city or town. A withdrawal shall be effective at the end of the day on the thirty-first day of December in the year in which the resolutions are adopted, but for purposes of establishing boundaries for property tax purposes, the boundaries shall be established immediately upon the adoption of the second resolution.

The authority of an area to be withdrawn from a library district as provided under this section is in addition, and not subject, to the provisions of RCW 27.12.380.

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The withdrawal of an area from the boundaries of a library district shall not exempt any property therein from taxation for the purpose of paying the costs of redeeming any indebtedness of the library district existing at the time of the withdrawal.

(3) An area that has been withdrawn from the boundaries of a library district under this section may be reannexed into the library district upon: (a) Adoption of a resolution by the board of trustees proposing the reannexation; and (b) adoption of a resolution by the city or town council approving the reannexation, if the area is located within the city or town, or adoption of a resolution by the county legislative authority of the county within which the area is located approving the reannexation, if the area is located outside of a city or The reannexation shall be effective at the end of the day on the thirty-first day of December in the year in which the adoption of the second resolution occurs, but for purposes of establishing boundaries for property tax purposes, the boundaries shall be established immediately upon the adoption of the second resolution. Referendum action on the proposed reannexation may be taken by the voters of the area proposed to be reannexed if a petition calling for a referendum is filed with the city or town council, or county legislative authority, within a thirty-day period after the adoption of the second resolution, which petition has been signed by registered voters of the area proposed to be reannexed equal in number to ten percent of the total number of the registered voters residing in that area.

If a valid petition signed by the requisite number of registered voters has been so filed, the effect of the resolutions shall be held in abeyance and a ballot proposition to authorize the reannexation shall be submitted to the voters of the area at the next special election date ((specified in RCW 29.13.020 that occurs forty-five or more days after the petitions have been validated)) according to RCW 29A.04.330. Approval of the ballot proposition authorizing the reannexation by a simple majority vote shall authorize the reannexation.

Sec. 15. RCW 27.12.370 and 1982 c 123 s 14 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

The county legislative authority or authorities shall by resolution call a special election to be held in such city or town at the next special election date ((provided in RCW 29.13.010 but not less than forty-five days from the date of the declaration of such finding)) according to RCW 29A.04.321, and shall cause notice of such election to be given as provided for in RCW ((29.27.080)) 29A.52.351.

The election on the annexation of the city or town into the library district shall be conducted by the auditor of the county or counties in which the city or town is located in accordance with the general election laws of the state and the results thereof shall be canvassed by the canvassing board of the county or counties. No person shall be entitled to vote at such election unless he or she is registered to vote in said city or town for at least thirty days preceding the date of the election. The ballot proposition shall be in substantially the following form:

If a majority of the persons voting on the proposition shall vote in favor thereof, the city or town shall thereupon be annexed and shall be a part of such library district.

Sec. 16. RCW 35.02.086 and 1986 c 234 s 11 are each amended to 26 read as follows:

Each candidate for a city or town elective position shall file a declaration of candidacy with the county auditor of the county in which all or the major portion of the city or town is located((, not more than forty five nor less than thirty days)) prior to the primary election at which the initial elected officials are nominated, according to RCW 29A.24.050. The elective positions shall be as provided in law for the type of city or town and form or plan of government specified in the petition to incorporate, and for the population of the city or town as determined by the county legislative authority or boundary review board where applicable. Any candidate may

- 1 withdraw his or her declaration ((at any time within five days after
- 2 the last day allowed for filing declaration of candidacy)) according to
- 3 RCW 29A.24.131. All names of candidates to be voted upon shall be
- 4 printed upon the ballot alphabetically in groups under the designation

Sec. 17. RCW 35.06.070 and 1994 c 81 s 8 are each amended to read 8 as follows:

A ballot proposition authorizing an advancement in classification of a town to a second class city shall be submitted to the voters of the town if either: (1) Petitions proposing the advancement are submitted to the town clerk that have been signed by voters of the town equal in number to at least ten percent of the voters of the town voting at the last municipal general election; or (2) the town council adopts a resolution proposing the advancement. The clerk shall immediately forward the petitions to the county auditor who shall review the signatures and certify the sufficiency of the petitions.

A ballot proposition authorizing an advancement shall be submitted to the town voters at the next ((municipal general)) special election ((occurring forty five or more days after the petitions are submitted)) date according to RCW 29A.04.330 if the county auditor certifies the petitions as having sufficient valid signatures. The town shall be advanced to a second class city if the ballot proposition is approved by a simple majority vote, effective when the corporation is actually reorganized and the new officers are elected and qualified. The county auditor shall notify the secretary of state if the advancement of a town to a second class city is approved.

Sec. 18. RCW 35.13.1821 and 1998 c 286 s 2 are each amended to 29 read as follows:

The annexation ordinance provided for in RCW 35.13.182 is subject to referendum for forty-five days after its passage. Upon the filing of a timely and sufficient referendum petition with the legislative body, signed by qualified electors in number equal to not less than ten percent of the votes cast in the last general state election in the area to be annexed, the question of annexation shall be submitted to the voters of the area in a general election if one is to be held

- 1 within ninety days or at a special election called for that purpose
- 2 ((not less than forty-five days nor more than ninety days after the
- 3 filing of the referendum petition)) according to RCW 29A.04.330.
- 4 Notice of the election shall be given as provided in RCW 35.13.080 and
- 5 the election shall be conducted as provided in the general election
- 6 law. The annexation shall be deemed approved by the voters unless a
- 7 majority of the votes cast on the proposition are in opposition
- 8 thereto.
- 9 After the expiration of the forty-fifth day from but excluding the 10 date of passage of the annexation ordinance, if no timely and

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- 14 **Sec. 19.** RCW 35.61.360 and 1987 c 138 s 2 are each amended to read 15 as follows:
- (1) As provided in this section, a metropolitan park district may withdraw areas from its boundaries, or reannex areas into the metropolitan park district that previously had been withdrawn from the metropolitan park district under this section.
 - Adoption of a resolution by the park district commissioners requesting the withdrawal and finding that, in the opinion of the commissioners, inclusion of this area within the metropolitan park district will result in a reduction of the district's tax levy rate under the provisions of RCW 84.52.010; and (b) adoption of a resolution by the city or town council approving the withdrawal, if the area is located within the city or town, or adoption of a resolution by the county legislative authority of the county within which the area is located approving the withdrawal, if the area is located outside of a city or town. A withdrawal shall be effective at the end of the day on the thirty-first day of December in the year in which the resolutions are adopted, but for purposes of establishing boundaries for property tax purposes, the boundaries shall be established immediately upon the adoption of the second resolution.
- The withdrawal of an area from the boundaries of a metropolitan park district shall not exempt any property therein from taxation for

the purpose of paying the costs of redeeming any indebtedness of the metropolitan park district existing at the time of the withdrawal.

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(3) An area that has been withdrawn from the boundaries of a metropolitan park district under this section may be reannexed into the metropolitan park district upon: (a) Adoption of a resolution by the park district commissioners proposing the reannexation; and (b) adoption of a resolution by the city or town council approving the reannexation, if the area is located within the city or town, adoption of a resolution by the county legislative authority of the county within which the area is located approving the reannexation, if the area is located outside of a city or town. The reannexation shall be effective at the end of the day on the thirty-first day of December in the year in which the adoption of the second resolution occurs, but for purposes of establishing boundaries for property tax purposes, the boundaries shall be established immediately upon the adoption of the second resolution. Referendum action on the proposed reannexation may be taken by the voters of the area proposed to be reannexed if a petition calling for a referendum is filed with the city or town council, or county legislative authority, within a thirty-day period after the adoption of the second resolution, which petition has been signed by registered voters of the area proposed to be reannexed equal in number to ten percent of the total number of the registered voters residing in that area.

If a valid petition signed by the requisite number of registered voters has been so filed, the effect of the resolutions shall be held in abeyance and a ballot proposition to authorize the reannexation shall be submitted to the voters of the area at the next special election date ((specified in RCW 29.13.020 that occurs forty five or more days after the petitions have been validated)) according to RCW 29A.04.330. Approval of the ballot proposition authorizing the reannexation by a simple majority vote shall authorize the reannexation.

Sec. 20. RCW 35A.14.299 and 1967 ex.s. c 119 s 35A.14.299 are each amended to read as follows:

Such annexation ordinance as provided for in RCW 35A.14.297 shall be subject to referendum for forty-five days after the passage thereof. Upon the filing of a timely and sufficient referendum petition with the

legislative body, signed by qualified electors in number equal to not 1 less than ten percent of the votes cast in the last general state 2 election in the area to be annexed, the question of annexation shall be 3 submitted to the voters of such area in a general election if one is to 4 5 be held within ninety days or at a special election called for that purpose ((not less than forty-five days nor more than ninety days after 6 7 the filing of the referendum petition)) according to RCW 29A.04.330. and has dissolved, the treasurer shall file a final report. Upon submitting a final report, the duties of the treasurer shall cease and there shall be no obligation to make any further reports.

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The report filed twenty-one days before the election shall report all contributions received and expenditures made as of the end of the fifth business day before the date of the report. The report filed seven days before the election shall report all contributions received and expenditures made as of the end of the one business day before the date of the report. Reports filed on the tenth day of the month shall report all contributions received and expenditures made from the closing date of the last report filed through the last day of the month preceding the date of the current report.

- (3) For the period beginning the first day of the fourth month preceding the date on which the special ((or general)) election is held, or for the period beginning on the first day of the fifth month before the date on which the general election is held, and ending on the date of that <u>special or general</u> election, each Monday the treasurer shall file with the commission and the appropriate county elections officer a report of each bank deposit made during the previous seven The report shall contain the name of each person calendar days. contributing the funds so deposited and the amount contributed by each person. However, contributions of no more than twenty-five dollars in the aggregate from any one person may be deposited without identifying the contributor. A copy of the report shall be retained by the treasurer for his or her records. In the event of deposits made by a deputy treasurer, the copy shall be forwarded to the treasurer for his or her records. Each report shall be certified as correct by the treasurer or deputy treasurer making the deposit.
- (4) If a city requires that candidates or committees for city offices file reports with a city agency, the candidate or treasurer so filing need not also file the report with the county auditor or elections officer.
- (5) The treasurer or candidate shall maintain books of account accurately reflecting all contributions and expenditures on a current basis within five business days of receipt or expenditure. The reannexation shall be effective at the end of the day on the thirty-first day of December in the year 3 in which the adoption of the second resolution occurs, but for purposes 4 5 of establishing boundaries for property tax purposes, the boundaries shall be established immediately upon the adoption of the second 6 7 Referendum action on the proposed reannexation may be taken by the voters of the area proposed to be reannexed if a petition 8 calling for a referendum is filed with the city or town council, or 9 10 county legislative authority, within a thirty-day period after the adoption of the second resolution, which petition has been signed by 11 12 registered voters of the area proposed to be reannexed equal in number 13 to ten percent of the total number of the registered voters residing in 14 that area.

If a valid petition signed by the requisite number of registered voters has been so filed, the effect of the resolutions shall be held in abeyance and a ballot proposition to authorize the reannexation shall be submitted to the voters of the area at the next special election date ((specified in RCW 29.13.020 that occurs forty five or more days after the petitions have been validated)) according to RCW 29A.04.330. Approval of the ballot proposition authorizing the reannexation by a simple majority vote shall authorize the reannexation.
