

SENATE BILL REPORT

ESB 5937

As Passed Senate, March 8, 2019

Title: An act relating to the color of stop lamps on vehicles.

Brief Description: Clarifying the required color of certain lamps on vehicles.

Sponsors: Senators Lovelett, Nguyen, Fortunato, Das, Billig and Hunt; by request of Washington State Patrol.

Brief Summary of Engrossed Bill

- Requires all rear commercial motor vehicle lighting devices and reflectors, including stop lamps, to be red, except other signal devices which may be red or amber.

Background: Generally under current law, all lighting devices and reflectors mounted on the rear of any vehicle must display or reflect a red color, except the stop lamp or other signal device may be red, amber, or yellow.

Summary of Engrossed Bill: All rear commercial motor vehicle lighting devices and reflectors, including stop lamps, must be red, except other signal devices may be red or amber.
