16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A supplemental capital budget is hereby 18 adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in this act, the 19 several dollar amounts hereinafter specified, or so much thereof as 1 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 2 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for capital projects during 3 the period beginning with the effective date of this act and ending 4 June 30, 2009, out of the several funds specified in this act.

PART 1

GENERAL GOVERNMENT

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1001. A new section is added to 2007 c 520 8 (uncodified) to read as follows:

9 FOR THE JOINT LEGISLATIVE AUDIT AND REVIEW COMMITTEE

10 K-12 Inventory Pilot Project (08-2-850)

11 The appropriation in this section is subject to the following 12 conditions and limitations:

13 (1) Funding is provided solely for the joint legislative audit and review committee to define and develop a pilot facility condition and 14 inventory system for K-12 public school facilities. In developing and 15 conducting the pilot, the joint legislative audit and review committee 16 shall seek input from the superintendent of public instruction, 17 18 participating school districts, the construction services group within educational service district 112, the state board for community and 19 technical colleges, the office of financial management, the department 20 of information services, and other entities as determined by the joint 21 legislative audit and review committee. It is the intent of the 22 legislature to build on the experience of the community and technical 23 24 college capital facility assessment and inventory process, which 25 includes an independent condition assessment of facilities, to establish a baseline of basic public school facility building data and 26 information. It is also the intent of the legislature that once 27 developed, a facility condition and inventory system must be housed in 28 and operated by the office of the superintendent of public instruction 29 for school districts statewide. 30

(2) The joint legislative audit and review committee shall select up to ten public school districts to participate in the pilot. The school districts must represent a cross-section of large and small districts, urban and rural districts, districts with facilities of varying age and condition, districts with varying fiscal capacity, and at least one district that serves as the host for a skills center.

(3) The facility condition and inventory system must include 1 2 facility and site information necessary for facility assessment and maintenance. The facility condition and inventory system must also 3 inform statewide policy options related to: (a) Class size; (b) all-4 5 day kindergarten; (c) specialized educational spaces, including math and science classrooms and labs, as well as other specialized spaces; б 7 (d) environmental health and safety improvements; (e) joint use of school facilities beyond the traditional school day; (f) 8 hiqh performance buildings; (g) use of portables; and (h) other policy 9 10 options as identified by the joint legislative audit and review committee. 11

12 (4) Data elements in the facility condition and inventory system 13 may include, but are not limited to, facility location, facility condition including health and safety considerations, type, size, 14 current use, enrollment and space by grade level, information on 15 specialized educational spaces, functionality of space, energy 16 efficiency information, date and cost of original construction, date 17 and cost of any major remodeling or renovation, operations and 18 maintenance information and expenditures, and other data elements as 19 determined by the joint legislative audit and review committee. 20

21 (5) By January 1, 2009, the joint legislative audit and review 22 committee shall provide a report to the appropriate legislative fiscal 23 committees on the following: (a) A proposed scope of work for the 24 facility condition and inventory system pilot project; (b) 25 identification of current sources of school district facility 26 information and where the data resides; (c) recommended criteria for 27 evaluating school facilities; (d) potential school district participants; (e) an implementation plan for the pilot group of school 28 districts; and (f) a review of other states' scope and use of public 29 school facility condition and inventory information. 30

(6) By January 1, 2010, the joint legislative audit and review 31 32 committee shall submit findings and recommendations on the pilot program to the appropriate legislative fiscal committees. 33 At a minimum, the final report must include the following: (a) A summary of 34 35 data collected and analyzed for each participating school district; (b) an analysis of study and survey data for several participating school 36 37 districts compared to an independent facility assessment; (c) a 38 cost/benefit analysis of expanding the pilot to school districts

statewide, including potential timelines; (d) possible methods and 1 2 frequency for collecting, inventorying, updating, and sharing facility information by the office of the superintendent of public instruction; 3 (e) possible interaction of a facility condition and inventory system 4 with the statewide first responder building mapping system and other 5 data collection efforts that are ongoing, including student educational б data managed by the office of the superintendent of public instruction; 7 (f) methods that allow for the efficient transfer of information 8 between school districts and the facility condition and inventory 9 system; and (g) other recommendations as determined by the joint 10 legislative audit and review committee. 11

Housing Assistance, Weatherization, and Affordable Housing (06-4-851)

The reappropriations in this section are subject to the following conditions and limitations:

(1) \$7,800,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing
trust account is provided solely for the backlog, as defined by the
department, of projects determined by the department to be eligible
under chapter 43.185 or 43.185A RCW.

(2) \$4,500,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing
 trust account is provided solely for weatherization administered
 through the energy matchmakers program.

(3) \$850,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing trust account is provided solely to promote development of safe and affordable housing units for persons eligible for services from the division of developmental disabilities within the department of social and health services. (4) \$500,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing
 trust account is provided solely for shelters, transitional housing, or
 other housing facilities for victims of domestic violence.

(5) \$3,000,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing
trust account is provided solely for farm worker housing projects and
programs to meet the full spectrum of housing needs of Washington's
farm workers and their families. The department shall work with
stakeholders representing a diversity of farm worker housing interests
to develop a strategic plan in implementing this provision.

(6) \$200,000 of the reappropriation from the Washington housing 10 trust account is provided solely for the implementation and management 11 12 of a manufactured/mobile home landlord-tenant ombudsman conflict 13 resolution program by the office of mobile home affairs as generally described in section 3, chapter 429, Laws of 2005. 14 The office of mobile home affairs shall also determine the number of complaints made 15 to the department since May of 2005 that, in the best estimate of the 16 17 department, do in fact present violations of chapter 59.20 RCW and shall produce a summary of the number and types of complaints. 18 The office of mobile home affairs shall also continue to maintain and 19 update a database with information about all mobile home parks and 20 21 manufactured housing communities. The office of mobile home affairs 22 shall provide a report regarding the activities and results of the program to the appropriate committees of the house of representatives 23 24 and the senate by December 31, 2007.

(7) \$150,000 of the appropriation from the Washington housing trust 25 account is provided solely for a program to assist individuals and 26 27 communities in the home-buying process, including, but not limited to: Homebuyer education classes, credit and budget counseling, financial 28 literacy training, and down payment assistance programs. The department 29 shall contract with a nonprofit organization as defined under section 30 31 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or similar successor provision 32 that has experience and expertise in addressing language access barriers in the home-buying process to implement this program. 33

(5) \$14,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for 6 7 facilities housing low-income migrant, seasonal, or temporary farmworkers. The operation of the facilities built under this section 8 shall be in compliance with 8 U.S.C. Sec. 1342. The department shall 9 10 work with the farmworker housing advisory committee to prioritize funding of projects to the areas of highest need. Funding may also be 11 provided, to the extent qualified projects are submitted, for health 12 13 and safety projects. Any of this appropriation that is not obligated 14 by June 30, 2009, shall be added to the amount appropriated for the general pool of projects. 15

16 (6) \$5,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for the 17 development of emergency shelters and transitional housing 18 opportunities for homeless families with children.

(7) \$4,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for the development of farm infrastructure improvements. Any of this appropriation that is not obligated by June 30, 2009, shall be added to the amount appropriated for the general pool of projects.

(8) \$1,500,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for the development of housing for low-income or homeless Native Americans. The department shall work with Native American tribes, not-for-profit organizations with experience in serving Native American populations, and Native American housing development organizations to prioritize projects located in the areas of highest identified need.

(9) \$4,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for loans and grants to eligible organizations to purchase manufactured/mobile home communities with the intent of preserving the communities for affordable housing.

33 (10) Up to \$10,000,000 of the appropriation is for the creation and 34 development of low-income housing within areas declared disasters by 35 the governor after November 2007.

36 (11) \$2,000,000 of the appropriation from the state taxable 37 building construction account is provided solely for the development or 38 preservation of farmworker housing for migrant and seasonal farmworkers located on private farms. This appropriation is subject to appropriate agreements to protect the public investment. Any of this appropriation that is not obligated by June 30, 2009, shall be added to the amount appropriated for the general pool of projects.

5 (12) The appropriations in this section from the state building
6 construction account shall be distributed as grants.

7 (13) \$250,000 of the appropriation from the Washington housing 8 trust account is provided solely to the city of Burien for housing 9 related purposes.

10 <u>(14)</u> The appropriation in this section shall not be used for the 11 administrative costs of the department. The amount of the 12 appropriation shall be included in the calculation of annual funds 13 available for determining the administrative costs authorized under RCW 14 43.185.050.

(((11))) (15) Within available funding provided in this section, 15 the department shall prepare an inventory of housing assistance 16 17 programs. The inventory shall include all state funded programs, the housing finance commission programs, all programs funded by local 18 governments and housing authorities, including a description of 19 expenditures from fees and taxes specifically authorized by state law 20 21 for housing assistance and homeless programs, all property tax and 22 sales tax provisions that are intended to support housing assistance programs, and all federally funded housing assistance programs provided 23 24 in the state. The inventory shall include a description of the program, biennial appropriation and expenditure levels since the 1999-25 26 2001 biennium through the 2007-2009 biennium, a description of 27 eligibility criteria and the amount of benefit provided per unit or per family, and the number of units or families assisted. The department 28 shall coordinate with the joint legislative audit and review committee 29 to reduce duplicative efforts that may be required by legislation. 30

(16)(a) \$10,000,000 of the appropriation is provided solely for the 31 department to contract with the Washington state housing finance 32 commission to provide grants or loans to eligible organizations, 33 described under RCW 43.185A.040, to purchase land or real property for 34 35 affordable housing and community facilities preservation or development 36 in rapidly gentrifying neighborhoods, redevelopment areas, or communities with a significant low-income population that is threatened 37 with displacement by such gentrification. Loans or grants may be made 38

to purchase land or real property for the preservation or development 1 2 of affordable housing or community facilities, including reasonable costs and fees. The Washington state housing finance commission's 3 review and evaluation of projects for loans and grants must include, 4 but is not limited to the following: (i) Consideration of mobile home 5 parks facing closure; (ii) properties in neighborhoods in King county 6 7 that are facing gentrification or redevelopment; and (iii) properties located in the city of Spokane that are facing the threat of displacing 8 low-income tenants due to the loss of affordable housing rental units. 9 The Washington state housing finance commission, with approval from the 10 department, may adopt quidelines and requirements that are necessary to 11 administer the affordable housing and community facilities rapid 12 13 response program. A loan recipient must preserve affordable rental 14 housing acquired or developed under this section as affordable housing for a minimum of thirty years. Interest rates on loans made under this 15 section may be as low as zero percent but may not exceed three percent. 16 17 All loan repayments must be deposited into the Washington housing trust account and accounted for separately from other funds in the account. 18 (b) By December 1, 2008, the Washington state housing finance 19

20 <u>commission shall report to the department and the appropriate</u> 21 <u>committees of the legislature: (i) The number of loans that were made</u> 22 <u>in the program; (ii) for what purposes the loans were made; (iii) to</u> 23 <u>whom the loans were made; and (iv) when the loans are expected to be</u> 24 paid back.

30 (18)(a) \$100,000 of the appropriation from the Washington housing 31 trust account is provided solely for the department to work in 32 consultation with the affordable housing advisory board and 33 representatives from nonprofit housing development organizations and 34 affordable housing advocacy groups in the state to:

35 (i) Identify and analyze all costs associated with affordable 36 housing development projects financed through the Washington housing 37 trust fund under chapters 43.185 and 43.185A RCW, which may include,

7 (1) Except as directed otherwise prior to the effective date of 8 this section, the department shall not expend the appropriations in 9 this section unless and until the nonstate share of project costs have 10 been either expended, or firmly committed, or both, in an amount 11 sufficient to complete the project or a distinct phase of the project 12 that is useable to the public for the purpose intended by the 13 legislature.

(6) Projects funded in this section, including those that are owned
 and operated by nonprofit organizations, are generally required to pay
 state prevailing wages.

31 (7) The appropriation provided in this section for the bridge for 32 kids project shall not be released until the department obtains a 33 report from the project sponsor updating the cost of the project and 34 the current fund raising plan.

35 (8) ((Funding for preconstruction activities for the Camas and 36 Washougal community and recreation center is contingent on voter 37 approval of a metropolitan park district.

For the 2007-2009 biennium, moneys in the account may be used 9 10 for grants for projects identified in section 138, chapter 488, Laws of 2005, for the infrastructure investment system implementation plan 11 12 identified in section 1022 of this act; for the interest rate buy-down 13 pilot program identified in section 1004 of this act; and for the housing assistance, weatherization, and affordable housing program 14 identified in section 1005 of this act. 15

(2) The job development fund is hereby established in the state 16 17 treasury. Up to fifty million dollars each biennium from the public works assistance account may be transferred into the job development 18 fund. Money in the job development fund may be used solely for job 19 20 development fund program grants, administrative expenses related to the 21 administration of the job development fund program created in RCW 22 43.160.230, and for the report prepared by the joint legislative audit and review committee pursuant to RCW 44.28.801(2). Moneys in the job 23 24 development fund may be spent only after appropriation. The board 25 shall prepare a prioritized list of proposed projects of up to fifty million dollars as part of the department's 2007-09 biennial budget 26 27 request. The board may provide an additional alternate job development fund project list of up to ten million dollars. The legislature may 28 remove projects from the list recommended by the board. 29 The legislature may not change the prioritization of projects recommended 30 31 for funding by the board, but may add projects from the alternate list 32 in order of priority, as long as the total funding does not exceed fifty million dollars. 33

(x) A public participation program, including regional citizen
 advisory committees;

(1) The stadium and exhibition center account is created in the custody of the state treasurer. Only the director of the office of financial management or the director's designee may authorize

expenditures from the account. The account is subject to allotment
 procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW. An appropriation is not required

Expenditures from the account may be used only for purposes of grants 3 or loans to cities, counties, and qualified nonprofit organizations for 4 community outdoor athletic facilities. For the 2005-2007 biennium, 5 moneys in the account may also be used for a recreation level of 6 service study for local and regional active recreation facilities. 7 Only the director of the recreation and conservation office or the 8 director's designee may authorize expenditures from the account. The 9 10 account is subject to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but an appropriation is not required for expenditures. The athletic 11 12 facility grants or loans may be used for acquiring, developing, 13 equipping, maintaining, and improving community outdoor athletic facilities. Funds shall be divided equally between the development of 14 new community outdoor athletic facilities, the improvement of existing 15 community outdoor athletic facilities, and the maintenance of existing 16 community outdoor athletic facilities. Cities, counties, and qualified 17 18 nonprofit organizations must submit proposals for grants or loans from the account. To the extent that funds are available, cities, counties, 19 and qualified nonprofit organizations must meet eligibility criteria as 20 21 established by the director of the recreation and conservation office. 22 The grants and loans shall be awarded on a competitive application process and the amount of the grant or loan shall be in proportion to 23 24 the population of the city or county for where the community outdoor 25 athletic facility is located. Grants or loans awarded in any one year 26 need not be distributed in that year. In the 2007-2009 biennium, if 27 there are not enough project applications submitted in a category within the account to meet the requirement of equal distribution of 28 funds to each category, the director of the recreation and conservation 29 office may distribute any remaining funds to other categories within 30 the account. The director of the recreation and conservation office 31 32 may expend up to one and one-half percent of the moneys deposited in the account created in this subsection for administrative purposes. 33
