3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that:

4 (1) Teaching first peoples' languages and cultures is a critical
5 factor in successful educational experiences and promoting cultural
6 sensitivity for all students. Experience shows such teaching
7 dramatically raises student achievement. The effect is particularly
8 strong for Native American students;

9 (2) Native American students have the highest high school dropout 10 rate among all groups of students. Less than one-fourth of Native 11 American students in the class of 2008 are on track to graduate based 12 on the results of the Washington assessment of student learning. 13 Positive and supportive educational experiences are critical for Native 14 American students' success;

15 (3) The sole expertise of sovereign tribal governments whose 16 traditional lands and territories lie within the borders of the state 17 of Washington in the transmission of their indigenous languages, 18 heritage, cultural knowledge, histories, customs, and traditions should 19 be honored;

20 (4) Government-to-government collaboration between the state and 21 sovereign tribal governments whose traditional lands the and territories lie within the borders of the state of Washington serves to 2.2 23 implement the spirit of the 1989 centennial accord and other similar 24 government-to-government agreements, including the 2004 accord between 25 the federally recognized Indian tribes with treaty reserved rights in Washington state and the state of Washington; 26

(5) Establishing a first peoples' language and culture teacher
 certification program both achieves educational objectives and models
 effective government-to-government relationships;

1 (6) Establishing a first peoples' language and culture 2 certification program implements the following policy objectives of 3 P.L. 101-477, the federal Native American languages act of 1990, in a 4 tangible way:

5 (a) To preserve, protect, and promote the rights and freedom of 6 Native Americans to use, practice, and develop Native American 7 languages;

8 (b) To allow exceptions to teacher certification requirements for 9 federal programs and programs funded in whole or in part by the federal 10 government, for instruction in Native American languages when such 11 teacher certification requirements hinder the employment of qualified 12 teachers who teach in Native American languages, and to encourage state 13 and territorial governments to make similar exceptions;

14 (c) To encourage and support the use of Native American languages 15 as a medium of instruction in order to encourage and support Native 16 American language survival, educational opportunity, increased student 17 success and performance, increased student awareness and knowledge of 18 their culture, and increased student and community pride;

19 (d) To encourage state and local education programs to work with 20 Native American parents, educators, Indian tribes, and other Native 21 American governing bodies in the implementation of programs to put this 22 policy into effect; and

(e) To encourage all institutions of elementary, secondary, and higher education, where appropriate, to include Native American languages in the curriculum in the same manner as foreign languages and to grant proficiency in Native American languages the same full academic credit as proficiency in foreign languages;

(7) Establishing a first peoples' language and culture certification program is consistent with the intent of presidential executive order number 13336 from 2004, entitled "American Indian and Alaska native education," to assist students in meeting the challenging student academic standards of P.L. 107-110, the no child left behind act of 2001, in a manner that is consistent with tribal traditions, languages, and cultures.

35 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410
36 RCW to read as follows:
37 (1) The Washington state first peoples' language and culture

teacher certification program is established. The professional 1 2 educator standards board shall adopt rules to implement the program in collaboration with the sovereign tribal governments whose traditional 3 lands and territories lie within the borders of the state of 4 Washington, including the tribal leader congress on education and the 5 first peoples' language and culture committee. The collaboration 6 required under this section shall be defined by a protocol for 7 in first peoples' language and culture teacher 8 coqovernance certification program developed by the professional educator standards 9 board, the office of the superintendent of public instruction, and the 10 sovereign tribal governments whose traditional lands and territories 11 12 lie within the borders of the state of Washington.

13 (2) Any sovereign tribal government whose traditional lands and 14 territories lie within the borders of the state of Washington may 15 participate individually on a government-to-government basis in the 16 program.

17 (3) Under the first peoples' language and culture teacher 18 certification program:

(a) Only a participating sovereign tribal government may certify 19 individuals who meet the tribe's criteria for certification as a 20 21 teacher in the Washington state first peoples' language and culture 22 program. Before certification of the individual, the participating sovereign tribal government shall conduct a background check through 23 24 the tribal police departments within Washington state to determine, to 25 the extent possible, whether the individual has been convicted of any crimes that may otherwise disqualify the person from being awarded a 26 27 teacher certificate and provide this information to the office of the superintendent of public instruction. The office of the superintendent 28 of public instruction shall not authorize or accept a certificate or 29 endorsement in Washington state first peoples' language and culture 30 without certification from a participating sovereign tribal government 31 32 and without conducting a record check of an individual applying for certification as required under RCW 28A.410.010; 33

34 (b) For each teacher to be certified in the program, the 35 participating sovereign tribal government shall submit information and 36 documentation necessary for the issuance of a state certificate, as 37 defined by rule, to the office of the superintendent of public 38 instruction;

(c) A Washington state first peoples' language and culture teacher 1 2 certificate serves as a subject area endorsement in first peoples' language and culture. The holder of a Washington state first peoples' 3 language and culture teacher certificate who does not also hold an 4 initial, residency, continuing, or professional teaching certificate 5 authorized by the professional educator standards board may be assigned 6 7 to teach only the languages and cultures designated on the certificate 8 and no other subject;

9 (d) In order to teach first peoples' language and culture, teachers 10 must hold certificates from both the office of the superintendent of 11 public instruction and the sovereign tribal government; and

(e) The holder of a Washington state first peoples' language and culture teacher certificate meets Washington state's definition of a highly qualified teacher under P.L. 107-110, the no child left behind act of 2001, for the purposes of teaching first peoples' language and culture, subject to approval by the United States department of education.

18 (4) First peoples' language/culture teacher certificates issued 19 under rules approved by the state board of education or the 20 professional educator standards board under a pilot program before the 21 effective date of this section remain valid as certificates under this 22 section, subject to the provisions of this chapter.

(5) Schools and school districts on or near tribal reservations are encouraged to contract with sovereign tribal governments whose traditional lands and territories lie within the borders of the state of Washington and first peoples' language and culture certification programs for in-service teacher training and continuing education in the culture and history appropriate for their geographic area, as well as suggested pedagogy and instructional strategies.

30 Sec. 3. RCW 28A.415.020 and 2006 c 263 s 808 are each amended to 31 read as follows:

32 (1) Certificated personnel shall receive for each ten clock hours 33 of approved in-service training attended the equivalent of a one credit 34 college quarter course on the salary schedule developed by the 35 legislative evaluation and accountability program committee.

36 (2) Certificated personnel shall receive for each ten clock hours37 of approved continuing education earned, as continuing education is

defined by rule adopted by the professional educator standards board, the equivalent of a one credit college quarter course on the salary schedule developed by the legislative evaluation and accountability program committee.

(3) Certificated personnel shall receive for each forty clock hours 5 of participation in an approved internship with a business, 6 an 7 industry, or government, as an internship is defined by rule of the educator standards board in accordance with RCW 8 professional 28A.415.025, the equivalent of a one credit college quarter course on 9 10 the salary schedule developed by the legislative evaluation and accountability program committee. 11

12 (4) An approved in-service training program shall be a program 13 approved by a school district board of directors, which meet standards 14 adopted by the professional educator standards board, and the development of said program has been participated in by an in-service 15 training task force whose membership is the same as provided under RCW 16 17 28A.415.040, or a program offered by an education agency approved to provide in-service for the purposes of continuing education as provided 18 for under rules adopted by the professional educator standards board, 19 20 or both.

(5) Clock hours eligible for application to the salary schedule developed by the legislative evaluation and accountability program committee as described in subsections (1) and (2) of this section, shall be those hours acquired after August 31, 1987. Clock hours eligible for application to the salary schedule as described in subsection (3) of this section shall be those hours acquired after December 31, 1995.

(6) In-service training or continuing education in first peoples' language or culture provided by a sovereign tribal government participating in the Washington state first peoples' language and culture program authorized under section 2 of this act shall be considered approved in-service training or approved continuing education under this section and RCW 28A.415.023.

34 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. This act may be known and cited as the 35 "First peoples' language/culture teacher certification act: Honoring 36 our ancestors.""
