- 1 AN ACT Relating to promoting the use of greywater in urban
- 2 buildings; amending RCW 90.46.140; adding a new section to chapter
- 3 19.27 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- 5 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the current 6 growth of use of water in Washington's major cities may increasingly 7 strain local water supplies and threaten to cause shortages during 8 times of drought. In many areas of the state, one strategy available 9 to stretch existing water supplies is to rely on the reuse of greywater, which includes wastewater from domestic sources 10 11 sinks, showers, and washing machines. Greywater reuse is frequently 12 the most economical means of reducing pressures on the state's over 13 appropriated water resources and is less costly and energy-intensive 14 than alternatives such as desalinization. Therefore, it is the intent of the legislature to reaffirm its commitment to prioritizing 15 16 greywater recycling as a water resource management strategy by 17 requiring the updating of standards, procedures, and guidelines to 18 allow for the indoor reuse of greywater in urban buildings.
- 19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 19.27
- 20 RCW to read as follows:

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- 1 (1) By January 1, 2018, the department of health shall, within its existing resources, update its standards, procedures, 2 guidelines to authorize the indoor reuse of greywater in urban 3 buildings in a manner consistent with the standards, procedures, and 4 quidelines adopted by rule pursuant to RCW 90.46.140. 5
 - (2) In consultation with the state building code council, and within its existing resources, the department of health shall update its standards, procedures, and guidelines pursuant to this section addressing the following requirements associated with implementation of greywater reuse:
- 11 (a) Treatment requirements associated with different greywater 12 sources prior to its reuse; and
- Standards for determining conditions 13 in which 14 greywater reuse is allowed consistent with rules adopted pursuant to RCW 90.46.140 for purposes of: 15
 - (i) Meeting building water use needs; or

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- (ii) Building heating and cooling needs.
- 18 The greywater standards, procedures, and guidelines (3) 19 established pursuant to this section supersede all local government code in all cities. 20
- 21 (4) The definitions in this subsection apply throughout this section unless the context clearly requires otherwise. 22
- (a) "Greywater" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 90.46.010. 23
- (b) "Indoor use" or "indoor reuse" includes the flushing of 24 25 toilets and the reuse of greywater for a building's heating and 26 cooling needs.
- 27 **Sec. 3.** RCW 90.46.140 and 1997 c 444 s 8 are each amended to 28 read as follows:
- (1) The department of health shall develop standards, procedures, 29 30 and guidelines for the reuse of greywater, consistent with RCW 31 43.20.230(2), by January 1, 1998. By January 1, 2018, the department of health must, within its existing resources, update the standards, 32 procedures, and quidelines adopted under this section to allow for 33 the indoor reuse of greywater for water use needs of a building, 34 including heating and cooling and the flushing of toilets. 35
- (2) Standards, procedures, and guidelines developed by the 36 department of health for reuse of greywater shall encourage the 37 application of this technology for conserving water resources, or reducing the wastewater load, on domestic wastewater facilities, 39

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4 5 (3) The department of health and local health officers may permit the reuse of greywater according to rules adopted by the department of health.

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
