- "NEW SECTION. Sec. 902. INFORMATION SYSTEMS PROJECTS. Agencies shall comply with the following requirements regarding information systems projects when specifically directed to do so by this act.
- 14 (1) The agency shall produce a feasibility study for each information systems project in accordance with instructions from the office of financial management. In addition to these requirements, the study shall examine and evaluate the costs and benefits of maintaining the status quo and the costs and benefits of the proposed project. The study shall identify when and in what amount any fiscal savings will accrue, and what programs or fund sources will be affected.
- (2) The agency shall produce a project management plan for each 21 22 project. The plan or plans shall address all factors critical to 23 successful completion of each project. The plan shall include, but is not limited to, the following elements: A description of the problem 24 25 or opportunity that the information systems project is intended to 26 address; a statement of project objectives and assumptions; definition 27 of phases, tasks, and activities to be accomplished and the estimated cost of each phase; a description of how the agency will facilitate 28

- 1 responsibilities of oversight agencies; a description of key decision
- 2 points in the project life cycle; a description of variance control
- 3 measures; a definitive schedule that shows the elapsed time estimated
- 4 to complete the project and when each task is to be started and
- 5 completed; and a description of resource requirements to accomplish the
- 6 activities within specified time, cost, and functionality constraints.
- 7 (3) A copy of each feasibility study and project management plan
- 8 shall be provided to the office of financial management and appropriate
- 9 legislative committees. Authority to expend any funds for individual
- 10 information systems projects is conditioned on approval of the relevant
- 11 feasibility study and project management plan by the office of

- 13 (4) A project status report shall be submitted to the office of

- 25 examine and evaluate: System requirements specifications; scope;
- 26 system architecture; change controls; documentation; user involvement;
- 27 training; availability and capability of resources; programming
- 28 languages and techniques; system inputs and outputs; plans for testing,
- 29 conversion, implementation, and post-implementation; and other aspects
- 30 critical to successful construction, integration, and implementation of

- 1 automated systems. Copies of project review written reports shall be 2 forwarded to the appropriate legislative committees by the agency.
- 3 (6) A written post-implementation review report shall be prepared 4 by the agency for each information systems project in accordance with published instructions of the office of financial management. 5 6 addition to the information requested pursuant to the instructions, the post-implementation report shall evaluate the degree to which a project 7 accomplished its major objectives including, but not limited to, a 8 9 comparison of original cost and benefit estimates to actual costs and 10 benefits achieved. Copies of the post-implementation review report shall be provided to the office of financial management and appropriate 11 12 legislative committees."
- 13 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 903. VIDEO TELECOMMUNICATIONS. The department of information services shall act as lead agency in coordinating video 14 telecommunications services for state agencies. As lead agency, the 15 16 department shall develop standards and common specifications for leased 17 and purchased telecommunications equipment and assist state agencies in 18 developing a video telecommunications expenditure plan. Prior to 7 any such expenditure by a public institution of postsecondary 8 9 education, a telecommunications expenditure plan shall be approved by the higher education coordinating board. 10 The higher education coordinating board shall coordinate the use of video telecommunications 11 12 for instruction and instructional support in postsecondary education, 13 including the review and approval of instructional telecommunications 14 course offerings."

- 2 The appropriations of moneys and the designation of funds and accounts
- 3 by this and other acts of the 1991 legislature shall be construed in
- 4 a manner consistent with legislation enacted by the 1985, 1987, and
- 5 1989 legislatures to conform state funds and accounts with generally
- 6 accepted accounting principles."
- 7 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 922. BUDGET STABILIZATION ACCOUNT. On July 1,
- 8 1991, the state treasurer shall transfer sixty-five million seven
- 9 hundred thousand dollars from the state general fund to the budget
- 10 stabilization account under RCW 43.88.525."
- 11 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 923. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this
- 12 act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid,
- 13 the remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other
- 14 persons or circumstances is not affected."
- 15 "NEW SECTION. Sec. 924. EFFECTIVE DATE. This act is necessary
- 16 for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety,
- 17 or support of the state government and its existing public
- 18 institutions, and shall take effect July 1, 1991."
