## SENATE BILL 6133

State of Washington 65th Legislature 2018 Regular Session

**By** Senators Zeiger, Wellman, Keiser, Hasegawa, and Kuderer; by request of Superintendent of Public Instruction

1 AN ACT Relating to expanding statewide career and technical 2 education course equivalency options; and amending RCW 28A.700.070.

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

4 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.700.070 and 2014 c 217 s 101 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (1) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 7 support school district efforts under RCW 28A.230.097 to adopt course 8 equivalencies for career and technical courses by:

9 (a) Recommending career and technical curriculum suitable for 10 course equivalencies;

(b) Publicizing best practices for high schools and schooldistricts in developing and adopting course equivalencies; and

(c) In consultation with the Washington association for career
and technical education, providing professional development,
technical assistance, and guidance for school districts seeking to
expand their lists of equivalent courses.

17 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 18 provide professional development, technical assistance, and guidance 19 for school districts to develop career and technical course 20 equivalencies that also gualify as advanced placement courses.

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1 (3) The office of the superintendent of public instruction, in consultation with one or more technical working groups convened for 2 this purpose, shall develop curriculum frameworks for a selected list 3 of career and technical courses that may be offered by high schools 4 or skill centers whose <u>academic standards</u> content ((in science, 5 6 technology, engineering, and mathematics)) is considered equivalent in full or in part to ((science or mathematics)) the academic courses 7 that meet high school graduation requirements. These courses may 8 include equivalency to English language arts, mathematics, science, 9 10 social studies, arts, world languages, or health and physical education. The content of the courses must be aligned with ((state 11 12 essential academic learning requirements in mathematics as adopted by the superintendent of public instruction in July 2011 and the 13 essential academic learning requirements in science as adopted in 14 15 October 2013, and)) the most current Washington K-12 learning standards in English language arts, mathematics, science, arts, world 16 17 languages, health and physical education, social studies, and required industry standards. The office shall submit the list of 18 equivalent career and technical courses and 19 their curriculum frameworks to the state board of education for review, an opportunity 20 21 for public comment, and approval. The first list of courses under this subsection must be developed and approved before the 2015-16 22 school year. Thereafter, the office may periodically update or revise 23 the list of courses using the process in this subsection. 24

25 (4) Subject to funds appropriated for this purpose, the office of the superintendent of public instruction shall allocate grant funds 26 to school districts to increase the integration and rigor of academic 27 28 instruction in career and technical courses. Grant recipients are encouraged to use grant funds to support teams of academic and 29 technical teachers ((using a research-based professional development 30 31 model supported by the national research center for career and 32 technical education)). The office of the superintendent of public 33 instruction may require that grant recipients provide matching 34 resources using federal Carl Perkins funds or other fund sources.

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
