3 "NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** The legislature finds that people
4 participating in their government is an essential part of developing
5 public policy. Familiarizing students with their representative
6 government's policy development process increases social
7 responsibility and civic awareness that will benefit them now as
8 students and later as adults, while improving our state. The
9 legislature further finds that policymakers can benefit from the
10 input of students presently in our kindergarten through grade 12
11 school system and those attending a community or technical college,
12 sharing insights and ideas on education and other issues affecting
13 youth in our state. Therefore, the legislature intends to establish
14 student councils, including 49 legislative district student councils
15 each representing one legislative district to ensure proportional and
16 geographical representation, to allow students to learn about and
17 participate in our representative democracy and share policy ideas
18 with their state elected officials.

19 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** (1) A legislative district student council
20 is established in each legislative district. Legislative district
21 student councils are informal nonpartisan advisory bodies that may
22 examine issues affecting youth and education and make recommendations
23 to the legislative youth advisory council on those issues.

24 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall
25 select a statewide organization with more than 20 years' experience
26 that provides leadership opportunities to students to complete the
27 following tasks, consistent with the provisions of this act, by
28 August 1, 2025:

29 (a) Develop processes and procedures that may be used to set up
30 legislative district student councils;

1 (b) Contribute to the development of an application and selection
2 process that may be used to select student members to serve on the
3 council, including for the position of chair for each legislative
4 district student council;

5 (c) Develop model practices regarding increasing student
6 engagement; and

7 (d) Distribute information to students in qualifying schools
8 about participating in a legislative district student council,
9 including the application process and timeline.

10 (3) Each legislative district student council is composed of no
11 more than seven student members as follows:

12 (a) One chair for each legislative district student council. The
13 organization selected in subsection (2) of this section shall select
14 the initial chairs for councils in legislative districts no later
15 than October 1, 2025. Subsequent chairs shall be selected no later
16 than June 1, 2027, and each June 1st every two years thereafter.

17 (b) One vice chair for each legislative district student council.
18 The youth civic engagement council member from the respective
19 legislative district shall serve as the vice chair for that
20 district's legislative district student council.

21 (c) To the greatest extent possible, the Washington state school
22 directors' association shall select up to two student board
23 representatives from each legislative district who attend a
24 qualifying school that serves students in any of grades nine through
25 12 and are members of the Washington state school directors'
26 association's student representatives network to be members in that
27 district's legislative district student council.

28 (d) (i) At least three additional members who are under the age of
29 21 at the start of their term and attend either a qualifying school
30 that serves students in any of grades nine through 12 or a community
31 or technical college that is located within that student council's
32 legislative district.

33 (ii) Factors to consider for selection of the members described
34 in this subsection (3)(d) include:

35 (A) Balancing representation among the various grades, with at
36 least one student being in grade 11 and one being in grade 12; and

37 (B) Selecting students who have demonstrated a commitment to
38 civic education through current participation in another local youth
39 council.

1 (iii)(A) For the selection of initial members described in this
2 subsection (3)(d) for new legislative district student councils, a
3 committee consisting of the chairs of each legislative district
4 student council shall meet for the purpose of selecting members for
5 each legislative district student council from the applications
6 submitted. Initial members must be selected by November 15, 2025.

7 (B) Subsequent selection of members described in this subsection
8 (3)(d) shall be the responsibility of each legislative district
9 student council and must occur no later than October 1, 2027, and on
10 October 1st every two years thereafter.

11 (4) To the greatest extent feasible, the members of each
12 legislative district student council must attend either a qualifying
13 school that serves students in any of grades nine through 12 or a
14 community or technical college that is in their council's legislative
15 district. If there are no applicants from a legislative district,
16 eligible students who attend a qualifying school that serves students
17 in any of grades nine through 12 or a community or technical college
18 located in an adjacent legislative district may be selected for
19 membership.

20 (5) Membership terms are as follows:

21 (a) Of the chairs initially selected, each chair shall serve two-
22 year terms, except that students who are in grade 12 shall serve a
23 one-year term but may serve the full two-year term if they attend a
24 community or technical college within the student council's
25 legislative district in the following year. The term of each
26 subsequent chair shall be two years, and qualifying chairs may be
27 selected for subsequent two-year terms.

28 (b) Of the members initially selected to serve on a legislative
29 district student council, two members shall serve one-year terms, and
30 all other members shall serve two-year terms. Members initially
31 selected to serve on a legislative district student council who are
32 in grade 12 shall serve a one-year term but may serve the full two-
33 year term if they attend a community or technical college within the
34 student council's legislative district in the following year. The
35 term of each subsequent eligible member shall be two years, and
36 members may be selected for subsequent two-year terms.

37 (c) In the case of a vacancy, the selection of a student member
38 to fill the remainder of an unexpired term must be conducted in the
39 same manner as the original appointment.

1 (6) Each student council may not conduct more than four in-person
2 meetings, with one of the in-person meetings occurring in person in
3 Olympia on the day of youth civic education organized by the
4 legislative youth advisory council, in collaboration with the student
5 representative network, pursuant to RCW 43.15.095(6)(e). The student
6 councils are encouraged to use technology, such as remote
7 videoconferencing technology, to conduct additional virtual meetings.

8 (7) The legislature, any agency of the legislature, and any
9 official or employee of such office or agency is immune from
10 liability for any injury that is incurred by or caused by a member of
11 the legislative district student council and that occurs while the
12 member of the council is performing duties of the council. The
13 immunity provided by this subsection does not apply to an injury
14 intentionally caused by the act or omission of an employee or
15 official of the office of the legislature or any agency of the
16 legislature.

17 (8) When engaging in outreach and recruiting efforts to educate
18 students and schools about opportunities to participate in a
19 legislative district student council, and when creating an
20 application and selection process as described in subsection (2) of
21 this section, the lieutenant governor, the organization selected in
22 subsection (2) of this section, and the Washington state school
23 directors' association, as applicable, shall comply with the
24 principles of the state pro-equity antiracism plan and playbook
25 developed by the office of equity to bridge opportunity gaps, reduce
26 disparities, and increase diversity of student membership.

27 (9) As used in this section:

28 (a) "Qualifying school" means a public school as defined in RCW
29 28A.150.010, a private school approved under chapter 28A.195 RCW, or
30 home-based instruction as defined in RCW 28A.225.010.

31 (b) "Student board representative" has the same meaning as in
32 section 4 of this act.

33 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** (1) The organization selected in section
34 2(2) of this act shall, by December 31, 2025, and in compliance with
35 RCW 43.01.036, submit a report to the legislature that details the
36 following:

37 (a) The number of legislative district student councils that have
38 been established pursuant to section 2 of this act;

1 (b) The legislative district of each legislative district student
2 council;

3 (c) A list of schools represented on legislative district student
4 councils;

5 (d) Grade levels represented on legislative district student
6 councils; and

7 (e) The demographics of student members on each legislative
8 district student council. The data must be disaggregated by
9 categories listed in RCW 28A.642.010 and by legislative district
10 student council.

11 (2) This section expires January 31, 2026.

12 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.345
13 RCW to read as follows:

14 (1) The Washington state school directors' association shall form
15 a student representative network to examine issues important to youth
16 and engage student school board representatives in the legislative
17 process.

18 (2) Subject to the supervision of the Washington state school
19 directors' association, the duties of the student representative
20 network are as follows:

21 (a) Advise the legislature through feedback and testimony on
22 proposed and pending legislation, including policy matters relating
23 to youth;

24 (b) Advise the standing committees of the legislature and study
25 commissions, committees, and task forces through feedback and
26 testimony on issues relating to youth;

27 (c) Collaborate with the legislative youth advisory council
28 established under RCW 43.15.095 to organize an in-person annual day
29 of youth civic education in Olympia;

30 (d) Develop and assemble resources for new and existing student
31 board representatives;

32 (e) Provide writing, photos, and other content for the Washington
33 state school directors' association publications in consultation with
34 Washington state school directors' association staff;

35 (f) Collaborate with the Washington state school directors'
36 association standing committees, advisory committees, task forces,
37 and caucuses as invited; and

1 (g) Provide additional student voices at Washington state school
2 directors' association events in consultation with Washington state
3 school directors' association staff.

4 (3) When acting on behalf of the student representative network,
5 advocacy position and policy recommendations from network members
6 shall be in accordance with the Washington state school directors'
7 association's approved positions. When acting on behalf of individual
8 school districts, legislative district student councils, or the
9 legislative youth advisory council established under RCW 43.15.095,
10 advocacy positions and policy recommendations made by network members
11 are considered independent from the Washington state school
12 directors' association.

13 (4) In supporting the student representative network, the
14 Washington state school directors' association shall provide network
15 members with the ability to learn about education policy issues and
16 determine best practices for establishing and supporting student
17 councils. Additionally, the Washington state school directors'
18 association shall facilitate a connection between network members and
19 the legislators in their legislative districts.

20 (5) All student board representatives are members of the student
21 representative network. The Washington state school directors'
22 association shall engage in outreach annually to each school district
23 to provide information about the student representative network. To
24 the greatest extent feasible, the Washington state school directors'
25 association shall identify at least one student board representative
26 from each legislative district to participate in the student
27 representative network. In legislative districts where there are no
28 established student board representatives, the Washington state
29 school directors' association shall communicate with school districts
30 to create awareness of and share best practices about the role and to
31 encourage participation.

32 (6) The Washington state school directors' association shall
33 invite legislators to participate in the student representative
34 network in an advisory capacity.

35 (7) The student representative network shall meet at least four
36 times per year. The number of in-person meetings may not exceed four.

37 (8) The Washington state school directors' association, the
38 legislature, any agency of the legislature, and any official or
39 employee of such office or agency is immune from liability for any
40 injury that is incurred by or caused by a member of the student

1 representative network and that occurs while the member of the
2 network is performing duties of the network or is otherwise engaged
3 in activities or receiving services for which reimbursement is
4 allowed under RCW 43.15.095(8). The immunity provided by this
5 subsection does not apply to an injury intentionally caused by the
6 act or omission of an employee or official of the Washington state
7 school directors' association, the legislature, or any agency of the
8 legislature.

9 (9) In compliance with RCW 43.01.036, the student representative
10 network, in consultation and with the support of Washington state
11 school directors' association staff, shall report on December 1st of
12 each year to the appropriate committees of the legislature on the
13 number of student board representatives in Washington and the
14 activities of the network.

15 (10) As used in this section, "student board representative"
16 means a student who is recognized by their local school board as a
17 representative of the student body serving on that board.

18 **Sec. 5.** RCW 43.15.095 and 2022 c 96 s 6 are each amended to read
19 as follows:

20 (1) The legislative youth advisory council is established to
21 examine issues of importance to youth, including but not limited to
22 education, employment, strategies to increase youth participation in
23 state and municipal government, safe environments for youth,
24 substance abuse, emotional and physical health, foster care, poverty,
25 homelessness, and youth access to services on a statewide and
26 municipal basis.

27 (2) The council consists of at least (~~twenty-two~~) 22 members as
28 provided in this subsection who, at the time of appointment, are
29 (~~aged~~) age (~~fourteen to eighteen~~) 14 to 18. The council shall
30 select a chair from among its members.

31 (3) Members shall serve two-year terms and, if eligible, may be
32 reappointed for subsequent two-year terms.

33 (4)(a) Students may apply annually to be considered for
34 participation in the program by completing an online application form
35 and submitting the application to the legislative youth advisory
36 council. The council may develop selection criteria and an
37 application review process. The council shall recommend candidates
38 whose names will be submitted to the office of the lieutenant

1 governor for final selection. The office of the lieutenant governor
2 shall notify all applicants of the final selections.

3 (b) The office of the lieutenant governor shall make the
4 application available on the lieutenant governor's website.

5 (5) Information about participating in the legislative youth
6 advisory council, including the application process and timeline,
7 shall be distributed by the Washington state school directors'
8 association.

9 (6) Subject to the supervision of the office of the lieutenant
10 governor, the council shall have the following duties:

11 (a) Advising the legislature on proposed and pending legislation,
12 including state budget expenditures and policy matters relating to
13 youth;

14 (b) Advising the standing committees of the legislature and study
15 commissions, committees, and task forces regarding issues relating to
16 youth;

17 (c) Conducting periodic seminars for its members regarding
18 leadership, government, and the legislature;

19 (d) Accepting and soliciting for grants and donations from public
20 and private sources to support the activities of the council; (~~and~~)

21 (e) In coordination with the student representative network,
22 organizing an in-person annual day of youth civic education in
23 Olympia;

24 (f) In collaboration with the youth civic engagement caucus,
25 organizing a virtual town hall meeting within the three-month period
26 preceding the commencement of the legislative session; and

27 (g) Reporting annually by December 1st to the legislature on its
28 activities, including proposed legislation that implements
29 recommendations of the council.

30 (~~(6)~~) (7) In carrying out its duties under this section, the
31 council must meet at least three times per year. The council is
32 encouraged to use technology, such as remote videoconferencing
33 technology, to facilitate members' participation in meetings. The
34 council is encouraged to invite local state legislators to
35 participate in the meetings. The council is encouraged to poll other
36 students in order to get a broad perspective on various policy
37 issues. The council is encouraged to use technology to conduct
38 polling.

39 (~~(7)~~) (8) Members may be reimbursed as provided in RCW
40 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

1 ~~((8))~~ (9) The office of the lieutenant governor shall provide
2 administration, supervision, and facilitation support to the council.
3 In facilitating the program, the office of the lieutenant governor
4 may collaborate with the Washington state leadership board
5 established in RCW 43.388.010. The senate and house of
6 representatives may provide policy and fiscal briefings and
7 assistance with drafting proposed legislation. The senate and the
8 house of representatives shall each develop internal policies
9 relating to staff assistance provided to the council. Such policies
10 may include applicable internal personnel and practices guidelines,
11 resource use and expense reimbursement guidelines, and applicable
12 ethics mandates. Provision of funds, resources, and staff, as well as
13 the assignment and direction of staff, remains at all times within
14 the sole discretion of the chamber making the provision.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** (1) A youth civic engagement caucus is
28 established to examine issues of importance to youth, including but
29 not limited to education, employment, strategies to increase youth
30 participation in state and municipal government, safe environments
31 for youth, substance abuse, emotional and physical health, foster
32 care, poverty, homelessness, and youth access to services on a
33 statewide and municipal basis.

34 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall
35 select a statewide organization that provides leadership
36 opportunities to students to create model processes and procedures
37 that may be used to establish and maintain the youth civic engagement
38 caucus. The model processes and procedures must be completed by
39 September 1, 2025.

1 (3) Membership terms are as follows:

2 (a) The caucus consists of up to 49 members, with one member from
3 each legislative district, who are sixth, seventh, or eighth grade
4 students who attend a qualifying school, as defined in section 2 of
5 this act, in the legislative district.

6 (b) The initial members on the caucus shall be equally balanced
7 between sixth and seventh grade students to the greatest extent
8 feasible. Sixth graders initially selected to the caucus shall serve
9 three-year terms. Seventh graders initially selected to the caucus
10 shall serve two-year terms, commencing October 1, 2025. All students
11 subsequently selected to the caucus shall serve two-year terms,
12 commencing each June 1st every two years thereafter.

13 (4) Members of the caucus shall serve as the vice chair for the
14 legislative district student council of the member's respective
15 legislative district.

16 (5) The caucus shall advise the legislature on proposed and
17 pending legislation, including policy matters relating to youth.

18 (6) In carrying out its duties under this section, the caucus
19 must meet at least four times per year, including:

20 (a) Collaborating with the legislative youth advisory council to
21 play an active role in organizing action day, the annual day of civic
22 youth education in Olympia under RCW 43.15.095(6) (e); and

23 (b) Collaborating with the legislative youth advisory council to
24 organize a virtual town hall meeting within the three-month period
25 preceding the commencement of the legislative session.

26 (7) The caucus is encouraged to use technology, such as remote
27 videoconferencing technology, to facilitate members' participation in
28 meetings. The caucus is encouraged to invite local state legislators
29 to participate in the meetings. The caucus is encouraged to poll
30 other students in order to get a broad perspective on various policy
31 issues. The caucus is encouraged to use technology to conduct
32 polling.

33 (8) When engaging in outreach and recruiting efforts to educate

35 civic engagement caucus, the lieutenant governor and the organization
36 selected in subsection (2) of this section, as applicable, shall

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** Sections 2 and 6 of this act constitute a
2 new chapter in Title 44 RCW.

3 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.300
4 RCW to read as follows:

5 (1) The Washington state green schools advisory program is
6 established in the office of the superintendent of public instruction
7 to support legislative district student councils in creating and
8 expanding resource conservation practices in public schools,
9 including: Waste reduction, energy reduction, water conservation,
10 urban forestry education, and environmental preservation; and
11 education and leadership opportunities for students seeking to
12 promote conservation practices in their schools. The program is
13 voluntary and is intended to report to the legislative district
14 student councils regarding opportunities to:

15 (a) Complement resource conservation programs for school
16 districts and public schools that are established by counties or
17 other entities by, in part, providing increased opportunities for
18 student education and leadership in resource conservation practices;

19 (b) For school districts and public schools that cannot access or
20 are not participating in resource conservation programs, establish
21 and promote resource conservation programs that include student
22 education and leadership opportunities;

23 (c) Support instruction in climate curriculum aligned with the
24 state science and integrated environmental and sustainability
25 learning standards; and

26 (d) For school districts and public schools, collaborate with the
27 department of natural resources for the purposes of schoolyard
28 greening projects, schoolyard forests, and career-connected learning
29 related to natural resource job opportunities within the national
30 forest school forest system network and other urban forestry
31 projects.

32 (2) The green schools advisory program shall solicit feedback
33 from the legislative district student councils regarding state
34 policies that would further the goals of student leadership in
35 resource conservation practices.

36 (3) For the purposes of this section, "public school" has the
37 same meaning as in RCW 28A.150.010.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** A new section is added to chapter 28A.300
2 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this
4 specific purpose, the office of the superintendent of public
5 instruction shall establish and administer a grant program to provide
6 assistance to school districts for the purpose of creating or
7 expanding resource conservation practices in accordance with section
8 8 of this act.

9 (2) School districts that participate in the Washington state
10 green schools advisory program established in section 8 of this act
11 may, on forms developed by the office of the superintendent of public
12 instruction, apply for:

13 (a) Annual project grants of up to \$15,000 per school, per year,
14 in furtherance of the Washington state green schools advisory
15 program. Applications for grants awarded in accordance with this
16 subsection (2)(a) must demonstrate student involvement through the
17 legislative district student council and a student-based team, group,
18 or club in the selection and support of projects proposed for
19 funding; and

20 (b) Grants for stipend funds for school-based advisors that
21 assist students in learning about, promoting, and implementing
22 resource conservation practices in school facilities. Stipend funds
23 provided in accordance with this section may not exceed \$600 per
24 school, per year, but nothing in this section prevents school
25 districts from providing additional funding for school-based
26 advisors.

27 (3) For the purposes of this section, "school districts" include
28 school districts, charter schools established under chapter 28A.710
29 RCW, and state-tribal education compact schools subject to chapter
30 28A.715 RCW."

31 On page 1, line 3 of the title, after "youth;" strike the
32 remainder of the title and insert "amending RCW 43.15.095; adding a
33 new section to chapter 28A.345 RCW; adding new sections to chapter

1 28A.300 RCW; adding a new chapter to Title 44 RCW; creating new
2 sections; and providing an expiration date."

EFFECT: Specifies that the statewide organization selected by OSPI have more than 20 years' experience. Establishes the Washington state green schools advisory program to support legislative district student councils in creating and expanding resource conservation practices in public schools. Directs OSPI to establish and administer a grant program to provide assistance to school districts for the purpose of creating or expanding resource conservation practices in accordance with the green schools advisory program.

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
