REGULATIONS RELATING TO THE CONTROL OF VIRULENT
HOG CHOLERA VIRUS; THE QUARANTINE OF PREMISES WHERE
CHOLERA IS KNOWN TO EXIST; VACCINATION PROCEDURES;
VACCINATION QUARANTINES; FARM MOVEMENTS

I, Donald W. Moos, Director of Agriculture of the State of Washington by virtue of the authority vested in me under Chapter 16.36, RCW, after due notice as provided under Chapter 34.04 and 42.32, RCW, and a public hearing held in Olympia on January 12, 1966 do promulgate the following regulations:

Regulation 1. For the purpose of this order "the Director" means the Director of the Department of Agriculture of the State of Washington or his duly authorized representative.

Regulation 2. Control of virulent hog cholera virus - No person, firm, corporation or association shall have in his possession or keep, sell or offer for sale, barter, exchange, give-away, use or otherwise dispose of virulent blood or hog cholera virus or blood harboring the hog cholera virus in this state except for the following purposes:

- (a) When used for the production of anti-hog cholera serum; virulent or avirulent hog cholera vaccines; or the testing of such products when under the supervision of the control agency of the United States Department of Agriculture and/or the Washington State Department of Agriculture.
- (b) For research purposes when authorized by special permit issued by the Director.
- (c) For emergency disease control procedures when authorized by special permit issued by the Director.

Regulation 3. Control of modified live virus hog cholera vaccine -

- (a) No person, firm, corporation or association shall have in his possession or keep, sell or offer for sale, barter, exchange, give away, use or otherwise dispose of Modified Live Virus Hog Cholera Vaccine in this state except for the following purposes:
 - 1. The official use in vaccination of swine for movement in interstate commerce as required by Title 9, Part 76, Code of Federal Regulations and/or the receiving state.
 - 2. For research and biologics production or testing under the supervision of the control agency of the United States Department of Agriculture and/or the Washington State Department of Agriculture under special permit issued by the Director.

3. For emergency disease control procedures when authorized by special permit issued by the Director.
4. For use in Registered Quarantine Feedlots for swine under permit from the Director.

Regulation 4. Quarantine of infected or exposed swine and premises - All facilities and grounds other than Public Livestock Markets where swine are kept and the disease of hog cholera is diagnosed or exists among such swine and/or premises where swine have been exposed to cholera shall be quarantined. No swine may be removed for any purpose from such premises for a period of at least thirty days following the date of death or final disposition of the last case of hog cholera and all facilities and grounds are properly cleaned and disinfected as prescribed by the Director.

Regulation 5. Disposal of swine that have died from hog cholera - All swine that have died from hog cholera shall be immediately burned or buried in a grave at least four feet deep, or otherwise disposed of by special permit of the director.

Regulation 6. Intrastate movement of swine and official vaccination - Healthy, unexposed swine may move intrastate from farm of origin to any destination without vaccination and with no restrictions PROVIDED that:

- (a) Swine moving to Public Livestock Markets will be subject to requirements of Public Livestock Market rules and regulations.
- (b) Swine moving into interstate commerce must meet requirements of Title 9, Part 76, Code of Federal Regulations and state of destination requirements.
- (c) Swine moving to fairs or shows, etc. will be subject to requirements of fair regulations.

Regulation 7. Official vaccination methods - Official vaccination of swine in Washington must be by one of the methods described in this Part (a), and (b) and all such swine shall be identified with an official tag or tattoo approved by the Director. Tag and/or tattoo number must be listed on a vaccination certificate signed by a State, Federal or accredited veterinarian and a copy mailed to the Department of Agriculture immediately. The vaccination certificate must also portray the owner's name and address; manufacturer of vaccine and serum; serial numbers and amount of each administered; and the date of vaccination.

- (a) Vaccinated with killed or inactivated hog cholera vaccine in accordance with the manufacturer's recommended dosage.
- (b) Vaccinated simultaneously with modified live virus hog cholera vaccine in dosage recommended by the manufacturer and hog cholera serum or antibody concentrate according to body weight with minimum dosage as follows:

<u>WEIGHT</u>	<u>HOG CHOLERA SERUM</u>	<u>ANTIBODY CONCENTRATE</u>
Under 20 lbs.	1 cc/lb. of body wt.	½ cc/lb. of body wt.
20 - 60 lbs.	20cc	10cc
60 -120 lbs.	30cc	15cc
Over 120 lbs.	40cc	20cc

PROVIDED, however, that vaccination under (b) above is allowed only for swine being certified for movement in interstate commerce as required by Title 9, Part 76, Code of Federal Regulations and the receiving state.

Regulation 8. Penalty -- Any person, firm or corporation violating this regulation shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.
