3 "Sec. 1. RCW 36.70A.020 and 2002 c 154 s 1 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

The following goals are adopted to guide the development and adoption of comprehensive plans and development regulations of those counties and cities that are required or choose to plan under RCW 36.70A.040. The following goals are not listed in order of priority and shall be used exclusively for the purpose of guiding the development of comprehensive plans and development regulations:

- (1) Urban growth. Encourage development in urban areas where adequate public facilities and services exist or can be provided in an efficient manner.
- (2) Reduce sprawl. Reduce the inappropriate conversion of undeveloped land into sprawling, low-density development.
- (3) Transportation. Encourage efficient multimodal transportation systems that are based on regional priorities and coordinated with county and city comprehensive plans.
 - (4) Housing. ((Encourage the availability of affordable)) Plan for and accommodate housing affordable to all economic segments of the population of this state, promote a variety of residential densities and housing types, and encourage preservation of existing housing stock.
 - (5) Economic development. Encourage economic development throughout the state that is consistent with adopted comprehensive plans, promote economic opportunity for all citizens of this state, especially for unemployed and for disadvantaged persons, promote the retention and expansion of existing businesses and recruitment of new businesses, recognize regional differences impacting economic development opportunities, and encourage growth in areas experiencing insufficient economic growth, all within the capacities of the state's natural resources, public services, and public facilities.

- 1 (6) Property rights. Private property shall not be taken for 2 public use without just compensation having been made. The property 3 rights of landowners shall be protected from arbitrary and 4 discriminatory actions.
 - (7) Permits. Applications for both state and local government permits should be processed in a timely and fair manner to ensure predictability.

- (8) Natural resource industries. Maintain and enhance natural resource-based industries, including productive timber, agricultural, and fisheries industries. Encourage the conservation of productive forestlands and productive agricultural lands, and discourage incompatible uses.
- 13 (9) Open space and recreation. Retain open space, enhance 14 recreational opportunities, conserve fish and wildlife habitat, 15 increase access to natural resource lands and water, and develop 16 parks and recreation facilities.
- 17 (10) Environment. Protect the environment and enhance the state's 18 high quality of life, including air and water quality, and the 19 availability of water.
 - (11) Citizen participation and coordination. Encourage the involvement of citizens in the planning process and ensure coordination between communities and jurisdictions to reconcile conflicts.
 - (12) Public facilities and services. Ensure that those public facilities and services necessary to support development shall be adequate to serve the development at the time the development is available for occupancy and use without decreasing current service levels below locally established minimum standards.

- The comprehensive plan of a county or city that is required or chooses to plan under RCW 36.70A.040 shall consist of a map or maps, and descriptive text covering objectives, principles, and standards used to develop the comprehensive plan. The plan shall be an internally consistent document and all elements shall be consistent with the future land use map. A comprehensive plan shall be adopted Code Rev/RB:lel

- and amended with public participation as provided in RCW 36.70A.140.

 Each comprehensive plan shall include a plan, scheme, or design for each of the following:
- (1) A land use element designating the proposed general 4 distribution and general location and extent of the uses of land, 5 6 where appropriate, for agriculture, timber production, housing, 7 commerce, industry, recreation, open spaces, general aviation airports, public utilities, public facilities, and other land uses. 8 The land use element shall include population densities, building 9 intensities, and estimates of future population growth. The land use 10 11 element shall provide for protection of the quality and quantity of 12 groundwater used for public water supplies. Wherever possible, the land use element should consider utilizing urban planning approaches 13 that promote physical activity. Where applicable, the land use 14 element shall review drainage, flooding, and stormwater runoff in the 15 16 area and nearby jurisdictions and provide guidance for corrective 17 actions to mitigate or cleanse those discharges that pollute waters of the state, including Puget Sound or waters entering Puget Sound. 18
 - (2) A housing element ensuring the vitality and character of established residential neighborhoods that:

- 5 (i) Incorporating consideration for low, very low, extremely low, 6 and moderate-income households;
- 7 (ii) Documenting programs and actions needed to achieve housing 8 availability including gaps in local funding, barriers such as 9 development regulations, and other limitations;

 - (g) Identifies areas that may be at higher risk of displacement from market forces that occur with changes to zoning development regulations and capital investments; and
 - (h) Establishes antidisplacement policies, with consideration given to the preservation of historical and cultural communities as well as investments in low, very low, extremely low, and moderate-income housing; equitable development initiatives; inclusionary zoning; community planning requirements; tenant protections; land disposition policies; and consideration of land that may be used for affordable housing.

In counties and cities subject to the review and evaluation requirements of RCW 36.70A.215, any revision to the housing element shall include consideration of prior review and evaluation reports and any reasonable measures identified. The housing element should link jurisdictional goals with overall county goals to ensure that the housing element goals are met.

39 (3) A capital facilities plan element consisting of: (a) An
40 inventory of existing capital facilities owned by public entities,

- showing the locations and capacities of the capital facilities; (b) a forecast of the future needs for such capital facilities; (c) the proposed locations and capacities of expanded or new capital facilities; (d) at least a six-year plan that will finance such capital facilities within projected funding capacities and clearly identifies sources of public money for such purposes; and (e) a requirement to reassess the land use element if probable funding falls short of meeting existing needs and to ensure that the land use element, capital facilities plan element, and financing plan within the capital facilities plan element are coordinated and consistent. Park and recreation facilities shall be included in the capital facilities plan element.
 - (4) A utilities element consisting of the general location, proposed location, and capacity of all existing and proposed utilities, including, but not limited to, electrical lines, telecommunication lines, and natural gas lines.

- (5) Rural element. Counties shall include a rural element including lands that are not designated for urban growth, agriculture, forest, or mineral resources. The following provisions shall apply to the rural element:
- (a) Growth management act goals and local circumstances. Because circumstances vary from county to county, in establishing patterns of rural densities and uses, a county may consider local circumstances, but shall develop a written record explaining how the rural element harmonizes the planning goals in RCW 36.70A.020 and meets the requirements of this chapter.
- (b) Rural development. The rural element shall permit rural development, forestry, and agriculture in rural areas. The rural element shall provide for a variety of rural densities, uses, essential public facilities, and rural governmental services needed to serve the permitted densities and uses. To achieve a variety of rural densities and uses, counties may provide for clustering, density transfer, design guidelines, conservation easements, and other innovative techniques that will accommodate appropriate rural economic advancement, densities, and uses that are not characterized by urban growth and that are consistent with rural character.
- (c) Measures governing rural development. The rural element shall include measures that apply to rural development and protect the rural character of the area, as established by the county, by:
 - (i) Containing or otherwise controlling rural development;

1 (ii) Assuring visual compatibility of rural development with the 2 surrounding rural area;

- (iii) Reducing the inappropriate conversion of undeveloped land into sprawling, low-density development in the rural area;
- (iv) Protecting critical areas, as provided in RCW 36.70A.060, and surface water and groundwater resources; and
- (v) Protecting against conflicts with the use of agricultural, forest, and mineral resource lands designated under RCW 36.70A.170.
- (d) Limited areas of more intensive rural development. Subject to the requirements of this subsection and except as otherwise specifically provided in this subsection (5)(d), the rural element may allow for limited areas of more intensive rural development, including necessary public facilities and public services to serve the limited area as follows:
- (i) Rural development consisting of the infill, development, or 15 16 redevelopment of existing commercial, industrial, residential, or 17 mixed-use areas, whether characterized as shoreline development, 18 villages, hamlets, rural activity centers, or crossroads developments. 19
 - (A) A commercial, industrial, residential, shoreline, or mixeduse area are subject to the requirements of (d)(iv) of this subsection, but are not subject to the requirements of (c)(ii) and (iii) of this subsection.
 - (B) Any development or redevelopment other than an industrial area or an industrial use within a mixed-use area or an industrial area under this subsection (5)(d)(i) must be principally designed to serve the existing and projected rural population.
 - (C) Any development or redevelopment in terms of building size, scale, use, or intensity shall be consistent with the character of the existing areas. Development and redevelopment may include changes in use from vacant land or a previously existing use so long as the new use conforms to the requirements of this subsection (5);
- (ii) The intensification of development on lots containing, or 33 new development of, small-scale recreational or tourist uses, 34 including commercial facilities to serve those recreational 35 tourist uses, that rely on a rural location and setting, but that do 36 not include new residential development. A small-scale recreation or 37 tourist use is not required to be principally designed to serve the 38 existing and projected rural population. Public services and public 39 40 facilities shall be limited to those necessary to serve the Code Rev/RB:lel 6

recreation or tourist use and shall be provided in a manner that does not permit low-density sprawl;

- The intensification of development on lots containing isolated nonresidential uses or new development of isolated cottage industries and isolated small-scale businesses that are not principally designed to serve the existing and projected rural population and nonresidential uses, but do provide job opportunities for rural residents. Rural counties may allow the expansion of smallscale businesses as long as those small-scale businesses conform with the rural character of the area as defined by the local government according to RCW 36.70A.030(($\frac{(16)}{(16)}$)) $\underline{(23)}$. Rural counties may also allow new small-scale businesses to utilize a site previously occupied by an existing business as long as the new small-scale business conforms to the rural character of the area as defined by the local government according to RCW 36.70A.030($(\frac{(16)}{(16)})$) (23). Public services and public facilities shall be limited to those necessary to serve the isolated nonresidential use and shall be provided in a manner that does not permit low-density sprawl;
- 19 (iv) A county shall adopt measures to minimize and contain the existing areas or uses of more intensive rural development, as 20 21 appropriate, authorized under this subsection. Lands included in such existing areas or uses shall not extend beyond the logical outer 22 23 boundary of the existing area or use, thereby allowing a new pattern of low-density sprawl. Existing areas are those that are clearly 24 25 identifiable and contained and where there is a logical boundary delineated predominately by the built environment, but that may also 26 include undeveloped lands if limited as provided in this subsection. 27 28 The county shall establish the logical outer boundary of an area of more intensive rural development. In establishing the logical outer 29 boundary, the county shall address (A) the need to preserve the 30 31 character of existing natural neighborhoods and communities, (B) physical boundaries, such as bodies of water, streets and highways, 32 33 and land forms and contours, (C) the prevention of abnormally irregular boundaries, and (D) the ability to provide public 34 facilities and public services in a manner that does not permit low-35 36 density sprawl;

- (e) Exception. This subsection shall not be interpreted to permit in the rural area a major industrial development or a master planned resort unless otherwise specifically permitted under RCW 36.70A.360 and 36.70A.365.
- 12 (6) A transportation element that implements, and is consistent 13 with, the land use element.
- 14 (a) The transportation element shall include the following 15 subelements:
 - (i) Land use assumptions used in estimating travel;
 - (ii) Estimated traffic impacts to state-owned transportation facilities resulting from land use assumptions to assist the department of transportation in monitoring the performance of state facilities, to plan improvements for the facilities, and to assess the impact of land-use decisions on state-owned transportation facilities;
 - (iii) Facilities and services needs, including:
 - (A) An inventory of air, water, and ground transportation facilities and services, including transit alignments and general aviation airport facilities, to define existing capital facilities and travel levels as a basis for future planning. This inventory must include state-owned transportation facilities within the city or county's jurisdictional boundaries;
 - (B) Level of service standards for all locally owned arterials and transit routes to serve as a gauge to judge performance of the system. These standards should be regionally coordinated;
- 33 (C) For state-owned transportation facilities, level of service standards for highways, as prescribed in chapters 47.06 and 47.80 34 RCW, to gauge the performance of the system. The purposes of 35 36 reflecting level of service standards for state highways in the local comprehensive plan are to monitor the performance of the system, to 37 improvement strategies, and to facilitate coordination 38 39 between the county's or city's six-year street, road, or transit 40 program and the office of financial management's ten-year investment Code Rev/RB:lel 8 S-2707.2/21 2nd draft

- program. The concurrency requirements of (b) of this subsection do
 to not apply to transportation facilities and services of statewide
 significance except for counties consisting of islands whose only
 connection to the mainland are state highways or ferry routes. In
 these island counties, state highways and ferry route capacity must
 be a factor in meeting the concurrency requirements in (b) of this
 subsection;
 - (D) Specific actions and requirements for bringing into compliance locally owned transportation facilities or services that are below an established level of service standard;
 - (E) Forecasts of traffic for at least ten years based on the adopted land use plan to provide information on the location, timing, and capacity needs of future growth;
 - (F) Identification of state and local system needs to meet current and future demands. Identified needs on state-owned transportation facilities must be consistent with the statewide multimodal transportation plan required under chapter 47.06 RCW;
 - (iv) Finance, including:

- (A) An analysis of funding capability to judge needs against probable funding resources;
- (B) A multiyear financing plan based on the needs identified in the comprehensive plan, the appropriate parts of which shall serve as the basis for the six-year street, road, or transit program required by RCW 35.77.010 for cities, RCW 36.81.121 for counties, and RCW 35.58.2795 for public transportation systems. The multiyear financing plan should be coordinated with the ten-year investment program developed by the office of financial management as required by RCW 47.05.030;
- (C) If probable funding falls short of meeting identified needs, a discussion of how additional funding will be raised, or how land use assumptions will be reassessed to ensure that level of service standards will be met;
- (v) Intergovernmental coordination efforts, including an assessment of the impacts of the transportation plan and land use assumptions on the transportation systems of adjacent jurisdictions;
 - (vi) Demand-management strategies;
- (vii) Pedestrian and bicycle component to include collaborative efforts to identify and designate planned improvements for pedestrian and bicycle facilities and corridors that address and encourage enhanced community access and promote healthy lifestyles.

- 1 (b) After adoption of the comprehensive plan by jurisdictions required to plan or who choose to plan under RCW 36.70A.040, local 2 jurisdictions must adopt and enforce ordinances which prohibit 3 development approval if the development causes the level of service 4 on a locally owned transportation facility to decline below the 5 6 standards adopted in the transportation element of the comprehensive plan, unless transportation improvements or strategies to accommodate 7 the impacts of development are made concurrent with the development. 8 These strategies may include increased public transportation service, 9 ride-sharing programs, demand management, and other transportation 10 11 systems management strategies. For the purposes of this subsection 12 (6), "concurrent with the development" means that improvements or strategies are in place at the time of development, or that a 13 financial commitment is in place to complete the improvements or 14 strategies within six years. If the collection of impact fees is 15 16 delayed under RCW 82.02.050(3), the six-year period required by this 17 subsection (6)(b) must begin after full payment of all impact fees is 18 due to the county or city.
- 19 (c) The transportation element described in this subsection (6), 20 the six-year plans required by RCW 35.77.010 for cities, RCW 21 36.81.121 for counties, and RCW 35.58.2795 for public transportation 22 systems, and the ten-year investment program required by RCW 23 47.05.030 for the state, must be consistent.

- (7) An economic development element establishing local goals, policies, objectives, and provisions for economic growth and vitality and a high quality of life. A city that has chosen to be a residential community is exempt from the economic development element requirement of this subsection.
- (8) A park and recreation element that implements, and is consistent with, the capital facilities plan element as it relates to park and recreation facilities. The element shall include: (a) Estimates of park and recreation demand for at least a ten-year period; (b) an evaluation of facilities and service needs; and (c) an evaluation of intergovernmental coordination opportunities to provide regional approaches for meeting park and recreational demand.
- (9) It is the intent that new or amended elements required after January 1, 2002, be adopted concurrent with the scheduled update provided in RCW 36.70A.130.  - NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 35A.21 RCW to read as follows:

5 A code city shall not prohibit transitional housing or permanent supportive housing in any zones in which residential dwelling units 6 or hotels are allowed. Effective September 30, 2021, a code city 7 shall not prohibit indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency 8 housing in any zones in which hotels are allowed, except in such 9 10 cities that have adopted an ordinance authorizing indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency housing in a majority of zones within a 11 one-mile proximity to transit. Reasonable occupancy, spacing, and 12 13 intensity of use requirements may be imposed by ordinance on permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, indoor emergency 14 15 housing, and indoor emergency shelters to protect public health and safety. Any such requirements on occupancy, spacing, and intensity of 16 use may not prevent the siting of a sufficient number of permanent 17 supportive housing, transitional housing, indoor emergency housing, 18 or indoor emergency shelters necessary to accommodate each code 19 city's projected need for such housing and shelter under RCW 20 21 36.70A.070(2)(a)(ii).

NEW SECTION. Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 35.21 RCW to read as follows:

A city shall not prohibit transitional housing or permanent supportive housing in any zones in which residential dwelling units or hotels are allowed. Effective September 30, 2021, a city shall not prohibit indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency housing in any zones in which hotels are allowed, except in such cities that have adopted an ordinance authorizing indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency housing in a majority of zones within a one-mile proximity to transit. Reasonable occupancy, spacing, and intensity of use requirements may be imposed by ordinance on permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, indoor emergency housing, and indoor emergency shelters to protect public health and safety. Any such requirements on occupancy, spacing, and intensity of use may not prevent the siting of a sufficient number of permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, indoor emergency housing, or indoor

Sec. 5. RCW 36.70A.390 and 1992 c 207 s 6 are each amended to read as follows:

A county or city governing body that adopts a moratorium, interim zoning map, interim zoning ordinance, or interim official control without holding a public hearing on the proposed moratorium, interim zoning map, interim zoning ordinance, or interim official control, shall hold a public hearing on the adopted moratorium, interim zoning map, interim zoning ordinance, or interim official control within at least sixty days of its adoption, whether or not the governing body received a recommendation on the matter from the planning commission or department. If the governing body does not adopt findings of fact justifying its action before this hearing, then the governing body shall do so immediately after this public hearing. A moratorium, interim zoning map, interim zoning ordinance, or interim official control adopted under this section may be effective for not longer than six months, but may be effective for up to one year if a work plan is developed for related studies providing for such a longer period. A moratorium, interim zoning map, interim zoning ordinance, or interim official control may be renewed for one or more six-month periods if a subsequent public hearing is held and findings of fact are made prior to each renewal.

This section does not apply to the designation of critical areas, agricultural lands, forestlands, and mineral resource lands, under RCW 36.70A.170, and the conservation of these lands and protection of these areas under RCW 36.70A.060, prior to such actions being taken in a comprehensive plan adopted under RCW 36.70A.070 and implementing development regulations adopted under RCW 36.70A.120, if a public hearing is held on such proposed actions. This section does not apply to ordinances or development regulations adopted by a city that prohibit building permit applications for or the construction of transitional housing or permanent supportive housing in any zones in which residential dwelling units or hotels are allowed or prohibit building permit applications for or the construction of indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency housing in any zones in which hotels are allowed.

Sec. 6. RCW 36.70A.030 and 2020 c 173 s 4 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter.

- (1) "Adopt a comprehensive land use plan" means to enact a new comprehensive land use plan or to update an existing comprehensive land use plan.
- (2) "Affordable housing" means, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise, residential housing whose monthly costs, including utilities other than telephone, do not exceed thirty percent of the monthly income of a household whose income is:
- (a) For rental housing, sixty percent of the median household income adjusted for household size, for the county where the household is located, as reported by the United States department of housing and urban development; or
- (b) For owner-occupied housing, eighty percent of the median household income adjusted for household size, for the county where the household is located, as reported by the United States department of housing and urban development.
- (3) "Agricultural land" means land primarily devoted to the commercial production of horticultural, viticultural, floricultural, dairy, apiary, vegetable, or animal products or of berries, grain, hay, straw, turf, seed, Christmas trees not subject to the excise tax imposed by RCW 84.33.100 through 84.33.140, finfish in upland hatcheries, or livestock, and that has long-term commercial significance for agricultural production.
 - (4) "City" means any city or town, including a code city.
- (5) "Comprehensive land use plan," "comprehensive plan," or "plan" means a generalized coordinated land use policy statement of the governing body of a county or city that is adopted pursuant to this chapter.
- (6) "Critical areas" include the following areas and ecosystems: (a) Wetlands; (b) areas with a critical recharging effect on aquifers used for potable water; (c) fish and wildlife habitat conservation areas; (d) frequently flooded areas; and (e) geologically hazardous areas. "Fish and wildlife habitat conservation areas" does not include such artificial features or constructs as irrigation delivery systems, irrigation infrastructure, irrigation canals, or drainage ditches that lie within the boundaries of and are maintained by a port district or an irrigation district or company.

- (7) "Department" means the department of commerce.
- (8) "Development regulations" or "regulation" means the controls placed on development or land use activities by a county or city, including, but not limited to, zoning ordinances, critical areas ordinances, shoreline master programs, official controls, planned unit development ordinances, subdivision ordinances, and binding site plan ordinances together with any amendments thereto. A development regulation does not include a decision to approve a project permit application, as defined in RCW 36.70B.020, even though the decision may be expressed in a resolution or ordinance of the legislative body of the county or city.
- (9) "Emergency housing" means temporary indoor accommodations for individuals or families who are homeless or at imminent risk of becoming homeless that is intended to address the basic health, food, clothing, and personal hygiene needs of individuals or families. Emergency housing may or may not require occupants to enter into a lease or an occupancy agreement.
- (10) "Emergency shelter" means a facility that provides a temporary shelter for individuals or families who are currently homeless. Emergency shelter may not require occupants to enter into a lease or an occupancy agreement. Emergency shelter facilities may include day and warming centers that do not provide overnight accommodations.
- (11) "Extremely low-income household" means a single person, family, or unrelated persons living together whose adjusted income is at or below thirty percent of the median household income adjusted for household size, for the county where the household is located, as reported by the United States department of housing and urban development.
- $((\frac{10}{10}))$ <u>(12)</u> "Forestland" means land primarily devoted to growing trees for long-term commercial timber production on land that can be economically and practically managed for such production, including Christmas trees subject to the excise tax imposed under RCW 84.33.100 through 84.33.140, and that has long-term commercial significance. In determining whether forestland is primarily devoted to growing trees for long-term commercial timber production on land that can be economically and practically managed for such production, the following factors shall be considered: (a) The proximity of the land to urban, suburban, and rural settlements; (b) surrounding parcel size and the compatibility and intensity of adjacent and

Wetlands do not include those artificial wetlands intentionally created from nonwetland sites, including, but not limited to, irrigation and drainage ditches, grass-lined swales, canals, detention facilities, wastewater treatment facilities, farm ponds, and landscape amenities, those wetlands created after July 1, 1990, that unintentionally created as a result of the construction of a road, street, or highway.  - (5) The city or county must make the same allowances for accessory dwelling units' roof decks, balconies, and porches to encroach on setbacks as are allowed for the principal unit;
 - (6) The city or county must apply abutting lot setbacks to accessory dwelling units on lots abutting zones with lower setback requirements;
 - (7) The city or county must establish an amnesty program to help owners of unpermitted accessory dwelling units to obtain a permit;
 - (8) The city or county must permit accessory dwelling units in structures detached from the principal unit, must allow an accessory dwelling unit on any lot that meets the minimum lot size required for the principal unit, and must allow attached accessory dwelling units on any lot with a principal unit that is nonconforming solely because the lot is smaller than the minimum size, as long as the accessory dwelling unit would not increase nonconformity of the residential use with respect to building height, bulk, or lot coverage;
 - (9) The city or county may not establish a maximum gross floor area requirement for accessory dwelling units that are less than 1,000 square feet or 60 percent of the principal unit, whichever is greater, or that exceeds 1,200 square feet;
 - (10) A city or county must allow accessory dwelling units to be converted from existing structures, including but not limited to detached garages, even if they violate current code requirements for setbacks or lot coverage;
 - (11) A city or county may not require public street improvements as a condition of permitting accessory dwelling units; and
 - (12) A city or county may require a new or separate utility connection between an accessory dwelling unit and a utility only when necessary to be consistent with water availability requirements, water system plans, small water system management plans, or established policies adopted by the water or sewer utility provider.

- 1 If such a connection is necessary, the connection fees and capacity 2 charges must:
- 3 (a) Be proportionate to the burden of the proposed accessory 4 dwelling unit upon the water or sewer system; and
 - (b) Not exceed the reasonable cost of providing the service."

On page 1, line 2 of the title, after "regulations;" strike the remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 36.70A.020, 36.70A.390, and 36.70A.030; reenacting and amending RCW 36.70A.070; adding a new section to chapter 35A.21 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 35.21 RCW; and adding a new section to chapter 36.70A RCW."

- EFFECT: (1) Modifies the new action of the housing element addressing the documentation of programs and actions needed to achieve housing availability to include gaps in local funding only as opposed to both state and local funding.
- (2) Modifies the new action of the housing element addressing the establishment of antidisplacement policies by prioritizing consideration of the preservation of historical and cultural communities.
- (3) Replaces the prohibition on cities preventing emergency housing and shelters and permanent supportive housing in certain zones where short-term rentals are allowed, and the requirement that such housing be permitted at the same occupancy levels as short-term rentals in the residential zone, with the following:
- (a) Prohibits cities from preventing transitional housing or permanent supportive housing in zones where residential dwelling units or hotels are allowed.
- (b) Prohibits cities, effective September 30, 2021, from preventing indoor emergency shelters and indoor emergency housing in zones where hotels are allowed, excepts for cities that have adopted an ordinance authorizing indoor emergency shelters and housing in a majority of zones within one mile of transit.
- (c) Authorizes reasonable occupancy, spacing, and intensity of use requirements to be imposed on permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, and indoor emergency housing and shelters to protect public health and safety, but that any such requirements may not prevent the siting of a sufficient number of permanent supportive housing, transitional housing, and indoor emergency housing and shelters necessary to accommodate the projected need as provided by the Department of Commerce under comprehensive plan housing element requirements.
- (4) Exempts city ordinances or development regulations prohibiting building permit applications for or the construction of transitional housing or permanent supportive housing in any zones in which residential dwelling units or hotels are allowed or prohibiting such applications for or the construction of indoor emergency

shelters and housing in any zones in which hotels are allowed from public hearing requirements under the GMA related to adopted moratoria or interim zoning controls.

- (5) Modifies one of the suggested policies to encourage the construction of ADUs to meet affordable housing goals, specifically authorizing cities and counties to require a new or separate utility connection between the ADU and a utility only when necessary to be consistent with certain water availability requirements and system plans, and requiring any fees associated with a necessary connection to be proportionate and not exceed reasonable costs.
- (6) Includes provisions from the Ways & Means committee striker to ESHB 1232 addressing the housing element in the comprehensive plan and makes technical and conforming amendments to ensure housing element policies in both the underlying bill and ESHB 1232 do not conflict.
