1 AN ACT Relating to plaques for certain state-funded capital 2 budget projects; amending RCW 27.34.330; and adding a new section to 3 chapter 43.63A RCW.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 43.63A 6 RCW to read as follows:

7 The department must require a plaque sized five and three-quarter inches square and one-fourth to one-half inch deep be affixed to 8 buildings or displayed as part of projects receiving a capital budget 9 10 appropriation of more than ninety-nine thousand dollars under RCW 11 43.63A.125, 43.63A.135, and 43.63A.750 and capital budget local and 12 community projects that receive more than ninety-nine thousand 13 dollars. The plaque must contain language that says exactly: "This 14 project has been made possible with funding from the people of Washington State." 15

16 **Sec. 2.** RCW 27.34.330 and 2015 3rd sp.s. c 3 s 7014 are each 17 amended to read as follows:

18 The Washington state historical society shall establish a 19 competitive process to solicit proposals for and prioritize heritage 20 capital projects for potential funding in the state capital budget.

1 The society shall adopt rules governing project eligibility and evaluation criteria. Application for funding of specific projects may 2 be made to the society by local governments, public development 3 authorities, nonprofit corporations, tribal governments, and other 4 entities, as determined by the society. The society, with the advice 5 6 of leaders in the heritage field, including but not limited to representatives from the office of the secretary of state, the 7 eastern Washington state historical society, and the department of 8 archaeology and historic preservation, shall establish and submit a 9 prioritized list of heritage capital projects to the governor and the 10 legislature in the society's biennial capital budget request. The 11 12 list shall include a description of each project, the amount of recommended state funding, and documentation of nonstate funds to be 13 used for the project. The total amount of recommended state funding 14 for projects on a biennial project list shall not exceed ten million 15 16 dollars. The prioritized list shall be developed through open and 17 public meetings and the amount of state funding shall not exceed thirty-three and thirty-three one-hundredths percent of the total 18 19 cost of the project. The nonstate portion of the total project cost may include cash, the value of real property when acquired solely for 20 21 the purpose of the project, and in-kind contributions. The department 22 shall not sign contracts or otherwise financially obligate funds under this section until the legislature has approved a specific list 23 of projects. In contracts for grants authorized under this section, 24 25 society shall include provisions requiring that the capital improvements be held by the grantee for a specified period of time 26 appropriate to the amount of the grant and that facilities be used 27 28 for the express purpose of the grant. If the grantee is found to be 29 out of compliance with provisions of the contract, the grantee shall repay to the state general fund the principal amount of the grant 30 31 plus interest calculated at the rate of interest on state of 32 Washington general obligation bonds issued most closely to the date of authorization of the grant. The society must require a plaque 33 sized five and three-quarter inches square and one-fourth to one-half 34 inch deep be affixed to buildings or displayed as part of projects 35 that receive more than ninety-nine thousand dollars under this 36 section. The plaque must contain language that says exactly: "This 37
