## STYLE AND FORMAT OF THE WASHINGTON STATE REGISTER

## 1. ARRANGEMENT OF THE REGISTER

The Register is arranged in the following eight sections:
(a) PREPROPOSAL-includes the Preproposal Statement of Inquiry that will be used to solicit public comments on a general area of proposed rule making before the agency files a formal notice.
(b) PROPOSED-includes the full text of formal proposals, continuances, supplemental notices, and withdrawals.
(c) EXPEDITED RULE MAKING-includes the full text of the rule being proposed using the expedited rule-making process. Expedited rule makings are not consistently filed and may not appear in every issue of the register.
(d) PERMANENT-includes the full text of permanently adopted rules.
(e) EMERGENCY-includes the full text of emergency rules and rescissions.
(f) MISCELLANEOUS-includes notice of public meetings of state agencies, rules coordinator notifications, summaries of attorney general opinions, executive orders and emergency declarations of the governor, rules of the state Supreme Court, and other miscellaneous documents filed with the code reviser's office under RCW 34.08.020 and 42.30.075.
(g) TABLE-includes a cumulative table of the WAC sections that are affected in the current year.
(h) INDEX-includes a cumulative index of Register Issues 01 through 24.

Documents are arranged within each section of the Register according to the order in which they are filed in the code reviser's office during the pertinent filing period. Each filing is listed under the agency name and then describes the subject matter, type of filing and the WSR number. The three part number in the heading distinctively identifies each document, and the last part of the number indicates the filing sequence with a section's material.

## 2. PRINTING STYLE-INDICATION OF NEW OR DELETED MATERIAL

RCW 34.05.395 requires the use of certain marks to indicate amendments to existing agency rules. This style quickly and graphically portrays the current changes to existing rules as follows:
(a) In amendatory sections-
(i) underlined material is new material;
(ii) deleted material is ((tined out between double parentheses));
(b) Complete new sections are prefaced by the heading NEW SECTION;
(c) The repeal of an entire section is shown by listing its WAC section number and caption under the heading REPEALER.

## 3. MISCELLANEOUS MATERIAL NOT FILED UNDER THE ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURE ACT

Material contained in the Register other than rule-making actions taken under the APA (chapter 34.05 RCW ) does not necessarily conform to the style and format conventions described above. The headings of these other types of material have been edited for uniformity of style; otherwise the items are shown as nearly as possible in the form submitted to the code reviser's office.

## 4. EFFECTIVE DATE OF RULES

(a) Permanently adopted agency rules normally take effect thirty-one days after the rules and the agency order adopting them are filed with the code reviser's office. This effective date may be delayed or advanced and such an effective date will be noted in the promulgation statement preceding the text of the rule.
(b) Emergency rules take effect upon filing with the code reviser's office unless a later date is provided by the agency. They remain effective for a maximum of one hundred twenty days from the date of filing.
(c) Rules of the state Supreme Court generally contain an effective date clause in the order adopting the rules.

## EDITORIAL CORRECTIONS

Material inserted by the code reviser's office for purposes of clarification or correction or to show the source or history of a document is enclosed in [brackets].

## REGULATORY FAIRNESS ACT

The Regulatory Fairness Act, chapter 19.85 RCW, was enacted in 1982 to minimize the impact of state regulations on small business. Amended in 1994, the act requires a small business economic impact analysis of proposed rules that impose more than a minor cost on twenty percent of the businesses in all industries, or ten percent of the businesses in any one industry. The Regulatory Fairness Act defines industry as businesses within a four digit SIC classification, and for the purpose of this act, small business is defined by RCW 19.85 .020 as "any business entity, including a sole proprietorship, corporation, partnership, or other legal entity, that is owned and operated independently from all other businesses, that has the purpose of making a profit, and that has fifty or fewer employees."

## Small Business Economic Impact Statements (SBEIS)

A small business economic impact statement (SBEIS) must be prepared by state agencies when a proposed rule meets the above criteria. Chapter 19.85 RCW requires the Washington State Business Assistance Center (BAC) to develop guidelines for agencies to use in determining whether the impact of a rule is more than minor and to provide technical assistance to agencies in developing a SBEIS. All permanent rules adopted under the Administrative Procedure Act, chapter 34.05 RCW , must be reviewed to determine if the requirements of the Regulatory Fairness Act apply; if an SBEIS is required it must be completed before permanent rules are filed with the Office of the Code Reviser.

## Mitigation

In addition to completing the economic impact analysis for proposed rules, state agencies must take reasonable, legal, and feasible steps to reduce or mitigate the impact of rules on small businesses when there is a disproportionate impact on small versus large business. State agencies are encouraged to reduce the economic impact of rules on small businesses when possible and when such steps are in keeping with the stated intent of the statute(s) being implemented by proposed rules. Since 1994, small business economic impact statements must contain a list of the mitigation steps taken, or reasonable justification for not taking steps to reduce the impact of rules on small businesses.

## When is an SBEIS Required?

When:
The proposed rule has more than a minor (as defined by the BAC) economic impact on businesses in more than twenty percent of all industries or more than ten percent of any one industry.

## When is an SBEIS Not Required?

When:
The rule is proposed only to comply or conform with a federal law or regulation, and the state has no discretion in how the rule is implemented;

There is less than minor economic impact on business;
The rule REDUCES costs to business (although an SBEIS may be a useful tool for demonstrating this reduced impact);

The rule is adopted as an emergency rule, although an SBEIS may be required when an emergency rule is proposed for adoption as a permanent rule; or
The rule is pure restatement of state statute.

Subject of Possible Rule Making: Establish plant tagging requirements for horticultural plants.

Statutes Authorizing the Agency to Adopt Rules on this Subject: Chapters 15.13 and 34.05 RCW.

Reasons Why Rules on this Subject may be Needed and What They Might Accomplish: Chapter 15.13 RCW requires the department to establish rules for the marking or tagging of horticultural plants. The ability to identify horticultural
plants is critical when enforcing plant related quarantines, especially noxious weed quarantines. A tagging rule would benefit consumers of such plants by providing an accurate identity of purchased plants. This proposal would also allow consumers to identify native plants collected in their natural environment.

Other Federal and State Agencies that Regulate this Subject and the Process Coordinating the Rule with These Agencies: None.

Process for Developing New Rule: Washington State Department of Agriculture representatives discuss proposed rule change with affected stakeholders and then publish the rule proposal.

- Prohibit stand alone videotape training. Due to the importance of this training, the participants of the course should have a trainer available to answer questions and concerns prior to a server taking the examination.
- Require prospective trainers to attend the Liquor Control Board's ID/over service training as a condition of certification. Currently no formal training is required for anyone to become a MAST trainer. This requirement will ensure those teaching the classes are familiar with relevant liquor laws and rules.
- Technical changes for clarification and to correct references to other WACs.

Summary: The Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises (OMWBE) has the authority to change size standards and industry code designations. Currently OMWBE uses an old code system no longer used by the federal government. Since OMWBE's certification authority also includes the federal DBE certification program, which includes utilizing the current federal government size standards and industry code designations, OMWBE must maintain two separate size standards and industry code designations for firms certified in both the state and federal programs.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: Using a single size standard and industry code designation system will streamline the certification process for businesses, state agencies and political subdivisions, and OMWBE staff, reducing processing time size standard confusion between the programs.

Explanation of Rule, its Purpose, and Anticipated Effects: Currently, the office uses two different code systems with different size standards: (1) Standard industrial classification (SIC) codes for the state certification program (using 1997 size standards) and (2) North American industrial classification system (NAICS) codes for the federal DBE certification program (using 2002 size standards). SIC codes have not been revised since 1987. Some industries do not have assigned numbers because they did not come into existence until after 1987. OMWBE has had to create or adapt number(s) for industries that did not exist prior to 1987. The two systems are not similar enough to allow for easy conversion between the systems. SIC codes are lower than NAICS codes (e.g., specialty contractors $=\$ 7.0 \mathrm{M}$ for SICs and $\$ 11.5 \mathrm{M}$ for NAICS; $\mathrm{A} / \mathrm{E}=\$ 2.5 \mathrm{M}$ for SICs and $\$ 4.0 \mathrm{M}$ for NAICS). Therefore, confusion exists for staff, businesses, agencies
and political subdivisions about which size applies to which program.

The proposed change to adopt NAICS codes to determine size and small business concerns will accomplish the following:

- More modern and universal coding system for state certification program that is currently used by the federal and other state governments.
- A single system to be used for both the state and federal DBE certification programs, reducing confusion and conversion charts.
- Streamlining process and reducing application processing time for businesses and staff concerning small business concems.
- Increasing the net number of certified firms because more businesses will qualify as small business concerns.
- Current federal DBE size standards already used as the working model.
- Staff already trained using the federal DBE model.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: The analysis to determine a small business concern will remain the same. The change will be come [coming] from changing the actual chart of size standards used to determine what consists the size limit: Changing from SIC codes to NAICS codes for the federal DBE program.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in WAC 326-20-096 (for certain federal projects), a small business concern is a business which is independently owned and operated, is not dominant in its field of operations, and which does not exceed the size limitations as set forth in the current table of ((Standard-Industrial Classifieation (SIC)) ) North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) codes and corresponding industry size standards as ((adopted by the United States-Small-Business Administration in Title 13-Code-of Federal Regulations, Paft 121, on file in the office)) set forth in 49 CFR Part 26 and amendments or inflationary adjustments thereof.
(b) The number of employees or amount of annual receipts listed as the size standard for each ((SIC)) NAICS code indicates the maximum allowed for a business (including its affiliates) to qualify as a small business concern.
(c) The office's determination of whether a business qualifies as a small business concern shall be, whenever possible, based on criteria that is consistent with the small business requirements defined under section 3 of the Small Business Act, 15 U.S.C. 632, and its implementing regulations, taking into consideration statewide markets.
(2) A business which exceeds the small business size limits after certification by the office shall be subject to ((decertifieation)) graduation.

WAC 326-20-094 Assignment of ((standerd-indus-triat-elassifieatien-(SIC)) North American Industrial Classification System (NAICS) code. (1) The office will determine which ((SIE)) NAICS code an applicant falls under based on information submitted by the business. The office will prepare conversion tables showing the department of general administration's commodity code designations, the codes developed by the Construction Specifications Institute, and the corresponding ((SIC)) NAICS codes listed in the directory of certified businesses as described in WAC 326-20-190.
(2) In the event the business plans to expand the areas in which it operates, it must notify the office in writing at least thirty calendar days before the effective date of such expansion.

WAC 326-20-095 Determination of firm size. (1) At the time of application for certification and recertification, a business must demonstrate to the office that it is a small business concern. The office may verify that the business continues to be a small business concern, once certified, at any time. In verifying the ((applieant's)) business's size, the office will review ((the)) such financial documentation of the business as may be made available to the office; e.g.. annual financial statements, federal income tax returns, state and/or local excise tax reports, and other relevant information.
(2) Affiliates. Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, businesses are affiliates of each other when either directly or indirectly:
(a) One controls or has power to control the other; or
(b) A third party or parties controls or has the power to control both; or
(c) Such an "identity of interest" exists between or among them that affiliation may be presumed.
(3) Annual receipts. Where the maximum size standard is set by reference to "annual receipts," a business that exceeds the annual receipts in that standard is not eligible for certification. Annual receipts includes all revenue in whatever form received or accrued from whatever source, including from the sales of products or services, interest, dividends, rents, royalties, fees, or commissions, reduced by returns and allowances. However, the term "receipts" excludes proceeds from sales of capital assets and investments, proceeds from transactions between a concern and its domestic and foreign affiliates, proceeds from payments of notes receivable and accounts receivable, and amounts collected as an agent for another, such as gross bookings on which a commission is earned (in which case only the commission earned would constitute revenue) or such as taxes collected for remittance to a taxing authority.
(4) Period of measurement.
(a) The size of a business that has completed three or more fiscal years will be determined by averaging the annual receipts of the business for each of the most recent three years.
(b) The size of a business that has completed less than three fiscal years will be determined by computing the average of the annual receipts from the time the business was formed as follows: Total revenues compiled over the period divided by the number of weeks, including fractions of a week, multiplied by fifty-two.
(d) Method of determining annual receipts. Revenue may be taken from the regular books of account of the concern. If the office so elects or the firm has not kept regular books of account or the Internal Revenue Service has found such records to be inadequate and has reconstructed income of the concern, then revenue as shown on the Federal Income Tax return of the concern may be used in determining annual
receipts along with other information the office deems relevant.
(4) Number of employees. Where the size standard is "number of employees" size eligibility requires that the concern may not exceed the number of employees in that standard.
(a) "Number of employees" means that average employment of the concern, including the employees of its domestic and foreign affiliates, based upon employment during each of the pay periods for the preceding completed twelve calendar months.
(b) In computing average employment, part-time and temporary employees are counted as full-time employees for each applicable pay period.
(c) If a concern has not been in business for twelve months, "number of employees" means the average employment of the concern, including its affiliates, during each of the pay periods during which it has been in business.

Other factors (e.g., patents, contract awards, assets) may be considered.
(3) If the activities of the business encompass two or more ((SIC)) NAICS codes, the first ((SIC)) NAICS code listed in the directory is the primary industry classification of the business.
(4) A firm which exceeds the small business size limits after certification by the office shall be subject to ((deeertifieation)) graduation.
(5) For purposes of utilization on projects funded by any operating modal of the ((Federal Highway Administration-er under-The-Surface-Tramspertation and Uniform Relocation Assistafe Aet of 1987, (PL. 100-17, or STURAA) ) U.S. Department of Transportation the maximum dollar size standard set out in ((STURAA and)) 49 CFR Part ((z3)) 26 as may be amended or adjusted for inflation, shall apply, even if the size standard would otherwise be set by reference to number of employees. This standard is a ceiling. Certified businesses are still subject to applicable lower limits on business size as established by the United States Small Business Administration and these regulations.

Purpose: Add procedures for implementation of chapter 39.19 RCW related to the addition of SEDBE to the state certification program as requested by the 56th Legislature in Joint Memorial 8015. The addition allows the Office of Minority and Women's Business Enterprises (OMWBE) to include businesses that are owned and controlled by persons with disabilities to be certified without fiscal impact.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 39.19.210.
Statute Being Implemented: Chapter 39.19 RCW.
Summary: The OMWBE has the authority to include socially and economically disadvantaged individuals to the state certification program under chapter 39.19 RCW. Reasons Supporting Proposal: By unanimous vote during 2000 regular session of the 56th Legislature, Joint Memorial 8015 of the house and senate passed, requesting the addition of socially and economically disadvantaged individuals be added to the state certification program.

- Staff already trained using the DBE model.
- Increases the number of certified firms.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: An additional category of certification will be added to include persons with disabilities in the state certification program. OMWBE currently certifies socially and economically disadvantaged business enterprises for the United States Department of Transportation DBE program. OMWBE will essentially adopt the federal rules concerning socially and economically disadvantaged for the state certification program.

WAC 326-02-010 Purpose. The purpose and intent of chapter 120, Laws of 1983, and of Title 326 WAC is to provide the maximum practicable opportunity for increased par-
ticipation by minority ((and)), women, and socially and economically disadvantaged-owned and controlled businesses in public works and the process by which goods and services are procured by state agencies and educational institutions from the private sector. This purpose will be accomplished by encouraging the full use of existing minority ((and)), women, and socially and economically disadvantaged-owned and controlled businesses and the entry of new and diversified minority ((and)) $)_{2}$ women, and socially and economically dis-advantaged-owned and controlled businesses into the marketplace. These rules shall be applied and interpreted to promote this purpose.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 96-24-085, filed $12 / 3 / 96$, effective $1 / 3 / 97$ )

WAC 326-02-030 Definitions. Words and terms used in this title shall have the same meaning as each has under chapter 120 , Laws of 1983 , unless otherwise specifically provided in this title, or the context in which they are used clearly indicates that they should be given some other meaning.
(1) "Advisory committee" means the advisory committee on minority ((and)), women(('s)), and socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business enterprises.
(2) "Broker" means a person that provides a bona fide service, such as professional, technical, consultant, brokerage, or managerial services and assistance in the procurement of essential personnel, facilities, equipment, materials, or supplies required for performance of a contract.
(3) "Certified business" or "certified" means a business or the status of a business that has been examined by the Washington state office of minority and women's business enterprises and deemed to be a minority business enterprise (MBE), a women's business enterprise (WBE), a minority woman's business enterprise (MWBE), (( $\because$ ( ) ) a combination business enterprise (CBE), or socially and economically disadvantaged business enterprise (SEDBE).
(4) "Class of contract basis" means an entire group of contracts having a common characteristic. Examples include, but are not limited to, personal service contracts, public works contracts, leases, purchasing contracts, and contracts for specific types of goods and/or services.
(5) "Combination business enterprise" or "CBE" means a small business concern organized for profit, performing a commercially useful function, that is fifty percent owned and controlled by one or more minority men or MBEs certified by the office and fifty percent owned and controlled by one or more nonminority women or WBEs certified by the office. The owners must be United States citizens or lawful permanent residents.
(6) "Commercially useful function" means the performance of real and actual services which are integral and necessary in the discharge of any contractual endeavor, and not solely for the purpose of obtaining certification or obtaining credit for participation goal attainment.
(7) "Common industry practices" means those usages, customs, or practices which are ordinary, normal, or prevalent among businesses, trades, or industries of similar types
engaged in similar work in similar situations in the community.
(8) "Conduit" means a certified business which agrees to be named as a subcontractor on a contract in which such certified business does not perform the work but, rather, the work is performed by the prime contractor, prime consultant, material supplier, purchasing contractor, or any other noncertified business.
(9) "Contract" means a mutually binding legal relationship (including a purchase order, lease, or any modification thereof), which obligates the seller to furnish goods or services (including construction), and the buyer to pay for them.
(10) "Contract by contract basis" means a single contract within a specific class of contracts.
(11) "Contractor" means a party who enters into a contract directly with a state agency or educational institution.
(12) "Corporate-sponsored dealership" means a business that does not meet the requirements for certification but is participating in a program specifically developed by a national or regional corporation to address the present-day issue of lack of opportunities for minorities or women in the dealership industry.
(13) "Director" means the director of the office of minority and women's business enterprises.
(14) "Economically disadvantaged individuals" means socially disadvantaged individuals whose ability to compete in the free enterprise system has been impaired due to diminished capital and credit opportunities as compared to others in the same or similar line of business who are not socially disadvantaged.
(15) "Educational institutions" means the state universities, the regional universities, The Evergreen State College, and the community colleges.
$(((+5)))(16)$ "Front" means a business which purports to be eligible for certification but is not in fact legitimately owned and controlled by minorities, women, socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, or a combination thereof.
(((16))) (17) "Goods and/or services" means all goods and services, including professional services.
$(((17)))(18)$ "Graduation" means the business is no longer certified because it is no longer a small business concern.
(19) "Heavy construction" means construction other than building construction; e.g., highway or street, sewer and pipeline, railroad, communication and power line, flood control, irrigation, marine, etc.
$(((18)))(20)$ "Joint venture" means a partnership of two or more persons or businesses created to carry out a single business enterprise for profit, for which purpose they combine their capital, efforts, skills, knowledge or property and in which they exercise control and share in profits and losses in proportion to their contribution to the enterprise.
$(((19)))(21)$ "Legitimately owned and controlled" means that minorities, women, socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, or a combination thereof, own at least fifty-one percent interest in the business (unless the business qualifies as a corporate sponsored dealership under the provisions of subsection (12) of this section and WAC 326-20$050(4)$ ); and the minorities, women, socially and economi-
cally disadvantaged individuals, or combination thereof, possess and exercise sufficient expertise specifically in the firm's field of operation to make decisions governing the long-term direction and the day-to-day operations of the firm.
$(((20)))(22)$ "Manufacturer" means a business which owns, operates, or maintains a factory or establishment that produces or creates goods from raw materials or substantially alters goods before reselling them.
$(((21)))(23)$ "Minority" means a person who is a citizen or lawful permanent resident of the United States and who is:
(a) Black: Having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa;
(b) Hispanic: Of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish or Portuguese culture or origin, regardless of race;
(c) Asian American: Having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands; or
(d) American Indian or Alaskan Native: Having origins in any of the original peoples of North America.
(((22))) (24) "Minority business enterprise," "minorityowned business enterprise," or "MBE" means a small business concern, organized for profit, performing a commercially useful function, which is legitimately owned and controlled by one or more minority individuals or minority business enterprises certified by the office. The minority owners must be United States citizens or lawful permanent residents.
$(((23)))(25)$ "Minority women's business enterprise" or "MWBE" means a small-business concern, organized for profit, performing a commercially useful function, which is legitimately owned and controlled by one or more minority women and is certified by the office. The owners must be United States citizens or lawful permanent residents.
$(((24)))(26)$ "Office" means the office of minority and women's business enterprises of the state of Washington.
(((25))) (27) "Pass-through" means a certified business which buys goods from a noncertified business and simply resells those goods to the state, state contractors or other persons doing business with the state for the purpose of allowing those goods to be counted towards fulfillment of WBE or MBE goals.
$(((26)))(28)$ "Person" means one or more individuals, partnerships, associations, organizations, corporations, cooperatives, legal representatives, trustees and receivers, or any group of persons.
$(((27)))(29)$ "Personal net worth" means the socially and economically disadvantaged individual's net personal assets and liabilities, excluding an individual's ownership interest in the applicant firm and the individual's equity in his or her primary residence. If the statement of personal net worth that an individual submits shows that the individual's personal net worth exceeds seven hundred fifty thousand dollars, the individual's economic disadvantage is rebutted.
(30) "Procurement" means the purchase, lease, or rental of any goods or services.
(((28))) (31) "Public works" means all work, including construction, highway and ferry construction, alteration, repair, or improvement other than ordinary maintenance, which a state agency or educational institution is authorized or required by law to undertake.
$(((29)))(32)$ "Regular dealer" means a certified business that owns, operates, or maintains a store, warehouse or other establishment in which the materials or supplies required for the performance of the contract are bought, kept in stock, and regularly sold to the public in the usual course of business.
(((30))) (33) "Services(( $(9))$ " in the context of "goods and/or services," means all services including, but not limited to, client services, personal services, and purchased services as defined in RCW 39.29.006.
$(((34)))(34)$ "Socially disadvantaged individuals" means those individuals who have been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias within American society because of their identities as members of groups and without regard to their individual qualities. Social disadvantage must stem from circumstances beyond their control.
(35) "Socially and economically disadvantaged business enterprise" or "SEDBE" means a small-business concern, organized for profit, performing a commercially useful function, which is legitimately owned and controlled by one or more socially and economically disadvantaged individuals or socially and economically disadvantaged business enterprises certified by the office. The socially and economically disadvantaged owners must be United States citizens or lawful permanent residents.
(36) "Socially and economically disadvantaged individual" means a person who is a citizen or lawful permanent resident of the United States and who is:
(a) Found to be a socially and economically disadvantaged individual on a case-by-case basis by OMWBE; or
(b) A member of one of the following groups that are presumed to be socially and economically disadvantaged:
(i) Minority:
(ii) Women:
(iii) Any additional groups whose members are designated as socially and economically disadvantaged by the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), at such time as the SBA designation becomes effective.
(37) "State agency" includes the state of Washington and all agencies, departments, offices, divisions, boards, commissions, and correctional and other types of institutions. "State agency" does not include the judicial or legislative branches of government except to the extent that procurement or public works for these branches is performed by a state agency.
$(((32)))(38)$ "Subcontractor" means a party that indirectly provides goods or services, including but not limited to construction, to a state agency or educational institution through a contractor.
(((33))) (39) "Supplier" means a manufacturer or regular dealer that:
(a) Provides or furnishes goods or materials;
(b) Performs a commercially useful function; and
(c) Is not considered a conduit, front, pass-through or broker.
$(((34)))(40)$ "Switch business" means a business which was previously owned and controlled by a man, men or nonminorities, or individuals who are not socially and economically disadvantaged, which has made technical changes to its business structure so that it is now purportedly owned and controlled by a woman or women or by a minority person or persons, or by a socially and economically disadvantaged
individual or individuals, but continues to operate in substantially the same manner as it did prior to the written revisions of the business structure.
(((35))) (41) "Women's business enterprise," "womenowned business enterprise," or "WBE" means a small business concern, organized for profit, performing a commercially useful function, which is legitimately owned and controlled by one or more women or women's business enterprises certified by the office. The women owners must be United States citizens or lawful permanent residents.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-02-040 Prohibited activities with regard to chapter 39.19 RCW. (1) RCW 39.19.080 makes it unlawful for a person, firm, corporation, business, union, or other organization to:
(a) Prevent or interfere with a contractor's or subcontractor's compliance with this chapter, or any rule adopted under this chapter;
(b) Submit false or fraudulent information to the state concerning compliance with this chapter or any such rule;
(c) Fraudulently obtain, retain, attempt to obtain or retain, or aid another in fraudulently obtaining or retaining or attempting to obtain or retain certification as a minority $((\Theta f))_{2}$ women $((' s)$ ), or socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business enterprise for the purpose of this chapter;
(d) Knowingly make a false statement, whether by affidavit, verified statement, report, or other representation, to a state official or employee for the purpose of influencing the certification or denial of certification of any entity as a minority $((\mathrm{ef}))_{2}$ women( $(\mathrm{s})$ ), or socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business enterprise;
(e) Knowingly obstruct, impede, or attempt to obstruct or impede any state official or employee who is investigating the qualification of a business entity that has requested certification as a minority ((өf)), women( $(' s)$ ), or socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business enterprise;
(f) Fraudulently obtain, attempt to obtain, or aid another person in fraudulently obtaining or attempting to obtain public moneys to which the person is not entitled under this chapter;
(g) Knowingly make false statements that any entity is or is not certified as a minority ((өf)), women(('s)), or socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business enterprise for purposes of obtaining a contract governed by this chapter;
(h) To fail or refuse to comply with any provision of chapter 39.19 RCW or with a contract requirement established under this chapter.
(2) A certified business engages in prohibited activity when it fails to perform a commercially useful function on any public-sector contract or procurement. Failure to perform a commercially useful function occurs when a business:
(a) Functions as a conduit; or
(b) Functions as a pass-through; except brokers and firms operating in industries where such activity is common industry practice, e.g., insurance or real estate.
(3) A business that is deemed to be a switch business is also deemed to have engaged in prohibited activity.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-02-045 Factors considered in determining performance of commercially useful function. (1) In determining the performance of a commercially useful function, factors which may be considered include, but are not limited to, the following:
(a) Whether the work to be performed by the business is within the scope of work included in the Standard Industrial Classification code(s) under which the business is listed in the directory of certified businesses published by the office or in the records of the office.
(b) Whether the business could be considered a conduit, front, or pass-through;
(c) Whether the minority and/or woman and/or socially and economically disadvantaged individual owner(s) has the skill and expertise to perform the work for which the business is being or has been certified;
(d) Whether the business is or will be responsible for executing a distinct element of work in the performance of a contract; and the principals or employees of the business actually perform, manage, and supervise the work for which the business is or will be responsible;
(2) In addition, a business that functions as a supplier shall:
(a) Be the manufacturer of the goods or materials or assume the actual and contractual responsibility for furnishing the goods or materials and execute material changes in the configuration of those goods or materials; or
(b) Prior to submitting an application for certification, secure a contract or distributor agreement with a manufacturer to act as an independent authorized representative capable of passing on product warranties to the purchaser.
(3) Factors which may indicate that a supplier is not performing a commercially useful function include, but are not limited to, the following:
(a) A minimum amount of inventory is not maintained.
(b) Billing and shipping arrangements are performed by nonowners or staff of nonowners.
(c) A significant amount of deliveries are shipped directly from the producer or manufacturer to the end user.
(d) The firm does not take ownership of the product.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-24-107, filed $12 / 2 / 92$, effective $1 / 2 / 93$ )

WAC 326-07-030 Description of office organization. (1) The office is located at 406 South Water Street, Olympia, Washington 98504.
(2) The office consists of a director, ((deputy direetor;)) confidential secretary, support staff, and three divisions; certification, (( opment, and information services.
(3) The office provides the following services: Certification of businesses, monitoring agency/educational institution compliance with chapter 39.19 RCW and this title, publication of a list of certified businesses, identification of barriers
to participation by minority ((and)), women, and socially and economically disadvantaged-owned businesses in the contracting and procurement processes of state agencies and educational institutions, and development of a plan which ensures opportunities for qualified minority ((and)), women ${ }_{1}$ and socially and economically disadvantaged-owned businesses to participate.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed $5 / 11 / 92$, effective $6 / 11 / 92$ )

WAC 326-20-010 In general. (1) Any business which meets the definition of a minority business enterprise, a women's business enterprise, a minority woman's business enterprise, or a combination minority and women's business enterprise, or socially and economically disadvantaged business enterprise, or corporate-sponsored dealership as set forth in this title, is eligible to be certified by the state of Washington.
(2) It is not the intent of the program to encourage the participation of businesses owned and controlled by minorities, and/or women, and/or socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, who have not encountered practices which prohibited or limited their access to contract opportunities, markets, financing, and other resources, based on their race, ethnic origin, or sex, or disability.
(3) Notwithstanding the provisions in subsection (1) of this section, to be eligible for certification, any business applying for certification shall have obtained all licenses necessary to lawfully conduct business in the state of Washington.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 326-20-045 Proof of socially and economically disadvantaged status. The following guidance is adapted, with minor modifications, from the United States Small Business Administration's regulations concerning social and economic disadvantage determinations (see 13 CFR 124.103(c) and 124.104 ) and 49 CFR Part 26. Each nonpresumptive socially and economically disadvantaged owner of a business applying for certification shall submit with the application form the statement of personal net worth and social and economic disadvantage forms with documents which show that the owner is a socially and economically disadvantaged individual. The final determination will be in the sole discretion of the office.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 326-20-046 Proof of social disadvantage. (1) Evidence of individual social disadvantage must include the following elements:
(a) At least one objective distinguishing feature that has contributed to social disadvantage, such as race, ethnic origin, gender, disability, long-term residence in an environment isolated from the mainstream of American society, or other similar causes not common to individuals who are not socially disadvantaged;
(b) Personal experiences of substantial and chronic social disadvantage in American society, not in other countries; and
(c) Negative impact on entry into or advancement in the business world because of the disadvantage. The office will consider any relevant evidence in assessing this element. In every case, however, the office will consider education, employment and business history, where applicable, to see if the totality of circumstances shows disadvantage in entering into or advancing in the business world.
(i) Education. The office will consider such factors as denial of equal access to institutions of higher education and vocational training, exclusion from social and professional association with students or teachers, denial of educational honors rightfully earned, and social patterns or pressures which discouraged the individual from pursuing a professional or business education.
(ii) Employment. The office will consider such factors as unequal treatment in hiring, promotions and other aspects of professional advancement, pay and fringe benefits, and other terms and conditions of employment; retaliatory or discriminatory behavior by an employer or labor union; and social patterns or pressures which have channeled the individual into nonprofessional or nonbusiness fields.
(iii) Business history. The office will consider such factors as unequal access to credit or capital, acquisition of credit or capital under commercially unfavorable circumstances, unequal treatment in opportunities for government contracts or other work, unequal treatment by potential customers and business associates, and exclusion from business or professional organizations.
(2) With respect to subsection (1) of this section, the office notes that people with disabilities have disproportionately low incomes and high rates of unemployment. Many physical and attitudinal barriers remain to their full participation in education, employment, and business opportunities available to the general public. The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) was passed in recognition of the discrimination faced by people with disabilities. It is plausible that many individuals with disabilities-especially persons with severe disabilities (e.g., significant mobility, vision, or hearing impairments) -may be socially and economically disadvantaged.
(3) Under the laws concerning social and economic disadvantage, people with disabilities are not a group presumed to be disadvantaged. Nevertheless, the office shall look carefully at individual showings of disadvantage by individuals with disabilities, making a case-by-case judgment about whether such an individual meets the criteria of this section. Subject to Title II of the ADA, the office must also ensure its SEDBE programs are accessible to individuals with disabilities. For example, physical barriers or the lack of application and information materials in accessible formats cannot be permitted to thwart the access of potential applicants to the certification process or other services made available to SEDBEs and applicants.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 326-20-047 Proof of economic disadvantage. Evidence of individual social disadvantage must include the following elements:
(1) Submission of narrative and financial information.
(a) Each individual claiming economic disadvantage must describe the conditions, which are the basis for the claim in a narrative statement, and must submit personal financial information.
(b) When married, an individual claiming economic disadvantage also must submit separate financial information for his or her spouse, unless the individual and the spouse are legally separated.
(2) Factors to be considered. In considering diminished capital and credit opportunities, the office will examine factors relating to the personal financial condition of any individual claiming disadvantaged status, including personal income for the past two years (including bonuses and the value of company stock given in lieu of cash), personal net worth, and the fair market value of all assets, whether encumbered or not. The office will also consider the financial condition of the applicant compared to the financial profiles of small businesses in the same primary industry classification, or, if not available, in similar lines of business, which are not owned and controlled by socially and economically disadvantaged individuals in evaluating the individual's access to credit and capital. The financial profiles that the office will compare include total assets, net sales, pretax profit, sales/working capital ratio, and net worth.
(3) Transfers within two years.
(a) Except as set forth in (b) of this subsection, the office will attribute to an individual claiming disadvantaged status any assets which that individual has transferred to an immediate family member, or to a trust, a beneficiary of which is an immediate family member, for less than fair market value, within two years prior to a concern's application for participation in the program, unless the individual claiming disadvantaged status can demonstrate that the transfer is to or on behalf of an immediate family member for that individual's education, medical expenses, or some other form of essential support.
(b) The office will not attribute to an individual claiming disadvantaged status any assets transferred by that individual to an immediate family member that are consistent with the customary recognition of special occasions, such as birthdays, graduations, anniversaries, and retirements.
(c) In determining an individual's access to capital and credit, the office may consider any assets that the individual transferred within such two-year period described by (a) of this subsection that are not considered in evaluating the individual's assets and net worth (e.g., transfers to charities).

## NEW SECTION

WAC 326-20-048 Presumption of disadvantage. (1) The office presumes that citizens of the United States or lawfully admitted permanent residents who are women, African Americans, Hispanic Americans, Native Americans, AsianPacific Americans, Subcontinent Asian Americans, or other minorities found to be disadvantaged by the program, are
socially and economically disadvantaged individuals. Applicants are required to submit a signed, notarized certification that each disadvantaged owner is, in fact, socially and economically disadvantaged.
(2)(a) The office requires each individual nonpresumptive socially and economically disadvantaged owner of a firm applying to participate as a SEDBE whose ownership and control are relied upon for SEDBE certification to submit a signed, notarized statement of personal net worth, with appropriate supporting documentation.
(b) In determining net worth, the office excludes an individual's ownership interest in the applicant firm and the individual's equity in his or her primary residence (except any portion of such equity that is attributable to excessive withdrawals from the applicant firm). A contingent liability does not reduce an individual's net worth.
(i) Rebuttal of disadvantage. If the statement of personal net worth that an individual submits under this section shows that the individual's personal net worth exceeds seven hundred fifty thousand dollars, the individual's economic disadvantage is rebutted. The office is not required to have a proceeding under this section in order to rebut the presumption of economic disadvantage in this case.
(ii) When an individual's social and/or economic disadvantage has been rebutted, his or her ownership and control of the firm in question cannot be used for purposes of SEDBE eligibility under this section unless and until he or she makes an individual showing of social and/or economic disadvantage. If the basis for rebutting a determination that the individual's personal net worth exceeds seven hundred fifty thousand dollars, the individual is no longer eligible for participation in the program and cannot regain eligibility by making an individual showing of disadvantage.
(3) Individual determinations of social and economic disadvantage. Firms owned and controlled by individuals who are not presumed to be socially and economically disadvantaged may apply for SEDBE certification. The office makes a case-by-case determination of whether each individual whose ownership and control are relied upon for SEDBE certification is socially and economically disadvantaged. In such a proceeding, the applicant firm has the burden of demonstrating to the office, by a preponderance of the evidence, that the individuals who own and control it are socially and economically disadvantaged. An individual whose personal net worth exceeds seven hundred fifty thousand dollars shall not be deemed to be economically disadvantaged. In making these determinations, the office uses the guidance found in 49 CFR Part 26, Appendix E. The office requires that applicants provide sufficient information to permit determinations under the guidance of 49 CFR Part 26, Appendix E.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-20-050 Proof of ownership of business. (1) All minority ((өf)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owners shall submit to the office proof of their ownership of the requisite percentage of the business at the time the application is submitted. Such proof shall consist of stock certificates, a notarized affidavit of stock ownership
from the corporate treasurer, a partnership agreement, ((eaneelled)) canceled check used to purchase ownership, or other recognized proof of ownership. The ownership shall be real, substantial, and continuing, shall go beyond the pro forma ownership of the business reflected in the ownership documents, and shall be based on the owner's capital contribution. The minority, and/or women, and/or socially and economically disad vantaged owner(s) shall enjoy the customary incidents of ownership and shall share in the risks and profits commensurate with their ownership interests, as demonstrated by an examination of the substance and the form of the arrangements.
(2) In cases of sole proprietorships or other cases where documentary proof of ownership is not available, the minority ((ef)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owners shall so advise the office, which may undertake further investigation. The office may also require documents showing how and when the minority ( $(\theta f))_{2}$ women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owners' interest in the business was acquired.
(3) The office may, for any reason, require any minority ((өf)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owners to provide additional proof of, or information concerning, ownership. The office may request additional information regarding separate ownership of a business including, but not limited to, a separate property agreement.
(4) Ownership of a corporate-sponsored dealership shall be evaluated by using the following standards:
(a) The minority ((er)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) have entered into a written agreement, contract, or arrangement with a national or regional corporation and has been granted a license to offer, sell, or distribute goods or services at wholesale or retail, leasing, or otherwise use the name, service mark, trademark, or related characteristics of the sponsoring corporation.
(b) The capital investment for the dealership or business is jointly contributed by the minority (( $\odot$ )), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) and the sponsoring corporation.
(c) The original investment contributed by the minority ((өf)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) may be less than fifty-one percent, but must constitute at least twenty-five percent of the capitalization investment (total required equity capital) in the dealership corporation.
(d) A specified time limit of not more than ten years must be established, binding between the minority ( $(\Theta))_{2}$, women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) and the sponsoring corporation, within which the buy-out of the corporate sponsor's interest shall be complete.
(e) The sponsoring corporation must have specifically developed a national or regional corporate sponsored dealership program which includes such features as capitalization assistance from the sponsoring corporation, on-going business operations training, technical assistance to the dealership owner, and a corporate sponsored minority ((and)), women(('ss)), and socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business program.
(f) The minority ((өf)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must demonstrate that the rela-
tionship between the corporate sponsor and the minority $((\theta f))$, women(('s)), or socially and economically disadvantaged individual's business was not formed for the primary purpose of achieving certification under chapter 39.19 RCW, or any similar provision of any ordinance, regulation, rule, or law.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-20-070 Counting ownership held in trust. In determining whether the fifty-one percent ownership requirement is met, no stock or ownership held in trust shall be counted, except in the following cases:
(1) Where both the trustee and the beneficiary are minorities, or both are women, or both are socially and economically disadvantaged individuals, and the trustee meets the control requirement; or
(2) Where the stock or ownership is held in an irrevocable trust for the benefit of a minority ( $\left(\begin{array}{rl} \\ )\end{array}\right)$, a woman, or a socially and economically disadvantaged individual, and the minority ((ef)), woman, or socially and economically disadvantaged beneficiary meets the control requirement.

## AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-20-080 Factors considered in determining control. (1) The minority ((er)), woman, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must possess and exercise managerial and operational control over the day-to-day affairs of the business.
(a) Managerial control. The minority ((er)), woman, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) has the demonstrable ability to make independent and unilateral business decisions needed to guide the future and direction of the firm.
(b) Operational control. The minority (( $\theta \mathrm{f}))_{2}$, woman $\boldsymbol{n}_{2}$ or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) has the demonstrable ability to independently make basic decisions pertaining to the daily operations of the business.
(2) Whether a minority (( $\because f)$ ), woman, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner meets the control requirement is determined on an application-by-application basis. Office management, clerical, or other experience unrelated to the firm's field of operations, is insufficient to establish that the business is legitimately owned and controlled.
(3) Factors which may be considered in determining whether the minority ((ef)), woman, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner meets the control requirement include, but are not limited to, the following:
(a) Authority and restrictions as indicated in the articles of incorporation, bylaws, partnership agreements and/or other business agreements and documents;
(b) The financial interest and/or participation in any other business by any owner or key personnel;
(c) Past and current employment history of minority and women owners involved in the business;
(d) Members of the board of directors and corporate officers;
(e) Experience, training, and expertise of any owners and key personnel;
(f) Recent changes in ownership and/or control of the business;
(g) Financial obligation to and capital contributions from owners and nonowners of the business; and
(h) Documentation indicating who has ultimate authority to make policy and management decisions and to legally obligate the business.
(4) If persons who are not minorities ((er)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged are disproportionately responsible for the operation of the business, then the business is not eligible for certification.
(5) The requirements of this section shall not apply, if the business qualifies as a corporate-sponsored dealership under the provisions of WAC 326-20-050(4). Control of a corpo-rate-sponsored dealership will be evaluated using the following standards:
(a) If the sponsoring corporation retains majority voting rights and control of the board of directors, then the minority ((er)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must annually apply at least fifty percent of the net profit and bonuses toward the buy-out of the corporate sponsors' interest within the buy-out time limit established with the corporation.
(b) The minority ((өr)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must show active participation in the decision-making process on the board of directors of the dealership.
(c) The minority (( $\oplus \mathrm{f}))_{2}$ women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must have and exercise managerial and operational control over the day-to-day management of the dealership, with responsibility for sales, service volume, and profits.
(d) The minority ((er)), women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must have prior business or management experience relating to the business being entered into as an owner.
(e) The minority $((\Theta f))_{2}$ women, or socially and economically disadvantaged owner(s) must be president of any corporation formed by the business.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 92-11-007, filed 5/11/92, effective 6/11/92)

WAC 326-20-110 Application process. (1) The office will develop and make available an application form for certification under chapter 39.19 RCW, and WAC 326-20-010. The application form may be modified at any time. The form will solicit enough information to determine whether the applicant is eligible for certification for state-funded projects and may include supplemental questions necessary to determine whether the applicant is eligible for certification for a specific federally-funded project. As part of its investigation, the office may require minority ((and)), women, and socially and economically disadvantaged owners to provide information in addition to that requested on the application forms.
(2) Where additional information is required from the applicant business to complete the investigation, the office may request the information in writing and may impose a
time limit of not more than twenty days in which the applicant must respond. The letter shall include notice to the applicant that, if the applicant fails to provide the information within the time requested, the file will be closed administratively. If all the requested information is not received by the office within the twenty days, the office may administratively close the file. The applicant will be notified in writing that the file has been administratively closed.
(3) Upon timely receipt of a written request for extension of the time to respond to the request for additional information, an extension of time to respond may be granted by the director. A showing of extenuating circumstances may be required, and granting of such request for extension is in the sole discretion of the director.
(4) Administrative closure means that the file is placed in inactive status, and further processing of the application is suspended. An applicant may petition the office for reopening or reactivation of the application file, by written request to the director. Requests to reopen will be granted in the sole discretion of the director. The applicant will be notified in writing of the director's decision to grant or deny the request to reactivate the file. If the request is denied, the applicant may submit a new application: Provided, That an applicant may not file more than one additional application within a year from the date of the closure. Each punch board and pull-tab series purchased or otherwise obtained by an operator shall be controlled and accounted for. Each operator shall closely monitor punch board and pull-tab series purchased to assure that Washington state identification and inspection service stamp numbers are correctly entered in all records and each device purchased is properly recorded. The following control procedures apply:

## Delivery of new games.

(1) The delivery/receipt of punch boards and pull-tab series shall be recorded as follows:

## Invoice record.

(a) All purchases of punch boards or pull-tab series shall be recorded on a standard distributor's invoice, which will be used by the operator as a record to account for the punch board or pull-tab series between the time it is purchased and removed from play. Each invoice shall include space for the operator to attach the records entry label from the device and the date the device was placed out for play: Provided, That in lieu of the distributor's invoice recording system, licensees utilizing a computerized recordkeeping system may use a
separate inventory record to account for purchases and uses of punch boards and pull-tabs as long as all necessary information is recorded. For these records, a computer generated facsimile of the stamp number may be imprinted on the inventory record in lieu of a records entry label.

## Operator to review data and check ID stamps.

(b) At the time a punch board or pull-tab series is delivered, each operator will assure that all required data is correctly recorded by the distributor by comparing the actual Washington state identification and inspection services stamp number attached to each punch board and pull-tab series to the number recorded on the purchase invoice;

## Invoice/inventory record - placing new games into play.

(2) At the time a punch board or pull-tab series is placed into play or permanently removed from play, each operator shall record in the allotted space on the distributor's invoice or the inventory record the following:
(a) Date placed into play; and
(b) Washington state identification and inspection services stamp number by attaching a records entry label.

## Retention requirements.

(3) Each punch board or pull-tab series which is removed from play, together with the prize flare, all unplayed tabs, and all winning punches or tabs, shall be retained by the operator and made available for inspection, on the licensed premises, by commission agents and/or local law enforcement and taxing agencies. If devices are stored off premises, they must be produced for inspection upon demand. The minimum retention time for devices removed from play shall be:

## Charitable.

(a) Charitable or nonprofit licensees - at least four months following the last day of the month in which the device was removed from play;

## Commercial.

(b) Commercial stimulant licensees - at least two months following the last day of the month in which the device was removed from play: Provided, That the flare and all winning punches or pull-tabs in excess of twenty dollars shall be retained for at least ninety days following the day the device was removed from play: Provided further, That any commercial stimulant licensee who fails to comply with all recordkeeping requirements of this title or who misstates gross gambling receipts by more than one percent during any calendar quarter shall be required, after written notification by the director, to retain all devices for at least four months following the last day of the month in which it was removed from play. Any licensee so restricted may petition the director to remove the increased retention requirement imposed after a minimum of one year. Any such petition shall include documentation of the steps taken to correct recordkeeping deficiencies. For purposes of computing gross gambling receipts for determining compliance with the recording accuracy requirement, the procedures in subsection (6) of this section apply; and

## Specially authorized games.

(c) Specially authorized pull-tab series may have retention requirements in addition to those set forth in subsections (a) and (b) of this section.

## Storage requirements.

(4) Each punch board or pull-tab series which is not placed out for play must be retained on the licensed premises and made available for inspection by the commission and/or local law enforcement and taxing agencies: Provided, That devices may be stored off premises if they are produced for inspection upon demand;

## Returning a game to the distributor or manufacturer.

(5) Each punch board or pull-tab series which has been placed out for play and is subsequently returned to a distributor or manufacturer is exempt from the retention requirements in subsection (3) of this section. The operator must retain a copy of the quality control report for the retention period normally applicable and must record each game on its monthly record required by WAC $230-08-010$. If a device is returned to a distributor for any reason, including commission required recall, the operator shall record the date, invoice or credit memo number, and "returned" on the original purchase invoice or inventory record on the corresponding entry for the device;

## Adjusting gross gambling receipts.

(6) For purposes of compliance with the requirements of this section and license class compliance, gross gambling receipts from the operation of punch boards and pull-tabs shall be adjusted for commission staff audit findings by using the following procedures:
(a) Unrecorded devices - gross gambling receipts shall be increased to account for any unrecorded devices purchased by an operator by adding the maximum amount that could be generated from the device, as determined by multiplying the total number of chances available by the price of a single chance. The adjustment shall be made to the records for the month in which the device was purchased; and
(b) Recording errors - gross gambling receipts shall be increased or decreased by an adjustment factor that is based upon the results of an audit of a sample of at least five devices randomly selected by the commission staff. The adjustment factor shall be determined by dividing the audited amount for the sample group of devices by the recorded amount for the same devices. The resulting product of this equation shall be applied to the total recorded gross gambling receipts for the calendar quarter from which the sample was taken and to the immediately preceding three quarters.

Reasons Supporting Proposal: The proposed rules will help the department address budget issues and the health and safety of children.

Other changes relate to an increase in consumer copayments, removal of some payments for WCCC services, detailed explanation of payments for children with special needs care, and in-home/relative care requirements. These changes should assist in budget issues and assist in determining correct payment and qualified providers' clients must use to remain eligible for WCCC.

Some WAC were separated into two or more new WAC for clarity, such as "rights and responsibilities for consumers" was separated from one to two sections. New WAC are added to assist workers and consumers understand the pro-
cess more fully, such as, what do consumers verify and what happens when a denial letter is sent.

Proposal Changes the Following Existing Rules: Changes were made in consumer eligibility (activities and income), copayments, payments for WCCC services inhome/relative eligibility, consumer rights and responsibilities, overpayments and the definition of family size.

No small business economic impact statement has been prepared under chapter 19.85 RCW . This rule does not impose more than minor costs to small business.

RCW 34.05.328 does not apply to this rule adoption. Proposed WAC 388-290-0005 through 388-290-0125, 388-290-255, 388-290-270 and 388-290-271 relate to client financial eligibility for WCCC services, and are exempt from preparing a cost benefit analysis under RCW 34.05.328 (5)(b)(vii), which states in part: "This section does not apply to... rules of the department of social and health services relating to client medical and financial eligibility."

(c) Diagnosed as ((mentally retarded)) having mental retardation based on a full scale score of seventy or lower on the Wechsler adult intelligence scale (WAIS);
(d) At least ((sixty-five)) sixty-four years old and seven months;
(e) Eligible for long-term care services from aging and ((adult)) disability services administration; or
(f) Approved ((by)) through the progressive evaluation process (PEP).
(2) We consider you to be incapacitated for ninety days (ffollowing your release frem:
(a) An inpatient psychiatric treatmentacility if:
(i) You directly participate in outpatient mental health treatment; and
(ii) The release frem in patient treatment was ne against medieal adviee)) after:
(a) You are released from inpatient treatment for a mental impairment if:
(i) The release from inpatient treatment was not against medical advice; and
(ii) There is no break in your participation between inpatient and outpatient treatment of your mental impairment.
(b) You are released from a medical institution where you received long-term care services from the aging and (( $\quad$ dult)) disability services administration,
(c) The Social Security Administration stops your Supplemental Security Income payments because you are not a citizen.

WAC 388-436-0002 If my family has an emergency, can I get help from DSHS to get or keep our housing or utilities? DSHS has a program called additional requirements for emergent needs (AREN). If your family has an emergency and you need ( $($ ane-timent pryment) ) assistance to get or keep safe housing or utilities, you may be eli-
gible. The special AREN payment is in addition to the regular monthly cash grant your family may already get.
(1) To get AREN, you must:
(a) Be eligible for temporary assistance for needy families (TANF), state family assistance (SFA), or refugee cash assistance (RCA);
(b) Have an emergency housing or utility need; and
(c) Have a good reason that you do not have enough money to pay your housing or utility costs.
(2) To get AREN, you must be eligible for TANF, SFA, or RCA. This means you must:
(a) Get benefits through TANF, SFA, or RCA. For RCA you must also be pregnant or have an eligible child; or
(b) Apply for TANF, SFA, and RCA, and meet all eligibility criteria including:
(i) The maximum earned income limit under WAC 388-478-0035;
(ii) The requirement that your unearned income not exceed the grant payment standard;
(iii) The requirement that your countable income as defined under WAC 388-450-0162 must be below the payment standard in WAC 388-478-0020 when you have both earned income and unearned income;
(iv) The resource limits under chapter 388-470 WAC;
(v) The program summary rules for either TANF (WAC 388-400-0005); SFA (WAC 388-400-0010); or RCA (WAC 388-400-0030); and
(vi) The requirement that you must be pregnant or have an eligible child.
(3) If you do not get or do not want to get TANF, SFA or RCA, you cannot get AREN to help with ((ene-time)) housing or utility costs. We will look to see if you are eligible for diversion cash assistance (DCA) under WAC 388-432-0005.
(4) To get AREN, you must have an emergency housing or utility need. You may get AREN to help pay to:
(a) Prevent eviction or foreclosure;
(b) Get housing if you are homeless or need to leave your home because of domestic violence;
(c) Hook up or prevent a shut off of utilities related to your health and safety. We consider the following utilities to be needed for health and safety:
(i) Electricity or fuel for heating, lighting, or cooking;
(ii) Water;
(iii) Sewer; and
(iv) Basic local telephone service if it is necessary for your basic health and safety. If you receive TANF or SFA, the Washington telephone assistance program (WTAP) may be used to help you pay for basic local telephone service.
(d) Repair damage or defect to your home when it causes a risk to your health or safety:
(i) If you own the home, we may approve AREN for the least expensive method of ending the risk to your health or safety;
(ii) If you do not own the home, you must ask the landlord in writing to fix the damage according to the Residential Landlord-Tenant Act at chapter 59.18 RCW . If the landlord refuses to fix the damage or defect, we may pay for the repair or pay to move you to a different place whichever cost is lower.
(e) If you receive TANF or SFA, WorkFirst support services under WAC 388-310-0800 may be used to help you relocate to new housing to get a job, keep a job, or participate in WorkFirst activities. Nonhousing expenses $\left(\bar{G}_{j}\right)$ ) that are not covered under AREN( $(\underset{;}{ })$ ) may be paid under WorkFirst support services. This includes expenses such as car repair, diapers, or clothing.
(5) To get AREN, you must have a good reason for not having enough money to pay for your housing or utility costs. You must prove that you:
(a) Did not have money available that you normally use to pay your rent and utilities due to an emergency situation that reduced your income (such as a long-term illness or injury);
(b) Had to use your money to pay for necessary or emergency expenses. Examples of necessary or emergency expenses include:
(i) Basic health and safety needs for shelter, food and clothing;
(ii) Medical care;
(iii) Dental care needed to get a job or because of pain;
(iv) Emergency child care;
(v) Emergency expenses due to a natural disaster, accident, or injury; and
(vi) Other reasonable and necessary expenses.
(c) Are currently homeless; or
(d) Had your family's cash grant reduced or suspended when we budgeted your expected income for the month, but the income will not be available to pay for the need when the payment is due. You must make attempts to negotiate later payments with your landlord or utility company before you can get AREN.
(6) In addition to having a good reason for not having enough money to pay for your costs, you must also explain how you will afford to pay for the on-going need in the future. We may deny AREN if your expenses exceed your income (if you are living beyond your means). We may approve AREN to help you get into housing you can afford.
(7) If you meet the above requirements, we decide the amount we will pay based on the following criteria.
(a) AREN payments may be made up to a maximum of ((fifteen hundred-dollars)) seven hundred fifty dollars in a consecutive twelve-month period.

(d) The amount of AREN is in addition to the amount of your monthly TANF, SFA, or RCA cash grant.
$(((d)))($ e) We will decide the lowest amount we must pay to end your housing or utility emergency. We will contact your landlord, utility company, or other vendor for information to make this decision. We may take any of the following steps when deciding the lowest amount to pay:
(i) We may ask you to arrange a payment plan with your landlord or utility company. This could include us making a partial payment, and you setting up a plan for you to repay the remaining amount you owe over a period of time.
(ii) We may have you use some of the money you have available in cash, checking, or savings to help pay for the expense. We will look at the money you have available as well as your bills when we decide how much we will pay.
(iii) We may consider income that is excluded or disregarded for cash assistance benefit calculations, such as SSI, as available to meet your emergency housing need.
(iv) We may consider money other individuals such as family or friends voluntarily give you. We will not count loans of money that you must repay to friends or family members.
(v) We may consider money from a nonneedy caretaker relative that lives in the home.
(vi) We may look at what other community resources you currently have to help you with your need.
(( $(8)$ Starting August 1,2000 , yeur family can get AREN fer your-mergency housing-or utility needs for one thirty day period every twelve months:
(a) The thirty day period stafts on the date we issue your first $A$ REN payment and lasts thirty censeetive days.

(2) Is in foster care.
"Live-in attendant" means a person who lives in the home and provides medical, housekeeping, childcare, or similar personal services an $A U$ member needs because:
(1) A member is aged, incapacitated, or disabled;
(2) A member of the $A U$ is ill; or
(3) A minor child in the $A U$ needs childcare.
"Parent" means a natural, step, or adoptive parent. A stepparent is not a parent to a child if the marriage to the child's natural parent ends due to divorce or death.

A person who lives with you pays a "reasonable amount" for meals if:
(1) You provide two or more meals a day and they pay at least the maximum allotment under WAC 388-478-0060 for their $A U$ size; or
(2) You provide one meal a day and they pay at least two-thirds the maximum allotment under WAC 388-4780060 for their AU size.
"Roomer" means a person who pays for lodging, but not meals;

A person has a "separate residence" from an AU if they have separate living, cooking, and sanitation facilities.
"Spouse" means your husband or wife through a legally recognized marriage.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 03-19-118, filed 9/16/03, effective 11/1/03)

WAC 388-408-0035 Who is in my assistance unit for basic food? (1) For basic food, a person must be in your assistance unit (AU) if they live in the same home as you and:
(a) Usually buy and fix food with you; or
(b) You provide meals for them and they pay less than a reasonable amount for meals.
(2) If the following people live with you, they must be in your AU even if you do not usually buy and fix food together:
(a) Your spouse;
(b) Your parents if you are under age twenty-two (even if you are married);
(c) Your children under age twenty-two;
(d) The parent of a child who must be in your $\mathrm{AU}_{\text {; }}$
(e) A child under age eighteen who doesn't live with their parent unless the child:
(i) Is emancipated;
(ii) Gets a TANF grant in their own name; or
(iii) Is not financially dependent on an adult in the AU because they get and have control of income of at least the TANF payment standard under WAC $388-478-0020$ (2) before taxes or other withholdings.
(3) If you live in an institution where you may be eligible for basic food under WAC 388-408-0040, we decide who is in your AU as follows:
(a) If the facility is acting as your authorized representative under WAC 388-460-0015, we include you and anyone who must be in your $A U$ under subsection (2) of this rule; or
(b) If you apply for benefits on your own, we include you, anyone who must be in your AU under subsection (2) of this rule, and other residents you choose to apply with.
(4) Anyone who must be in your AU under subsection (1) or (2) is an ineligible AU member if they:
(a) Are disqualified for an intentional program violation (IPV) under WAC 388-446-0015;
(b) Do not meet ABAWD work requirements under WAC 388-444-0030.
(c) Do not meet work requirements under WAC 388-444-0055;
(d) Do not provide a social security number under WAC 388-476-0005;
(e) Do not meet the citizenship or alien status requirements under chapter 388-424 WAC;
(f) Are fleeing a felony charge or violating a condition of parole or probation under WAC 388-442-0010;
(g) Are disqualified for a drug-related felony under WAC 388-442-0010.
(5) If your $A U$ has an ineligible member:
(a) We count the ineligible member's income to your AU under WAC 388-450-0140;
(b) We count all the ineligible members resources to your AU; and
(c) We do not use the ineligible member to determine your AU's size for the maximum income amount or allotment under WAC 388-478-0060.
(6) If the following people live in the same home as you, you can choose if we include them in your AU :
(a) A permanently disabled person who is age sixty or over and cannot make their own meals if the total income of everyone else in the home (not counting the elderly and disabled person's spouse) is not more than the one hundred sixty-five percent standard under WAC 388-478-0060;
(b) A boarder. If you do not include a boarder in your AU , the boarder cannot get basic food benefits in a separate AU;
(c) A person placed in your home for foster care. If you do not include this person in your $A U$, they cannot get basic food benefits in a separate AU;
(d) Roomers; or
(e) Live-in attendants even if they buy and fix food with you.
(7) If someone in your AU is out of your home for a full issuance month, they are not eligible for benefits as a part of your AU.
(8) If someone received basic food or food stamps in another AU or another state, they cannot receive benefits in your $A U$ for the same period of time with one exception. If you already received basic food or food stamp benefits:
(a) In another state, you are not eligible for basic food for the period of time covered by the benefits you received from the other state; or
(b) In another AU , you are not eligible for basic food in a different AU for the same period of time;
(c) In another AU, but you left the AU to live in a shelter for battered women and children under WAC 388-408-0045, you may be eligible to receive benefits in a separate AU.
(9) The following people who live in your home are not members of your AU. If they are eligible for basic food, they may be a separate AU:
(a) Someone who usually buys and fixes food separately from your AU if they are not required to be in your AU ; or
(b) Someone who lives in a separate residence.
(10) A student who is ineligible for basic food under WAC 388-482-0005 is not a member of your AU.

WAC 314-02-105 What is a beer and/or wine specialty store license? (1) Per RCW 66.24.371, a beer and/or wine specialty store license allows a licensee to sell beer and/or wine for off-premises consumption.
(2) The annual fee for this license is one hundred dollars.
(3) To obtain and maintain a beer and/or wine specialty store license, the premises must be stocked with an inventory of beer and/or wine in excess of three thousand dollars wholesale value. This inventory must be:
(a) Stocked within the confines of the licensed premises; and
(b) Maintained on the premises at all times the premises is licensed, with the exception of beginning and closing inventory for seasonal operations or when the inventory is being sold out immediately prior to discontinuing or selling the business.
(4) A beer and/or wine specialty store licensee may allow customers to sample beer and wine for the purpose of sales promotion, if the primary business is the sale of beer and/or wine at retail. A licensee's gross retail sales of beer and/or wine must exceed fifty percent of all gross sales for the entire business. Sampling may be conducted under the following conditions:
(a) No more than a total of eight ounces of alcohol may be provided to a customer during any one visit to the premises;
$(((\mathrm{A})))(\mathrm{b})$ Each sample must be two ounces or less; and
(( (e) No more than four samples may be provided to-a eustomer during any one-visit to the premises; and))
(c) No more than one sample of any single brand and type of beer or wine may be provided to a customer during any one visit to the premises.
(5) A beer and/or wine specialty store licensee may sell beer in kegs or other containers holding at least four gallons and less than five and one-half gallons of beer. See WAC 314-02-115 regarding keg registration requirements.

(a) The name of the trainee;

(d) The instructor's name and signature; and
(e) The date(s) of training.
(2) The trainee must be given an original certificate. Home care agencies must keep a copy of the certificate on file.

The modified basic learning outcomes and competencies may be obtained from the DSHS aging and ((adult)) disability services administration.

(b) Must have forty hours of teaching while being mentored by an instructor who meets these qualifications, and must attend a class on adult education that meets the requirements of WAC ( $(388-71-05951))$ 388-71-05899.
(4) The instructor must be experienced in caregiving practices and capable of demonstrating competency with respect to the course content or units being taught;
(5) Instructors who will administer tests must have experience or training in assessment and competency testing; and
(6) If required under WAC ((388-71-05923)) 388-7105730 or ( $(388-71-05929)$ ) $388-71-05760$, instructors must successfully complete basic or modified basic training prior to beginning to train others.

WAC 388-71-05951 What physical resources are required for basic (( $\theta$ ) $)$, modified basic, or nurse delegation core classroom training and testing? ## EMERGENCY ACTIONS

## NEW SECTION

WAC 148-120-400 Emergency expulsion - Limitations. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, a student may be expelled immediately by the superintendent or a designee of the superintendent in emergency situations: Provided, That the superintendent or designee has good and sufficient reason to believe that the student's presence poses
an immediate and continuing danger to the student, other students, or school personnel or an immediate and continuing threat of substantial disruption of the educational process. An emergency expulsion shall continue until rescinded by the superintendent or his or her designee, or until modified or reversed pursuant to the hearing provisions set forth in WAC 148-120-410 or the appeal provisions set forth in WAC 148-120-415.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 148-120-405 Emergency expulsion — Notice of hearing - Waiver of hearing right. (1) The student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be notified of the emergency expulsion of the student and of their opportunity for a hearing either (a) by hand delivering written notice to the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) within twenty-four hours of the expulsion and documenting delivery by obtaining his or her signature acknowledging receipt or the written certification of the person making the delivery, or (b) by certified letter(s) deposited in the United States mail, within twenty-four hours of the expulsion: Provided, That if the emergency expulsion is based upon a failure to comply with the state immunization law (see chapter 180-38 WAC), the notice must be received by the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) prior to the emergency expulsion of the student regardless of the method of delivery. In addition, if the notice is by certified letter, reasonable attempts shall be made to notify the student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) by telephone or in person as soon as reasonably possible. Such written and oral notice shall:
(a) Be provided in the predominant language of a student and/or a parent(s) or guardian(s) who predominantly speak a language other than English, to the extent feasible,
(b) Specify the alleged reason(s) for the emergency expulsion,
(c) Set forth the corrective action or punishment taken and proposed,
(d) Set forth the right of the student and/or his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) to a hearing for the purpose of contesting the allegation(s) as soon as reasonably possible, and
(e) Set forth the facts that:
(i) A written (or "oral" if provided for by school policy) request for a hearing must be received by the school employee designated, or by his or her office, on or before the expiration of the tenth school business day after receipt of the notice of opportunity for a hearing, and
(ii) If such a request is not received within the prescribed period of time, then the right to a hearing may be deemed to have been waived and the emergency expulsion may be continued as deemed necessary by the school without any further opportunity for the student or his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) to contest the matter. A schedule of "school business days" potentially applicable to the exercise of such hearing right should be included with the notice.
(2) The student and/or his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) shall reply to the notice of opportunity for a hearing and request a hearing within ten school business days after the date of receipt of the notice. A request for a hearing shall be provided to the school employee specified in the notice of
opportunity for a hearing, or to his or her office. A request for a hearing shall be accepted if in writing and may be accepted orally if expressly provided for and allowed by rule of the school.
(3) If a request for a hearing is not received within the required ten school business day period, the school may deem the student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) to have waived the right to a hearing and the emergency expulsion may be continued as deemed necessary by the school district.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 148-120-410 Emergency expulsion - Prehearing and hearing process. (1) If a request for a hearing within the required ten school business days is received pursuant to WAC 148-120-405, the school shall immediately schedule and give notice of a hearing to commence as soon as reasonably possible and in no case later than the third school business day after receipt of the request for hearing.
(2) The student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) shall have the right to:
(a) Inspect in advance of the hearing any documentary and other physical evidence which the school district intends to introduce at the hearing,
(b) Be represented by legal counsel,
(c) Question and confront witnesses, unless a school witness does not appear and the nonappearance of the witness is excused by the person(s) hearing the case based upon evidence of good reason for doing so submitted by the school. The evidence submitted by the school must at a minimum establish either:
(i) That the school made a reasonable effort to produce the witness and is unable to do so; or,
(ii) That it is not advisable for the student to appear due to an expectation and fear on the part of the responsible school official(s) or the student of retaliation against the student if he or she appears as a witness,
(d) Present his or her explanation of the alleged misconduct, and
(e) Make such relevant showings by way of witnesses and the introduction of documentary and other physical evidence as he or she desires.
(3) The designee(s) of the school assigned to present the school's case and/or the assistant attorney general shall have the right to inspect in advance of the hearing any documentary and other physical evidence that the student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) intend to introduce at the hearing.
(4) The person(s) hearing the case shall not be a witness and the guilt or innocence of the student shall be determined solely on the basis of the evidence presented at the hearing.
(5) Either a tape-recorded or verbatim record of the hearing shall be made.
(6) Within one school business day after the date upon which the hearing concludes, a decision as to whether or not the expulsion shall be continued shall be rendered, and the student's legal counsel or, if none, the student and his or her parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be notified thereof by depositing a certified letter in the United States mail. The decision shall set forth the findings of fact, the conclusions (including a conclusion as to whether or not the emergency situation
giving rise to the emergency expulsion continues), and whether or not the emergency expulsion shall be continued or a lesser form of corrective action or punishment is to be imposed.
(7) An emergency expulsion may be continued following the hearing on the basis that the emergency situation continues and/or as corrective action or punishment for the action(s) giving rise to the emergency expulsion in the first instance.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 148-120-415 Appeals - Long-term suspension and expulsion. Appeals from decisions rendered pursuant to WAC 148-120-236 and 148-120-410 which impose either a long-term suspension or an expulsion upon a student shall be governed as follows:
(1) Appeals may be heard and decided by a disciplinary appeal council established by the Board. The disciplinary appeal council shall be appointed by the school board of trustees for fixed terms and shall consist of not less than three persons.
(2) If an appeal is not taken to the disciplinary appeal council within the required three school business day period, the suspension or expulsion decided upon may be imposed as of the calendar day following expiration of the three school business day period.
(3) If a timely appeal is taken to the disciplinary appeal council, the suspension or expulsion may be imposed during the appeal period subject to the following conditions and limitations:
(a) A long-term suspension or nonemergency expulsion may be imposed during the appeal period for no more than ten consecutive school days or until the appeal is decided, whichever is the shortest period;
(b) An emergency expulsion may be continued during the appeal period for so long as the student continues to pose an immediate and continuing danger to the student, other students, or school personnel or an immediate and continuing threat of substantial disruption of the educational process of the student's school;
(c) Any days that a student is temporarily suspended or expelled before the appeal is decided shall be applied to the term of the student's suspension or expulsion and shall not limit or extend the term of the student's suspension or expulsion; and
(d) Any student subjected to a temporary suspension who returns to school before the appeal is decided shall be provided the opportunity upon his or her return to make up assignments and tests missed by reason of the suspension if:
(i) Such assignments or tests have a substantial effect upon the student's semester or trimester grade or grades; or
(ii) Failure to complete such assignments or tests would preclude the student from receiving credit for the course or courses.
(4) An appeal from any decision of the disciplinary appeal council to impose or to affirm the imposition of a long-term suspension or an expulsion shall be to the courts. Whether or not the decision of the disciplinary appeal council shall be postponed pending an appeal to superior court shall
be discretionary with the school board or disciplinary appeal council except as ordered otherwise by a court.

WAC 415-104-245 Am I required to meet minimum medical and health standards in order to establish or reestablish Plan ( $(\mathbf{\pm})$ ) 1 membership? (1) You may be required to meet minimum medical and health standards in order to establish or reestablish Plan ( $(\mathbf{(})$ ) $\underline{1}$ membership.

You are required to meet minimum medical and health standards codified in WAC 415-104-500 through 415-104755, if you:
(a) Were first employed as a law enforcement officer or fire fighter on or after August 1, 1971, and before October 1, 1977; and
(b) Have been separated from service for more than six months for reasons other than a disability leave, a disability retirement, or an authorized leave of absence.
(2) If you are an elected sheriff or an appointed police or fire chief, you are exempt from the age requirement of the standards.
(3) If you are required to meet the minimum medical and health standards, your employer will enroll you in Plan ((I)) 1 provisionally, depending on the results of your physical examination.
(a) If you are required to meet the minimum medical and health standards, your employer will begin reporting you in LEOFF Plan $(( \pm)) 1$ from the first day of your employment. Your enrollment in Plan $(( \pm)) \underline{1}$, however, is provisional depending upon the results of your medical examination.
(b) Your employer is responsible for having you examined by a physician or surgeon appointed by the local disability board and for paying the cost of your examination. Your employer will send a copy of your examination report to the department along with a certification letter of whether you have met the standards.
(4) If you are denied Plan (( $\mathbf{(})$ ) 1 membership because you did not meet minimum medical and health standards, you will enter membership in Plan (( $\mathbf{4} \mathbf{)}) \mathbf{2}$.
(a) The department will review your examination report and if you meet the minimum medical and health standards you will be reported in membership in Plan (( $\ddagger$ )) $\underline{1}$.
(b) If you do not meet the standards, your employer must stop reporting you to the department in Plan $((\mathrm{I})) \underline{1}$ and report you in Plan ((\#)) 2. The department will transfer your membership from Plan $(( \pm)) \underline{1}$ to Plan $((\Psi)) \underline{2}$ retroactively to the beginning of your term of employment.

(2) How do I make the choice? Under WAC 415-111110 , it is your responsibility to complete the correct form for choosing a contribution rate and submitting the form in a timely manner to your employer as directed on the form.
(3) Where do I get the form to make my choice? Your employer must provide the appropriate form to choose a contribution rate if you are enrolling in Plan 3 or transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3.
(4) When do I have to choose? You must ((ifrea bly)) choose a contribution rate within ninety calendar days from your date of hire in an eligible position. However, if you are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3, you must choose a contribution rate at the same time you transfer. The ninetyday period does not apply to a member transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3.
(5) When do contributions begin?
(a) Once you choose a contribution rate, contributions will begin the first day of the pay cycle in which you make the choice.
(b) If the employer advises the department that you should be reported into Plan 3 membership retroactively, the ninety-day period starts from the date it is discovered that you should have been reported. The department will decide which date to use.
(6) What if I work for more than one employer? If you are a Plan 3 member working in eligible positions for more than one employer, you may select a different contribution rate with each employer.
(7) What happens if I do not make a choice? Under RCW 41.34.040, you will be ((ifrely)) assigned ((te)) a base rate of $5 \%$ (Option A) if:
(a) You are a new employee or changing your employer, and do not choose a contribution rate within the ninety-day election period described in subsection (4) of this section; or
(b) You are transferring from Plan 2 to Plan 3 and do not choose a contribution rate at the time of transfer. Contributions required under subsection (a) or (b) will begin the first day of the pay cycle in which you are assigned to Option A.
(8) Can I change my contribution rate?
(a) Except as provided in (c) of this subsection, once you ((eleet)) choose a contribution rate or are ((defaulted inte)) assigned the base rate of $5 \%$ (Option A), you cannot change your contribution rate unless you change employers.
(b) Each time you change employers, you ((will be allowed the ninety-day period deseribed in subsection (4) of this seetion to cheose new centribution rate)) must choose a new contribution rate within ninety days or you will be assigned a base rate of $5 \%$ (Option A). No contributions will be taken until you choose a rate or until the ninety-day period has elapsed, whichever occurs first.
(c) Each January, TRS Plan 3 members may change their contribution rate option by providing written notification to their employer as described in WAC 415-111-110(1).

## Chapter 208-700 WAC

## PROCESSING APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS FROM THE MORTGAGE LENDING FRAUD PROSECUTION ACCOUNT

## DEFINITIONS

[NEW SECTION]
WAC 208-700-010 Definitions. The definitions in this section apply throughout the chapter unless the context clearly requires otherwise.
(1) "Department" means the Department of Financial Institutions.
(2) "Director" means the Director of the Department.
(3) "Mortgage lending fraud prosecution account" or "account" means the account established under RCW 36.22.181, RCW 40.320.140, and RCW 43.320.1401 (chapter 289, Laws of 2003).
(4) "Mortgage lending process" means the process through which a person seeks or obtains a residential mortgage loan including, but not limited to, solicitation, application or origination, negotiation of terms, third party provider services, underwriting, signing and closing, and funding of the loan.
(5) "Person" means a natural person, corporation, company, limited liability corporation, partnership, or association.
(6) "Prosecutorial agency" means the office of the Washington Attorney General, the office of the United States Attorney, or the office of any county prosecutor in the State of Washington.
(7) "Residential mortgage loan" means any loan primarily for personal, family, or household use secured by a mortgage or deed of trust on residential real estate upon which is constructed or intended to be constructed a single family dwelling or multiple family dwelling of four or fewer units.
(8) "Third-party provider" means any person other than a mortgage broker or lender who provides goods or services in connection with the preparation of a borrower's loan and includes, but is not limited to, credit reporting agencies, title companies, appraisers, structural and pest inspectors, or escrow companies.

## [NEW SECTION]

WAC 208-700-020 Authorization for use of funds. The Director is authorized to disburse funds held under this chapter to cover the expenses of any prosecutorial agency for the purposes of prosecuting fraudulent activities in the mortgage lending process, whether the knowledge of such activity arises from a direct complaint or the independent investifation of the Department of any law enforcement agency. Such prosecution expenses may include, but are not limited to:
(1) Training.
(2) Investigation.
(3) Discovery.
(4) Trial preparation and trial.
(5) Witness expenses.
(6) Sentencing.
(7) Appeal.

## [NEW SECTION]

WAC 208-700-030 Application and approval for disbursement of funds. (1) At the Director's discretion, the Department may establish any of the following means for application, approval and disbursement of funds:
a. A written agreement or memorandum of understanding with a prosecutorial agency covering expenses for a set period of time or the expenses for a particular prosecution. Each agreement or memorandum of understanding shall identify the effective period, the expenses to be covered, the dollar limit, the manner and form of billing expenses and the process for disbursement of the funds, and shall be signed by an authorized representative of the prosecutorial agency, and the Director or the Director's designee.
b. A written application submitted to the Department for payment of prosecution expenses. Such written application shall be in a form acceptable to the Director and shall include at a minimum the following information:
i. The prosecutorial agency applicant name, address and contact information.
ii. The case name and description including the details of persons and crimes under consideration.
iii. The court and county where the charges are or may be filed.
iv. The expenses or range of expenses to be reimbursed.
c. An invoice and voucher submitted after the prosecutorial expenses have been incurred, which shall include all the information required under " $b$ ", above.
(2) The Department will approve or deny the application in a written letter. The letter of approval shall contain the terms of payment including the maximum amount to be reimbursed, the billing process to be followed by the prosecutorial agency, reporting requirements to the Department and the procedures by which the Department shall disburse the funds.
(3) A completed invoice or voucher in a form acceptable to the Director shall be submitted for all prosecution expenses for which payment or reimbursement from the account is sought.

WAC 208-700-040 Disbursement limitation The Director is not required to disburse any funds unless the mortgage lending fraud prosecution account contains sufficient funds to cover planned disbursements under an agreement, memorandum of understanding or approved application. At no time shall the Director or the Department be required to make disbursements from the Department's own operating funds.

Date of Adoption: December 24, 2003.
Purpose: The Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) will establish a new program for individuals in need of employment/day program services. Under existing rules, employment and day program services were paid as state supplementary payments or through the counties. These rules identify a new program whereby DDD will pay individuals directly with state-only funds and require that these individuals purchase the necessary employment/day program services. ## Chapter 388-827 WAC

## STATE SUPPLEMENTARY PAYMENT PROGRAM

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0100 What is the State Supplementary Payment (SSP) that is administered by the division of developmental disabilities (DDD)? The State Supplementary Payment (SSP) is a state-paid cash assistance program for certain clients of the division of developmental disabilities.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0105 What are the eligibility requirements for the DDD/SSP program? To be eligible to receive DDD/SSP, you must be determined DDD eligible under RCW 71A. 10.020 and meet all of the financial and programmatic criteria for DDD/SSP.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0110 What are the financial eligibility requirements to receive DDD/SSP? You must be eligible for or receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI) cash assistance in the month in which the DDD/SSP is issued.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0115 What are the programmatic eligibility requirements for DDD/SSP? (1) You received one or more of the following services from DDD with state-only funding between March 1, 2001 and June 30, 2003 and continue to demonstrate a need for and meet the DDD program eligibility requirements for these services.
(a) Certain voluntary placement program services, which include:
(i) Foster care basic maintenance,
(ii) Foster care specialized support,
(iii) Agency specialized support,
(iv) Staffed residential home,
(v) Out-of-home respite care,
(vi) Agency in-home specialized support,
(vii) Group care basic maintenance,
(viii) Group care specialized support,
(ix) Transportation,
(x) Agency attendant care,
(xi) Child care,
(xii) Professional services,
(xiii) Nursing services,
(xiv) Interpreter services,
(b) Family support;
(c) One or more of the following residential services:
(i) Adult family home,
(ii) Adult residential care facility,
(iii) Alternative living,
(iv) Group home,
(v) Supported living,
(vi) Agency attendant care,
(vii) Supported living or other residential service allowance,
(viii) Intensive individual supported living support
mpanion homes). (companion homes).
(2) For individuals with community protection issues as defined in WAC 388-820-020, the department will determine eligibility for SSP on a case-by-case basis.
(3) For new authorizations of family support opportunity:
(a) You were on the family support opportunity waiting list prior to January 1, 2003; and
(b) You are on the home and community based services (HCBS) waiver administered by DDD; and
(c) You continue to meet the eligibility requirements for the family support opportunity program contained in WAC 388-825-200 through 388-825-242.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0120 How often will my eligibility for DDD/SSP be re-determined? Redetermination of eligibility for the DDD/SSP program will be conducted at least every twelve months, or more frequently if deemed necessary by DDD.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0125 How will I know if I am eligible to receive a DDD/SSP payment? You will receive a written notification from DDD if you have been identified as eligible for this program.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0130 Can I choose not to accept DDD/SSP payments? If your service funding has been converted to the DDD/SSP program, DDD/SSP payments are the only way you can receive that funding.
(1) If you choose not to receive DDD/SSP payments, you will not receive department funding for that service.
(2) Your home and community based services (HCBS) waiver service(s) administered by DDD but not funded by DDD/SSP payments will not be affected by your choice to receive or reject DDD/SSP payments.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0131 What happens if I no longer meet the financial or programmatic requirements after my funding has been converted to the DDD/SSP program? If you no longer meet the eligibility requirements in WAC 388-827-0105, 388-827-0110, or 388-827-0115, you may continue to receive services only if an exception to the rules is approved in accordance with WAC 388-827-0300.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0135 Can I apply for the DDD/SSP program if $I$ am not identified by DDD as eligible for the DDD/SSP program? You can apply through your case resource manager to determine eligibility for SSP but eligibility is limited to those meeting the eligibility requirements in WAC 388-827-0105, 388-827-0110, and 388-827-0115.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0140 What are my appeal rights if DDD determines that I am not eligible for DDD/SSP? (1) You have the right to appeal the department's denial, termination, or reduction of services. Your rights to an adjudicative proceeding are in WAC 388-825-120.
(2) Your current services will not be continued while the matter is being appealed if the service termination or transfer is for a specific group of clients in order to meet the legislative intent of and comply with sections 205 and 207, chapter 371, Laws of 2002.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0145 How much money will I receive? The purpose of the SSP is to increase the amount of income to meet your needs. The department will determine your payment amount based on your living arrangement and your assessed needs.
(1) For residential and voluntary placement program services, the amount of your SSP will be based on the amount of state-only dollars spent on certain services at the time the funding source was converted to SSP. If the type of your residential living arrangement changes, your need will be reassessed and your payment adjusted based on your new living arrangement and assessed need.
(2) For family support services, refer to WAC 388-825200 through 388-825-284.
(a) If you are on the home and community based services (HCBS) waiver administered by DDD:
(i) You will receive nine hundred dollars DDD/SSP money per year to use as you determine.
(ii) The remainder up to the maximum allowed may be authorized by DDD to purchase HCBS waiver services and will be paid directly to the provider.
(b) If you are not on the HCBS waiver administered by DDD, you will receive the yearly maximum allowed in the form of DDD/SSP money to use as you determine.
(c) The yearly amount of DDD/SSP money will be prorated into monthly amounts. You will receive one twelfth of the yearly amount each month.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0146 May I voluntarily remove myself from the home and community based services (HCBS) waiver administered by DDD in order to increase the amount of my SSP? You may voluntarily remove yourself from the HCBS waiver administered by DDD but your SSP will not increase because of this action.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0150 How often will I receive my DDD/SSP warrant/check? You will receive a monthly warrant/check from the state.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0155 Who will the warrant/check be sent to? (1) If you are a child under the age of eighteen, the warrant/check will be sent to your legal representative or protective payee or representative payee.
(2) If you are a person age eighteen and older, the warrant/check will be sent directly to your protective payee or representative payee if you have one.
(3) If you do not have a protective payee or representative payee, the warrant/check will be sent directly to you.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0160 How will the warrant/check be sent? You may choose to have your check delivered through the US Postal Service, or as an electronic funds transfer.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0170 Are there rules restricting how I use my DDD/SSP money? There are no restrictions on how you use your DDD/SSP money.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0175 What changes must I report to the department? You must report changes in your circumstances within ten days from the date you become aware of the change. You must tell us if:
(1) Your SSI stops;
(2) Your address changes; or
(3) There is a change in your living arrangement that affects your assessed need.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0180 Do I have additional responsibilities when I purchase my own services? (1) When you use DDD/SSP funds paid directly to you to purchase in-home services from individuals, you become the employer. As the employer, you may have tax liabilities. If you have questions regarding employer tax issues, you can contact the Internal Revenue Service.
(2) If you want to obtain a criminal background check of any employee who will have unsupervised access to children or adults with developmental disabilities, you may get the
background check done through the Washington State Patrol. You can ask your DDD case resource manager to assist you with completing these background checks.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0185 When will the department stop sending my DDD/SSP money? The department will stop sending your DDD/SSP money when:
(1) You no longer are eligible for or receive SSI cash benefits;
(2) You no longer demonstrate a need for the services as described in WAC 388-827-0115; or
(3) Your DDD eligibility is terminated.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0200 What is a representative payee? A representative payee is a person, organization, institution or agency that manages your DDD/SSP. They may also provide services such as helping you manage your money.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0210 Who can be a representative payee for my DDD/SSP? (1) A representative payee may be:
(a) The person, organization, institution or agency that acts as your representative payee for Supplemental Security Income (SSI);
(b) Your parent, if you are under eighteen;
(c) Your spouse; or
(d) A person, organization, institution or agency you select if the department approves your selection.
(2) If you select a representative payee under subsection (1) (d) of this section, the department will evaluate the selection according to the following criteria:
(a) The relationship of the payee to you;
(b) The amount of interest the payee shows in you;
(c) Any legal authority the payee has to act on your behalf;
(d) Whether the payee has custody of you; and
(e) Whether the payee is in a position to know of and look after your needs.
(3) The DDD director or designee will approve or deny your request for a representative under subsection (1) (d) of this section.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0215 What are the responsibilities of a representative payee? A representative payee has the responsibility to:
(1) Spend the DDD/SSP on you or your behalf;
(2) Notify the department if any event happens that may affect the amount of benefits you receive;
(3) Submit to the department, upon our request, a written report accounting for the payments received; and
(4) Notify the department of any change in the payee's circumstances that would affect performance of the payee responsibilities.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0300 Does DSHS make exceptions to the requirements in this chapter? DSHS may grant exceptions to the requirements specified in this chapter as long as the following conditions are met:
(1) You or your case manager may request an exception to a rule in this chapter.
(2) The case manager must submit a written request for an exception to his or her DDD regional administrator.
(3) DSHS will evaluate requests for exceptions, considering:
(a) The federal and state rules governing SSP; and
(b) The impact on the client if the exception is not approved.
(4) The DDD regional administrator will forward the request to the DDD director together with the regional administrator's recommendation to approve or deny the request.
(5) The DDD director or designee will approve or deny the request in writing within sixty calendar days after receiving the request from the case manager.
(6) The department will notify you of the decision.
(7) You do not have rights to adjudicative proceedings when you receive a denial from DSHS for an exception to the rules in this chapter.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0400 What is an SSP overpayment?
(1) An overpayment means any SSP paid that is more than the amount you were eligible to receive.
(2) If you request a hearing and the hearing decision determines that you received any DDD/SSP money that you were not eligible to receive, then some or all of the DDD/SSP you received before the hearing decision must be paid back to the department.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0410 When can an overpayment occur? An overpayment can occur when:
(1) You were not eligible for and did not receive Supplemental Security Income in the month in which the SSP was issued;
(2) You were no longer eligible for services from the division of developmental disabilities in the month in which the SSP was issued; or
(3) Your assessed need has changed.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-827-0420 Who is liable for repayment of an overpayment? (1) If you received the money in your own name, you are responsible for repayment.
(2) If you are paid through a representative payee, both you and the representative payee may be responsible for repayment.
(a) You are responsible to the extent that the incorrect payments were spent on you or your behalf. Funds conserved
by a representative payee to which you do not have direct access have not been spent on you or your behalf.
(b) If the incorrect payments were spent on you or your behalf and the representative payee is without fault in connection with the overpayment, you are solely responsible for repayment.
(c) The representative payee is solely responsible for repayment if:
(i) The incorrect payments were not spent on you or your behalf; and
(ii) The representative payee is at fault in connection with the overpayment.
(d) A government entity or an institution can be a representative payee and can be found responsible for repayment -just as a private individual can.
(e) You and the representative payee are both responsible for repayment when the incorrect payments have been spent on you or your behalf and the representative payee is at fault.
(3) The representative payee is at fault when the representative payee was aware of the reason you were not eligible for the SSP.

## HAZARDOUS WASTE OPERATIONS

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-100 Scope. This chapter applies if you have any of the following:

- Employees working in operations involving hazardous waste at a treatment, storage, and disposal (TSD) facility required to have a permit or interim status AND regulated by any of the following:
- 40 CFR Parts 264 and 265 under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 (RCRA), 42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq.;
- Agencies implementing RCRA through agreements with the United States Environmental Protection Agency (U.S.E.P.A.);
-Chapter 173-303 WAC, Dangerous waste regulations; OR
- Employees conducting initial investigations of govern-ment-identified sites before determining whether hazardous substances are present;

OR

- Corrective actions, involving clean-up operations, at sites covered by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 (RCRA) as amended (42 U.S.C. 6901 et seq.) or chapter 70.105 RCW, Hazardous waste management;

OR

- Employees performing clean-up operations at an uncontrolled hazardous waste site. Sites include, but are not limited to:
- The Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) National Priority Site List (NPL); see http://www.epa.gov/ superfund/sites/npl/wa.htm;
- Sites recommended for inclusion on the EPA NPL;
- State priority site lists, for example those listed under chapter 173-340 WAC, Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA); see http://www.ecy.wa.gov/programs/tcp/cscs/CSCSpage. HTM;
- Unlisted sites recognized by a federal, state or local government as an uncontrolled hazardous waste site. Examples of such sites include:
- Sites that do not meet clean-up goals established by the MTCA and that pose a threat or potential threat to human health or the environment;
- Clandestine drug lab sites designated for cleanup;
- Postemergency response cleanup at the site of a hazardous substance release regulated by chapter 296-824 WAC, Emergency response.

IMPORTANT:
This chapter applies to hazardous waste sites until cleanup at the site is determined to be complete by the governing regulatory agency.

- Establish and identify the chain of command.
- Identify the site safety and health supervisor and other personnel responsible for employee safety and health.
- Specify the overall responsibilities of supervisors and employees.
- Include the name and title of the person with responsibility and authority to direct all hazardous waste operations.
- Include a site safety and health supervisor responsible for developing and implementing the HASP and verifying compliance.
- Identify the functions and responsibilities of all personnel needed for hazardous waste operations and emergency response.
- Identify site specific lines of authority, responsibility, and communication.


## Comprehensive work plan:

- A written comprehensive work plan of tasks, objectives, logistics, and resources for site operations, including the following:
- Addresses anticipated clean-up activities and normal operating procedures unless that information is already available in another document.
- Defines work tasks and objectives.
- Describes how the work tasks and objectives will be accomplished.
- Establishes the personnel requirements to implement the work plan.
- Provides for implementation of training, briefings, and information as required by WAC 296-843-200.


## Site control plan:

- An up-to-date site control plan before clean-up operations begin to minimize employee exposure to hazardous substances and including the following (unless it's available in another document):
- A site map.
- Establish site work zones.
- How the "buddy system" is used.
- The site communications plan, including how employees are alerted during emergencies.
- The site's standard operating procedures (SOPs) or safe work practices.
- Identification of the nearest medical assistance.


## Personal protective equipment:

- A PPE plan that addresses all of the following:
- Site hazards and activities.
- Methods to evaluate the effectiveness of the PPE plan.
- Criteria for selecting and fitting PPE, including work duration, use limitations of particular PPE, and medical considerations such as temperature extremes and heat stress.
- Training on PPE use.
- Procedures for putting on and taking off PPE.
- PPE inspection procedures prior to, during, and after use.
- Decontamination and disposal of PPE.
- Maintenance and storage of PPE.

Additional elements:

- A sampling and monitoring plan (see WAC 296-843130) that includes sampling of drums and containers.
- Site control measures (see WAC 296-843-140).
- Decontamination procedures (see WAC 296-843-150).
- Spill containment plans (see WAC 296-843-180, Drum and container handling).
- Standard operating procedures for sampling, managing, and handling drums and containers (see WAC 296-843180).
- Entry procedures for tanks or vaults (see WAC 296-62141, Confined spaces).
- A training, briefings, and information plan (see WAC 296-843-200).
- A medical surveillance plan (see WAC 296-843-210), that includes site-specific medical surveillance requirements.
- Sanitation (see WAC 296-155-140).
- Lighting (see WAC 296-800-210).
- Excavations (see chapter 296-155 WAC, Part N, Excavation, trenching and shoring).
- Any relationship or interaction between other programs and the site-specific program.

Note: The emergency response plan required by WAC 296-843160, Emergency response for hazardous waste sites, is also included as a separate section in the HASP.

Evaluate employee exposure to hazardous substances during clean-up operations

WAC 296-843-13010.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-13005 Conduct monitoring for health and safety hazards during initial site entry.

## You must:

- Make visual observations of the site to detect signs of actual or potential immediately dangerous to life or health (DLH) or other dangerous conditions.
- Conduct representative air monitoring with direct reading test equipment, when the preliminary site evaluation does not eliminate the potential for ionizing radiation or IDLH conditions.
- Assess the following:
- Potential IDLH conditions.
- Exposure over radioactive material dose limits.
- Potential exposure over permissible exposure limits (PELs) or other published exposure levels.
- Other dangerous conditions, such as the presence of flammable or oxygen-deficient atmospheres.

Reference: See WAC 296-62-09004, Ionizing radiation, for additional information about radioactive material dose limits.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-13010 Evaluate employee exposure to hazardous substances during clean-up operations.

## IMPORTANT:

The clean-up operation begins when soil, surface water, or containers are moved or disturbed.

## You must:

- Identify the type of personnel monitoring and environmental sampling you plan to use, including instrumentation.
- Include requirements for maintaining and calibrating the monitoring and sampling instruments used.
- Monitor whenever employees may be exposed to concentrations exceeding PELs or other published exposure levels.
- Evaluate employees who are likely to have the highest exposure:
- Monitor all employees who are likely to have the highest exposure to hazardous substances or health hazards above the PEL or published exposure limit.
- Use personal sampling frequently enough to characterize the exposures of these employees.

When results indicate exposure is over the PEL or other published exposure level, identify all employees likely to be above the PEL or published exposure limit.

Note: You may use a representative sampling approach by documenting that the employees and chemicals chosen for monitoring are representative of both:

- Employee exposure to hazardous substances; AND
- Employees not sampled.

You must:

- Conduct monitoring when the possibility of one of the following exists:
- An atmosphere that is immediately dangerous to life or health (IDLH);

OR

- A flammable atmosphere;

OR

- Employee exposures exceeding PELs or other published exposure levels.

Examples of situations where these possibilities may exist:

- Work begins on a different portion of the site.
- Contaminants other than those previously monitored are being handled.
- A different type of site operation starts, such as moving from drum opening to exploratory well drilling.
- Handling leaking drums or containers.
m Working in areas with obvious liquid contamination such as a spill or lagoon.
- Time has passed and employee exposure levels may have significantly increased.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-140 Site control.
Your responsibility:
To establish a plan to control access to the site.
You must:
Establish a site control plan
WAC 296-843-14005.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-14005 Establish site control.
You must:

- Maintain site work zones and site control as required by Table 1, Site Work Zone Requirements.
- Control access to the exclusion and contamination reduction zones.
- Make sure people wear personal protective equipment (PPE) appropriate to their work zone.

WAC 296-843-150 Worker and equipment decontamination.

Your responsibility:
To make sure the necessary facilities and equipment for effective decontamination are available and used.

## You must:

Establish and implement decontamination procedures before any worker or equipment enters a contaminated area

WAC 296-843-15005.
Provide showers and changing rooms
WAC 296-843-15010.
Provide washing facilities
WAC 296-843-15015.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-15005 Establish and implement decontamination procedures before any worker or equipment enters a contaminated area.

## You must:

- Establish, implement, and communicate decontamination procedures to all workers, to include the following:
- Standard operating procedures to minimize worker contact with:
- Hazardous substances.
- Contaminated equipment.
- Decontaminating all:
- Workers leaving a contaminated area.
- Equipment leaving a contaminated area.
- Decontaminating, cleaning, laundering, repairing, or replacing protective clothing or equipment (PPE) as needed to maintain effectiveness.
- Immediate removal of clothing, such as cotton coveralls, wet with hazardous substances and use of the nearest shower.
- Decontaminate or dispose of clothing before removal from the work zone.
- Periodically monitoring procedures for effectiveness by the site safety and health supervisor.
- Correct your procedures when found ineffective.
- Establish decontamination areas to minimize contact of contaminated employees and equipment with uncontaminated employees or equipment.
- Make sure only authorized employees remove protective clothing or equipment from changing rooms.
- Inform commercial laundries or cleaning establishments about the potentially harmful effects from exposure to hazardous substances.
- Properly decontaminate or dispose of decontamination equipment and solvents.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-15010 Provide showers and changing rooms.

## You must:

- Provide changing areas and showers outside a contaminated area, when needed for worker decontamination, that include at least the following:
- Separate changing areas:
- One to provide a clean area where employees can remove, store, and put on street clothing with an exit leading off the work site.
- Another where employees can put on, remove, store, and dispose of work clothing and PPE with an exit leading to the work site.
- A shower area separating the changing areas.
- Prevent clean areas from being contaminated by hazardous substances.
- Provide and use other effective means for worker cleansing, if temperature conditions prevent the effective use of water.
- Locate showers and change rooms where worker exposures are below permissible exposure limits (PELs) or other published exposure levels.
- If this cannot be accomplished, use a ventilation system to supply air that is below the PELs or published exposure levels.
- Make sure all workers shower at the end of their work shift or before they leave the site, when needed for worker decontamination.

## NEW SECTION

## WAC 296-843-15015 Provide washing facilities.

## You must:

- Provide adequate washing facilities to employees working in hazardous waste operations that are:
- Close and convenient to the work area.
- Located in areas where employee exposure is below PELs or other published exposure levels.
- Equipped so an employee can remove hazardous substances from themselves without assistance.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-160 Emergency response for hazardous waste sites.

Your responsibility:
To establish an emergency response plan for emergencies at the hazardous waste site.

You must:
Establish an emergency response plan for anticipated emergencies before beginning hazardous waste operations

WAC 296-843-16005.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-16005 Establish an emergency response plan for anticipated emergencies before beginning hazardous waste operations.

Exemption:

> Employers are exempt from preparing an emergency response plan if they do ALL of the following:
> - Evacuate all employees from the danger area during an emergency.
> - Prohibit employees from assisting in the emergency response.
> - Prepare an emergency action plan that complies with WAC $296-24-567(1)$, Evacuation plan.

## IMPORTANT:

Treatment, storage, and disposal (TSD) employers are not required to duplicate subjects fully addressed in the contingency plan required by permits when the contingency plan is part of their emergency response plan. Examples of permits would be those issued by the department of ecology.

## You must:

(1) Establish and maintain the plan to reflect current site conditions, information, and personnel:

- Include policies or procedures for at least the following:
- Preemergency planning.
- Coordination with outside organizations.
- Current site topography, layout, and weather conditions.
- Personnel roles.
- Lines of authority.
- Communication.
- Reporting incidents to local, state, and federal government agencies.
- Emergency recognition and prevention.
- Safe distances and places of refuge.
- Site security and control.
- Evacuation routes.
- Decontamination not covered by the site-specific HASP.
- Emergency medical treatment and first aid.
- Emergency alert and response.
- Personal protective equipment and emergency equipment.
- Employee training.
- Critique of the response effort and appropriate followup.
- Use available information at the time of the emergency to:
- Evaluate the incident and site response capabilities.
- Proceed with appropriate steps to implement your emergency response plan.
- Make sure the emergency response plan is:
- Kept as a separate section of your site-specific health and safety plan (HASP);


## AND

- Integrated and compatible with, local, state, and federal plans for disasters, fires, and emergency responses.
(2) Establish an alarm system to alert employees to all of the following:
- An on-site emergency incident:
- To stop work activities, if necessary.
- To lower background noise to assist communication.
-To begin emergency procedures.
(3) Rehearse the plan as part of site operations training.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-170 Employee exposure controls.
Your responsibility:
Implement feasible controls to protect employees from exposure to site hazards.

## You must:

Control employee exposure to site health and safety hazards

WAC 296-843-17005.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-17005 Control employee exposure to site health and safety hazards.

## You must:

- Use feasible controls, selected based on monitoring and other available information, to protect employee exposure above permissible exposure limits (PELs) or other published exposure levels.
- Examples of controls include:
- Installing pressurized cabs or control booths on equipment.
- Using remotely operated material handling equipment.
- Removing all nonessential employees when opening drums.
- Wetting down dusty operations.
- Positioning employees upwind of possible hazards.
- Evaluate new technologies and other control measures before using them on a large scale.
- Use any reasonable combination of controls and personal protective equipment (PPE) to reduce and maintain employee exposure at or below the PELs, published exposure levels, or dose levels when controls are not:
- Feasible;

OR

- Effective.
- Make sure PPE is NOT used as a replacement control.
- PPE should be used only as a supplement to controls.

Note: For those hazardous substances without PELs or published exposure levels, use other published literature and material safety data sheets (MSDSs) to help decide what level of protection is appropriate. For more information about MSDSs, see WAC 296-800-180 in the Safety and Health Core Rules book.

## You must:

- Use employee rotation to reduce exposure below ionizing radiation PELs or dose limits, when that is the only feasible means of protecting employees.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-180 Drum and container handling. Your responsibility:
To handle drums and containers in ways that minimize the hazard to employees.

## You must:

Handle drums and containers safely
WAC 296-843-18005.
Handle drums and containers suspected of containing shock-sensitive (explosive) wastes safely

WAC 296-843-18010.
Maintain worker safety in drum and container opening areas

WAC 296-843-18015.
Ship and transport drums and containers safely WAC 296-843-18020.
IMPORTANT:

- Containers or drums containing shock-sensitive (explosive) or potentially shock-sensitive wastes require special handling precautions.
- Handle, transport, label, and dispose of drums and containers according to this chapter and other United States Department of Transportation (DOT), WISHA, EPA, and Washington department of ecology regulations for:
- Drums.
- Containers.
- Hazardous substances.
- Contaminated soils.
- Liquids, and other residues.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-18005 Handle drums and containers safely.

## Preparation for moving drums and containers:

You must:

- Assess hazards to employees, such as radioactive waste, before handling drums and containers.
- Consider unlabeled drums and containers to contain hazardous substances and handle them accordingly, until the contents are positively identified, labeled, and assessed for hazards.
- Inspect and make sure drums and containers are sound before moving them.
- If it is not practical to inspect drums without moving them, move drums and containers to an accessible location and inspect prior to further handling.
- Remove soil or other materials covering drums or containers with caution to prevent rupture.
- Use ground-penetrating systems or other types of detection systems or devices to estimate the location and depth of buried drums or containers.
- Use the sampling plan and procedures included in the site-specific HASP to sample the contents of containers and drums.


## Moving drums and containers:

## You must:

- Warn all employees exposed to drum movement operations about the potential hazards associated with the contents of the drums or containers prior to moving them.
- Minimize movement of drums or containers.
- Select, position, and operate tools and material handling equipment to prevent the ignition of flammable vapors.
- Handle tanks and vaults containing hazardous substances with the same precautions as for drums and containers, taking into account the size of tank or vault.


## Handling spills and leaks:

## You must:

- Contain and isolate the entire volume of a hazardous substance in a drum or container when a spill occurs.
- Have available and use both of the following in areas where spills, leaks, or ruptures may occur:
- United States Department of Transportation (DOT) specified salvage drums or containers.
- Suitable quantities of proper absorbent materials.
- Empty drums and containers, that cannot be moved without rupturing, leaking, or spilling, into a sound container.
- Use a pump or other device classified for the material being transferred.
- Have fire-extinguishing equipment on-hand to control fires in their initial stage.

Reference: For further information, see the safety and health core rules, WAC 296-800-300, Portable fire extinguishers.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-18010 Handle drums and containers suspected of containing shock-sensitive (explosive) wastes safely.

## You must:

- Allow only essential employees in the transfer area.
- Communicate as follows:
- Signal the beginning and end of shock-sensitive (explosive) waste handling activities with an alarm system that is capable of being perceived above background light and noise.
- Maintain continuous communications throughout the handing operation:
- Between the employee-in-charge of the immediate handling area AND the site safety and health supervisor AND the command post.
- Using portable radios, hand signals, or telephones, as appropriate.
- Prevent the use of communication equipment or methods that could cause shock-sensitive (explosive) materials to explode.
- Provide material handling equipment with explosive containment devices or shields to protect equipment operators from exploding containers.
- Do not move bulging or swollen drums or containers until the cause for excess pressure is determined and you can move the drum or container safely.
- Consider packaged laboratory wastes or laboratory waste packs shock-sensitive or explosive until the contents have been characterized.
- Make sure laboratory waste packs are opened only:
- When necessary.
- By a person knowledgeable in the inspection, classification, and segregation of the containers within the pack.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-18015 Maintain worker safety in drum and container opening areas.

You must:

- Keep employees who are not involved in opening drums or containers a safe distance from the opening area.
- Use appropriate shielding between the employee and the drums or containers, when excess interior pressure cannot be relieved from a remote location.
- Provide an explosion-resistant barrier that does not interfere with the work to protect employees working near or adjacent to drum or container opening operations from accidental explosions.
- Position controls for drum or container opening equipment, monitoring equipment, and fire suppression equipment behind the explosion-resistant barrier. Prohibit employees from standing on or working from drums or containers.

Reference: The shipment of shock-sensitive (explosive) waste may be prohibited under United States Department of Transportation (DOT) regulations. You and your shipper should refer to title 49 CFR.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-18020 Ship and transport drums and containers safely.

## You must:

(1) Identify and classify drum and container contents prior to packaging for shipment.
(2) Provide staging areas:

- Each staging area must have adequate entry and exit routes.
- The number of drum or container staging areas must be kept to the minimum needed to identify and classify materials safely and prepare them for transport.
(3) Permit bulking of hazardous wastes only after a thorough characterization of the wastes has been completed.

WAC 296-843-190 Personal protective equipment (PPE).

## Your responsibility:

To use PPE to protect employees when feasible controls do not remove the hazardous exposure.

## You must:

Provide and use appropriate PPE
WAC 296-843-19005.

Note: The manufacturer's information on PPE may be used to meet you PPE plan requirements. For example, the manufacturer's procedures for putting on and taking off PPE may
be attached to the site-specific health and safety plan (HASP).

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-19005 Provide and use appropriate PPE.

Reference: See WAC 296-843-110, Evaluations and inspections, found in this chapter, for more information about how to identify hazards and complete your preliminary site evaluation.

## You must:

(1) Make sure the PPE you provide and use for initial entry protects employees from known or suspected safety and health hazards identified during the preliminary site evaluation as follows:

- Actual and potential hazards identified during the site characterization and analysis (see WAC 296-843-110, Evaluations and inspections).
- Hazards likely to be encountered.
- Required tasks and their duration.
- Site requirements and limitations.
- Use Table 2 to identify the type of PPE that is required for various exposure situations.

Note: If there is not a permissible exposure limit (PEL) or other published exposure level for a hazardous substance, you may use published studies and information as a guide for selecting appropriate PPE.

WAC 296-843-200 Training, briefings, and information.

## Your responsibility:

To make sure employees and subcontractors have the training and information needed to work safely.

## You must:

Inform workers and employers about the hazardous waste site

WAC 296-843-20005.
Train workers, supervisors and managers before work begins on the site

WAC 296-843-20010.
Provide additional training to your managers and supervisors

WAC 296-843-20015.
Training for postemergency response
WAC 296-843-20020.
Make sure your employees receive written documentation of training

WAC 296-843-20025.
Provide refresher training to employees
WAC 296-843-20030.
Use qualified trainers
WAC 296-843-20035.
IMPORTANT:
If law enforcement personnel participate in clean-up activities, they must receive appropriate hazardous waste clean-up training as described in this chapter.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-20005 Inform workers, contractors and subcontractors about the hazardous waste site.

## You must:

- Inform employees, contractors, and subcontractors or their representatives, about:
- The nature, level, and degree of exposure to hazardous substances they're likely to encounter.
- All site-related emergency response procedures.
- Any identified potential fire, explosion, health, safety, or other hazards.
- Conduct briefings for employees, contractors, and subcontractors, or their representatives as follows:
- A preentry briefing before any site activity is started.
- Additional briefings, as needed, to make sure that the site-specific HASP is followed.
- Make sure all employees working on the site are:
- Informed of any risks identified.
- Trained on how to protect themselves and other workers against the site hazards and risks.
- Update all information to reflect current site activities and hazards.


## NEW SECTION

## WAC 296-843-20010 Train workers, supervisors and managers before work begins on the site. IMPORTANT:

- The eighty-hour training requirement does NOT apply to law enforcement personnel entering illicit drug labs, securing the premises, and obtaining evidence. Attendance at a forty-hour training course, such as presented by the criminal justice training commission, is acceptable.
- These training requirements do not apply to workers engaged in limited postemergency response activities pro- - Permanen
vided they meet the conditions described in WAC 296-84320020.


## You must:

- Make sure workers have received twenty-four-, fortyor eighty-hour training as required by Table 3 before participating in hazardous waste operations.
- Make sure workers also receive site-specific training that thoroughly covers at least the following:
- The personnel responsible for employee safety and health.
-Safety, health, and other hazards known or suspected at the site.
- Use of personal protective equipment.
- Work practices to minimize worker's risk from the hazards.
- Use of engineering and other controls and equipment on the site.
- Medical surveillance provided.
- Recognition of signs and symptoms that might indicate overexposure to site hazards.
- The contents of the site-specific health and safety plan (HASP) required by this chapter.

Note: The site-specific training can be provided as part of the twenty-four-, forty- or eighty-hour training or as part of the employee briefings provided all training and information requirements of WAC 296-843-200 are met.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-20015 Provide additional training to your managers and supervisors.

## You must:

- Make sure the following receive appropriate training:
- On-site managers.
- Supervisors responsible for hazardous waste operations.
- Supervisors who directly supervise employees in hazardous waste operations.
- Make sure such supervisors and on-site managers receive the same training as that required by the workers they supervise (see WAC 296-843-20010).
- Make sure such supervisors and managers receive a minimum of eight additional hours of specialized training including the following information:
- Written site-specific health and safety plan (HASP):
- Training plan.
- Personal protective equipment (PPE) plan.
- Spill containment plan.
- Emergency management procedures to use when a release of hazardous substances occurs.
- Federal, state, and local agencies to be contacted if there is a release of hazardous substances.
- Sampling and monitoring plan (including procedures and techniques for monitoring health hazards).
- Managing hazardous wastes and their disposal.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-20020 Training for postemergency response.

You must:

- Provide workers who participate only in limited postemergency response clean-up operations with a minimum of eight hours of training, when these conditions are met:
- Cleanup is at a site that is a hazardous waste operation only because of an emergency response.
-Clean-up work is directly supervised by someone who has completed at least forty hours of training in hazardous waste operations as required in this chapter.
- Written documentation is maintained at the work site supporting less than twenty-four hours of training.
-The work:

Is performed in an area that has been monitored and fully characterized by a qualified person as an area where employee exposure cannot exceed PELs or other published exposure levels.

- Does not require using respiratory protection.
- Does not require entry into permit-required confined spaces.
- Involves minimal health risks from skin exposure and absorption that are effectively controlled by PPE.
- Workers have received training in your emergency response plan and hazard communication program.

Reference: For additional information, see WAC 296-843-160, Emergency response, and WAC 296-800-170, Employer chemical hazard communication.

## You must:

- Make sure workers complete any other safety and health training needed to perform assigned clean-up tasks in a safe and healthful manner.
- Training may include topics such as the following:
- Safety hazards and controls.
- The content and availability of the site-specific health and safety plan.
- Decontamination procedures.
- Operating procedures related to assigned clean-up tasks.
- PPE use and limitations.
- Hands-on exercises for PPE and decontamination.
- Information about heat stress and hypothermia.
- Make sure workers have been trained within the last twelve months.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-20025 Make sure your employees receive written documentation of training.

You must:

- Certify and document annually that each manager, supervisor, and worker has either:
- Attended and successfully completed the training required by this section;

OR

- Demonstrated their competency.
- Record and maintain the method used to demonstrate competency.
- Make sure your employees and supervisors who complete required training and field experience receive written training documentation authenticated by the responsible trainer.
- Provide a copy of the certification or documentation to your employee upon request.

Note: Equivalent training may include academic or work-related training that covers subjects required by this chapter.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-20030 Provide refresher training to employees.

You must:

- Make sure all certified employees, supervisors, and managers receive eight hours of refresher training at least every twelve months that covers:
- The topics specified in WAC 296-843-200.
- Assessments or evaluations of work-related incidents.
- Any other relevant topics.

WAC 296-843-20035 Use qualified trainers.

## You must:

Use trainers that:

- Have demonstrated competent instructional skills.
- Demonstrate knowledge of the subject matter and have either:

Your responsibility:
To provide medical surveillance for employees that work in hazardous waste operations.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-21005 Provide medical surveillance for your employees.

You must:

- Establish a medical surveillance plan for all employees who meet any of the following:
- Are or may be exposed to hazardous substances or health hazards for at least thirty days a year, at or above the permissible exposure limits (PELs) or other published exposure levels.
- Wear a respirator for at least thirty days a year.
- Are injured, become ill, or develop signs or symptoms of possible overexposure to hazardous substances or health hazards.
- Are hazardous materials team (HAZMAT) members.

Reference: Employees who use respirators less than thirty days a year are required to have a respirator medical evaluation as outlined by chapter 296-842 WAC, Respirators. Completion of a medical examination required by this section will meet the requirement for a respirator medical evaluation.

## You must:

- Make sure medical examinations, consultations, and procedures are:
-Scheduled according to Table 4, Medical Examination Schedule.
- Performed or supervised by a licensed physician.
- Available:
- At a reasonable time and place.
- Without loss of pay.
- Without cost to employees.

Note: Examples of costs include: Mileage, gas, bus fare, and time spent outside normal work hours.

## You must:

- Make sure the medical examination includes the following information for each affected employee:
- A medical and work history, with special emphasis on symptoms related to handling hazardous substances and health hazards.
- Information about fitness for duty including the ability to wear any personal protective equipment (PPE) under conditions that may be expected at the workplace.
- Any additional information that is determined by the examining physician.

Note: The physician should consult the NIOSH Occupational Safety and Health Guidance Manual for Hazardous Waste Site Activities http://www.cde.gov/niosh/85-115.html.
You must:

- Provide complete information to the examining physician, including:
- A copy of WAC 296-843-210.
- Medical evaluation information required by chapter 296-842 WAC, Respirators.
- A description of the employee's duties that relate to hazardous substance exposure.
- The actual or anticipated hazardous substance exposure levels for the employee.
- A description of the PPE the employee uses or could use.
- Information available from previous medical examinations.
- Instruction to the physician that the physician's written opinion NOT include specific findings or diagnoses that are not related to occupational exposures.

Note: You are not required to send duplicate information to the physician for each employee.

## You must:

- Obtain the physician's written medical opinion that includes the following information:
- Whether medical conditions were found that would increase the employee's risk for impairment during emergency response work or respirator use.
- Limitations of the employee's assigned work, if any.
- Examination and test results, if the employee requests this information.
- A statement that the employee has been confidentially informed of medical examination results (including medical conditions requiring followup required by WAC 296-843210).
- Provide the employee with a copy of the physician evaluation.

WAC 296-843-220 Recordkeeping and information access.

Your responsibility:
To keep records and make them accessible to employees.
You must:
Make your records accessible
WAC 296-843-22005.
Keep medical surveillance records for your employees WAC 296-843-22010.

WAC 296-843-22005 Make your records accessible.

## You must:

- Allow your written health and safety plan (HASP) and all other written plans required by this chapter to be inspected and copied by:
- Employees or their designated representative.
- Site contractors or their designated representatives.
- Subcontractors or their designated representatives.
- Personnel of any federal, state, or local agency with regulatory authority over the site.


## NEW SECTION

WAC 296-843-22010 Keep medical surveillance records for your employees.

You must:

- Keep medical surveillance records for each affected employee that include:
- The employee's name and Social Security number.
- Physicians' written opinions including recommended limitations and results of examinations and tests.
- Any employee medical complaints regarding hazardous substance exposures.
- A copy of all information given to the examining physician (except a copy of this chapter).
- Keep each employee's records for at least the duration of his or her employment plus thirty years.

## NEW SECTION

## WAC 296-843-300 Definitions. <br> Buddy system

A system of organizing employees into work groups so that each employee is assigned to observe another employee in the same work group. The purpose of this system is to provide rapid assistance to employees in the event of an emergency.

## Clean-up operation

An operation where hazardous substances are removed, contained, incinerated, neutralized, stabilized, cleared-up, or in any other manner processed or handled with the goal of making the site safer for people or the environment.

## Contamination reduction zone

The buffer zone between the exclusion and the clean zone.

## Decontamination

The removal of hazardous substances from employees and equipment, to the extent necessary, to avoid foreseeable adverse health effects.

## Emergency response or responding to emergencies

An organized response to an anticipated release of a hazardous substance that is, or could become, an uncontrolled release.

## Exclusion zone

A controlled area at a site, where contamination occurs, that is a risk to human health or the environment.

## Exposure or exposed

Employee contact with a toxic substance, harmful physical agent, or oxygen deficient condition. Exposure can occur through various routes of entry, such as inhalation, ingestion, skin contact, or skin absorption.

## Facility

Any building structure, installation, equipment, pipe, or pipeline (including any pipe into a sewer or publicly owned treatment works), well, pit, pond, lagoon, impoundment,
ditch, storage container, motor vehicle, rolling stock, or aircraft;

## OR

Any site or area where a hazardous substance has been deposited, stored, disposed of, placed, or otherwise located (not including any boat, ship or barge).

## Hazardous substance

Any of the following substances that could adversely affect an exposed employee's health or safety:

- Substances defined under section 101(14) of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) or "Superfund" Act (found at: http://www.epa.gov).
- Biological or other disease-causing agents released that could reasonably be expected to cause death, disease, behavioral abnormalities, cancer, genetic mutation, physiological malfunctions, including malfunctions in reproduction, or physical deformations in a person or their offspring when, the person:
- Is directly exposed to the agent in the environment.
- Directly ingests, inhales, or assimilates the agent from the environment.
- Indirectly ingests the agent through a food chain.
- Substances listed by the United States Department of Transportation as hazardous materials under Title 49 (Transportation) in the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 172, section 101 and appendices (found at: http://www.nara. gov, search for "List of CFR subjects").
- Hazardous wastes as defined in this chapter.


## Hazardous waste

Any substance designated by the department of ecology as a dangerous or extremely hazardous waste by chapter 173303 WAC, Dangerous waste regulations.

## Hazardous waste site

A hazardous waste site is any facility or location within the scope of this chapter.

## Hazardous materials team (HAZMAT team)

A group of employees who are expected to perform responses to releases, or possible releases, of hazardous substances for the purpose of control and stabilization. As a result of their duties, HAZMAT team members may have close contact with hazardous substances.

## Health hazard

A chemical, mixture, biological agent, or physical agent that may cause health effects in short- or long-term exposed employees based on statistically significant evidence from at least one study conducted using established scientific principles. Health hazards include:

- Carcinogens.
- Toxic or highly toxic agents.
- Reproductive toxins.
- Irritants.
- Corrosives.
- Sensitizers.
- Hepatotoxins (liver toxins).
- Nephrotoxins (kidney toxins).
- Neurotoxins (nervous system toxins).
- Substances that act on the hematopoietic system (blood or blood-forming system).
- Substances that can damage the lungs, skin, eyes, or mucous membranes.
- Hot or cold conditions.

IDLH or immediately dangerous to life or health
Any atmospheric condition that would:

- Cause an immediate threat to life;

OR

- Cause permanent or delayed adverse health effects;

OR

- Interfere with an employee's ability to escape.


## Incidental release

A release that can be safely controlled at the time of the release and does not have the potential to become an uncontrolled release.

An example of a situation that results in an incidental release:

A tanker truck is receiving a load of hazardous liquid when a leak occurs. The driver knows the only hazard from the liquid is minor skin irritation. The employer has trained the driver on procedures and provided equipment to use for a release of this quantity. The driver puts on skin protection and stops the leak. A spill kit is used to contain, absorb, and pick up the spilled material for disposal.

## Material safety data sheet (MSDS)

Written, printed, or electronic information (on paper, microfiche, or on-screen) that informs manufacturers, distributors, employers or employees about a hazardous chemical, its hazards and protective measures as required by chapter 296-839 WAC, Content and distribution of material safety data sheets (MSDSs) and label information.

## Oxygen deficiency

An atmosphere where the percentage of oxygen by volume is less than $19.5 \%$.

## Permissible exposure limit (PEL)

Permissible exposure limits (PELs) are employee exposures to toxic substances or harmful physical agents that must not be exceeded. PELs are specified in applicable WISHA rules.

## Published exposure level

Exposure limits published in "National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) Recommendations for Occupational Safety and Health" (DHHS publication \#92-100, 1992).

If an exposure limit is not published by NIOSH, then "published exposure level" means the exposure limits published by the American Conference of Governmental Industrial Hygienists (ACGIH) in "TLVs and BEIs-Threshold Limit Values for Chemical Substances and Physical Agents" (1999 edition).

## Postemergency response

The stage of the emergency response where the immediate threat from the release has been stabilized or eliminated, and cleanup of the site has started. For more information, see the definition for "emergency response."

## Site safety and health supervisor (or official)

The individual present at a hazardous waste site who is responsible to the employer and has the authority and knowledge necessary to establish the site-specific health and safety plan and verify compliance with applicable safety and health requirements.

## Site work zones

Zones established at a hazardous waste site before cleanup work begins to control work on the site and access to the site. The work zones are: Exclusion zone, contamination reduction zone, and clean zone.

## Uncontrolled hazardous waste site

An area where an accumulation of hazardous substances creates a threat to the health and safety of individuals or the environment or both. Examples include: Former municipal, county, or state landfills, locations where illegal or poorly managed waste disposal has taken place, or property of generators or former generators of hazardous substance waste (surface impoundments, landfills, dumps, and tank or drum farms).

## Uncontrolled release

A release where significant safety and health risks could be created. Releases of hazardous substances that are either incidental or couldn't create a safety or health hazard (i.e., fire, explosion, or chemical exposure) aren't considered to be, uncontrolled releases.

Examples of conditions that could create a significant safety and health risk:

- Large-quantity releases.
- Small releases that could be highly toxic.
- Potentially contaminated individuals arriving at hospitals.
- Airborne exposures that could exceed a WISHA permissible exposure limit or a published exposure limit and employees aren't adequately trained or equipped to control the release.

Example of an uncontrolled release:
A forklift driver knocks over a container of a solventbased liquid, releasing the contents onto the warehouse floor. The driver has been trained to recognize the vapor is flammable and moderately toxic when inhaled. The driver hasn't been trained or provided appropriate equipment to address this type of spill. In this situation, it isn't safe for the driver to attempt a response. The driver needs to notify someone of the release so an emergency response can be initiated.

## WSR 04-02-063 <br> PERMANENT RULES DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

[Filed January 7, 2004, 9:56 a.m.]
Date of Adoption: January 5, 2004.
Purpose: The 2003 legislature transferred the livestock nutrient management program from the Department of Ecology' to the Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA). By enacting ESSB 5889, the legislature gave WSDA the authority to take immediate corrective action and formal regulatory enforcement action for violations of chapter 90.64 RCW, Dairy nutrient management, and chapter 90.48 RCW, Water pollution control. However, ESSB 5889 left the appeal of any WSDA livestock nutrient management program action under the jurisdiction of the Pollution Control Hearings Board.

This rule-making order adopts amendments to chapter 16-08 WAC, Practice and procedure, to make clear that any
appeal of livestock nutrient management program orders and penalties must be appealed to the Pollution Control Hearings Board under chapter 43.21B RCW, Environmental hearings office-Pollution control hearings board, and chapter 371-08 WAC, Environmental hearings office-Pollution control hearings board. An appellant cannot use the procedural rules in chapter $16-08 \mathrm{WAC}$. The adopted amendments also clarify that any appeal of livestock nutrient management program orders and penalties must be served on and handled by WSDA rather than the Department of Ecology.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 16-08-003 Declaration of purpose and applicability. This chapter sets forth the rules of procedure that are applicable to adjudicative proceedings before the department. Because civil penalties and orders issued by the department pursuant to chapters 90.64 and 90.48 RCW in the livestock nutrient management program are appealable only to the pollution control hearings board (PCHB) under chapter 43.21B RCW and chapter 371-08 WAC, this chapter is not applicable to those proceedings.

(1) The department will issue an interim permit to any applicant who has shown to the satisfaction of the department that the applicant:
(a) Is supervised by a speech-language pathologist or audiologist ((eertified)) licensed under chapter 18.35 RCW,
in good standing for at least two years unless otherwise approved by the board.
((i) Supervision infludes-the-personat-and-direet involvement of the superviser. The superviser must difectly observe diagnestic and therapeutie procedures.
(ii) All purchase agreements for the sate of hearing instruments must be-signed by the supervisor and the permit holder:
(iii) Ne certified audiolegist or speech-language pathelogist under chapter 18.35 RCW may-assume-the respensibit ity-for mere than one permit helder.
(iv) The-stperviser is respensible-for alt atts of the interim-permit holder-in-connection-with audiolegy-or speech-language pathelegy-serviees during the duratien-of the permit:))
(b) Has paid the application and permit fee.
(c) Has not committed unprofessional conduct as specified by the Uniform Disciplinary Act or chapter 18.35 RCW.
(2) The provisions of RCW 18.35.030, 18.35.110, 18.35 .120 ((shatl)) apply to ((any-person issued-an interim)) permit holders. A person issued an audiology interim permit may engage in the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments.
(3) The interim permit shall contain the name and title of the ((eertified)) supervisor licensed under chapter 18.35 RCW ((who is supervising the permit holder. The superviser shall execute and submit to the department acknowledgment of responsibility for all acts of the permit holder in conneetion with audiolegy-or speech language pathology serviees)).

## Interim permit period.

(4) The interim permit period is divided into three equal segments. The supervisor must complete a minimum of:
(a) ((Nolessthan)) At least thirty-six supervisory activities spaced uniformly throughout the year.
(b) At least eighteen on-site observations (one hour equals one on-site observation). At least six on-site observations must be accrued during each segment (up to six hours may be accrued in one day).
(c) Eighteen other monitoring activities, at least six per segment.
(d) Upon the completion of each segment the supervisor must submit documentation of completion to the department on a form provided by the department.
(e) A review of all purchase agreements in the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments prior to signing. All purchase agreements ((wiH)) must be signed by the supervisor.
(5) The interim permit is valid for one year or for the duration of the postgraduate experience. The interim permit ((witl)) expires one year from the date ((efits isstante)) it is issued. The board may extend the permit an additional six months.

## Supervisor delegation.

(6) Portions of the supervisory activities including the supervision in hearing instrument fitting and dispensing may be obtained in another facility and may be under the supervision of another ((eertified)) licensed speech-language pathologist or audiologist as delegated by the supervisor of record.
(a) The audiologist supervisor of record may delegate the supervision of hearing instrument fitting and dispensing to a
licensed hearing instrument fitter/dispenser who has been licensed in good standing for at least two years.
(b) Delegation of the responsibility of supervision must be approved by the department.
(7) The department may approve transfer of a permit holder to another eligible supervisor upon the written request of either the supervisor or the permit holder.
(8) ((It is the respensibility- $\theta f)$ ) The permit holder ((te)) must immediately report the termination of the supervisor to the department in writing, by certified mail.
(9) The supervisor of a permit holder who desires to terminate the responsibility as supervisor must immediately notify the department in writing, by certified mail, of the termination. The supervisor is responsible for the permit holder until ((sueh timeas)) the notification of termination to the department is deposited in the United States mail.

WAC 246-828-075 Student supervisors-Scope and definitions. $(((+)))$ Students enrolled in an accredited education or training program may perform the duties of a hearing instrument fitter/dispenser in the course of their training if under the supervision of a Washington state licensed hearing instrument fitter/dispenser or ((eertified)) audiologist.
(l) Supervision ((shat)) means ((that)) the licensee( $(t$ eertifiente helder)) is physically present on the premises at all times.
(a) Supervision includes the personal and direct involvement of the supervisor. The supervisor must:

(b) A licensed audiologist or speech-language pathologist under chapter 18.35 RCW may not assume the responsibility for more than one permit holder.
(c) The supervisor is responsible for all acts of the permit holder in connection with audiology or speech-language pathology services through the duration of the permit. The supervisor shall execute and submit to the department acknowledgment of responsibility for all acts of the permit holder in connection with audiology or speech-language pathology services.
(2) An accredited education or training program ((shalH bedefined-as)) means any course of study in the field of fitting and dispensing hearing instruments that is offered by a school or program recognized by the state of Washington.
(3) The student shall at all times wear an identification badge readily visible to the public ((whieh)) that identifies him or her as a student.
(((4) The lieensedfeertified-superviser-shall- be respensi-ble-for all acts the-student:))

WAC 246-828-090 Standards for equipment calibration. (1) All electronic equipment utilized by licensees(/feer tifieate helders)) for the determination of audiometric thresh-
olds for pure tones and for speech shall conform to all current standards of the American National Standards Institute. Licensees((feertifieate holders)) shall insure that all such audiometric equipment has been evaluated electrically and acoustically at least once each year, adjusted or repaired if necessary, and that conformity with such standards was determined at that time. Licensees must maintain calibration records ((ef such-calibration-shall-be)) permanently ((maint tained by licensees/eertifiente holders)) and licensees shall ((be)) make the records available for inspection by the department at any time ((by the department)). No licensee((1eertif ieate-holder shall be permitted to) ) may certify ((as-t日)) the calibration of his or her own equipment unless authorized to do so by the department. In addition, all licensees((\&eertifieate holders shall utilize)) must use routine procedures for the daily inspection of audiometric equipment, or prior to use if used less often than on a daily basis, to generally determine that it is in normal working order.
(2) Hearing instruments, assistive listening devices, and electronic equipment used for assessment and/or monitoring of auditory and vestibular function ((shalt)) must be maintained according to manufacturer's specifications.
(3) All instrumental technology used to diagnose and/or treat disorders of communication, swallowing and hearing shall be maintained in proper working order and be properly calibrated according to accepted standards.

WAC 246-828-095 Audiology minimum standards of practice. ((Certified)) Licensed audiologists are independent practitioners who provide a comprehensive array of services related to the identification, assessment, habitation/rehabilitation and prevention of auditory and vestibular impairments.

Audiologists serve in a number of roles including but not limited to clinician, therapist, teacher, consultant, researcher, and administrator. Audiologists provide services in hospitals, clinics, schools, nursing facilities, care centers, private practice and other settings in which audiological services are relevant. Audiologists provide services to individuals of all ages.

Audiologists must engage in and supervise only those aspects of the profession that are within the scope of their education, training and experience.

Standard procedures for providing audiology services may include one or more of the following:
(1) Case history (( $\ddagger$ inelude)) including:
(a) Documentation of referrals.
(b) Historical review of the nature, onset, progression and stability of the hearing problem, and associated otic and/or vestibular symptoms.
(c) Review of communication difficulties.
(d) Review of medical, pharmacology, vocational, social and family history pertinent to the etiology, assessment and management of the underlying hearing disorder.
(2) Physical examination of the external ear ((ineludes)) including:
(a) Otoscopic examination of the external auditory canal to detect:
(i) Congenital or traumatic abnormalities of the external canal or tympanic membrane.
(ii) Inflammation or irritation of the external canal or tympanic membrane.
(iii) Perforation of the tympanic membrane and/or discharge from the external canal.
(iv) A foreign body or impacted cerumen in the external canal.
(b) Cerumen management to clean the external canal and to remove excess cerumen for the preservation of hearing.
(c) Referral for otologic evaluation and/or treatment when ((indieated)) necessary.
(3) Identification of audiometry:
(a) Hearing screening administered as needed, requested, or mandated for those persons who may be identified as at risk for hearing impairment.
(b) Referral of persons who fail the screening for rescreening, audiologic assessment and/or for medical or other examination and services.
(c) Audiologists may perform speech and language screening measures for initial identification and referral.
(4) Assessment of auditory function ((ineludes)) including:
(a) The administration of behavioral and/or objective measures of the peripheral and central auditory system to determine the presence, degree and nature of hearing loss or central auditory impairment, the effect of the hearing impairment on communication, and/or the site of the lesion within the auditory system. Assessment may also include procedures to detect and quantify nonorganic hearing loss.
(i) When traditional audiometric techniques cannot be employed as in infants, children or multiple impaired clients, developmentally appropriate behavioral and/or objective measures may be employed.
(ii) Assessment and intervention of central auditory processing disorders in which there is evidence of communication disorders may be provided in collaboration with other professionals.
(b) Interpretation of measurement recommendations for habilitative/rehabilitative management and/or referral for further evaluation and the counseling of the client and family.
(5) Assessment of vestibular function ((ineludes)) including administration and interpretation of behavioral and objective measures of equilibrium to detect pathology within the vestibular system, to determine the site of lesion, to monitor changes in balance and to determine the contribution of visual, vestibular and proprioceptive systems to balance.
(6) Habilitation/rehabilitation of auditory and vestibular disorders ((may inelude)) including:
(a) Aural rehabilitation therapy
(b) Fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments and assistive listening devices.
(c) Habilitative and rehabilitative nonmedical management of disorders of equilibrium.
(7) Industrial and community hearing conservation programs.
(8) Intraoperative neurophysiologic monitoring.
(9) Standardized and nonstandardized procedures may be employed for assessment, habilitation/rehabilitation of auditory and vestibular disorders. When standardized proce-
dures are employed they must be conducted according to the standardized procedure or exception documented. Nonstandardized measures must be conducted according to established principles and procedures of the profession.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 98-06-079, filed 3/3/98, effective 4/3/98)

WAC 246-828-100 Hearing instrument fitting dis-pensing-Minimal standards of practice. Minimum procedures in the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments ((shalt)) include:
(1) ((Obtain)) Obtaining case history ((to inelude the fot fowing) ) including:
(a) As required by WAC 246-828-280, documentation of referrals, or as otherwise required by this chapter.
(b) Historical evaluation ((to include)) including inquiry regarding hearing loss, onset of loss, and any associated symptoms including significant noise in the ears, vertigo, acute or chronic dizziness, nausea, earaches, or other such discomfort which may indicate the presence of medical illness. Specific inquiry should be made to determine if hearing loss has been sudden or rapidly progressive in the past ninety days, if there has been any active drainage or infection in ears during the past ninety days, and if there are any specific physical problems ((whieh)) that may relate to the use of a hearing instrument.
(2) ((Examination )) Examining the ears ((should be dene)) to reasonably determine if any of the following conditions exist:
(a) Impacted ear wax.
(b) Foreign body within the ear canal.
(c) Discharge in the ear canal.
(d) Presence of inflammation or irritation of the ear canal.
(e) Perforation of the ear drum.
(f) Any other abnormality.
(3) Hearing testing ((shall be performed)) to include the following:
(a) Hearing loss, or residual hearing, shall be established for each ear using pure tone threshold audiometry by air and bone conduction with effective masking as required.
(b) Appropriate live voice or recorded speech audiometry by ear phones to determine the following: Speech reception threshold, most comfortable level, uncomfortable level, and the speech discrimination percent.
(c) Hearing testing shall be conducted in the appropriate environment as required by WAC 246-828-080, minimum standards of equipment, or as otherwise required by this chapter.
(d) When pure tone audiometry indicates an air-bone gap of 15 db or more, 500,1000 , and 2000 Hz , the presence of unilateral hearing loss, or any inconsistent audiometric findings, the client shall be advised of the potential help available through medical treatment. ((Should)) If the client declines ((t-consider such metheds, or-if the elient has previousty)) medical treatment, has been appropriately treated previously, or has been advised against ((sueh procedures;)) medical treatment, the licensee shall make an appropriate notation ((shallbe made)) in the client's record.
(e) In the event a client is referred to a licensee by an M.A. audiologist, otologist, otolaryngologist, or by a fitter/ dispenser duly licensed under chapter 18.35 RCW , and the audiometric results obtained within the previous six months are provided to the licensee as a part of this referral, the applicable provisions of WAC 246-828-100 shall not be required. However, a confirmatory audiometric examination is recommended.
(4) Medical evaluation requirements:
(a) If the prospective hearing instrument user is eighteen years of age or older, the hearing instrument dispenser may afford the prospective user an opportunity to waive the medical evaluation requirements of (b) of this subsection ((prowided that)) if the hearing instrument dispenser:
(i) Informs the prospective user that the exercise of the waiver is not in the user's best health interest;
(ii) Does not in any way actively encourage the prospective user to waive ((such a)) the medical evaluation;
(iii) ((Afferds)) Offers the prospective user the opportunity to sign the following statement:

I have been advised by (hearing instrument fitter/dispenser or audiologist name) that the Food and Drug Administration has determined that my best health interest would be served if I had a medical evaluation before purchasing a hearing instrument; and
(iv) Provides the prospective user with a copy of the signed waiver statement.
(b) Except as provided in (a) of this subsection, a hearing instrument dispenser shall not sell a hearing instrument unless the prospective user has presented to the hearing instrument dispenser a written statement signed by a licensed physician that states that the patient's hearing loss has been medically evaluated and the patient may be considered a candidate for a hearing instrument. The medical evaluation must have taken place within the preceding six months.
(5) Selection and fitting of the hearing instrument ((shall inelude the follewing)) includes providing the client:
(a) ((Provide)) Information regarding the selection of the most appropriate method and model for amplification for the needs of the client.
(b) ((Previde-the-user-with)) The cost of the recommended instruments and services.
(c) ((Provide for or have available)) An appropriate custom made ear mold.
(d) ((Provide)) Final fitting of the hearing instrument to ensure physical and operational comfort.
(e) ((Provide)) Ádequate instructions and appropriate post-fitting adjustments to ensure the most successful use of the hearing instrument.
(6) Keeping records on every client to whom the licensee/certificate holder renders service in connection with the dispensing of a hearing instrument. ((Sueh)) These records ((shat)) must be preserved for at least three years after the dispensing of the first hearing instrument to the client. If other hearing instruments are subsequently dispensed to that client, cumulative records must be maintained for at least three years after the ((latest)) most recent dispensing of an instrument to that client. The records must be available for the department inspection and ((will)) must include:
(a) Client's case history.
(b) Source of referral and appropriate documents.
(c) Medical clearance for the hearing instrument user or the waiver set forth in subsection (4)(a)(iii) of this section which has been signed after being fully informed that it is in the best health interest to seek medical evaluation.
(d) Copies of any contracts and receipts executed in connection with the fitting and dispensing of each hearing instrument provided.
(e) A complete record of tests, test results, and services provided except for minor services.
(f) All correspondence specifically related to the service given the client or the hearing instrument or instruments dispensed to the client.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 99-19-058, filed 9/15/99, effective 10/16/99)

WA C 246-828-105 Speech-language pathologyMinimum standards of practice. ((Gertified)) Licensed speech-language pathologists are independent practitioners who provide a comprehensive array of services related to the identification, assessment, habilitation/rehabilitation, of communication disorders and dysphagia. Speech-language pathologists serve in a number of roles including but not limited to clinician, therapist, teacher, consultant, researcher, and administrator. Speech-language pathologists provide services in hospitals, clinics, schools, nursing facilities, care centers, private practice, and other settings in which speechlanguage pathology services are relevant. Speech-language pathologists provide services to individuals of all ages.

Services must be provided and products dispensed only when benefit can reasonably be expected. All services provided and products dispensed must be evaluated for effectiveness. A certified speech-language pathologist must engage in and supervise only those aspects of the profession that are within the scope of their education, training, and experience. Speech-language pathologists must provide services appropriate to each individual in his or her care, which may include one or more of the following standard procedures:
(1) Case history, ((to inelude the following)) including:
(a) Documentation of referral.
(b) Review of the communication, cognitive and/or swallowing problem.
(c) Review of pertinent medical, pharmacological, social and educational status.
(2) Examination of the oral mechanism for the purposes of determining adequacy for speech communication and swallowing.
(3) Screening to include: Speech and language.
(a) Hearing screening, limited to pure-tone air conduction and screening tympanometry.
(b) Swallowing screening. Children under the age of three years who are considered at risk are assessed, not screened;
(4) Assessment may include the following:
(a) Language may include parameters of phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics; and include receptive and expressive communication in oral, written, graphic and manual modalities;
(b) Speech may include articulation, fluency, and voice (including respiration, phonation and resonance). Treatment shall address appropriate areas;
(c) Swallowing;
(d) Cognitive aspects of communication may include communication disability and other functional disabilities associated with cognitive impairment;
(e) Central auditory processing disorders in collaboration with other qualified professionals;
(f) Social aspects of communication may include challenging behaviors, ineffective social skills, lack of communication opportunities;
(g) Augmentative and alternative communication include the development of techniques and strategies that include selecting, and dispensing of aids and devices (excluding hearing instruments) and providing training to individuals, their families, and other communication partners in their use.
(5) Habilitation/rehabilitation of communication and swallowing ((to inelude the following)) including:
(a) Treatment of speech disorders including articulation, fluency and voice.
(b) Treatment of language disorders including phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics; and include receptive and expressive communication in oral, written, graphic and manual modalities.
(c) Treatment of swallowing disorders.
(d) Treatment of the cognitive aspects of communication.
(e) Treatment of central auditory processing disorders in which there is evidence of speech, language, and/or other cognitive communication disorders.
(f) Treatment of individuals with hearing loss, including aural rehabilitation and related counseling.
(g) Treatment of social aspects of communication, including challenging behaviors, ineffective social skills, and lack of communication opportunities.
(6) All services must be provided with referral to other qualified resources when appropriate.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending Order 165B, filed 5/8/91, effective 6/8/91)

WAC 246-828-220 Unfair or deceptive practices, unethical conduct and unfair methods of competitionUsed or rebuilt products. (1) A licensee may not represent, directly or indirectly, that any industry product or part thereof is new, unused, or rebuilt, ((wher ) if it is not ((the f(at)).
(2) In the marketing of a hearing ((aid)) instrument which has been used, or which contains used parts, a licensee ((shatl make full and nendeeptive diselosure of sueh fatt)) must fully and nondeceptively disclose that the product or its parts are used in all advertising and promotional literature relating to the product, on the container, box or package in which ((such)) the product is packed or enclosed and, if the product has the appearance of being new, on the product itself. The required disclosure may be made by use of ((sueh)) words such as "used," "secondhand," "repaired," or
"rebuilt," whichever most accurately describes the product involved.
(3) A licensee shall not misrepresent the identity of the rebuilder of a hearing ((aid)) instrument. If the rebuilding of a hearing ((aid)) instrument was done by other than the original manufacturer, a licensee shall disclose ((sueh)) this fact wherever the original manufacturer is identified.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 98-06-079, filed $3 / 3 / 98$, effective 4/3/98)

WAC 246-828-270 Personal disclosure. A licensee((feertifieate holder)) who contacts a prospective purchaser away from the licensee's((feertifieate holder's)) place of business must:
(1) When the contact is in person, present the prospective purchaser with written notice of:
(a) His or her name, the name of his or her business firm, his or her business address and telephone number;
(b) The number of his or her license((/feertificate)).
(2) Telephone contact with prospective purchasers must disclose the name of the licensee((/eertificate heldef)), name and location of his or her principal establishment and purpose of call.
(3) When the contact is through a direct mail piece or other advertising initiated by the licensee( (fertifieate holdef)), clearly show on all promotional items the business/ establishment name, the principal establishment address and telephone number, not just the address or telephone number where he/she will be on given days.
(4) A principal establishment is one which is bonded ((pursuant te)) under RCW 18.35.240.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 02-14-052, filed $6 / 27 / 02$, effective 7/28/02)

WAC 246-828-290 Purchaser recision rights. In addition to the receipt and disclosure information required by RCW 18.35.030, 18.35.185, 63.14.040 and 63.14.120, every retail agreement for the sale of hearing instruments shall contain or have attached the following notice to buyer in twelve point type or larger. The language in part 1 under "Notice to Buyer" is intended to have the same legal effect as the notices required in RCW 63.14.040(2) and 63.14.120(3) and may be substituted for those notices.

The rights summarized in the "Notice to Buyer" must be made known to the purchaser before the contract is executed. The licensee ((er certifieate holder)) must provide this "Notice to Buyer" in writing to the purchaser. The purchaser must demonstrate knowledge of these rights by initialing each numbered section of the "Notice to Buyer" and by signing his or her name in the appropriate space following the "Notice to Buyer."

## Notice to Buyer

Do not sign this agreement before you read it or if any spaces intended for the agreed terms are blank.

You are entitled to receive a copy of this agreement at the time you sign it.

The seller's business address must be shown on the agreement.

## Section 1 CANCELLATION - WITHIN THREE DAYS Purchaser's Initial

You may cancel this agreement within three days, without explaining your reasons, if the seller solicited it in person and you signed it at a place other than the seller's business address.

To cancel this agreement without explaining your reasons, you must notify the seller in writing that you are canceling the agreement. You may deliver the written notice to the seller at the seller's business address. Alternatively, you may send the written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the seller at the seller's business address.

Your written notice must be mailed or delivered by midnight of the third business day after you signed this agreement.

Any merchandise you received under this agreement must be in its original condition. You must return it to the seller or make it available to the seller at the same place it was delivered to you.

The seller must refund to you all deposits, including any down payment, and must return to you all goods traded in as part of the agreement.

You will incur no additional liability for canceling the agreement.

## Section 2 RECISION - WITHIN THIRTY DAYS <br> Purchaser's Initial

You may rescind (or terminate) the agreement within thirty days, for reasonable cause. This thirty-day period is called the "recision period."

To rescind this agreement, you must notify the seller in writing that you are rescinding the agreement for reasonable cause pursuant to RCW 18.35.185(1). (Reasonable cause does not include cosmetic concerns or a mere change of mind.) You may deliver the written notice to the seller at the seller's business address. Alternatively, you may send the written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the seller at the seller's business address.

Your written notice must be mailed or delivered by midnight of the thirtieth day after delivery of the hearing instrument.

Any merchandise you received under this agreement must be in its original condition, except for normal wear and tear. You must return it to the seller or make it available to the seller at the same place it was delivered to you.

The seller must refund to you all deposits, including any down payment, and must return to you all goods traded in as part of the agreement. However, for each hearing instrument you return, the seller may keep either one hundred fifty dollars or fifteen percent of the total purchase price, whichever is less. The seller also may deduct any costs incurred in making traded-in goods ready for resale.

The seller must refund your money and return your traded goods, or have them postmarked and in the mail to you, within ten business days after receiving your notice of recision.

You will incur no additional liability for rescinding the agreement.

## Section 3 EXTENSION OF RECISION PERIOD Purchaser's Initial

If you notify the seller within the thirty-day recision period that your hearing instrument has developed a problem that constitutes reasonable cause to rescind the agreement or that prevents you from evaluating your hearing instrument, the seller must extend the recision period. The recision period stops running on the date you notify the seller of the problem and starts running again on the date the seller notifies you that your hearing instrument is ready for redelivery.

You and the seller may agree to a recision period longer than thirty days.

Whenever the recision period is extended, the seller must provide you written notice of the last date upon which you may demand a refund and return of traded goods.

WAC 246-828-320 Minimum standards for fitting and dispensing locations. (1) The hours of business of each hearing instrument establishment shall be prominently and continuously displayed and visible to the public at each regular place or places of business owned or operated by that establishment.
(2) ((All-such)) Any regular place or places of business or any activities ((emating therefrem-shall)) resulting from these locations must meet the minimum standards for facilities and equipment essential for the testing of hearing and the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments ((as-set forth)) in WAC 246-828-080.
(3) The term "place or places of business" means a location where a licensee((رeertificate helder)) engages or intends to engage in the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments at a permanent address(es) open to the public on a regular basis.

WAC 246-828-330 Notice of availability and location of follow-up services. Every licensee((/eertifieate holder)) shall provide to a hearing instrument purchaser, in writing prior to the signing of the contract, notice of availability of services. The notice shall include the specific location of the follow-up service, including date and time if applicable.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 98-06-079, filed $3 / 3 / 98$, effective $4 / 3 / 98$ )

WAC 246-828-350 Reasonable cause for recision. RCW 18.35.190(2) allows the purchaser of the hearing instrument(s) ((may)) to rescind the purchase and recover moneys ((in aecordance with RCW $18.35 .190(2)$ )) for reasonable cause. The term "reasonable cause" ((is-defined to inelude the following)) includes:
(1) Any material misstatement of fact or misrepresentation by the licensee((feertifieate holder)) regarding the hearing instrument(s) or fitting and dispensing services to be provided which the purchaser relied on or which induced the purchaser into making the agreement;
(2) Failure by the licensee((feertifieate holder)) to provide the purchaser with the hearing instrument(s) and fitting and dispensing services which conform to those specified in the purchase agreement between the parties;
(3) Diagnosis of a medical condition unknown to the purchaser at the time of purchase, which precludes the purchaser from using the hearing instrument(s);
(4) Failure by the licensee((fcertificate holder)) to remedy a significant material defect of the hearing instrument(s) within a reasonable period of time in accordance with RCW 18.35.190 (2)(c);
(5) The hearing instrument(s) and/or fitting and dispensing services would not be in accordance with accepted practices of the industry; and
(6) Failure by the licensee((feertifieate holder fails)) to meet any standard of conduct prescribed in the laws regarding the fitting and dispensing of hearing instruments and this failure adversely affects in any way the transaction which the purchaser seeks to rescind.

WAC 246-828-500 Citation and purpose. The purpose of these rules is to require licensed hearing ((aid)) instrument fitters and dispensers to continue their professional education as a condition of maintaining a license to practice the fitting and dispensing of hearing ((aids)) instruments in this state.

an industry-recognized local, state, national, or international organization. Only ((such)) programs ((which)) that have accompanying required comprehension tests ((efeomprehensien)) upon completion ((and)) that are independently graded ((shall)) may be accepted.

## Date of Adoption: December 19, 2003.

Purpose: The Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) will establish a new program for individuals in need of employment/day program services. Under existing rules, employment and day program services were paid as state supplementary payments or through the counties. These emergency rules identify a new program whereby DDD will pay individuals directly with state-only funds and require that these individuals purchase the necessary employment/day program services. These rules are needed to extend emergency rules filed as WSR 03-18-029 on August 25, 2003, while the department completes the regular rule-making process. Proposed rules were filed as WSR 03-21-156, and a public hearing was held on December 9, 2003.

Citation of Existing Rules Affected by this Order: Amending WAC 388-825-020, 388-825-055, 388-825-100, 388-825-120, 388-825-205, 388-825-252, 388-825-254, 388-850-035, and 388-850-045.

Statutory Authority for Adoption: RCW 71A.12.030.
Other Authority: RCW 71A.10.020, 2001-03 Supplemental Budget ESSB 6387 (chapter 371, Laws of 2002).

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds that immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest; and that state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.

Reasons for this Finding: Conditions have changed since the emergency rule was adopted as WSR 03-10-027. On July 18, 2003, the Social Security Administration (SSA) informed the state that its current rules governing the payment of the state supplementary payments (SSP) did not satisfy requirements under section 1616(a) and 1618 of the Social Security Act ("the act"), 42 U.S.C. 1382(e)[a], 42 U.S.C. $1382(\mathrm{~g})$ and regulations at 20 C.F.R. 416.2001 and 20 C.F.R. 416.2095-2099. Specifically, payment to individuals with developmental disabilities to purchase employment/day program services under existing rules were found by SSA to be vendor payments and disallowed as SSP. Failure to comply with these requirements jeopardizes the department's ability to receive federal financial participation under Title XIX of the act. These rules create a new DDD program for individuals in employment/day programs and removes SSP funding for employment/day programs. The rules are necessary to implement chapter 371, Laws of 2002.

Immediate adoption is necessary to preserve the public health and general welfare for individuals with developmental disabilities who need employment/day program services. Further, immediate adoption is necessary to preserve the public health and general welfare by allowing the state to continue to receive federal financial participation (FFP) for its

Medicaid program under Title XIX of the act. The loss of FFP would effectively terminate medical assistance under Title XIX for low-income families and individuals in the state of Washington. Establishment of a new DDD program for individuals in employment/day programs is necessary to continue support for these individuals.

WAC 388-825-020 Definitions. "Abandonment" means action or inaction by a person or entity with a duty to care for a vulnerable adult that leaves the vulnerable person without the means or ability to obtain necessary food, clothing, shelter, or health care.
"Adolescent" means a DDD eligible child age thirteen through seventeen years.
"Attendant care" means provision of physical and/or behavioral support to protect the safety and well being of a client.
"Best interest" includes, but is not limited to, clientcentered benefits to:
(1) Prevent regression or loss of skills already acquired;
(2) Achieve or maintain economic self-support;
(3) Achieve or maintain self-sufficiency;
(4) Prevent or remedy neglect, abuse, or exploitation of individuals unable to protect their own interest;
(5) Preserve or reunite families; and
(6) Provide the least-restrictive setting that will meet the person's medical and personal needs.
"Client or person" means a person the division determines under RCW 71A.16.040 and WAC 388-825-030 eligible for division-funded services.
"Community support services" means one or more of the services listed in RCW 71A.12.040 including, but not limited to the following services: Architectural, case management, early childhood intervention, employment, counseling, family support, respite care, information and referral, health services and equipment, therapy services, and residential support.
"Companion home" means the same as "intensive individual supported living support."
"Department" means the department of social and health services of the state of Washington.
"Director" means the director of the division of developmental disabilities.
"Division or DDD" means the division of developmental disabilities of the department of social and health services.
"Emergency" means a sudden, unexpected occurrence demanding immediate action.
"Exemption" means the department's approval of a written request for an exception to a rule in this chapter.
"Family" means individuals, of any age, living together in the same household and related by blood, marriage, adoption or as a result of sharing legal custody of a minor child.
"Family resources coordinator" means the person who is:
(1) Recognized by the IDEA Part C lead agency; and
(2) Responsible for:
(a) Providing family resources coordination;
(b) Coordinating services across agencies; and
(c) Serving as a single contact to help families receiving assistance and services for their eligible children who are under three years of age.
"ICF/MR" means a facility certified as an intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded by Title XIX to provide services to the mentally retarded or persons with related conditions.
"ICF/MR Eligible" for admission to an ICF/MR means a person is determined by DDD as needing active treatment as defined in CFR 483.440. Active treatment requires:
(1) Twenty-four hour supervision; and
(2) Continuous training and physical assistance in order to function on a daily basis due to deficits in the following areas: Toilet training, personal hygiene, dental hygiene, selffeeding, bathing, dressing, grooming, and communication.
"Individual" means a person applying for services from the division.
"Individual alternative living" means provision of community-based individualized client training, assistance and/or ongoing support to enable a client to live as independently as possible with minimal services.
( ("Individun-supportive living serviee") (also known as companion heme) means provision of twenty-four heur residential suppert in a nenlieensed heme for one adult per sen-with-developmental disabilities.))
"Intelligence quotient score" means a full scale score on the Wechsler, or the intelligence quotient score on the Stanford-Binet or the Leiter International Performance Scale.
"Intensive individual supported living support" (also known as companion home) means provision of twenty-four hour residential support in a nonlicensed home for no more than one adult person with developmental disabilities in a regular family residence approved and contracted by the department ensuring client health, safety and well-being.
"Medicaid personal care" is the provision of medically necessary personal care tasks as defined in chapter 388-15 WAC.
"Nonresidential programs" means programs including, but not limited to, county-funded habilitation services.
"Nursing facility eligible" means a person is assessed by DDD as meeting the requirements for admission to a licensed nursing home as defined in WAC 388-71-0700 (3) through (5). The person must require twenty-four hour care provided by or under the supervision of a licensed nurse.
"Other resources" means resources that may be available to the client, including but not limited to:
(1) Private insurance;
(2) Medicaid;
(3) Indian health care;
(4) Public school services through the office of the superintendent of public instruction; and
(5) Services through the department of health.
"Part C" means early intervention for children from birth through thirty-five months of age as defined in the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), Part C and 34 CFR, Part 303 and Washington's federally approved grant.
"Residential habilitation center" or "RHC" means a state-operated facility certified to provide ICF/MR and/or nursing facility level of care for persons with developmental disabilities.
"RHC capacity" means the maximum number of eligible persons that can reside in a residential habilitation center without exceeding its 1997 legislated budgeted capacity.
"Residential programs" means provision of support for persons in community living situations. Residential programs include DDD certified community residential services and support, both facility-based such as, licensed group homes, and non-facility based, i.e., supportive living, intensive tenant support, and state-operated living alternatives (SOLA). Other residential programs include individual alternative living, intensive individual supportive living services, adult family homes, adult residential care services, nursing homes, and children's foster homes.
"Respite care" means temporary residential services provided to a person and/or the person's family on an emergency or planned basis.
"Secretary" means the secretary of the department of social and health services or the secretary's designee.
"State supplementary payment (SSP)" is the state paid cash assistance program for certain DDD eligible SSI clients.
"Vacancy" means an opening at a RHC, which when filled, would not require the RHC to exceed its 1997 biannually budgeted capacity, minus:
(1) Twenty-six beds designated for respite care use; and
(2) Any downsizing related to negotiations with the Department of Justice regarding community placements.
"Vulnerable adult" means a person who has a developmental disability as defined under RCW 71A.10.020.

WAC 388-825-055 Authorization of services. (1) The division's field services section shall be responsible for authorizing services agreed to by the person/family including, but not limited to:
(a) Placement to and from residential habilitation centers;
(b) Community residential services;
(c) Family support services; ((and))
(d) Nonresidential programs; and
(e) Employment/day programs when the person receives the funding directly from DDD to pay for the services, subject to the eligibility requirements in WAC 388-825-060 and the restrictions in WAC 388-825-065. Allowable employment/day program services are listed in WAC 388-850-035.
(2) The division's authorization of state funded services shall be based on the ((avilmbility off)) services and funding available.
(a) Persons must meet the programmatic and financial eligibility requirements for the specific services;
(b) Funding for state paid services is available in the state operating budget; and
(c) SSP funding is not available to the client.
(3) The division will include the following persons when determining authorized services:
(a) The person;
(b) The person's parent or guardian and may include:
(i) The person's advocate; or
(ii) Other responsible parties.
(4) Per RCW 71A.16.010 the division shall offer adults the choice of admittance to a residential habilitation center if all of the following conditions exist:
(a) An RHC vacancy is available;
(b) Funding, specifically designated for this purpose in the state operating budget, is available for alternative community support services;
(c) The person or their family is requesting residential services;
(d) The person meets ICF/MR or nursing facility eligibility for the available RHC vacancy;
(e) The person is the most in need of residential services as determined by DDD after reviewing all persons determined eligible for ICF/MR or nursing facility level of care. DDD will make this selection based on the following criteria:
(i) The person is age eighteen or older;
(ii) The person's/family's health and safety is in jeopardy due to the lack of necessary residential support and supervision:
(A) Priority is given to eligible persons/families currently without necessary residential supports;
(B) Other eligible persons will be considered based on their risk of losing residential supports due to unstable or deteriorating circumstances.
(f) The person's alternative DDD funded community support services would cost seventy percent or more of the average RHC rate, assuming a minimum household size of three persons.
(5) If RHC capacity is not being used for permanent residents, the division will make these vacancies available for respite care or any other services the department determines are needed and allowable within the rules governing the use of federal funds.
(a) Admission of a child or adolescent to an RHC for respite care requires the written approval of the division director or designee.
(b) Respite care exceeding thirty days in a calendar year is subject to subsection (6) of this section.
(6) The division shall not make an emergency or temporary admission of a person to a residential habilitation center for thirty-one days or more without the written approval of the division director or the director's designee if the admission is not a choice provided under subsection (4) of this section.
(a) Children twelve years of age and younger shall not be admitted to an RHC.
(b) Admission of an adolescent to an RHC can only occur if:
(i) DDD determines that foster placement services cannot meet the emergency needs of the child/family; and
(ii) A voluntary placement plan is in place with DDD with the goal of community placement or family reunification; and
(iii) Progress towards placement planning is reported to the division director at least every ninety days.
(7) The division shall authorize county-funded services only when the ( $(\div$
$(\mathrm{a})$ )) service is included in a department contract $((\stackrel{\text { and }}{ }$
$(-))$ ) and the person is not receiving funding directly from DDD for employment/day program services:
(a) The person is at least twenty-one years of age and ((graduated from sehoolduring their twenty first year;or)) is no longer attending school; or
(b) The person is age twenty and graduates prior to his/her July or August twenty-first birthday; or
(c) ((Person is twenty-two years of age-or older; ©f
(d) Persen)) The child is two years of age or younger and eligible for early intervention services.
(8) The department shall require a person to participate in defraying the cost of services provided when mandated by state or federal regulation or statute.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-060 What are the eligibility requirements for persons who receive funds directly for employment/day programs? (1) You must have received the State Supplementary Payment for an employment/day program between September 2002 and July 2003.
(2) This program is available only to individuals born prior to September 1, 1981.
(3) If you were born between September 1, 1979 and August 31, 1981:
(a) You received employment/day program services from a county or a county-contracted provider funded by DDD between July 1, 2001 and June 30, 2003, and:
(i) You have been assessed by DDD, the division of vocational rehabilitation (DVR) or the department of services for the blind to be in need of long-term support; and
(ii) You receive services from a county or a county-contracted provider; and
(iii) You have developed a plan with DDD for employment/day program services.
(b) If you are on the home and community based services (HCBS) waiver administered by DDD and received employment/day program services between July 1, 2001 and August 31, 2002, but receive no HCBS waiver services from DDD other than employment/day program services, you will
receive employment/day program services according to WAC 388-850-035. You will not receive funds directly from DDD for employment/day program services.
(4) If you were born prior to September 1, 1979 and you have been assessed by DDD, the division of vocational rehabilitation (DVR) or the department of services for the blind to be in need of long-term support:
(a) You were authorized by DDD and the county for employment/day program services for December 2002; and
(b) These services were funded totally with state funds; and
(c) You continue to receive services from a county or county-contracted provider.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-064 What are the restrictions on the use of the funds paid directly to persons for employment/ day programs? For employment/day program services, you are required to use this money to purchase employment/day program services from a county or a county-contracted provider.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-070 What happens if I do not spend the funds paid directly to me for employment/day programs as specified in WAC 388-825-065? The department will stop sending these funds directly to you and has the right to recover any funds sent directly to you if it is determined that these funds were not spent as required in WAC 388-825065.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-075 How much money will I receive? The department will determine the amount of your payment on an individual basis.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-076 How often will I receive a direct payment check for my employment/day program services? You will receive a monthly warrant/check from the state.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-077 Who will the warrant/check be sent to? (1) The warrant/check will be sent directly to your protective payee or representative payee if you have one.
(2) If you do not have a protective payee or representative payee, the warrant/check will be sent directly to you.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-078 How will the warrant/check be sent? You may choose to have your check delivered through the US Postal Service, or as an electronic funds transfer.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-085 What is a representative payee? A representative payee is a person, organization, institution or agency that manages your DDD direct payments. They may also provide services such as helping you manage your money.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-086 Who can be a representative payee for my DDD direct payment funds for employment/ day program services? (1) A representative payee may be:
(a) The person, organization, institution or agency that acts as your representative payee for Supplemental Security Income (SSI);
(b) Your parent, if you are under eighteen;
(c) Your spouse; or
(d) A person, organization, institution or agency you select if the department approves your selection.
(2) If you select a representative payee under subsection (1)(d) of this section, the department will evaluate the selection according to the following criteria:
(a) The relationship of the payee to you;
(b) The amount of interest the payee shows in you;
(c) Any legal authority the payee has to act on your behalf;
(d) Whether the payee has custody of you; and
(e) Whether the payee is in a position to know of and look after your needs.
(3) The DDD director or designee will approve or deny your request for a representative under subsection (1)(d) of this section.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-087 What are the responsibilities of a representative payee? A representative payee has the responsibility to:
(1) Spend the DDD direct payment funds on you or your behalf;
(2) Notify the department if any event happens that may affect the amount of benefits you receive;
(3) Submit to the department, upon our request, a written report accounting for the payments received; and
(4) Notify the department if any change in the payee's circumstances that would affect performance of the payee responsibilities.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-090 When will DDD recover direct payment funds sent to me for employment/day program services? DDD may recover funds, known as an overpayment, when:
(1) You did not spend the direct payment funds on employment/day program services as specified in WAC 388 -825-065; or
(2) You were no longer eligible for services from the division of developmental disabilities in the month in which the SSP was issued; or
(3) Your assessed need has changed.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 388-825-095 Who is liable for repayment of an overpayment? (1) If you received the money in your own name, you are responsible for repayment.
(2) If you are paid through a representative payee, both you and the representative payee may be responsible for repayment.
(a) You are responsible to the extent that the incorrect payments were spent on you or your behalf. Funds conserved by a representative payee to which you do not have direct access have not been spent on you or your behalf.
(b) If the incorrect payments were spent on you or your behalf and the representative payee is without fault in connection with the overpayment, you are solely responsible for repayment.
(c) The representative payee is solely responsible for repayment if:
(i) The incorrect payments were not spent on you or your behalf; and
(ii) The representative payee is at fault in connection with the overpayment.
(d) A government entity or an institution can be a representative payee and can be found responsible for repayment -just as a private individual can.
(e) You and the representative payee are both responsible for repayment when the incorrect payments have been spent on you or your behalf and the representative payee is at fault.
(3) The representative payee is at fault when the representative payee was aware of the reason you were not eligible for the direct payment funds.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 02-16-014, filed $7 / 25 / 02$, effective $8 / 25 / 02$ )

WAC 388-825-100 Notification. (1) The department shall notify the client or applicant, the parent when the client or applicant is a minor, ((and)) or the guardian when the client or applicant is an adult, of the following decisions:
(a) Denial or termination of eligibility set forth in WAC ((388-825-100)) 388-825-030 and 388-825-035;
(b) Development or modification of the individual service plan set forth in WAC 388-825-050;
(c) Authorization, denial, reduction, or termination of services or funds paid directly to the client set forth in WAC 388-825-055 or payment of SSP set forth in chapter 388-827 WAC ((388-825-100)); and
(d) Admission or readmission to, or discharge from, a residential habilitation center.
(2) The notice shall set forth appeal rights pursuant to WAC 388-825-120 and a statement that the client's case manager can be contacted for an explanation of the reasons for the action.
(3)(a) The department shall provide notice of a denial or partial authorization of a family support services request and a statement of reason for denial or partial authorization, or reduction to the person or persons described in subsection (1) of this section. The department shall send such notice no later
than five working days before the end of the month previous to the month for which service was requested;
(b) The department shall make available an administrative review of a decision to deny or partially authorize services upon receipt of a written request by a person or persons described in subsection (1) of this section to the administrator of the region in which the client is living. The regional office must receive a request for administrative review by the last working day of the month;
(c) The client shall state in the written request why the client or client's family believes their service priority designation is not correct;
(d) Upon receipt of request for administrative review, the regional administrator or designee shall review the request and the client file; and
(e) The department shall send the results of the administrative review to the client and/or family within the first five working days of the service month for which the client is being denied or receiving a partial authorization for services.
(4) The department shall provide at least thirty days' advance notice of action to terminate a client's eligibility, terminate or reduce a client's service, or discharge a client from a residential habilitation center to the community. Transfer or removal of a client from a service set forth in WAC 388-825$120(5)(f)$ is governed by that section, and reduction of family support funding during the service authorization period is covered by subsection (3)(a) of this section.
(5) All parties affected by such department decision shall be consulted, whenever possible, during the decision process by the responsible field services regional office in person and/or by telephone.
(6) The division shall ensure notification to the school district in which a school-aged child is to be placed when a placement decision is reached.

WAC 388-825-120 Adjudicative proceeding. (1) A client, former client, or applicant acting on the applicant's own behalf or through an authorized representative has the right to an adjudicative proceeding to contest the following department actions:
(a) Denial or termination of eligibility set forth in WAC ((388-825-100)) 388-825-030 and 388-825-035;
(b) Development or modification of the individual service plan set forth in WAC 388-825-050;
(c) Authorization, denial, reduction, or termination of services or funds paid directly to the client set forth in WAC 388-825-055 or payment of SSP set forth in chapter 388-827 WAC ((388-825-100));
(d) Admission or readmission to, or discharge from, a residential habilitation center;
(e) A claim the client, former client, or applicant owes an overpayment debt;
(f) A decision of the secretary under RCW 71A. 10.060 or 71A.10.070;
(g) A decision to change a client's placement from one category of residential services to a different category of residential services.
(2) Adjudicative proceedings are governed by the Administrative Procedure Act (chapter 34.05 RCW ), RCW 71A.10.050, the rules in this chapter, and by chapter 388-02 WAC. If any provision in this chapter conflicts with chapter 388-02 WAC, the provision in this chapter shall govern.
(3) The applicant's application for an adjudicative proceeding shall be in writing and filed with the DSHS office of appeals within twenty-eight days of receipt of the decision the appellant wishes to contest.
(4) The department shall not implement the following actions while an adjudicative proceeding is pending:
(a) Termination of eligibility;
(b) Reduction or termination of service, except when the action to reduce or terminate the service is based on the availability of funding and/or service; or
(c) Removal or transfer of a client from a service, except when a condition in subsection (5)(f) of this section is present.
(5) The department shall implement the following actions while an adjudicative proceeding is pending:
(a) Denial of eligibility;
(b) Development or modification of an individual service plan;
(c) Denial of service;
(d) Reduction or termination of service when the action to reduce or terminate the service is based on the availability of funding or service;
(e) After notification of an administrative law judge's (or review judge) ruling that the appellant has caused an unreasonable delay in the proceedings; or
(f) Removal or transfer of a client from a service when:
(i) An immediate threat to the client's life or health is present;
(ii) Service termination or transfer for a specific group of clients in order to meet the intent of and comply with sections 205 and 207, chapter 371, Laws of 2002;
(iii) The client's service provider is no longer able to provide services due to:
(A) Termination of the provider's contract;
(B) Decertification of the provider;
(C) Nonrenewal of provider's contract;
(D) Revocation of provider's license; or
(E) Emergency license suspension.
((fiii))) (iv) The client, the parent when the client is a minor, or the guardian when the client is an adult, approves the decision.
(6) When the appellant files an application to contest a decision to return a resident of a state residential school to the community, the procedures specified in RCW 71A.10.050(2) shall govern the proceeding. These procedures include:
(a) A placement decision shall not be implemented during any period during which an appeal can be taken or while an appeal is pending and undecided unless the:
(i) Client's or the client's representative gives written consent; or
(ii) Administrative law judge (or review judge) after notice to the parties rules the appellant has caused an unreasonable delay in the proceedings.
(b) The burden of proof is on the department; and
(c) The burden of proof is whether the specific placement proposed by the department is in the best interests of the resident.
(7) The ((initiat-order-shatt be made)) administrative law judge shall issue an initial or final order within sixty days of the department's receipt of the application for an adjudicative proceeding. When a party files a petition for administrative review, allowed under WAC 388-02-0215 (4)(w)(x) and/or $(y)$, the review order shall be made within sixty days of the department's receipt of the petition. The decision-rendering time is extended by as many days as the proceeding is continued on motion by, or with the assent of, the appellant.

WAC 388-825-205 Who is eligible to participate in the family support opportunity program? (1) All individuals living with their families determined to be developmentally disabled according to WAC 388-825-030 and 388-825035 are eligible to participate in the program if their family requires assistance in meeting their needs. However, the program will fund or provide support services only as funding is available.
(2) Persons currently receiving services under WAC ((388-825-030)) 388-825-252, Family support services, may volunteer to participate in the program.
(3) Families will receive program services based on one or more of the following criteria: The date of application, the date the family was placed on the wait list, eligibility for SSP or other available funding, and/or HCBS waiver status.
(4) Availability of the SSP makes the family ineligible for other state only funding for the same service.

AMENDATORY SECTION (Amending WSR 02-16-014, filed 7/25/02, effective $8 / 25 / 02$ )

WAC 388-825-252 Family support services. (1) The purpose of the family support program is to:
(a) Reduce or eliminate the need for out-of-home residential placement of a client where the in-home placement is in the client's best interest;
(b) Allow a client to live in the most independent setting possible; and
(c) Have access to services best suited to a client's needs.
(2) The department's family support services shall include, the following services:
(a) Respite care, including the use of community activities which provide respite;
(b) Attendant care;
(c) Nursing services provided by a registered nurse or licensed practical nurse, that cannot be provided by an unlicensed caregiver, including but not limited to, ventilation, catheterization, insulin injections, etc., when not covered by another resource;
(d) Therapeutic services, provided these therapeutic services are not covered by another resource such as medicaid, private insurance, public schools, or child development services funding, including:
(i) Physical therapy;
(ii) Occupational therapy;
(iii) Behavior management therapy; and
(iv) Communication therapy; or
(v) Counseling for the client relating to a disability.
(3) Receiving family support services is based on:
(a) Funding for state paid services available in the state operating budget;
(b) SSP funding available to the client/family; or
(c) HCBS waiver status.
(4) The following rules, subsections (5) through (9), apply only to family support services authorized by the department and do not govern services purchased by the family with SSP (state supplementary payment) funding (see WAC 388-827-0145 and 388-827-0170).
(5) Up to nine hundred dollars of the service need level amount in WAC ((388-825-252)) 388-825-254 may be used during a one year period for flexible use as follows. The requested service must be necessary as a result of the disability of the client.
(a) Training and supports including parenting classes and disability related support groups;
(b) Specialized equipment and supplies including the purchase, rental, loan or refurbishment of specialized equipment or adaptive equipment not covered by another resource including Medicaid. Mobility devices such as walkers and wheelchairs are included, as well as communication devices and medical supplies such as diapers for those more than three years of age;
(c) Environmental modification including home repairs for damages, and modifications to the home needed because of the disability of the client;
(d) Medical/dental services not covered by any other resource. This may include the payment of insurance premiums and deductibles and is limited to the premiums and deductibles of the client;
(e) Special formulas or specially prepared foods needed because of the disability of the client;
(f) Parent/family counseling dealing with a diagnosis, grief and loss issues, genetic counseling and behavior management;
(g) Specialized clothing adapted for a physical disability, excessive wear clothing, or specialized footwear;
(h) Specialized utility costs including extraordinary supplemental utility costs related to the client's disability or medical condition;
(i) Transportation costs for gas or tickets (ferry fare, transit cost) for a client to get to essential services and appointments, if another resource is not available;
(j) Other services approved by the DDD regional administrator or designee that will replace or reduce ongoing departmental expenditures and will reduce the risk of out-ofhome placement. Exemption requests under this section are not subject to appeal.
$(((4)))$ (6) Recommendations will be made to the regional administrator by a review committee. The regional administrator will approve or disapprove the request and will communicate reasons for denial to the committee.
$(((5)))(7)$ Payment for services specified in subsection $(((-3)))(5)$, except $(((3)))(5)(\mathrm{a})$ and (h), shall cover only the portion of cost attributable to the client.
(((6))) (8) Requests must be received by DDD no later than midway through the service authorization period unless circumstances exist justifying an emergency.
$(((7)))(9)$ A plan shall be developed jointly by the family and the department for each service authorization period. The department may choose whether to contract directly with the vendor, to authorize purchase by another agency, or may reimburse the parent of the client.
$(((8)))(10)$ Emergency Services. Emergency funds may be requested for use in response to a single incident or situation or short term crisis such as care giver hospitalization, absence, or incapacity. The request shall include anticipated resolution of the situation. Funds shall be provided for a limited period not to exceed two months. All requests are to be reviewed and approved or denied by the regional administrator or designee.
$(((9)))$ (11) A departmental service authorization shall state the type, amount, and period (duration) of service. Each department authorization shall constitute a new service for a new period.
(((10))) (12) If the client becomes eligible and begins to receive Medicaid Personal Care services as defined in WAC ((388-15-202 through 388-15-203)) 388-71-0202 and 388-71-0203, the family support funding will be reduced at the beginning of the next month of service. The family will receive notice of the reconfiguration of services at least five working days before the beginning of the month.
$(((+1)))(13)$ If requested family support services are not authorized, such actions shall be deemed a denial of services.
$(((12)))(14)$ Family support services may be authorized below the amount requested by the family for the period. When, during the authorized service period, family support services are reduced or terminated below the amount specified in service authorizations, the department shall deem such actions as a reduction or termination of services.

WAC 388-825-254 Service need level rates. (1) The department shall base periodic service authorizations on:
(a) Requests for family support services described in WAC 388-825-252 (2) ((of this section)) and (5);
(b) Service need levels ((as deseribed in-WAC 388-825$252(3)$ of this chapter)). The amount of SSP (state supplementary payment) a vailable to a client will be included when calculating the monthly allocation of state family support dollars.
(c) Service need level lid amounts ((are)) as follows:
(i) Clients designated for service need level one (WAC 388-825-256) may receive up to one thousand one hundred fifty-six dollars per month or two thousand four hundred sixty-two dollars per month if the client requires licensed nursing care in the home:
(A) If a client is receiving funding through Medicaid Personal Care or other DSHS in-home residential support, the maximum payable through family support shall be five hundred twelve dollars per month;
(B) If the combined total of family support services at this maximum plus in-home support is less than one thousand
one hundred fifty-six dollars additional family support can be authorized to bring the total to one thousand one hundred fifty-six dollars.
(ii) Clients designated for service need level two (WAC 388-825-256) may receive up to four hundred fifty-six dollars per month if not receiving funding through Medicaid personal care:
(A) If a client is receiving funds through Medicaid personal care or other DSHS in-home residential support service, the maximum receivable through family support shall be two hundred fifty-six dollars per month;
(B) If the combined total of family support services at this maximum plus in-home support is less than fifty-six hundred four dollars, additional family support can be authorized to bring the total to four hundred fifty-six dollars.
(iii) Clients designated for service need level three (WAC 388-825-256) may receive up to two hundred fifty-six dollars per month provided the client is not receiving Medicaid personal care. If the client is receiving Medicaid personal care or other DSHS in-home residential support service, the maximum receivable through family support shall be one hundred twenty-eight dollars per month; and
(iv) Clients designated for service level four (WAC 388-825-256) may receive up to one hundred twenty-eight dollars per month family support services.
(((e))) (d) Availability of family support funding;
$(((d)))(e)$ Authorization by a review committee, in each regional office, which reviews each request for service;
(((e))) (f) The amounts designated in subsection (1)(b)(i) through (iv) of this section are subject to periodic increase if vendor rate increases are mandated by the legislature.
(2) The department shall authorize family support services contingent upon the applicant providing accurate and complete information on disability-related requests.
(3) The department shall ensure service authorizations do not exceed maximum amounts for each service need level based on the availability of funds.
(4) The department shall not authorize a birth parent, adoptive parent, or stepparent living in the same household as the client as the direct care provider for respite, attendant, nursing, therapy, or counseling services for a child seventeen years of age or younger.

WAC 388-850-035 Services-Developmental disabilities. (1) A county may purchase and provide services listed under chapter 71 A. 14 RCW.

(2) A county may purchase or provide authorized services. Authorized services may include, but are not limited to:

(e) Individual evaluation;
(f) Program evaluation;
(g) County planning and administration; ((and))
(h) Consultation and staff development; and

WAC 388-850-045 Funding formula-Developmental disabilities. (1) For the purposes of this section, "county" shall mean the legal subdivision of the state, regardless of any agreement with another county to provide developmental disabilities services jointly.

(a) Each county shall receive a base amount of funds. The amount shall be based on the prior biennial allocation, including any funds from budget provisos from the prior biennium, and subject to the availability of state and federal funds;
(b) The distribution of any additional funds provided by the legislature or other sources shall be based on a distribution formula which best meets the needs of the population to be served as follows:
(i) On a basis which takes into consideration minimum grant amounts, requirements of clients residing in an ICF/MR or clients on one of the division's Title XIX home and com-munity-based waivers, and the general population of the county, and special education enrollment as well as the population eligible for county-funded developmental disabilities services;
(ii) On a basis that takes into consideration the population numbers of minority groups residing within the county;
(iii) A biennial adjustment shall be made after these factors are considered; and
(iv) ((Countries;) Counties not receiving any portion of additional funds pursuant to this formula shall not have their base allocation reduced due to application of this formula.
(c) Funding appropriated through legislative proviso, including vendor rate increases, shall be distributed to the population directed by the legislature utilizing a formula as directed by the legislature or using a formula specific to that population or distributed to identified people;
(d) The ability of the community to provide funds for the developmental disability program provided in chapter 71 A .14 RCW may be considered with any or all of the above.
(3)(a) A county may utilize seven or less percent of the county's allocated funds for county administrative expenses. A county may utilize more than seven percent for county administration with approval of the division director. $A$ county electing to provide all services directly, in addition to county administration, is exempt from this requirement.
(b) A county may receive funds for oversight of employment/day program services purchased by DDD clients with money sent directly to the client based on the following conditions:
(i) The oversight funds for the recipients described below will be allocated at the same rate that the county received in their original 2001-2003 DDD county program agreement for administrative expenses for these same individuals. These funds will be calculated by using the date the recipient began receiving funds directly if the recipient:
(A) Was born between September 1. 1979 and August 31, 1981; and
(B) Received a county or county-contracted service between July 1, 2001 and June 30, 2002; and
(C) Continues to receive a county or county-contracted service.
(ii) Oversight funds for the recipients described below will be allocated at the same rate that the county received in their original 2001-2003 DDD county program agreement for administrative expenses for these same individuals. These funds will be calculated by using the date the recipient began receiving funds directly if the recipient:
(A) Was born prior to September 1, 1979; and
(B) Was authorized by DDD and the county for employment/day program services for December, 2002; and
(C) Continues to receive a county or county-contracted service.
(iii) The oversight funds for recipients described below shall equal up to seven percent of the amount of the funds received directly by the recipient, if the recipient:
(A) Was born between September 1, 1979 and August 31. 1981; and
(B) Received no county or county-contracted service prior to July 1, 2002; and
(C) Received or will receive a county or county-contracted service between July 1, 2002 and June 30, 2003; and
(D) Continues to receive a county or county-contracted service.
(4) The department may withhold five or less percent of allocated funds for new programs, for statewide priority programs, and for emergency needs.

WAC 220-52-07300J Sea urchins. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-52-073 and WAC 220-20-051, effective December 27, 2003 until further notice, it is unlawful to take or possess sea urchins taken for commercial purposes except as provided for in this section:
(1) Sea urchin districts:
(a) Sea Urchin District 3 (Port Angeles) is defined as those waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 23C east of a line projected true north from Low Point along the $123^{\circ} 49.500^{\prime}\left(123^{\circ} 49^{\prime} 30^{\prime \prime}\right)$ longitude line, and Area 23D.
(b) Sea Urchin District 4 (Sekiu) is defined as those waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 23C west of a line projected true north from Low Point along the $123^{\circ} 49.500^{\prime}\left(123^{\circ} 49^{\prime} 30^{\prime \prime}\right)$ longitude line and those waters of Area 29 east of a line projected true north from the mouth of Rasmussen Creek ( 3.1 miles southeast of Sail Rock).
(2) Green sea urchins: Sea Urchin Districts 1 and 2 are open only on December 28, 29 and 30, 2003, January 4, 5 and 6,2004. Sea Urchin Districts 3,4, 6 and 7 are open only on Mondays and Tuesdays of each week. The minimum size for green sea urchins is 2.25 inches (size in largest test diameter exclusive of spines).
(3) Red sea urchins: Sea Urchin Districts 1 and 2 are open only on December 27 and 28, 2003, and thenceforth Monday through Friday of each week. Sea Urchin District 3 is open only on January 5, 6, and 7, 2004. Sea Urchin District 4 is open only on January 5,2004 . The maximum daily landing of red sea urchins allowed in Sea Urchin Districts 3 and 4 is 2,000 pounds per commercial sea urchin license on a valid designated harvest vessel. It is unlawful to harvest red sea urchins smaller or larger than the following size (size in largest test diameter exclusive of spines).
(a) District 1 and $2-4.0$ minimum to 5.5 maximum inches.
(b) District 3 and $4-3.25$ minimum to 5.0 maximum inches.
(4) It is unlawful to dive for any purpose from a commercially licensed sea urchin or sea cucumber fishing vessel within the following sea urchin Districts on the following days.
(a) Districts 1 and 2 -January 3, 2004 and thenceforth Saturdays and Sundays of each week.
(b) Districts 3, 4, 6 and 7 - Saturdays and Sundays of each week.

Under RCW 34.05.350 the agency for good cause finds that immediate adoption, amendment, or repeal of a rule is necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, or general welfare, and that observing the time requirements of notice and opportunity to comment upon adoption of a permanent rule would be contrary to the public interest; and that state or federal law or federal rule or a federal deadline for state receipt of federal funds requires immediate adoption of a rule.

Reasons for this Finding: In the 2003-2005 state operating budget bill (section 205, chapter 25, Laws of 2003 1st sp.s.), the state legislature provided funds for RHC consolidation and downsizing at the Fircrest School. In the budget detail documents, the legislature stated its intent that: "The department shall consolidate vacancies across all residential habilitation centers (RHCs) in order to downsize Fircrest School." The department has determined that the process of downsizing of Fircrest School must begin immediately in order for the department to remain within its budget allocation. Emergency rules are needed to assure the safety and welfare of residents of Fircrest School as the department establishes procedures to transfer residents of the school to other facilities or care settings.

(4) If the secretary or secretary's designee affirms the decision to transfer the resident and a request for judicial review has been filed, any proposed transfer must be delayed until the appeal process is complete unless a delay jeopardizes the resident's health or safety or the welfare of other residents.

This section describes how the department defines the resource standard and available resources when determining a client's eligibility for LTC services. The department uses the term "resource standard" to describe the maximum amount of resources a client can have and still be resource eligible for program benefits.

(a) Two thousand dollars for:
(i) A single client; or
(ii) A legally married client with a community spouse, subject to the provisions described in subsections (5) through (8); or
(b) Three thousand dollars for a legally married couple, unless subsection (2) applies.
(2) If the department has already established eligibility for one spouse, then it applies the standard described in subsection (1)(a) to each spouse, unless doing so would make one of the spouses ineligible.
(3) The department applies the following rules when determining available resources for LTC services:
(a) WAC ( $(388-470-0005)$ ) $388-475-0300$, Resource eligibility and limits;
(b) WAC ( $388-470-0010)$ ) 388-475-0250, How to determine who owns a resource;
(c) ((WAC 388-470-0015, Availability of resourees;
(d)) ) WAC 388-470-0060(6), Resources of an alien's sponsor; and
(((e))) (d) WAC 388-506-0620, SSI-related medical clients.
(4) For LTC services the department determines a client's nonexcluded resources as follows:
(a) For an SSI-related client, the department reduces available resources by excluding resources described in WAC ((388-513-1360)) 388-475-0350 through 388-4750550;
(b) For an SSI-related client who has a community spouse, the department:
(i) Excludes resources described in WAC 388-513-1360; and
(ii) Adds together the available resources of both spouses according to subsection (5)(a) or (b) as appropriate;
(c) For a client not described in subsection (4)(a) or (b), the department applies the resource rules of the program used to relate the client to medical eligibility.
(5) The department determines available resources of a legally married client, when both spouses are institutionalized, by following WAC 388-506-0620 (5) and (6). For legally married clients when only one spouse meets institutional status, the following rules apply. If the client's current period of institutional status began:
(a) Before October 1,1989 , the department adds together one-half the total amount of nonexcluded resources held in the name of:
(i) The institutionalized spouse; or
(ii) Both spouses.
(b) On or after October 1, 1989, the department adds together the total amount of nonexcluded resources held in the name of:
(i) Either spouse; or
(ii) Both spouses.
(6) If subsection (5)(b) applies, the department ((allentimen) determines the amount of resources ((erdinarily allowed by law)) that are allocated to the community spouse before determining nonexcluded resources used to establish eligibility for the institutionalized spouse((The maximum allecation amount is eighty-seven thousand dollars effeetive Jantary 1, 2001.
(7))) as follows:
(a) If the client's current period of institutional status began on or after October 1, 1989 and before August 1, 2003, the department allocates the maximum amount of resources ordinarily allowed by law. The maximum allocation amount is ninety-two thousand seven hundred sixty dollars effective January 1, 2004; or
(b) If the client's current period of institutional status began on or after August 1, 2003, the department allocates the greater of:
(i) A spousal share equal to one-half of the couple's combined nonexcluded resources as of the beginning of the current period of institutional status, up to the amount described in subsection (6)(a); or
(ii) The state spousal resource standard of forty thousand dollars.
(7) The amount of the spousal share described in (6)(b)(i) is determined sometime between the date that the current period of institutional status began and the date that eligibility for LTC services is determined. The following rules apply to the determination of the spousal share:
(a) Prior to an application for LTC services, the couple's combined countable resources are evaluated from the date of the current period of institutional status at the request of either member of the couple. The determination of the spousal share is completed when necessary documentation and/or verification is provided; or
(b) The determination of the spousal share is completed as part of the application for LTC services if the client was institutionalized prior to the month of application, and declares the spousal share exceeds the state spousal resource standard. The client will be required to provide verification of the couple's combined countable resources held at the beginning of the current period of institutional status.
(8) The amount of allocated resources described in subsection (6) can be increased, only if:
(a) A court transfers additional resources to the community spouse; or
(b) An administrative law judge establishes in a fair hearing described in chapter 388-02 W AC or by consent order, that the amount is inadequate to provide a minimum monthly maintenance needs amount for the community spouse.
$(((8)))$ (9) The department considers resources of the community spouse unavailable to the institutionalized spouse the month after eligibility for LTC services is established, unless subsection (((9))) (10)(a), (b), or (c) applies.
$(((9)))(10)$ A redetermination of the couple's resources as described in subsections (4)(b) or (c) is required, if:
(a) The institutionalized spouse has a break of at least thirty consecutive days in a period of institutional status;
(b) The institutionalized spouse's nonexcluded resources exceed the standard described in subsection (1)(a), if subsection (5)(b) applies; or
(c) The institutionalized spouse does not transfer the amount described in subsections (6) or (((7))) (8) to the community spouse or to another person for the sole benefit of the community spouse as described in WAC 388-513-1365(4) by either:
(i) The first regularly scheduled eligibility review; or
(ii) The reasonable amount of additional time necessary to obtain a court order for the support of the community spouse.

WAC 388-513-1380 Determining a client's participation in the cost of care for long-term care (LTC) services. This rule describes how the department allocates income and excess resources when determining participation in the cost of care (in the post-eligibility process). The department applies rules described in WAC 388-513-1315 to define which income and resources must be used in this process.
(1) For a client receiving institutional or hospice services in a medical facility, the department applies all subsections of this rule.
(2) For a client receiving waivered services at home or in an alternate living facility, the department applies only those subsections of this rule that are cited in the rules for those programs.
(3) For a client receiving hospice services at home, the department applies rules used for the community options program entry system (COPES).
(4) Excess resources are reduced in an amount equal to incurred medical expenses (for definition see WAC 388-519$0110(10)$ ) that are not subject to third-party payment and for which the client is liable, including:
(a) Health insurance and Medicare premiums, deductions, and co-insurance charges;
(b) Necessary medical care recognized under state law, but not covered under the state's Medicaid plan; and
(c) The amount of excess resources is limited to the following amounts:
(i) For LTC services provided under the categorically needy (CN) program, the amount described in WAC 388-513-1315(3); or
(ii) For LTC services provided under the medically needy (MN) program, the amount described in WAC 388-513-1395(2)(a) or (b).
(5) The department allocates nonexcluded income up to a total of the medically needy income level (MNIL) in the following order:
(a) A personal needs allowance (PNA) of:
(i) One hundred sixty dollars for a client living in a state veterans' home;
(ii) Ninety dollars for a veteran or a veteran's surviving spouse, who receives a VA improved pension and does not live in a state veterans' home; or
(iii) Forty-one dollars and sixty-two cents for all other clients in a medical facility.
(b) Federal, state, or local income taxes ((ineurred during the time-period covered by the PNA, whether paid-or unpaid)) owed by the client.
(c) Wages for a client who:
(i) Is related to the supplemental security income (SSI) program as described in WAC 388-503-0510(1); and
(ii) Receives the wages as part of a department-approved training or rehabilitative program designed to prepare the client for a less restrictive placement. When determining this deduction employment expenses are not deducted.
(d) Guardianship fees and administrative costs including any attorney fees paid by the guardian, after June 15, 1998, only as allowed by chapter 388-79 WAC.
(6) The department allocates nonexcluded income after deducting amounts described in subsection (5) in the following order:
(a) Income garnisheed for child support:
(i) For the time period covered by the PNA; and
(ii) Not deducted under another provision in the post-eligibility process.
(b) A monthly maintenance needs allowance for the community spouse not to exceed, effective January 1 , ((2001)) 2004, two thousand ((ene)) three hundred ((seventyfive)) nineteen dollars, unless a greater amount is allocated as described in subsection (8) of this section. The monthly maintenance needs allowance:
(i) Consists of a combined total of both:
(A) An amount added to the community spouse's gross income to provide a total of one thousand ((fetr)) six hundred ((fifty-twe)) ninety-two dollars; and
(B) Excess shelter expenses as specified under subsection (7) of this section; and
(ii) Is allowed only to the extent the client's income is made available to the community spouse.
(c) A monthly maintenance needs amount for each minor or dependent child, dependent parent or dependent sibling of the community or institutionalized spouse who:
(i) Resides with the community spouse, equal to onethird of the amount that one thousand ((fенr)) six hundred ((fifty-two)) ninety-two dollars exceeds the dependent family member's income.
(ii) Does not reside with the community spouse, equal to the MNIL for the number of dependent family members in the home less the income of the dependent family members.
(iii) Child support received from noncustodial parent is the child's income.
(d) Incurred medical expenses described in subsections (4)(a) and (b) not used to reduce excess resources.
(e) Maintenance of the home of a single client or institutionalized couple:
(i) Up to one hundred percent of the one-person federal poverty level per month;
(ii) Limited to a six-month period;
(iii) When a physician has certified that the client is likely to return to the home within the six-month period; and
(iv) When social services staff documents initial need for the income exemption and reviews the client's circumstances after ninety days.
(7) For the purposes of this section, "excess shelter expenses" means the actual expenses under subsection (7)(b) less the standard shelter allocation under subsection (7)(a). For the purposes of this rule:
(a) The standard shelter allocation is four hundred ((thirty-six)) fifty-five dollars, effective April 1, ((2004)) 2003; and
(b) Shelter expenses are the actual required maintenance expenses for the community spouse's principal residence for:
(i) Rent;
(ii) Mortgage;
(iii) Taxes and insurance;
(iv) Any maintenance care for a condominium or cooperative; and
(v) The food stamp standard utility allowance for four persons, provided the utilities are not included in the maintenance charges for a condominium or cooperative.
(8) The amount allocated to the community spouse may be greater than the amount in subsection (6)(b) only when:
(a) A court enters an order against the client for the support of the community spouse; or
(b) A hearings officer determines a greater amount is needed because of exceptional circumstances resulting in extreme financial duress.
(9) A client who is admitted to a medical facility for ninety days or less and continues to receive full SSI benefits is not required to use the SSI income in the cost of care for medical services. Income allocations are allowed as described in this section from non-SSI income.

WAC 220-52-04600F Crab fishery-Seasons and areas. Notwithstanding the provisions of WAC 220-52-046:
(1) Effective immediately until further notice, it is unlawful to fish for Dungeness crab for commercial purposes as provided herein:
(a) Catch Areas 23D, 25A, and 25E.
(b) Effective 12:01 a.m. January 1, 2004 until further notice, it is unlawful to fish for or possess commercial crab taken from those waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 26A east of a line from Howarth Park due north to the south end of Gedney Island and that portion of 24B east of a line from the north end of Gedney Island to Camano Head and south of a line drawn from Camano Head to Hermosa Point.
(2) Effective immediately until further notice, it will be lawful to fish for Dungeness Crab for commercial purposes in the following areas:
(a) Those waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 26A within a line that extends due north from the green number 1 buoy at Scatchet Head to Scatchet Head, thence from the green number 1 buoy at Scatchet Head to the green number 1 buoy at Possession Point, thence due north from the green number 1 buoy at Possession Point to Possession Point.
(b) Those waters of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 26A east and north of a line that extends from Possession Point to the green number 1 buoy at Possession Point thence following the 200 foot contour northward to a point due east from the Glendale Dock, thence extending due west to the Whidbey Island shore.
(c) That portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 21B in Samish Bay south of a line from Fish Point and Point Williams in water deeper than 60 feet.
(d) That portion of Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 26A south of a line projected from the outermost tip of the ferry dock at Mukilteo projected to the green \#3 buoy at the mouth of the Snohomish River and west of a line projected northward from the spiral staircase at Howarth Park to the southern most tip of Gedney Island.
(3) Effective immediately until further notice Marine Fish-Shellfish Management and Catch Reporting Area 26A shall be further defined by the following boundaries:
(a) Area 26A-W shall include those waters of Catch Area 26 A south of 25B and northerly of a line from Apple Cove Point to Point Edwards and south and west of a line that extends from Possession Point to the Shipwreck located . 8 nautical miles north of Picnic Point.
(b) Area 26A-E shall include those waters of Catch Area 26 A south of Areas 24B and 24 C and north and east of a line that extends from Possession Point to the Shipwreck located .8 nautical miles north of Picnic Point.

## Chapter 199-08 WAC

## PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE-BEFORE THE ENVIRONMENTAL AND LAND USE HEARINGS BOARD

## PARTA <br> GENERAL

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-300 Purpose of this chapter and applicability of the board's rules of practice to the civil rules of procedure and the rules of evidence. (1) The purpose of chapter 199-08 WAC is to provide rules of practice before the environmental and land use hearings board (hereinafter "board"). The interpretation of these rules may be guided, where relevant, by the civil rules of superior court (hereinafter "civil rules") and the rules of evidence for the superior courts of the state of Washington, as those rules have been construed by Washington state courts.
(2) Except where in conflict with the board's rules, Washington statutes regarding pretrial procedures, civil rules and rules of evidence shall be followed in proceedings before the board unless the presiding officer determines that the evidence, although in conflict with the rules, is admissible pursuant to WAC 199-08-515.
(3) This chapter shall govern practice before the board. The rules in this chapter are consistent with the model rules of procedure issued by the office of administrative hearings, chapter $10-08$ WAC except where specifically noted.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-305 Definitions. As used in this chapter the following terms shall have the following meanings:
(1) "Agency" means any state or local governmental entity.
(2) "Adjudicative proceeding" means a proceeding involving an opportunity for hearing before the board as defined in chapter 34.05 RCW. The terms "appeal," "adjudicative proceeding" and "case" are used interchangeably in this chapter.
(3) "Board" means the environmental and land use hearings board, a quasi-judicial body created pursuant to chapter 43. RCW ESSB 5776 and described in WAC 199-08-315.
(4) "Filing" of a document means actual receipt by the board during regular office hours. Any document filed with the board shall contain an affirmation that copies were served on the appropriate agency, local government and parties. Filing by facsimile is permitted of documents ten pages or less if the original document is concurrently mailed or submitted to a commercial delivery service.
(5) "Final decision" means the highest and last decision available within the permit agency with respect to a permit application to the agency, including, but not limited to, decisions resulting from internal appeals available within the agency for the permit decision.
(6) "Local government" means any county, incorporated city or town, which has approved, denied or conditioned any economic development project subject to ESSB 5776 and as further defined in subsection (9) of this section.
(7) "Participating permit agency" means any permit agency in which the applicant for a qualifying project has filed an application for an environmental or land use permit that is required for the qualifying project.
(8) "Party" means:
(a) A person to whom any local government or agency decision is specifically directed;
(b) A person named as a party to the appeal, or allowed to intervene or joined as a party by the board;
(c) Any participating permit agency.
(9) "Permit" means any license, permit, certificate, certification, approval, compliance schedule, or other similar document pertaining to any regulatory or management program related to the protection, conservation, use of, or interference with the land, air, or water in the state. This document must be required to be obtained from a state agency or local government, including, but not limited to, counties, cities, and air agencies, prior to constructing or operating a qualifying project. Local government permits include, but are not limited to, subdivisions, binding site plans, planned unit developments, shoreline permits or other approvals under RCW 90.58.140, master plan approvals, site plan approvals, permits or approvals required by critical area ordinances, conditional use permits, variances, and site-specific rezones authorized by a comprehensive plan or subarea plan or other equivalent documents however titled or denominated. Local government permits excluded under this definition include the adoption or amendment of a comprehensive plan, subarea plan, legislative actions or development regulations, certifications by local health districts of water and sewer availabil-
ity, and building, grading, flood hazard, utility connection, and other nondiscretionary construction permits.
(10) "Permit agency" means any state agency or local government, including, but not limited to, air agencies, authorized by law to issue permits.
(11) "Person" means any individual, partnership, corporation, association, organization, governmental subdivision, agency or entity of any character.
(12) "Petition for review" is a document that when properly filed with the board initiates an adjudicative proceeding before the board.
(13) "Presiding officer" means any member of the board or an administrative appeals judge who is assigned to conduct a conference or hearing by the chairperson or the vice-chairperson.
(14) "Service" of a document means delivery of the document to the other parties to the appeal. Service may be made in any of the following ways:
(a) Personally, in accordance with the laws of the state, with a return of service or affidavit of service completed.
(b) First-class, registered or certified mail. Service is complete upon deposit in the United States mail properly stamped and addressed.
(c) Facsimile transmission with mailing or submission to a commercial delivery service of copies on the same day. Service by facsimile is regarded as complete by production of the confirmation of transmission and evidence of mailing or submission to a delivery service of the copies.
(d) Commercial delivery service. Service by commercial delivery service is regarded as complete upon delivery to the delivery company with charges prepaid.
(15) "Qualifying project" means an economic development project that is:
(a) Located within a county that in its entirety qualifies as a distressed area as defined in RCW 43.168.020(3), and a rural natural resources impact area as defined in RCW 43.160.020;
(b) Designed to provide at least thirty full-time yearround jobs; and
(c) Designated as a qualifying project by the office of permit assistance established under chapter 43.42 RCW if a request for a determination of such designation is made to the office by the project applicant as provided by law.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-310 Computation of time. (1) In computing any period of time prescribed or allowed by these rules or applicable statute, the day of the act after which the designated period of time begins to run is not to be included. The time within which any act shall be done, as provided by these rules, shall be computed by excluding the first day and including the last, unless the last day is a Saturday, Sunday or a legal holiday, and then it is excluded and the next succeeding day which is neither a Saturday, Sunday nor a legal holiday is included. When the period of time prescribed or allowed is less than seven days, intermediate Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays shall be excluded in the computation.
(2) This section also pertains to the period for filing with the board any petition for review, petition for declaratory ruling or any other adjudication which this chapter authorizes.

## PART B <br> BOARD ADMINISTRATION AND JURISDICTION

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-315 Board membership, function and jurisdiction. (1) Members. An environmental and land use hearings board is established within the environmental hearings office created under RCW 43.21B.005. The environmental and land use hearings board shall be composed of six members, as provided in RCW 90.58.170. The chairperson of the pollution control hearings board shall be the chairperson of the environmental and land use hearings board. The members of the environmental and land use hearings board shall receive the compensation, travel, and subsistence expenses as provided in RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.
(2) Function and jurisdiction. This board is a quasijudicial body with powers of de novo review as authorized by chapter 43._ RCW (ESSB 5776) to adjudicate or determine appeals from any person aggrieved by the granting, denying or rescinding of a permit issued pursuant to chapter 43. $\qquad$ RCW (ESSB 5776);
(3) Expedited review. The board shall provide expedited review of petitions filed under this chapter. Any matter reviewed on the decision record must be set for hearing within sixty days of the date set for submitting the decision record of all participating permit agencies, absent a showing of good cause for a different date or a stipulation of the parties. Any matter reviewed de novo must be set for hearing or trial no later than one hundred twenty days after the initial hearing date. The board shall issue a final decision and order within thirty days after the final hearing required in this section.
(4) Administrative appeals judges. The chairperson may appoint any member of the board or an administrative appeals judge from the environmental hearings office to be the presiding officer.
(5) This section is intended to be general and informational only and failure herein to list matters over which the board has jurisdiction shall not constitute a waiver or withdrawal of that jurisdiction.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-320 Office hours, telephone number, telefacsimile number and address of the board. (1) The administrative business of the board, except rule making, is performed by the environmental hearings office. To the extent necessary for rule making, the appeals board holds regular meetings at 10:00 a.m. on the second Tuesday of each month at the address set forth below.
(2) The board is organized within the Environmental Hearings Office, 4224 6th Avenue S.E., Building No. 2 Rowe Six, Lacey, Washington. The mailing address is:

WAC 199-08-325 Public information about practice before the board and public records. (1) Questions about board procedures may be directed to the environmental hearings office by e-mail at eho@eho.wa.gov, by regular mail or, during regular office hours, by telephone or by telefacsimile. The board's website address is: www.eho.wa.gov.
(2) Case files of appeals pending before the board, past written opinions of the board and other public records maintained by the board under chapter 198-12 WAC are available for public inspection and copying during regular office hours at the environmental hearings office. The form for requests for public records is set forth in WAC 198-12-140. Any person seeking to make copies of such public records may copy the documents at the environmental hearings office for a reasonable charge per page.

## PART C FILING AN APPEAL WITH THE BOARD AND SERVICE

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-335 Types of petitions before the board. The board is empowered to hear and decide the following:

Petitions for review of final decisions made by state agencies and local governments on permit applications for qualifying economic development projects.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-340 Where to file a petition for review and number of copies. (1) Proceedings for review under this chapter shall be commenced by filing a petition with the environmental and land use hearings board. An adjudicative proceeding before the board shall be begun by filing a petition for review and one copy at the environmental hearings office. The board shall acknowledge filing of the petition for review by a stamp and the board's stamp on the petition shall be prima facie evidence of the date of filing. The board may thereafter require that additional copies be filed.
(2) Such petition is barred, and the board may not grant review, unless the petition is timely filed with the board and timely served on the following persons who shall be parties to the review of the petition:
(a) The participating permit agencies, which for purposes of the petition shall be:
(i) If a state agency, the director thereof; and
(ii) If a local government, the jurisdiction's corporate entity which shall be served as provided in RCW 4.28.080; and
(b) Each of the following persons if the person is not the petitioner:
(i) Each person identified by name and address as applicant in the application to the participating permit agencies;
(ii) Each person identified in project application documents as an owner of the property at issue or, if none, each person identified as a taxpayer for the property at issue in the records of the county assessor.
(3) The petition is timely if it is filed and served on all parties listed in subsection (2) of this section within twentyone days of the issuance by the permit agency of the permit for the qualifying project.
(4) For the purposes of this section, the date on which a permit decision is issued is:
(a) Three days after a written decision is mailed by the permit agency to the project applicant or, if not mailed, the date on which the permit agency provides notice that a written decision is publicly available; or
(b) If (a) of this subsection does not apply, the date the decision is entered into the public record.
(5) Service on all parties shall be by personal service or by mail. Service by mail is effective on the date of mailing. Proof of service shall be by affidavit or declaration under penalty of perjury.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-350 Contents of the petition for review. Petitions for review to the board pursuant to chapter 43.___ RCW (ESSB 5776) and shall contain:
(1) The name, mailing address, telephone number and telefacsimile number (if available) of the appealing party, and of the representative, if any;
(2) Identification of the parties, by listing in the caption or otherwise. In every case, the agency and/or the local government whose decision is being appealed and the person to whom the decision is directed shall be named as parties;
(3) A copy of the application form without attachments, which was filed with the local government pursuant to legal requirements;
(4) A copy of the decision or permit appealed from;
(5) A short and plain statement showing the grounds upon which the appealing party considers such decision or permit to be unjust or unlawful;
(6) A clear and concise statement upon which the appealing party relies to sustain his or her grounds for appeal;
(7) A clear and concise statement of fact demonstrating that the petitioner has standing to seek board review;
(8) A separate and concise statement of each error alleged to have been committed;
(9) The relief sought, including the specific nature and extent;
(10) The signature of the representative of the appealing party or of the appealing party. The signature of the representative or the appealing party shall constitute a certificate by the signatory that the signatory has read the petition and that it is consistent with civil rule 11;
(11) All pleadings shall be so construed as to do substantial justice.

## PART D <br> APPEARANCE AND PRACTICE BEFORE THE BOARD

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-385 Persons who may appear before the board. (1) Any person has the right to represent himself or herself in a proceeding before the board.
(2) The only persons who are qualified to represent another person or entity before the board are the following:
(a) Attorneys at law duly qualified and entitled to practice before the highest court of record of any state.
(b) An authorized officer, partner, owner, employee or member of an association, partnership, corporation, organization, government agency or local government.
(c) Legal interns admitted to practice under the applicable admission to practice rules of the Washington state court rules as long as the conditions and limitations of the applicable rules are satisfied.
(d) Any other individual designated by an entity to serve as a spokesperson in a case with the approval of the board's presiding officer.
(3) When an active part, as a representative of a participating agency, was taken in the same case or proceeding by a former employee, said former employee of:
(a) Any participating agency; or
(b) A member of the legal staff of a local governmental agency; or
(c) The attorney general's staff, may not appear in a representative capacity on behalf of other parties in a formal board proceeding, except when permitted by applicable state conflict of interest laws.
(4) No former member of the board shall, for a period of one year after the termination of his or her membership, represent a party before the board on any matter.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-390 Appearance by representative. (1) An attorney or authorized representative as defined in WAC 199-08-385 may appear for a party by either of the following actions:
(a) Filing a written notice of appearance, a petition for review or another pleading containing the name of the party to be represented, and the name, address and telephone number of the representative; or
(b) Entering an appearance at the time and place of a conference or hearing on the appeal, and notifying the presiding officer conducting the same of the party to be represented and the name, address and telephone number of the representative.
(2) Copies of every written notice of appearance or pleading that identifies the representative shall be served by the representative on all other parties or their representatives of record at the time the original is filed with the board.
(3) Where a petition for review has been filed with the board by the department of ecology or attorney general, the attorney general shall, unless the department or attorney general notifies the board otherwise, be deemed to have entered
an appearance for the department, and the attorney general shall be exempt from the requirement of filing and serving a written notice of appearance.
(4) After a representative appears on behalf of a party, the board shall serve all future notices, orders and correspondence upon such representative. Service upon the representative shall constitute service upon the party, except for final orders, which shall be served on both the party and the representative.
(5) After a representative appears on behalf of a party, and gives notice to all other parties to the appeal, all future pleadings and correspondence shall be served upon that representative. Service upon the representative shall constitute service upon the party.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-395 Withdrawal or substitution of representatives. An attorney or other representative withdrawing from a case shall immediately so notify the board and all parties of record in writing, or shall state such withdrawal for the record at a conference or hearing. Any substitution of an attorney or representative shall be accomplished by written notification to the board and to all parties of record, together with the written consent of the prior attorney or representative, and if such consent cannot be obtained, a written statement of the reason therefor shall be supplied.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-400 Conduct before the board by representatives. All persons who are representing parties before the board shall conform to the standards of ethical conduct required of attorneys before the courts of Washington even if the representative is not an attorney. Representatives who, in the opinion of the presiding officer, violate those ethical standards may be reprimanded or sanctioned. Sanctions may include, among other measures, the imposition of costs and the exclusion of the representative from the proceedings. The board may, after notifying the representative and holding a hearing, take appropriate disciplinary action including, but not limited to, barring such person from representing another party in any future board proceedings.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-405 Parties not represented by legal counsel-Waiver of rules to prevent manifest injustice. The presiding officer may waive any of these rules, other than a rule relating to jurisdiction, for any party not represented by legal counsel where necessary to avoid manifest injustice.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-410 Presiding officer duties and powers. It shall be the duty of the presiding officer to conduct conferences or hearings in cases assigned in an impartial and orderly manner. The presiding officer shall have the authority, subject to the other provisions of these rules:
(1) To administer oaths and affirmations.
(2) To issue subpoenas and protective orders as provided in the Administrative Procedure Act.
(3) To rule on all procedural matters, objections and motions.
(4) To rule on all offers of proof and receive relevant evidence.
(5) To question witnesses called by the parties in an impartial manner to develop any facts deemed necessary for a fair and adequate decision.
(6) To secure and present in an impartial manner such evidence, in addition to that presented by the parties, as deemed necessary to decide the matter fairly and equitably.
(7) To take appropriate disciplinary action with respect to representatives of parties appearing before the board.
(8) To issue orders joining other parties, on motion of any party, or in the judgment of the presiding officer, when it appears that such other parties may have an interest in, or may be affected by, the proceedings.
(9) To consol idate matters for hearing when such consolidation will expedite disposition of the matters and avoid duplication of testimony and when the rights of the parties will not be prejudiced thereby.
(10) To hold prehearing and settlement conferences.
(11) To permit and regulate the taking of discovery.
(12) To regulate the course of the hearing.
(13) To dismiss a petition for review or take other appropriate disciplinary actions, where a party or representative fails to appear or participate in a prehearing conference, hearing or at any other stage of the appeal proceeding.
(14) To take any other action necessary and authorized by these rules and the law.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-415 Mediation. The board may, on occasion, recommend that the parties to an appeal engage in mediation. One or more parties may also recommend to the other parties or the presiding officer that mediation occur. Subject to availability, an administrative appeals judge from the environmental hearings office may serve as the mediator for the board. In the event that the mediation proves unsuccessful and the case proceeds to hearing, any administrative appeals judge who served as a mediator will neither preside over the hearing nor have any contact with the board members regarding the case other than to inform them that the mediation did not result in a settlement.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-420 Subpoenas. (1) Issuance. Subpoenas may be issued by any member of the board, the presiding officer assigned to the case or by the attorney of record, as provided in the Administrative Procedure Act. Each subpoena shall be subscribed with the signature of the issuing person. Parties desiring subpoenas to be signed by the presiding officer or a board member shall make a showing of general relevance and reasonable scope of the testimony or evidence sought, shall prepare the subpoenas for issuance, shall send them to the board's office for signature, and, upon return, shall make arrangements for service.
(2) Form. Every subpoena shall name the environmental and land use board and the title of the proceedings, and shall command the person to whom it is directed to attend and give testimony or produce designated books, documents, or things under that person's control at a specified time and place.
(3) Service. Service of subpoenas to a witness who is not party to the case shall be made by personally serving a copy of the subpoena to such person, in accordance with civil rule 45 , and tendering on demand, where entitled to make such a demand, the fees for one day's attendance and the mileage allowed by law. All costs shall be paid by the party seeking the attendance of the witness.
(4) Proof of service. The person serving the subpoena shall make proof of service by filing the subpoena and the required return, affidavit or acknowledgment of service with the board or presiding officer of the case. Failure to make proof of service does not affect the validity of the service.
(5) Quashing. Upon motion made promptly (at or before the time specified in the subpoena for compliance) by the person subpoenaed and upon notice to the party for whom the subpoena was issued, the board or its presiding officer may:
(a) Quash; or
(b) Modify the subpoena if it is unreasonable or requires evidence not relevant to any matter in issue; or
(c) Condition denial of the motion upon just and reasonable conditions.
(6) Geographical scope. Attendance of witnesses and production of evidence may be required from any place in the state of Washington, at any designated place of hearing.

## PARTE PREHEARING PRACTICE

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-425 Dismissal of petitions for review on jurisdictional grounds. (1) Timely filing of the petition for review, and other petitions within the board's jurisdiction is required for the board to acquire jurisdiction.
(2) Any party may challenge the jurisdiction of the board to hear a petition for review on jurisdictional grounds, and the board may independently raise the jurisdictional issue. The board may, when satisfied that it does not have jurisdiction, dismiss the petition for review.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-426 Certification of permit applications. (1) Within seven days after receipt of service of the petition filed pursuant to law, the project applicant shall file with the board and serve on all parties an affidavit certifying all applications for permits that the project applicant has filed with participating permit agencies for the qualifying project, provided, however, that no permit may be included that has been issued and appealed to an administrative hearings board or to court prior to the date of service of the petition filed with the board under this chapter. The board shall request verification from the participating agencies of the permit applica-
tions certified in the project applicant's affidavit and of the expected date for final decision on the permit applications. Filing of the affidavit shall toll the schedule for hearing by the board until twenty-one days after issuance of the final permit decision on the last permit required for the qualifying project that has been certified in the project applicant's affidavit and verified by a participating agency as applied for, unless the petition filed and served by the petitioner relates to the final permit decision.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-427 Initial hearing, jurisdictional motions and case scheduling.
Initial hearing.
(1) Within seven days after the expiration of the appeal period for the final permit decision on the last permit required for the qualifying project, the petitioner shall note an initial hearing on jurisdictional and other preliminary matters, and, if applicable, on other pretrial matters. This initial hearing shall be set no sooner than thirty-five days and not later than fifty days after the expiration of the appeal period for the final permit.
(2) The parties shall note all motions on jurisdictional and procedural issues for resolution at the initial hearing, except that a motion to allow discovery may be brought sooner.
(3) The defenses of lack of standing, untimely filing or service of the petition, lack of good faith or improper purpose in filing, and failure to join persons needed for just adjudication are waived if not raised by timely motion noted to be heard at the initial hearing, unless the board allows discovery on such issues.
(4) The parties may waive the initial hearing by scheduling with the board a date for the hearing or hearings on the merits and filing a stipulated order that resolves the jurisdictional and procedural issues raised by the petition, including the issues identified in subsections (3) and (5) of this section.

## Case schedule order.

(5) The petitioner shall move the board for an order at the initial hearing that sets the date on which the permit decision record or records of the applicable permit agency or agencies, if any, must be submitted, sets a briefing schedule, sets a discovery schedule if discovery is to be allowed, and schedules a hearing or hearings on the merits.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-428 Stays. (1) Any party may request the board to stay or suspend an action by a participating permit agency or another party to implement the decision under review. The request must set forth a statement of grounds for the stay and the factual basis for the request.
(2) The board may grant a stay only if the board finds that:
(a) The party requesting the stay is likely to prevail on the merits;
(b) Without the stay the party requesting it will suffer irreparable harm;
(c) The grant of a stay will not substantially harm other parties to the proceedings; and
(d) The request for the stay is timely in light of the circumstances of the case.
(3) The board may grant the request for a stay upon such terms and conditions, including the filing of security, as are necessary to prevent harm to other parties by the stay.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-429 Discovery. The parties may not conduct pretrial discovery except with the prior permission of the board, which may be sought by motion, subject to any applicable rules adopted by the board and RCW 34.05.446(3), at any time after service of the petition. The party requesting discovery must make a prima facie showing of need. The board shall strictly limit discovery to what is necessary for equitable and timely review of the issues.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-430 Correction or amendment of notice. (1) Within thirty days of receipt by the board, if any petition for review is found to be defective or insufficient, the board may require the party filing the petition for review to correct, clarify or amend the same to conform to the requirements of any relevant statutes and the board's rules. The board may refuse to schedule any conference or hearing thereon until compliance with such requirements, or may issue an appropriate order which may include providing for dismissal of the petition upon failure to comply within a specified time.
(2) Other amendments and supplemental pleadings shall conform to civil rule 15 .

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-435 Intervention. (1) The presiding officer may grant a petition for intervention by any person at any time, upon determining that the petitioner qualifies as an intervenor pursuant to civil rule 24 , that the intervention will serve the interests of justice and that the prompt and orderly conduct of the appeal will not be impaired.
(2) The presiding officer may impose conditions upon the intervenor's participation in the proceedings.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-440 Joinder of parties. The presiding officer shall order the joinder of the permittee, permitting agency or any other interested person or entity in accordance with civil rule 19. The presiding officer may also permit the joinder of persons who are not necessary to the determination of the appeal in accordance with civil rule 20.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-445 Answers to petitions for review. (1) A party need not file an answer to a petition for review filed pursuant to these rules.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-450 Initial hearing and case scheduling. (1) Upon receipt of petitioner's request for an initial hearing, which complies with the requirements of these regulations, the board shall promptly mail to each party a scheduling letter which sets the time and location of the initial hearing.
(2) In those cases where the presiding officer does not order a prehearing conference, the letter setting the initial hearing date and time will be mailed at least thirty-five days before the initial hearing date. The letter may also set the schedule for filing motions and prehearing briefs, and will notify the parties that an interpreter can be made available, upon reasonable notice to the board, for a witness or party who does not speak English or is hearing-impaired. The scheduling letter will control the subsequent proceedings, unless modified for good cause by the presiding officer.
(3) In cases where the presiding officer decides to hold a prehearing conference, the scheduling letter will also notify the parties of the time and location of the prehearing conference. The scheduling letter will be mailed at least seven days before the prehearing conference.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-455 Prehearing conferences. (1) The purpose of a prehearing conference shall be:
(a) To determine the feasibility of a settlement of the appeal or, failing settlement;
(b) To prepare the case for hearing by scheduling prehearing deadlines and by identifying the issues, and if possible, witnesses, exhibits, stipulations, and admissions.
(2) Appearance by a party or by the party's representative at a prehearing conference is mandatory. If a party fails to attend a prehearing conference, that is not justified by good cause, the presiding officer may issue an order of default against the absent party or other appropriate action.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-460 Case scheduling and prehearing orders. After an initial hearing or prehearing conference which has not resulted in settlement, the presiding officer shall enter a prehearing order. Normally, this will include a statement of issues, a schedule for filing motions and briefs, and lists of witnesses and exhibits or provide for filing such lists, as well as other matters which may bear on the preparation for hearing. The issues stated in the prehearing order shall control the subsequent course of the proceedings, unless modified for good cause by subsequent order.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-465 Settlement and mediation agreements. (1) Where the parties settle an appeal before hearing, the parties shall prepare a written order of dismissal to which the settlement agreement is attached, and submit that order to the board. If the agreement is in accordance with the law, the board shall enter the order and dispose of the case.
(2) This section also pertains to settlement agreements reached after mediation.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-470 Use of telephone conferences, motion hearings and hearings. Upon the motion of any party or independently, the presiding officer may decide to conduct any conference, motion hearing or hearing by telephone conference call to promote the fair, speedy and economical processing of a matter. If the presiding officer grants the party's request for a telephone conference, the requesting party shall initiate and pay for the conference call.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-475 Motions. (1) An application to the board for an order shall be by motion which, unless made during a hearing, shall be in writing, state with particularity the grounds therefor and set forth the relief sought. Each written motion shall have appended to it the order which the motion seeks.
(2) For motions for continuance or for schedule changes, or other motions that are likely to be uncontested, the moving party shall affirmatively seek the stipulation of all parties and present a stipulated order wherever possible.
(3) If the motion is contested, any party may request that the board hold a motion hearing. At a motion hearing, the board will consider the arguments of the parties but will not take evidence. Unless a motion hearing is requested by one or more parties, or the board independently sets a motion hearing date, the board will normally decide the motion exclusively on the parties' written submissions. The motion, proposed order and other relevant materials shall be filed and served. Where the hearing coordinator specifies that the hearing shall be telephonic, the moving party shall originate the telephonic hearing conference call. The presiding officer will decide whether or not a motion hearing will be held, and notify the parties accordingly.
(4) Unless a scheduling letter or order provides otherwise, the following schedule governs all written motions (including any supporting affidavits, memoranda of law, or other documentation):
(a) All responses to any motion shall be filed and served ten days from the date the motion is received. The moving party shall then have seven days from receipt of the response to file and serve a reply.
(b) In cases where the moving party requests a motion hearing, all dispositive motions shall be filed and served not later than twenty-eight days before the motion hearing.
(c) All dispositive motions shall be filed and served not later than two months before the hearing date, unless the presiding officer by order allows otherwise.
(d) In exigent or exceptional circumstances, a party may at any time request the board to modify the above schedules by requesting a scheduling conference (which may be telephonic) with the presiding officer.
(5) The board will decide a motion on the written record unless the presiding officer orders a motion hearing.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-480 Postponements and continuances of hearings. (1) Postponement or continuance of a hearing is within the discretion of the presiding officer, whether contested or uncontested by the parties. The board may postpone or continue a hearing on its own motion.
(2) The postponement or continuance of a hearing shall be sought by written motion and according to the procedure set forth in WAC 199-08-475.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-485 Dismissal, default or withdrawal of appeal. (1) If a party fails to attend or participate in a hearing or other stage of an adjudicative proceeding, the presiding officer may serve upon all parties a default or other dispositive order which shall include a statement of the grounds for the order. Within seven days after service of a default or dismissal order for failure to attend or participate, the party against whom it was entered may file a written motion requesting that the order be vacated and stating the grounds relied upon.
(2) A petitioner may request to withdraw a petition for review. Requests before the petitioner rests its case-in-chief during the hearing are mandatory and afterwards are permissive.

## PART F HEARINGS

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-490 Hearing briefs. Hearing briefs, if filed, should be submitted to the board at least seven days before the time of hearing or other such time as the board may prescribe. An original and six copies must be filed. In all cases where briefs are filed, a copy shall also be served on the other parties or their attorneys. The board may permit or require the filing of additional briefs.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-495 Procedures at hearings. (1) Presiding officer. All hearings shall be conducted by a presiding officer who shall conduct the hearing in an orderly manner and rule on all procedural matters, objections and motions.
(2) Testimony under oath. Oaths shall be administered by the presiding officer or other officer with authority to administer oaths. All testimony to be considered by the board shall be sworn or affirmed.
(3) Recording.
(a) An official recording of all evidentiary hearings shall be made by manual, electronic, or other type of recording device.
(b) Unofficial use of photographic and recording equipment is permitted at hearings; however, the presiding officer shall be consulted first and may impose conditions on their use as necessary to prevent disruption of the hearing.
(4) Order of presentation of evidence.
(a) The presiding officer shall determine the proper order of presentation of evidence. As a general rule, the petitioning party shall initially introduce its evidence.
(b) The opposing party shall introduce its evidence after the petitioner has rested. Rebuttal and surrebuttal evidence will be received only at the discretion of the presiding officer.
(c) Witnesses may be called out of turn in contravention of this rule by agreement of all parties.
(5) Opening statements. Unless the presiding officer rules otherwise, parties shall present an oral opening statement setting out briefly a statement of the basic facts, disputes and issues of the case.
(6) Written statement of qualifications of expert witnesses. Any party who plans to introduce the testimony of any expert witness at the hearing shall submit as an exhibit to the board and all parties at the hearing a written statement of the qualifications, experience, and expertise of each such expert witness.
(7) Former employee as an expert witness. No former employee of a participating permit agency, its legal staff or legal representative, or the board or the attorney general shall at any time after leaving the employment with a participating permit agency appear, except when permitted by applicable state conflict of interest law, as an expert witness on behalf of other parties in a formal proceeding in which an active part in the investigation as a representative of the department or board was taken.
(8) Objections and motions to strike. Objections to the admission or exclusion of evidence shall be in short form, stating the legal grounds of objection relied upon, and the transcript shall not include extended argument or debate.
(9) Rulings. The presiding officer, on objection or independently, shall exclude all irrelevant or unduly repetitious evidence and all rulings upon objections to the admissibility of evidence shall be made in accordance with WAC 199-08515 through 199-08-535.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-500 Scope and standard of review. (1) Hearings upon petitions for review shall be quasi-judicial in nature. The scope and standard of review shall be as follows:
(2) For all permit decisions being reviewed that were made by quasi-judicial bodies or permit agency officers who made factual determinations in support of the decisions, after the conduct of proceedings in which the parties had an opportunity consistent with due process to make records on the factual issues, board review of factual issues and the conclusions drawn from the factual issues shall be confined to the records created by the quasi-judicial bodies or permit agency officers, except that:
(3) For decisions described in subsection (2) of this section, the records may be supplemented by additional evidence only if the additional evidence relates to:
(a) Grounds for disqualification of a member of the body or of the officer that made the permit decision, when such grounds were unknown by the petitioner at the time the record was created;
(b) Matters that were improperly excluded from the record after being offered by a party to a permit decision proceeding; or
(c) Matters that were outside the jurisdiction of the body or officer that made the permit decision.
(4) For permit decisions other than those described in subsection (2) of this section, the board review of the permit decision shall be de novo on issues presented as error in the petition.
(5) The board may require or permit corrections of ministerial errors or inadvertent omissions in the preparation of the record.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-510 Provision of interpreters and of reasonable accommodations to individuals with special needs. (1) Whenever any person involved in an adjudicative proceeding before the board is eligible for an interpreter, as that eligibility is defined in WAC $10-08-150$, or qualifies for reasonable accommodations as an individual with disabilities, that person shall request an interpreter or other reasonable accommodations from the presiding officer not later than three weeks before the date of the hearing, conference or other situation for which the interpreter or assistance is needed. The board shall comply with WAC 10-08-150 and 10-08-160(2) regarding the provision of interpreters.
(2) Information about proceedings before the board is available in alternate format upon request.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-515 Rules of evidence—Admissibility criteria. (1) Evidence, including hearsay evidence, is admissible if in the judgment of the presiding officer it is the kind of evidence on which reasonably prudent persons are accustomed to rely in the conduct of their affairs. All relevant evidence is admissible which, in the opinion of the presiding officer, is the best evidence reasonably obtainable, having due regard for its necessity, availability and trustworthiness. In passing upon the admissibility of evidence, the presiding officer shall give consideration to, but shall not be bound to follow, the rules of evidence governing civil proceedings in matters not involving trial by jury in the superior courts of the state of Washington.
(2) The presiding officer shall exclude evidence that is excludable on constitutional or statutory grounds or on the basis of evidentiary privilege recognized in the courts of this state.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-520 Rules of evidence-Official notice-Matters of law. The board and its hearing officers, upon request made before or during a hearing, will officially notice:
(1) Federal law. The Constitution; congressional acts, resolutions, records, journals and committee reports; decisions of federal courts and administrative agencies; executive orders and proclamations; and all rules, orders and notices published in the Federal Register.
(2) State law. The Constitution of the state of Washington, acts of the legislature, resolutions, records, journals and committee reports; decisions of Washington state courts and administrative agencies; executive orders and proclamations by the governor; and all rules, orders and notices filed with the code reviser.
(3) Governmental organization. Organization, territorial limitations, officers, departments, and general administration of the government of the state of Washington, the United States, the several states and foreign nations.
(4) Agency organization. Participating permit agency, commission or board organization, administration, officers, personnel, official publications, and practitioners before its bar.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-525 Rules of evidence—Official notice-Material facts. (1) In the absence of controverting evidence, the board and its hearing officers, upon request made before or during a hearing, or in a proposed decision, may officially notice:
(a) Board proceedings. The pendency of, the issues and position of the parties therein, and the disposition of any proceeding then pending before or theretofore concluded by the board;
(b) Business customs. General customs and practices followed in the transaction of business;
(c) Notorious facts. Facts so generally and widely known to all well informed persons as not to be subject to reasonable dispute, or specific facts which are capable of immediate and accurate demonstration by resort to accessible sources of generally accepted authority, including, but not exclusively, facts stated in any publication authorized or permitted by law to be made by any federal or state officer, department, or agency;
(d) Technical knowledge. Matters within the technical knowledge of the board as a body of experts, within the scope or pertaining to the subject matter of its statutory duties, responsibilities or jurisdiction.
(2) Request or suggestion. Any party may request, or the presiding officer may suggest, that official notice be taken of a material fact, which shall be clearly and precisely stated, orally on the record, at any prehearing conference or oral hearing or argument, or may make such request or suggestion by written notice, any pleading, motion, memorandum, or brief served upon all parties, at any time prior to a final decision.
(3) Statement. Where an initial or final decision of the board rests in whole or in part upon official notice of a material fact, such fact shall be clearly and precisely stated in such decision. In determining whether to take official notice of material facts, the hearing officer may consult any source of pertinent information, whether or not furnished as it may be, by any party and whether or not admissible under the rules of evidence.
(4) Controversion. Any party may controvert a request or a suggestion that official notice of a material fact be taken at the time the same is made if it be made orally, or by a pleading, reply or brief in response to the pleading or brief or
notice in which the same is made or suggested. If any decision is stated to rest in whole or in part upon official notice of a material fact which the parties have not had a prior opportunity to controvert, any party may controvert such fact by appropriate exceptions if such notice be taken in a petition for reconsideration if notice of such fact be taken in a final report. Such controversion shall concisely and clearly set forth the sources, authority and other data relied upon to show the existence or nonexistence of the material fact assumed or denied in the decision.
(5) Evaluation of evidence. Nothing herein shall be construed to preclude the board or its authorized agents from utilizing their experience, technical competence, and specialized knowledge in the evaluation of the evidence presented to them.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-535 Rules of evidence-Tentative admission-Exclusion-Discontinuance-Objections. When objection is made to the admissibility of evidence, such evidence may be received subject to a later ruling. The officer conducting the hearing may, either with or without objection, exclude inadmissible evidence or order cumulative evidence discontinued. Parties objecting to the introduction of evidence shall state the precise grounds of such objection at the time such evidence is offered.

## PART G <br> DECISIONS BY THE BOARD AFTER HEARING

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-540 Contents of the record. The record before the board in any adjudicative proceeding shall consist of the decision or order appealed from, the petition for review therefrom, responsive pleadings, if any, and notices of appearances, and any other written applications, motions, stipulations or requests duly filed by any party and written reports or orders of the presiding officer. Such record shall also include all depositions, if they are admitted at the hearing, the transcript of testimony as provided in WAC 199-08545, and other proceedings at the hearing, together with all exhibits admitted.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-545 Preparation of transcripts. (1) The board, in its discretion, may at any time cause a transcript to be printed, but will not normally do so.
(2) When the board does not cause a transcript to be printed, it shall be the obligation of the party wishing a transcript, or portions of it, to order the same from the board reporter and assume the printing costs.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-550 Preparation of findings, conclusions and orders. Upon request of the board or presiding officer proposed findings, conclusions and orders shall be prepared by counsel and the same shall be based upon the
board's oral or memorandum opinion. The board or presiding officer may adopt, in whole or in part, the proposed findings, conclusions and orders or the board may prepare its own findings, conclusions and orders.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-555 Final decisions and orders. (1) Upon completion of the record and submission of the issues for decision and order, a written final decision and order concurred in by a majority of the board may be adopted which shall contain findings and conclusions as to each contested issue of fact and law: Provided, That in the event that the board considers the record and that four of the members cannot agree on a decision, the substantive decision under appeal will control. The board will formally adopt its final decision and order.
(2) Copies of the final decision and order shall be mailed by the board to each party to the petition for review and to the attorney or representative of record, if any.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-565 Petitions for reconsideration. (1)(a) After issuance of a final decision, any party may file a petition for reconsideration with the board. Such petition must be filed within ten days of mailing of the final decision. The board may require an answer to the petition. Copies of the petition for reconsideration, and an answer, if required, shall be served on the other parties of record.
(b) The filing of a petition for reconsideration does not stay the effectiveness of the final decision of the board.
(c) In response to a petition for reconsideration, the board may deny it, or may reverse or modify its decision or may reopen the hearing. The board is deemed to have denied the petition if, within twenty days from the date the petition is filed, the board does not act on the petition or specify a date by which it will act on the petition.
(2) The time for filing a petition for judicial review does not commence until disposition of any timely petition for reconsideration. However, the filing of a petition for reconsideration is not a prerequisite for seeking judicial review.
(3) Copies of the final decision and order and of the board's disposition of any petition for reconsideration shall be mailed by the board to each party to the appeal and to the attorney or representative of record.

## PART H <br> APPEALS FROM BOARD DECISIONS

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-570 Time for filing petitions for review to superior court and court of appeals. (1) Superior court review. In order to obtain judicial review of a final decision of the environmental and land use hearings board, a party to the board case as consolidated shall timely file a petition for judicial review in the superior court for Thurston County and timely serve the board and all parties to the proceedings before the board by personal service or by mail. Such petition is timely filed and served only if it is filed and served on
all parties within thirty days after the filing of the final decision and order of the board. Service by mail shall be deemed effective on the date of deposit with the United States Postal Service.
(2) Direct review. Any party may apply for direct review by the court of appeals. An application for direct review must be filed with the superior court within ten days after the filing of the petition for judicial review. In considering an application for direct review under this chapter, it shall be presumed that:
(a) The qualifying project presents fundamental and urgent issues affecting the public interest which require a prompt determination; and
(b) Delay in obtaining a final and prompt determination of such issues would be detrimental to a party and the public interest.

## NEW SECTION

WAC 199-08-580 Certification of record. Within thirty days of receipt of a copy of the petition for judicial review to the superior court or notice of acceptance of the certificate of appealability by the court of appeals, the board shall certify and transmit to the reviewing court the record made before the board. Additional time for certification and transmission of the record may be allowed by the reviewing court. Normally the record will not include a transcript of the testimony. Unless the board has caused a transcript to be printed, arrangements for and costs of the written transcript shall be the obligation of the party seeking judicial review.

The current restriction on personal use is based on expenditures of a candidate's campaign fund that are "not directly related to the candidate's election campaign." A public hearing and possible adoption of an amended rule may occur on March 23, 2004. If adopted, the new or amended rule will likely go into effect in May of 2004.

A public hearing on this issue may occur on March 23, 2004. If new or amended requirements are established by rule, they will likely go into effect in May of 2004.
