3 "<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 4 to read as follows:

The legislature declares that the safety and well-being of children 5 and families is essential to the social and economic health of 6 Washington. It is the duty of the state to provide children at risk of 7 8 out-of-home placement and their families with reasonable opportunities 9 to access supportive services that enhance their safety and well-being. 10 The legislature directs the programmatic and administrative changes 11 required in this act to be accomplished in conformance with this 12 foregoing principle.

The legislature finds that research in the area of child safety and well-being supports the conclusion that a restructuring of the administration and delivery of child welfare services through the use of performance-based contracts can enhance safety and well-being, when done so in a careful, well-planned and collaborative manner.

18 The legislature intends that the execution of performance-based 19 contracts which transfer the delivery of child welfare services to 20 entities other than the department be done without restricting who may 21 seek to participate in the procurement process of the contracts. The 22 legislature directs that the department retain those positions 23 necessary to provide child protective and investigative services and to 24 administer performance-based contracts.

The legislature further intends that the programmatic and administrative changes contained in this act have the result of reducing racial disproportionality in the child welfare system and racial disparities in child outcomes.

The legislature, in creating the committee in section 8 of this act, is establishing the mechanism to design, in collaboration with the 1 executive and judicial branches and all affected entities, the 2 transition to performance-based contracts in the delivery of out-of-3 home care and case management services.

4 **Sec. 2.** RCW 74.13.020 and 1999 c 267 s 7 are each amended to read 5 as follows:

6 ((As used in Title 74 RCW, child welfare services shall be defined 7 as public social services including adoption services which strengthen, 8 supplement, or substitute for, parental care and supervision for the 9 purpose of:

10 (1) Preventing or remedying, or assisting in the solution of 11 problems which may result in families in conflict, or the neglect, 12 abuse, exploitation, or criminal behavior of children;

13 (2) Protecting and caring for dependent or neglected children;

14 (3) Assisting children who are in conflict with their parents, and 15 assisting parents who are in conflict with their children with services 16 designed to resolve such conflicts;

17 (4) Protecting and promoting the welfare of children, including the 18 strengthening of their own homes where possible, or, where needed;

19 (5) Providing adequate care of children away from their homes in 20 foster family homes or day care or other child care agencies or 21 facilities.

As used in this chapter, child means a person less than eighteen years of age.

The department's duty to provide services to homeless families with children is set forth in RCW 43.20A.790 and in appropriations provided by the legislature for implementation of the plan.))

27 <u>For purposes of this chapter:</u>

(1) "Case management" means the management of services delivered to 28 children in the legal custody of the department in the child welfare 29 30 system, including permanency services, caseworker-child visits, family visits, the convening of family group conferences, the development and 31 revision of the case plan, the coordination and monitoring of services 32 needed by the child and family, and the assumption of court-related 33 duties, including preparing court reports, attending judicial hearings 34 35 and permanency hearings, and ensuring that the child is progressing toward permanency within state and federal mandates, including the 36 Indian child welfare act. 37

(9) "Performance-based contracting" means the structuring of all 1 aspects of the procurement of services around the purpose of the work 2 to be performed and the desired results with the contract requirements 3 set forth in clear, specific, and objective terms with measurable 4 outcomes. Contracts shall also include provisions that link the 5 6 performance of the contractor to the level and timing of reimbursement. (10) "Permanency services" means long-term services provided to 7 secure a child's safety, permanency, and well-being, including foster 8 9 care services, family reunification services, adoption services, and preparation for independent living services. 10

11 (11) "Primary prevention services" means services which are 12 designed and delivered for the primary purpose of enhancing child and 13 family well-being and are shown, by analysis of outcomes, to reduce the 14 risk to the likelihood of the initial need for child welfare services.

15 (12) "Supervising agency" means an agency licensed by the state 16 under RCW 74.15.090, or an Indian tribe under RCW 74.15.190, that has 17 entered into a performance-based contract with the department to 18 provide child welfare services.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 20 to read as follows:

(1) On and after December 1, 2010, the department shall begin to convert its current contracts with child-placing agencies into performance-based contracts to provide child welfare services in this state.

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(2) On and after July 1, 2014:

(a) Child welfare services for sixty percent of the children for
whom the department has legal custody shall be provided by supervising
agencies with whom the department has entered into performance-based
contracts. Supervising agencies may enter into subcontracts with other
licensed agencies; and

31 (b) Except as provided in subsection (4) of this section, and 32 notwithstanding any law to the contrary, in those offices in which 33 child welfare services are provided by supervising agencies, the 34 department may not directly provide child welfare services.

35 (3) On and after July 1, 2014, in the offices in which the 36 department has entered into a performance-based contract with a supervising agency to provide child welfare services, the department is
 responsible for only the following:

3 (a) Monitoring the quality of services for which the department4 contracts under this chapter; and

5 (b) Ensuring that the services are provided in accordance with 6 federal law and the laws of this state, including the Indian child 7 welfare act.

8 (4) On and after July 1, 2014, in the offices in which the department has entered into a performance-based contract with a 9 supervising agency to provide child welfare services, the department 10 may provide child welfare services only in an emergency or as a 11 12 provider of last resort. The department shall adopt rules describing 13 the circumstances under which the department may provide those services. For purposes of this section, "provider of last resort" 14 means the department is unable to contract with a private agency to 15 provide child welfare services in a particular geographic area or, 16 17 after entering into a contract with a private agency, either the 18 contractor or the department terminates the contract.

19 (5) For purposes of this chapter, on and after July 1, 2010, 20 performance-based contracts shall be structured to hold the supervising 21 agencies accountable for achieving the following goals in order of 22 importance: Child safety; reunification of the child with the child's 23 parents; child permanency; and child well-being.

(6) A federally recognized tribe located in this state may enter into a performance-based contract with the department to provide child welfare services to Indian children whether or not they reside on a reservation.

28 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 29 to read as follows:

30 Children whose cases are managed by a supervising agency remain 31 dependents of the state.

32 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 33 to read as follows:

Except for Indian tribes, performance-based contracts with private nonprofit entities who otherwise meet the definition of supervising agency shall be preferred. <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. A new section is added to chapter 43.10 RCW
 to read as follows:

The office of the attorney general shall provide, or cause to be provided, legal services in only dependency or termination of parental rights matters to supervising agencies with whom the department of social and health services has entered into performance-based contracts to provide child welfare services as soon as the contracts become effective.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 10 to read as follows:

11 As child welfare services caseworker and staff vacancies occur due 12 to voluntary employee departures, and if the department determines those positions should be filled by state workers because there are 13 insufficient supervising agency resources available in that region to 14 provide the necessary child welfare services, the department shall 15 review its current staff assignments and transfer staff with sufficient 16 17 child welfare services experience in other units in the region to the vacant child welfare services position or positions. If this occurs, 18 the department shall determine if there are other services in the 19 20 region where the work could be performed by supervising agencies.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 22 to read as follows:

(1)(a) The child welfare transformation design committee isestablished, with members as provided in this subsection.

25 (i) The governor or the governor's designee;

(ii) Four private agencies that, as of the effective date of this section, provide child welfare services to children and families referred to them by the department. Two agencies must be headquartered in western Washington and two must be headquartered in eastern Washington. Two agencies must have an annual budget of at least one million state-contracted dollars and two must have an annual budget of less than one million state-contracted dollars;

33 (iii) The assistant secretary of the children's administration in 34 the department;

35 (iv) Two regional administrators in the children's administration

1 selected by the assistant secretary, one from one of the department's 2 administrative regions one or two, and one from one of the department's 3 administrative regions three, four, five, or six;

4 (v) The administrator for the division of licensed resources in the 5 children's administration;

6 (vi) Two nationally recognized experts in performance-based 7 contracts;

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(vii) The attorney general or the attorney general's designee;

9 (viii) A representative of the collective bargaining unit that 10 represents the largest number of employees in the children's 11 administration;

12 (ix) A representative from the office of the family and children's13 ombudsman;

14 (x) Four representatives from federally recognized Indian tribes, 15 two of which operate child welfare programs, selected by the Indian 16 policy advisory committee convened by the department's Indian policy 17 and support services office;

18 (xi) Two present or former superior court judges with significant 19 experience in dependency matters, selected by the superior court 20 judge's association;

21 (xii) One representative from partners for our children affiliated 22 with the University of Washington school of social work;

23 (xiii) A member of the Washington state racial disproportionality 24 advisory committee;

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(xiv) A foster parent; and

26 (xv) A parent representative who has had personal experience with 27 the dependency system.

(b) The president of the senate and the speaker of the house of
representatives shall jointly appoint the members under (a)(ii), (v),
(xiv), and (xv) of this subsection.

(c) The representative from partners for our children shall convenethe initial meeting of the committee no later than June 15, 2009.

33 (d) The chair or cochairs of the committee shall be selected from 34 among its membership by a majority vote of those present at the initial 35 meeting.

36 (2) The committee shall establish a transition plan containing 37 recommendations to the legislature and the governor consistent with 1 this section for the provision of child welfare services by supervising 2 agencies pursuant to section 3 of this act.

(3) The plan shall include the following:

4 (a) A model or framework for performance-based contracts to be used
5 by the department that clearly defines:

6 (i) The target population;

(ii) The referral and exit criteria for the services;

8 (iii) The child welfare services including the use of evidence-9 based services and practices to be provided by contractors;

10 (iv) The roles and responsibilities of public and private agency 11 workers in key case decisions;

(v) Contract performance and outcomes including those related toeliminating racial disparities in child outcomes;

14 (vi) That supervising agencies will provide culturally competent 15 service;

16 (vii) How to measure whether each contractor has met the goals 17 listed in section 3(5) of this act; and

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(viii) Incentives to meet outcome goals;

(b) A method by which the department will substantially reduce itscurrent number of contracts for child welfare services;

(c) A method or methods by which clients will access communitybased services, how private supervising agencies will engage other services or form local service networks, develop subcontracts, and share information and supervision of children;

(d) Methods to address the effects of racial disproportionality, as identified in the 2008 Racial Disproportionality Advisory Committee Report published by the Washington state institute for public policy in June 2008;

(e) Methods for inclusion of the principles and requirements of the
 centennial accord executed in November 2001, executed between the state
 of Washington and federally recognized tribes in Washington state;

32 (f) Methods for assuring performance-based contracts adhere to the 33 letter and intent of the federal Indian child welfare act;

34 (g) Contract monitoring and evaluation procedures that will ensure 35 that children and families are receiving timely and quality services 36 and that contract terms are being implemented;

37 (h) A method or methods by which to ensure that the children's

1 administration has sufficiently trained and experienced staff to 2 monitor and manage performance-based contracts;

3 (i) A process by which to expand the capacity of supervising and 4 other private agencies to meet the service needs of children and 5 families in a performance-based contractual arrangement;

6 (j) A method or methods by which supervising and other private 7 agencies can expand services in underserved areas of the state;

8 (k) The appropriate amounts and procedures for the reimbursement of
9 supervising agencies given the proposed services restructuring;

(1) A method by which to access and enhance existing data systemsto include contract performance information;

12 (m) A financing arrangement for the contracts that examines:

(i) The use of case rates or performance-based fee-for-service contracts that include incentive payments or payment schedules that link reimbursement to outcomes; and

16 (ii) Ways to reduce a contractor's financial risk that could 17 jeopardize the solvency of the contractor, including consideration of 18 the use of a risk-reward corridor that limits risk of loss and 19 potential profits or the establishment of a statewide risk pool;

(n) A description of how the transition will impact the state's
ability to obtain federal funding and examine options to further
maximize federal funding opportunities and increased flexibility;

(o) A review of whether current administrative staffing levels in
 the regions should be continued when the majority of child welfare
 services are being provided by supervising agencies;

(p) A description of the costs of the transition, the initial start-up costs and the mechanisms to periodically assess the overall adequacy of funds and the fiscal impact of the changes, and the feasibility of the plan and the impact of the plan on department employees during the transition; and

31 (q) Identification of any statutory and regulatory revisions 32 necessary to accomplish the transition.

33 (4) The committee shall also prepare as part of the plan a 34 recommendation as to how to implement this act so that full 35 implementation of the requirement that child welfare services for sixty 36 percent of the children for whom the department has legal custody is 37 achieved no later than July 1, 2014. 1 (5) The committee shall prepare the plan to manage the delivery of 2 child welfare services in a manner that achieves coordination of the 3 services and programs that deliver primary prevention services.

4 (6) The committee shall report quarterly on its progress, beginning on June 30, 2009, to the governor and the legislative children's 5 oversight committee established in RCW 44.04.220. The committee shall б report on its progress in meeting its duties under subsections (2) and 7 8 (3) of this section and on any other matters the committee or the legislative children's oversight committee or the governor deems 9 10 appropriate. The portion of the plan required in subsection (4) of this section shall be due to the legislative children's oversight 11 committee on or before June 1, 2010. The reports shall be in written 12 13 form.

14 (7) The committee, by majority vote, may establish advisory 15 committees as it deems necessary.

16 (8) All state executive branch agencies and the agencies with whom 17 the department contracts for child welfare services shall cooperate 18 with the committee and provide timely information as the chair or 19 cochairs may request. Cooperation by the children's administration 20 must include developing and scheduling training for supervising 21 agencies to access data and information necessary to implement and 22 monitor the contracts.

(9) It is expected that the administrative costs for the committeewill be supported through private funds.

(10) Staff support for the committee shall be provided jointly bypartners for our children and legislative staff.

(11) The committee is subject to chapters 42.30 (open public
 meetings act) and 42.52 (ethics in public service) RCW.

29 (12) This section expires July 1, 2014.

30 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 9. A new section is added to chapter 74.13 RCW 31 to read as follows:

(1) Eighteen months after the department has entered into performance-based contracts with supervising agencies to provide child welfare services, the Washington state institute for public policy is to conduct a review of outcomes achieved by the supervising agencies and compare those outcomes with the existing services offered by the state. Among the outcomes to be compared are the number of relative

placements, number of placements with siblings, rereferral for cases 1 2 where the children who were placed were reunified and then returned to 3 out-of-home care during the eighteen-month period, the extent to which the programmatic and administrative changes contained in this act have 4 5 resulted in reducing the disproportionate representation of children of color in the child welfare system and reduced racial disparities in б 7 child outcomes, and timelines for achievement of permanency in 8 individual cases. This preliminary report is due to the governor and the legislature by June 30, 2012. 9

10 (2) No later than July 1, 2013, the Washington state institute for 11 public policy shall provide the legislature and the governor with the 12 final results of the outcomes comparison. If the report indicates 13 improved outcomes through the use of performance-based contracts with 14 supervising agencies, the governor is encouraged to expand statewide 15 the use of performance-based contracts in the manner contemplated in 16 this act.

17 (3) The department shall respond to the Washington institute for 18 public policy's request for data and other information with which to 19 complete these reports in a timely manner.

20 **Sec. 10.** RCW 74.15.010 and 1995 c 302 s 2 are each amended to read 21 as follows:

The purpose of chapter 74.15 RCW and RCW 74.13.031 is:

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(1) To safeguard the health, safety, and well-being of children, expectant mothers and developmentally disabled persons receiving care away from their own homes, which is paramount over the right of any person to provide care;

(2) To strengthen and encourage family unity and to sustain parental rights and responsibilities to the end that foster care is provided only when a child's family, through the use of all available resources, is unable to provide necessary care;

(3) To promote the development of a sufficient number and variety of adequate ((child-care)) foster family homes and maternity-care facilities, both public and private, through the cooperative efforts of public and ((voluntary)) supervising agencies and related groups;

(4) To provide consultation to agencies caring for children,
 expectant mothers or developmentally disabled persons in order to help
 them to improve their methods of and facilities for care;

1 (5) To license agencies as defined in RCW 74.15.020 and to assure 2 the users of such agencies, their parents, the community at large and 3 the agencies themselves that adequate minimum standards are maintained 4 by all agencies caring for children, expectant mothers and 5 developmentally disabled persons.

6 Sec. 11. RCW 74.15.020 and 2007 c 412 s 1 are each amended to read 7 as follows:

8 For the purpose of this chapter and RCW 74.13.031, and unless 9 otherwise clearly indicated by the context thereof, the following terms 10 shall mean:

11 (1) "Agency" means any person, firm, partnership, association, 12 corporation, or facility which receives children, expectant mothers, or 13 with developmental disabilities for control, persons care, or maintenance outside their own homes, or which places, arranges the 14 placement of, or assists in the placement of children, expectant 15 16 mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities for foster care or placement of children for adoption, and shall include the following 17 18 irrespective of whether there is compensation to the agency or to the children, expectant mothers or persons with developmental disabilities 19 20 for services rendered:

(a) "Child-placing agency" means an agency which places a child orchildren for temporary care, continued care, or for adoption;

(b) "Community facility" means a group care facility operated for the care of juveniles committed to the department under RCW 13.40.185. A county detention facility that houses juveniles committed to the department under RCW 13.40.185 pursuant to a contract with the department is not a community facility;

(c) "Crisis residential center" means an agency which is a temporary protective residential facility operated to perform the duties specified in chapter 13.32A RCW, in the manner provided in RCW 74.13.032 through 74.13.036;

(d) "Emergency respite center" is an agency that may be commonly known as a crisis nursery, that provides emergency and crisis care for up to seventy-two hours to children who have been admitted by their parents or guardians to prevent abuse or neglect. Emergency respite centers may operate for up to twenty-four hours a day, and for up to seven days a week. Emergency respite centers may provide care for children ages birth through seventeen, and for persons eighteen through twenty with developmental disabilities who are admitted with a sibling or siblings through age seventeen. Emergency respite centers may not substitute for crisis residential centers or HOPE centers, or any other services defined under this section, and may not substitute for services which are required under chapter 13.32A or 13.34 RCW;

7 (e) "Foster-family home" means an agency which regularly provides 8 care on a twenty-four hour basis to one or more children, expectant 9 mothers, or persons with developmental disabilities in the family abode 10 of the person or persons under whose direct care and supervision the 11 child, expectant mother, or person with a developmental disability is 12 placed;

(f) "Group-care facility" means an agency, other than a fosterfamily home, which is maintained and operated for the care of a group of children on a twenty-four hour basis;

(g) "HOPE center" means an agency licensed by the secretary to 16 17 provide temporary residential placement and other services to street youth. A street youth may remain in a HOPE center for thirty days 18 19 while services are arranged and permanent placement is coordinated. No street youth may stay longer than thirty days unless approved by the 20 21 department and any additional days approved by the department must be 22 based on the unavailability of a long-term placement option. A street 23 youth whose parent wants him or her returned to home may remain in a HOPE center until his or her parent arranges return of the youth, not 24 25 longer. All other street youth must have court approval under chapter 26 13.34 or 13.32A RCW to remain in a HOPE center up to thirty days;

(h) "Maternity service" means an agency which provides or arranges for care or services to expectant mothers, before or during confinement, or which provides care as needed to mothers and their infants after confinement;

(i) "Responsible living skills program" means an agency licensed by the secretary that provides residential and transitional living services to persons ages sixteen to eighteen who are dependent under chapter 13.34 RCW and who have been unable to live in his or her legally authorized residence and, as a result, the minor lived outdoors or in another unsafe location not intended for occupancy by the minor. Dependent minors ages fourteen and fifteen may be eligible if no other

placement alternative is available and the department approves the 1 2 placement;

3 (j) "Service provider" means the entity that operates a community 4 facility.

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(2) "Agency" shall not include the following:

(a) Persons related to the child, expectant mother, or person with б 7 developmental disability in the following ways:

8 (i) Any blood relative, including those of half-blood, and including first cousins, second cousins, nephews or nieces, and persons 9 of preceding generations as denoted by prefixes of grand, great, or 10 qreat-qreat; 11

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(ii) Stepfather, stepmother, stepbrother, and stepsister;

(iii) A person who legally adopts a child or the child's parent as 13 14 well as the natural and other legally adopted children of such persons, and other relatives of the adoptive parents in accordance with state 15 16 law;

17 (iv) Spouses of any persons named in (i), (ii), or (iii) of this subsection (2)(a), even after the marriage is terminated; 18

(v) Relatives, as named in (i), (ii), (iii), or (iv) of this 19 subsection (2)(a), of any half sibling of the child; or 20

21 (vi) Extended family members, as defined by the law or custom of 22 the Indian child's tribe or, in the absence of such law or custom, a person who has reached the age of eighteen and who is the Indian 23 24 child's grandparent, aunt or uncle, brother or sister, brother-in-law 25 or sister-in-law, niece or nephew, first or second cousin, or 26 stepparent who provides care in the family abode on a twenty-four-hour 27 basis to an Indian child as defined in 25 U.S.C. Sec. 1903(4);

28 (b) Persons who are legal guardians of the child, expectant mother, 29 or persons with developmental disabilities;

30 (c) Persons who care for a neighbor's or friend's child or children, with or without compensation, where the parent and person 31 32 providing care on a twenty-four-hour basis have agreed to the placement in writing and the state is not providing any payment for the care; 33

(d) A person, partnership, corporation, or other entity that 34 provides placement or similar services to exchange students or 35 36 international student exchange visitors or persons who have the care of 37 an exchange student in their home;

1 (e) A person, partnership, corporation, or other entity that 2 provides placement or similar services to international children who 3 have entered the country by obtaining visas that meet the criteria for 4 medical care as established by the United States <u>citizenship and</u> 5 immigration ((and naturalization)) services, or persons who have the 6 care of such an international child in their home;

7 (f) Schools, including boarding schools, which are engaged 8 primarily in education, operate on a definite school year schedule, 9 follow a stated academic curriculum, accept only school-age children 10 and do not accept custody of children;

(g) Hospitals licensed pursuant to chapter 70.41 RCW when performing functions defined in chapter 70.41 RCW, nursing homes licensed under chapter 18.51 RCW and boarding homes licensed under chapter 18.20 RCW;

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(h) Licensed physicians or lawyers;

16 (i) Facilities approved and certified under chapter 71A.22 RCW;

(j) Any agency having been in operation in this state ten years prior to June 8, 1967, and not seeking or accepting moneys or assistance from any state or federal agency, and is supported in part by an endowment or trust fund;

(k) Persons who have a child in their home for purposes of adoption, if the child was placed in such home by a licensed childplacing agency, an authorized public or tribal agency or court or if a replacement report has been filed under chapter 26.33 RCW and the placement has been approved by the court;

(e) A description of the steps that will be taken to minimize the harm to the child that may result if separation occurs including an assessment of the child's relationship and emotional bond with any siblings, and the agency's plan to provide ongoing contact between the child and the child's siblings if appropriate; and

26 (f) Behavior that will be expected before determination that 27 supervision of the family or placement is no longer necessary.

28 (17) "Supervising agency" means an agency licensed by the state 29 under RCW 74.15.090 or an Indian tribe under RCW 74.15.190 with whom 30 the department has entered into a performance-based contract to provide 31 child welfare services as defined in RCW 74.13.020.

(c) "Permanent legal custody" means legal custody pursuant to chapter 26.10 RCW or equivalent laws of another state or a federally recognized Indian tribe.

(a) The child was previously found to be a dependent child underthis chapter;

(b) The child's parent's rights were terminated in a proceeding under this chapter;

31 (c) The child has not achieved his or her permanency plan within 32 three years of a final order of termination; and

(d) The child must be at least twelve years old at the time the petition is filed. Upon the child's motion for good cause shown, or on its own motion, the court may hear a petition filed by a child younger than twelve years old. (2) A child seeking to petition under this section shall be
 provided counsel at no cost to the child.

3 (3) The petition must be signed by the child in the absence of a4 showing of good cause as to why the child could not do so.

5 (4) If, after a threshold hearing to consider the parent's apparent 6 fitness and interest in reinstatement of parental rights, the court 7 finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the best interests of the 8 child may be served by reinstatement of parental rights, the juvenile 9 court shall order that a hearing on the merits of the petition be held.

4 (13) This section is retroactive and applies to any child who is

6 regardless of the date parental rights were terminated.

7 (14) The state, the department, the supervising agency, and its 8 employees are not liable for civil damages resulting from any act or omission in the provision of services under this section, unless the 9 10 act or omission constitutes gross negligence. This section does not create any duty and shall not be construed to create a duty where none 11 12 exists. This section does not create a cause of action against the 13 state, the department, the supervising agency, or its employees 14 concerning the original termination.

15 Sec. 35. RCW 13.34.230 and 1981 c 195 s 1 are each amended to read 16 as follows:

Any party to a dependency proceeding, including the supervising agency, may file a petition in juvenile court requesting that guardianship be created as to a dependent child. The department ((of social and health services)) <u>or supervising agency</u> shall receive notice of any guardianship proceedings and have the right to intervene in the proceedings.

23 **Sec. 36.** RCW 13.34.233 and 2000 c 122 s 30 are each amended to 24 read as follows:

The employees shall have sixty days from the date of notification to offer alternatives to purchasing services by contract, and the agency shall consider the alternatives before requesting bids. 1 (b) If the employees decide to compete for the contract, they shall 2 notify the contracting agency of their decision. (3) The department shall investigate complaints of any recent act 18 or failure to act on the part of a parent or caretaker that results in 19 death, serious physical or emotional harm, or sexual abuse or 20 21 exploitation, or that presents an imminent risk of serious harm, and on 22 the basis of the findings of such investigation, offer child welfare 23 services in relation to the problem to such parents, legal custodians, 24 or persons serving in loco parentis, and/or bring the situation to the attention of an appropriate court, or another community agency. 25 An 26 investigation is not required of nonaccidental injuries which are 27 clearly not the result of a lack of care or supervision by the child's 28 parents, legal custodians, or persons serving in loco parentis. If the 29 investigation reveals that a crime against a child may have been 30 committed, the department shall notify the appropriate law enforcement 31 agency.

32 (4) <u>The department or supervising agencies shall offer</u>, on a 33 voluntary basis, family reconciliation services to families who are in 34 conflict.

Except where required by Public Law 95-27 608 (25 U.S.C. Sec. 1915), no private adoption agency which receives children for adoption from the department shall discriminate on the 28 basis of race, creed, or color when considering applications in their 29 30 placement for adoption.

31 (7) <u>The department and supervising agency shall have authority to</u> 32 provide temporary shelter to children who have run away from home and 33 who are admitted to crisis residential centers.

34 (8) <u>The department and supervising agency shall have authority to</u> 35 purchase care for children((*i* and shall follow in general the policy of 36 using properly approved private agency services for the actual care and 37 supervision of such children insofar as they are available, paying for 1 care of such children as are accepted by the department as eligible for 2 support at reasonable rates established by the department)).

and appropriate, the remediation plan shall be developed to integrate the recommendations required in this subsection with the department's existing compliance plans, training efforts, and other practice improvement and reform initiatives in progress. The advisory committee shall be responsible for ongoing evaluation of current and prospective policies and procedures for their contribution to or effect on racial disproportionality and disparity.

(6) Not later than December 1, 2008, the secretary shall report the 8 results of the analysis conducted under subsection (2) of this section 9 and shall describe the remediation plan required under subsection (5) 10 11 of this section to the appropriate committees of the legislature with 12 jurisdiction over policy and fiscal matters relating to children, 13 families, and human services. Beginning January 1, 2010, the secretary 14 shall report annually to the appropriate committees of the legislature on the implementation of the remediation plan, including any measurable 15 progress made in reducing and eliminating racial disproportionality and 16 17 disparity in the state's child welfare system.
