House Bills

HB 2208 by Representatives Shea, Young, Taylor, Condotta, Scott, G. Hunt, and McCaslin

Changing provisions relating to presidential electors. Modifies presidential elector provisions.

HB 2209 by Representatives G. Hunt, Young, Shea, Taylor, Scott, Condotta, Harmsworth, and McCaslin

Verifying that an applicant for a driver's license or identocard is lawfully within the United States.

Requires the department of licensing to adopt rules to establish procedures for verifying that a driver's license applicant is a United States citizen or that the applicant's presence in the United States is authorized under federal law, including determining which documents are adequate to provide proof of citizenship or legal presence.

HB 2210 by Representatives Young, G. Hunt, Taylor, Shea, Scott, Condotta, and McCaslin

Repealing the state estate tax. Repeals the state estate tax.

HB 2211 by Representatives Pollet, Ryu, McBride,

Cody, Robinson, and Gregerson

Concerning vapor products, e-cigarette, and nicotine products tax and regulatory reform to support youth substance prevention.

Regulates vapor products, e-cigarettes, and nicotine products.

Imposes a tax on the sale, use, consumption, handling, possession, or distribution of all vapor products in this state. Creates the essential public health services account.

Requires the department of health to use the money in the account for the following purposes: (1) To fund essential governmental public health services;

(2) To fund tobacco control and prevention and other substance use prevention and education;

(3) To strengthen and support public health system capabilities, including accredited higher education public health programs; and

(4) Enforcement by the liquor control board.
