## HOUSE RESOLUTION NO. 2017-4647, by Representative Lovick

- 1 WHEREAS, The three most significant documents in United States 2 history that exemplify America's passion for freedom are the 3 Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and the Emancipation Proclamation; 4 and
- 5 WHEREAS, Each has maintained its rightful place in the annals of 6 American history, only the Constitution and the Bill of Rights have 7 identifiable dates emphasizing their importance to the American 8 People through celebration of the Fourth of July, Constitution Day, 9 and Flag Day; and
- 10 WHEREAS, President Abraham Lincoln ended slavery in the United 11 States with the Emancipation Proclamation, which became official 12 January 1, 1863; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Slavery remained in the state of Texas for more than two 14 years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed by President 15 Abraham Lincoln; and
- 16 WHEREAS, On June 19, 1865, Major General Gordon Granger of the 17 Union Army led his troops into the city of Galveston, Texas and 18 officially proclaimed freedom for slaves in that state; and
- 19 WHEREAS, General Granger's order reads in part: "The people of 20 Texas are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the 21 Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an 22 absolute equality of rights and rights of property between masters

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and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them becomes that between employer and free laborer"; and

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10 11 WHEREAS, The celebration of "Juneteenth" - June 19th - is the oldest known celebration of the ending of slavery because it marks the day that slaves in the state of Texas were informed of the Emancipation Proclamation; and

WHEREAS, As African-Americans from Texas and other parts of the South began to migrate to other parts of the United States, they took with them the tradition of Juneteenth, spreading the word that African-American Freedom has roots in the celebration of Juneteenth; and

WHEREAS, Today, Juneteenth commemorates African-American freedom emphasizing education and achievement, through reflection, rejoicing, and planning for the future;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives celebrate the end of slavery on June 19th.

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
