REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO THE USE OF HERBICIDES IN ADAMS COUNTY

I, Donald W. Moos, Director of Agriculture of the state of Washington, by virtue of the authority vested in me under Chapters 17.21 and 15.57 RCW, after due notice as provided under Chapters 34.04 and 42.32 RCW, and a public hearing held in Kennewick, Washington on March 23, 1971, do hereby promulgate the following regulations relating to the use of growth regulating herbicides

REGULATION 1. Area Under Order, Restricted Use Herbicides, Prohibited Formulations, and Definition.

AREA UNDER ORDER: All lands lying within the borders of Adams County.

RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES: All formulations of phenoxy hormone type herbicides, including 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T, and MCPA are by this order declared to be restricted use herbicides.

PROHIBITED FORMULATIONS: The use of dust formulations of restricted use herbicides are prohibited in the entire area under order. The use of all oil type carriers, emulsifiers and spreader stickers are also prohibited: PROVIDED, That oil type emulsifiers and spreader stickers may be used when not in excess of one pint per acre; and from October 1 to May 15 of the following year, oil type carriers may be used for brush control.

REGULATION 2. Area 1. All lands lying within the borders of Adams County.

AREA 1. Restrictions. From May 15 to October 1 of each year the application of high volatile formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be prohibited and aerial applications shall be made with a minimum of two gallons of water per acre and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.078 inches, directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 3. WIND AND WEATHER CONDITIONS. The application of restricted use herbicides by ground or aerial equipment shall be prohibited from May 15 to October 1 of each year when the mean sustained wind velocity is over seven miles per hour from any direction. Even though wind velocity is within the limits allowable for spraying, restricted use herbicides shall not be applied if other weather conditions (Examples - temperature inversion, high temperature, etc.) are such that

damage could result to adjacent and nearby towns, susceptible crops, and plantings through physical drift or volatilization.

REGULATION 4. AIRCRAFT RESTRICTION. Aircraft carrying restricted use herbicides are prohibited from turning and/or low flying during spraying operations over cities and towns unless authorized by the city or town in question pursuant to an agreement for pesticide application; or residences, windbreaks, orchards or susceptible crops belonging to any person other than the owner of the property being treated, except by permission of the person whose residence, windbreak, orchard, or susceptible crop is involved.

REGULATION 5. DISPOSAL OF RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES AND THEIR CONTAINERS. No person shall dispose of, discard, or store any restricted use pesticide or their containers in such a manner as may cause injury to humans, vegetation, crops, livestock, wildlife, pollinating insects or to pollute any water supply or waterway.

REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO THE USE OF HERBICIDES IN BENTON COUNTY

I, Donald W. Moos, Director of Agriculture of the State of Washington, by virtue of the authority vested in me under Chapters 17.21 and 15.57 RCW, after due notice and public hearing held at Kennewick, Washington, March 23, 1971, as provided under Chapters 42.32 and 34.04 RCW do hereby promulgate the following regulations relating to the use of growth regulating herbicides.

REGULATION 1. Area Under Order, Restricted Use Herbicides, Prohibited Formulations, and Definitions.

AREA UNDER ORDER: All of Benton County except that portion lying within the boundaries of the Hanford Project.

RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES: All formulations of phenoxy hormone type herbicides, including 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T, and MCPA are by this order declared to be restricted use herbicides.

PROHIBITED FORMULATIONS: Use of high volatile ester formulations and all dust formulations of restricted use herbicides are prohibited in the entire area under Order. The use of all oil type carriers, emulsifiers and spreader stickers are also prohibited: PROVIDED, That oil type emulsifiers and spreader stickers may be used when not in excess of 1 pint per acre; and, from November 1 to the specified date of the following year, oil type carriers may be used for brush control.

DEFINITION: SPECIFIED DATE. Specified date as referred to in this Order is that date to be determined by the State Department of Agriculture in consultation with local authorities and shall be as near as possible to the date of bud break of grapes being grown in Benton County and/or adjacent counties. Notification of this date, after which such operations that are applicable are so restricted, shall be made by mailing a notice to each of the known wheat growers and to each of the known commercial applicators working in the area and an announcement to the local newspapers, radio stations, and county extension offices.

DEFINITION: HIGH VOLATILE AND LOW VOLATILE ESTERS. High volatile and low volatile esters are those formulations labeled as high volatile and low volatile in Interpretation 17, Revision 1 of Title 7 under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act.



This area includes all the lands in Sections 29 through 36, Township 9 North, Range 29 East; Sections 1 through 6, 10 through 13 and those portions of Sections 7, 8, 9, 14, 15, 23, and 24 lying north and east of the K.I.D. Canal, T.8N., R.29E.; Sections 4 through 10, 14 through 28, 35, 36 and those portions of 29, 30, 32, 33, and 34 lying north and east of the K.I.D. Canal, T.8N., R.30E.

AREA 1. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the amine and sodium or solubilized acid formulations, by ground equipment only, on any crops, shrubs, or lands.

REGULATION 3. AREA 2. (PROSSER, BENTON CITY, AND KIONA AREA). This area includes all lands in Sections 1 through 12, and 15 through 19, T.8N., R.24E.; Sections 5, 6, and 7, T.8N., R.25E.; all of T.9N., R.24E.; Sections 1 through 34, T.9N., R.25E.; Sections 1 through 24, T.9N., R.26E.; all of T.9N., R.27E.; those portions of Sections 29, 30, 31, and 32, T.10N., R.28E., lying south of the Yakima River; that portion of T.9N., R.28E., lying south of the Yakima River; and that portion of T.8N., R.28E., lying north of the Northern Pacific Railroad tracks.

AREA 2. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the liquid form of the amine and sodium or solubilized acid formulations on any crops, shrubs, or lands by ground equipment only: PROVIDED, That low volatile esters may be used from November 1 to the specified date of the following year.

Oil amine invert formulations may be applied by aircraft on a permit basis (See Regulation 12) at any time: PROVIDED, That these aerial applications shall be made with a minimum of 5 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.156 inches and directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 4. GROUND EQUIPMENT RESTRICTIONS, AREAS 1 AND 2. Ground application shall be made with a minimum of 10 gallons per acre. Spray equipment must be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.036 inches. Pressure for ground equipment must not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles.

REGULATION 5. AREA 3. (BUFFER ZONE SURROUNDING PROSSER, BENTON CITY, KIONA AND KENNEWICK AREAS). Sections 19 through 36, Township 10 North, Range 24 through 27 East; Sections 13, 14, and 20 through 36, T.8N., R.24E.; Sections 1 through 4, 8 through 12, 15 through 22, T.8N., R.25E.; Sections 1 through 12, T.8N., R.26E.; Sections 25 through 36, T.9N., R.26E.; Sections 1 through 16, 21 through 25, and 36, T.8N., R.27E.; Sections 1, 2, 11, and 12, T.7N., R.28E.; all of T.8N., R.28E.; that portion of T.8N., R.28E., lying south of the Northern Pacific Railroad tracks, Sections 1 through 12, T.7N., R.29E.; Sections 15 through 22, 25 through 36 and those portions of Sections 7, 8, 9, 14, 15, 23, and 24 lying south and west of the

Sections 31 and those portions of 29, 30, 32, 33, and 34 lying south and west of the K.I.D. Canal, T.8N., R.30E.; and those portions of Sections 5 through 8, T.7N., R.31E., lying in Benton County.

AREA 3. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application by ground or aircraft equipment of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the liquid forms of the amine and sodium or solubilized acid formulations: PROVIDED, That low volatile esters may be used from November 1 to the specified date of the following year.

Ground applications shall be made with a minimum of 8 gallons of water per acre, and ground equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.031 inches from November 1 to the specified date of the following year. From the specified date to November 1 of each year, ground applications shall be made with a minimum of 10 gallons of water per acre, and ground equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.036 inches. Pressure form ground equipment shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles.

Aircraft applications shall be made with a minimum of 3 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.125 inches, directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight, from November 1 to the specified date of the following year. From the specified date to November 1 of each year, aircraft application shall be made with a minimum of 5 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.156 inches, directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 6. AREA 4. The remainder of Benton County including the area north of the buffer zone and the Horse Heaven Hills.

AREA 4. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application by ground or aerial equipment of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the liquid forms of the amine, sodium, or solubilized acid formulations, and those ester formulations labeled as low volatile.

Ground application shall be made with a minimum of 8 gallons per acre. Spray equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.031 inches. Pressure for ground equipment shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles.

Aircraft application shall be made with a minimum of 3 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.125 inches, and directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 7. RESTRICTIONS ON THE USE OF AIRSTRIPS. The loading and/or mixing of restricted use herbicides is prohibited on any airstrip, airfield or any location within areas 1 and 2 and turning and/or low flying over areas 1 and 2 is also prohibited when loaded with restricted use herbicides, or prior to thoroughly cleaning equipment following use of these herbicides.

restricted use herbicides are prohibited from turning and/or low flying, during spraying operations, over cities and towns, unless authorized by the city or town in question pursuant to an agreement for pesticide applications; or over residences, windbreaks, orchards, or susceptible crops belonging to any persons other than the owner of the property being treated, except by permission of the person whose residence, windbreak, orchard, or susceptible crop is involved.

REGULATION 9. DISPOSAL OF RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES AND THEIR CONTAINERS. No person shall dispose of, discard, or store any restricted use pesticide or their containers in such a manner as may cause injury to humans, vegetation, crops, livestock, wildlife, pollinating insects or to pollute any water supply or waterway.


REGULATION 10. WIND AND WEATHER CONDITIONS. The application of restricted use herbicides by ground or aerial equipment shall be prohibited when the mean sustained wind velocity is over seven miles per hour from any direction. Even though wind velocity is within the limits allowable for spraying, restricted use herbicides shall not be applied if other weather conditions (examples - temperature inversion, high temperature) are such that damage could result to adjacent and nearby towns, susceptible crops and plantings through physical drift or volatilization in the area under Order.

REGULATION 11. RESTRICTIONS ON THE SALE OF CERTAIN FORMULATIONS OF RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES. The sale of high and low volatile ester formulations of restricted use herbicides in containers of less than one gallon is prohibited in the entire area under Order; PROVIDED, That containers of one gallon of high volatile ester liquid formulations may be sold only with the maintenance of a ledger as provided in state-wide Order No. 1161, WAC 16-222-145(2).

REGULATION 12. SPECIAL RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDE PERMITS. The Washington State Department of Agriculture may approve written requests to apply certain restricted use herbicides for purposes of critical weed control in the restricted areas under Order; the Director will consider recommendations of the 2,4-D Committee for Benton County.

REGULATION 13. RESTRICTED EVENING APPLICATIONS IN THE AREA UNDER ORDER. The application of allowable formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be prohibited daily from two hours prior to sunset to 4:00 A.M., the following morning, from the specified date to November 1.

Moos, Director of Agriculture of the State of Washington, by virtue of the authority vested in me under Chapters 17.21 and 15.57 RCW, after due notice and public hearing held at Kennewick, Washington, on March 23, 1971, as provided under Chapters 42.32. and 34.04 RCW, do hereby promulgate the following regulations relating to the use of growth regulating herbicides.

REGULATION 1. Area Under Order, Restricted Use Herbicides, Prohibited Formulations, and Definitions.

AREA UNDER ORDER: All the lands within the borders of Franklin County.

RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES: All formulations of phenoxy hormone type herbicides including 2,4-D, 2,4,5-T, and MCPA are by this order declared to be restricted use herbicides.

PROHIBITED FORMULATIONS: The use of dust formulations of restricted use herbicides are prohibited in the entire area under order. The use of all oil type carriers, emulsifiers and spreader stickers are also prohibited: PROVIDED, That oil type emulsifiers and spreader stickers may be used when not in excess of one pint per acre; and from November 1 to the specified date of the following year, oil type carriers may be used for brush control.

DEFINITION: SPECIFIED DATE. Specified date as referred to in this order is that date to be determined by the State Department of Agriculture in consultation with local authorities and shall be as near as possible to the date of bud break of grapes being grown in Franklin County and/or adjacent counties. Notification of this date, after which such operations that are applicable are so restricted, shall be made by mailing a notice to each of the known commercial applicators working in the area and an announcement to the local newspapers, radio stations, and county extension offices.

DEFINITION: HIGH VOLATILE AND LOW VOLATILE ESTERS. High volatile and low volatile esters are those formulations labeled as high volatile and low volatile in Interpretation 17, Revision 1 of Title 7 under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act.



REGULATION 2. AREA 1. (LANDS LYING WEST, NORTH, AND EAST OF PASCO). This area includes all lands lying within a line starting at a point along the Columbia River near the Northwest corner of Sec. 1, T.10N., R.28E.; thence east thirteen miles more or less along section lines to the Northeast corner of Sec. 1, T.10N., R.30E.; thence south ten miles more or less along section lines to the Snake River; thence southwesterly along the Snake River to and northwesterly along the Columbia River to the point of beginning.

AREA 1. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the liquid forms of the amine and sodium or solubilized acid formulations: PROVIDED, That the low volatile esters may be used from November 1 to the specified date.

The use or application of permitted formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be by ground equipment only: PROVIDED, That oil amine invert formulation applications shall be allowed by aircraft at any time on a permit basis (See Regulation 11). These aircraft applications shall be made with a minimum of 5 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft must be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.156 inches and directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

Ground applications of restricted use herbicides shall be made with a minimum of 10 gallons of water per acre, and ground equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.036 inches. Pressure for ground equipment shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles. No application is to be made on vegetation at a height greater than 4 feet above the ground level.

REGULATION 3. AREA 2. (BUFFER AREA). This area includes all the lands in Franklin County lying west and south of a line starting at the northwest corner of Section 5, T.14N., R.31E., thence southeasterly along the Northern Pacific Railroad tracks to the Moor Road and the Northwest corner of Section 23, T.14N., R.31E.; thence south 17½ miles along the Moor Road and section lines to the Eltopia and Eye Road; thence easterly along the Brass Road to the Bannenburg Road; thence southeasterly along the Bannenburg Road to the Northwest corner of Section 6, T.10N., R.33E.; thence south along the section line to the Snake River; thence southwesterly along the Snake River to the East boundary line of Area 1.

AREA 2. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application, by ground or aerial equipment, of restricted use herbicides is restricted to the liquid forms of the amine and sodium or solubilized acid formulations: PROVIDED, That the low volatile ester formulations may be applied from November 1 to May 15.

Ground application shall be made with a minimum of 8 gallons of water per acre, and ground equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.031 inches. Pressure for ground equipment shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles.

Aerial applications shall be made with a minimum of 3 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft must be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.125 inches and directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 4. AREA 3. (DRYLAND AREA SOUTHEAST OF CONNELL). An area beginning at the Northwest corner of Sec. 35, T.14N., R.31E.; thence east along State Highway 11A two miles more or less to Connell; thence southeasterly along the Kahlotus Road to and along the Elgin Road to State Highway 11B; thence easterly along State Highway 11B eight miles more or less to the Munt Road; thence southerly along the Munt Road one and one half miles more or less to the Largent Road; thence east along the Largent Road two miles more or less to the Kahlotus Highway; thence east along the Kahlotus Highway one mile to the Walker Road; thence southerly along the Walker Road five miles more or less to the Snake River; thence southerly along the Snake River to the East boundary line of Area 2; thence northerly along the Area 2 boundary line to the point of beginning.

AREA 3. (RESTRICTIONS). From May 1 to November 1 of each year, the use or application of high volatile formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be prohibited.

REGULATION 5. AREA 4. (DRYLAND AREA NORTH AND EAST OF CONNELL). All of the remaining lands in Franklin County North and East of Areas 2 and 3.

AREA 4. (RESTRICTIONS). The use or application of high volatile formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be prohibited from May 15 to November 1 of each year.

Ground applications of restricted use herbicides shall be made with a minimum of 8 gallons of water per acre, and ground equipment shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.031 inches. Pressure for ground equipment shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch at the nozzles.

Aerial applications of restricted use herbicides in Areas 3 and 4 shall be made with a minimum of 2 gallons of water per acre, and aircraft shall be equipped with nozzles having a minimum orifice diameter of 0.078 inches and directed downward or backward 90 degrees or more from the direction of flight.

REGULATION 6. RESTRICTIONS ON THE USE OF AIRSTRIPS. The loading and/or mixing of the restricted use herbicides in aircraft or ground equipment for use or application shall be prohibited on any airstrip, airfield, or on any location other than the property being treated within the area described in Regulation 2.

REGULATION 7. RESTRICTIONS ON AIRCRAFT: Aircraft carrying restricted use herbicides are prohibited from turning and/or low flying, during spraying operations, over cities and towns, unless

authorized by the city or town in question pursuant to an agreement for pesticide applications; or over residences, windbreaks, orchards, or susceptible crops belonging to any persons other than the owner of the property being treated, except by permission of the person whose residence, windbreak, orchard, or susceptible crop is involved.

REGULATION 8. DISPOSAL OF RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES AND THEIR CONTAINERS. No person shall dispose of, discard, or store any restricted use pesticide or their containers in such a manner as may cause injury to humans, vegetation, crops, livestock, wildlife, pollinating insects or to pollute any water supply or waterway.

REGULATION 9. WIND AND WEATHER CONDITIONS. The application of restricted user herbicides by ground or aerial equipment shall be prohibited when the mean sustained wind velocity is over 7 miles per hour during restricted dates for each area: PROVIDED, That the 7 miles per hour wind velocity restriction shall apply to Area 1 at all times. Even though wind velocity is within the limits allowable for spraying, restricted use herbicides shall not be applied if other weather conditions (examples - temperature inversion, high temperature) are such that damage could result to adjacent and nearby towns, susceptible crops and plantings through physical drift or volatilization in the area under Order.

REGULATION 10. RESTRICTIONS ON THE SALE OF CERTAIN FORMULATIONS OF RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDES. The sale of high and low volatile ester liquid formulations of restricted use herbicides in containers of less than one gallon is prohibited in the entire area under Order; PROVIDED, That containers of one gallon of high volatile ester liquid formulations may be sold only with the maintenance of a ledger as provided in statewide Order No. 1161, WAC 16-222-145(2).

REGULATION 11. SPECIAL RESTRICTED USE HERBICIDE PERMITS. The Washington State Department of Agriculture may approve written requests to apply certain restricted use herbicides for purposes of critical weed control in the restricted areas under Order; the Director will consider recommendations of the 2,4-D Committee for Franklin County.

REGULATION 12. RESTRICTED EVENING APPLICATIONS IN THE AREA UNDER ORDER. The application of allowable formulations of restricted use herbicides shall be prohibited daily from two hours prior to sunset to 4:00 A.M. the following morning, from the specified date to November 1; PROVIDED, That oil amine invert formulation applications shall be allowed at any time.
