Beginning on page 2, line 34, strike all of section 3 and insert the following:

3 "Sec. 3. RCW 28A.150.260 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 13 s 402 are each 4 amended to read as follows:

5 The purpose of this section is to provide for the allocation of 6 state funding that the legislature deems necessary to support school 7 districts in offering the minimum instructional program of basic 8 education under RCW 28A.150.220. The allocation shall be determined 9 as follows:

10 (1) The governor shall and the superintendent of public 11 instruction may recommend to the legislature a formula for the 12 distribution of a basic education instructional allocation for each 13 common school district.

(2)(a) The distribution formula under this section shall be for 14 allocation purposes only. Except as may be required under subsections 15 (4)(b) and (c) and (9) of this section, chapter 28A.155, 28A.165, 16 17 28A.180, or 28A.185 RCW, or section 2 of this act, or federal laws and regulations, nothing in this section requires school districts to 18 use basic education instructional funds to implement a particular 19 20 instructional approach or service. Nothing in this section requires school districts to maintain a particular classroom teacher-to-21 22 student ratio or other staff-to-student ratio or to use allocated 23 funds to pay for particular types or classifications of staff. individual teacher to a 24 Nothing in this section entitles an particular teacher planning period. 25

(b) To promote transparency in state funding allocations, the superintendent of public instruction must report state per-pupil allocations for each school district for the general apportionment, special education, learning assistance, transitional bilingual, highly capable, and career and technical education programs. The superintendent must also report state general apportionment per-pupil allocations by grade for each school district. The superintendent

must report this information in a user-friendly format on the main 1 page of the office's web site and on school district apportionment 2 reports. School districts must include a link to the superintendent's 3 per-pupil allocations report on the main page of 4 the school district's web site. In addition, the budget documents published by 5 the legislature for the enacted omnibus operating appropriations act 6 7 must report statewide average per-pupil allocations for general apportionment and the categorical programs listed in this subsection. 8

(3)(a) To the extent the technical details of the formula have 9 been adopted by the legislature and except when specifically provided 10 as a school district allocation, the distribution formula for the 11 basic education instructional allocation shall be based on minimum 12 staffing and nonstaff costs the legislature deems necessary to 13 14 support instruction and operations in prototypical schools serving high, middle, and elementary school students as provided in this 15 16 section. The use of prototypical schools for the distribution formula 17 not constitute legislative intent that schools should be does operated or structured in a similar fashion as the prototypes. 18 Prototypical schools illustrate the level of resources needed to 19 operate a school of a particular size with particular types and grade 20 21 levels of students using commonly understood terms and inputs, such as class size, hours of instruction, and various categories of school 22 staff. It is the intent that the funding allocations to school 23 districts be adjusted from the school prototypes based on the actual 24 25 number of annual average full-time equivalent students in each grade 26 level at each school in the district and not based on the grade-level configuration of the school to the extent that data is available. The 27 allocations shall be further adjusted from the school prototypes with 28 29 minimum allocations for small schools and to reflect other factors identified in the omnibus appropriations act. 30

31 (b) For the purposes of this section, prototypical schools are 32 defined as follows:

(i) A prototypical high school has six hundred average annualfull-time equivalent students in grades nine through twelve;

35 (ii) A prototypical middle school has four hundred thirty-two 36 average annual full-time equivalent students in grades seven and 37 eight; and

38 (iii) A prototypical elementary school has four hundred average 39 annual full-time equivalent students in grades kindergarten through 40 six.

1 (4)(a)(i) The minimum allocation for each level of prototypical 2 school shall be based on the number of full-time equivalent classroom 3 teachers needed to provide instruction over the minimum required 4 annual instructional hours under RCW 28A.150.220 and provide at least 5 one teacher planning period per school day, and based on the 6 following general education average class size of full-time 7 equivalent students per teacher:

(ii) The minimum class size allocation for each prototypical high 15 school shall also provide for enhanced funding for class size 16 17 reduction for two laboratory science classes within grades nine through twelve per full-time equivalent high 18 school student multiplied by a laboratory science course factor of 0.0833, based on 19 20 the number of full-time equivalent classroom teachers needed to provide instruction over the minimum required annual instructional 21 22 hours in RCW 28A.150.220, and providing at least one teacher planning period per school day: 23

1 (6)(a) The minimum staffing allocation for each school district 2 to provide district-wide support services shall be allocated per one 3 thousand annual average full-time equivalent students in grades K-12 4 as follows:

10 (b) The minimum allocation of staff units for each school 11 district to support certificated and classified staffing of central 12 administration shall be 5.30 percent of the staff units generated 13 under subsections (4)(a) and (5) of this section and (a) of this 14 subsection.

15 (7) The distribution formula shall include staffing allocations 16 to school districts for career and technical education and skill 17 center administrative and other school-level certificated staff, as 18 specified in the omnibus appropriations act.

(8)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, the minimum allocation for each school district shall include allocations per annual average full-time equivalent student for the following materials, supplies, and operating costs as provided in the 2017-18 school year, after which the allocations shall be adjusted annually for inflation as specified in the omnibus appropriations act:

12 (9) In addition to the amounts provided in subsection (8) of this 13 section and subject to RCW 28A.150.265, the omnibus appropriations 14 act shall provide an amount based on full-time equivalent student 15 enrollment in each of the following:

16 (a) Exploratory career and technical education courses for 17 students in grades seven through twelve;

(b) Preparatory career and technical education courses forstudents in grades nine through twelve offered in a high school; and

(c) Preparatory career and technical education courses forstudents in grades eleven and twelve offered through a skill center.

(10) In addition to the allocations otherwise provided under this section, amounts shall be provided to support the following programs and services:

25 (a)(i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for students who are not meeting academic standards through the learning 26 27 assistance program under RCW 28A.165.005 through 28A.165.065, allocations shall be based on the district percentage of students in 28 grades K-12 who were eligible for free or reduced-price meals in the 29 prior school year. The minimum allocation for the program shall 30 provide for each level of prototypical school resources to provide, 31 32 on a statewide average, 2.3975 hours per week in extra instruction with a class size of fifteen learning assistance program students per 33 34 teacher.

(ii) In addition to funding allocated under (a)(i) of this subsection, to provide supplemental instruction and services for students who are not meeting academic standards in schools where at least fifty percent of students are eligible for free and reducedprice meals. The minimum allocation for this additional high poverty-

based allocation must provide for each level of prototypical school resources to provide, on a statewide average, 1.1 hours per week in extra instruction with a class size of fifteen learning assistance program students per teacher, under RCW 28A.165.055, school districts must distribute the high poverty-based allocation to the schools that generated the funding allocation.

7 (b)(i) To provide supplemental instruction and services for students whose primary language is other than English, allocations 8 shall be based on the head count number of students in each school 9 who are eligible for and enrolled in the transitional bilingual 10 11 instruction program under RCW 28A.180.010 through 28A.180.080. The 12 minimum allocation for each level of prototypical school shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 4.7780 hours 13 per week in extra instruction for students in grades kindergarten 14 through six and 6.7780 hours per week in extra instruction for 15 16 students in grades seven through twelve, with fifteen transitional 17 bilingual instruction program students per teacher. Notwithstanding 18 other provisions of this subsection (10), the actual per-student allocation may be scaled to provide a larger allocation for students 19 needing more intensive intervention and a commensurate reduced 20 21 allocation for students needing less intensive intervention, as detailed in the omnibus appropriations act. 22

To provide supplemental instruction and 23 (ii) services for 24 students who have exited the transitional bilingual program, 25 allocations shall be based on the head count number of students in 26 each school who have exited the transitional bilingual program within the previous two years based on their performance on the English 27 proficiency assessment and are eligible for and enrolled in the 28 29 transitional bilingual instruction program under RCW 28A.180.040(1)(g). The minimum allocation for each prototypical 30 31 school shall provide resources to provide, on a statewide average, 32 3.0 hours per week in extra instruction with fifteen exited students per teacher. 33

(c) To provide additional allocations to support programs for 34 highly capable students under RCW 28A.185.010 through 28A.185.030, 35 allocations shall be based on 5.0 percent of each school district's 36 full-time equivalent basic education enrollment. 37 The minimum allocation for the programs shall provide resources to provide, on a 38 39 statewide average, 2.1590 hours per week in extra instruction with fifteen highly capable program students per teacher. 40

(11) The allocations under subsections (4)(a), (5), (6), and (8)
 of this section shall be enhanced as provided under RCW 28A.150.390
 on an excess cost basis to provide supplemental instructional
 resources for students with disabilities.

5 (12)(a) For the purposes of allocations for prototypical high 6 schools and middle schools under subsections (4) and (10) of this 7 section that are based on the percent of students in the school who 8 are eligible for free and reduced-price meals, the actual percent of 9 such students in a school shall be adjusted by a factor identified in 10 the omnibus appropriations act to reflect underreporting of free and 11 reduced-price meal eligibility among middle and high school students.

(b) Allocations or enhancements provided under subsections (4), (7), and (9) of this section for exploratory and preparatory career and technical education courses shall be provided only for courses approved by the office of the superintendent of public instruction under chapter 28A.700 RCW.

17 (13)(a) This formula for distribution of basic education funds 18 shall be reviewed biennially by the superintendent and governor. The 19 recommended formula shall be subject to approval, amendment or 20 rejection by the legislature.

(b) In the event the legislature rejects the distribution formula recommended by the governor, without adopting a new distribution formula, the distribution formula for the previous school year shall remain in effect.

25 (c) The enrollment of any district shall be the annual average 26 number of full-time equivalent students and part-time students as provided in RCW 28A.150.350, enrolled on the first school day of each 27 month, including students who are in attendance pursuant to RCW 28 28A.335.160 and 28A.225.250 who do not reside within the servicing 29 school district. The definition of full-time equivalent student shall 30 31 be determined by rules of the superintendent of public instruction and shall be included as part of the superintendent's biennial budget 32 request. The definition shall be based on the minimum instructional 33 hour offerings required under RCW 28A.150.220. Any revision of the 34 present definition shall not take effect until approved by the house 35 36 ways and means committee and the senate ways and means committee.

(d) The office of financial management shall make a monthly
 review of the superintendent's reported full-time equivalent students
 in the common schools in conjunction with RCW 43.62.050.

However, if and to the 18 19 extent that any of these additional staffing units are funded by 20 specific reference to this section in the omnibus operating 21 appropriations act, those units become part of prototypical school 22 funding formulas and a component of the state funding that the 23 legislature deems necessary to support school districts in offering the statutory program of basic education under Article IX, section 1 24 25 of the state Constitution."

<u>EFFECT:</u> Replaces the term "parent involvement coordinator" with "family and community engagement coordinator" in the statute describing staffing enrichments to the program of basic education to

achieve consistency in the school code; and moves the effective date forward by one year.

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
