- 27 those pregnant women who are categorically eligible for medicaid are
- 28 eligible for general assistance; or
- 29 (B) Incapacitated from gainful employment by reason of bodily or
- 30 mental infirmity that will likely continue for a minimum of ninety days

as determined by the department. Persons who are unemployable due to 1 alcohol or drug addiction are not eligible for general assistance. 2 3 Persons receiving general assistance on July 26, 1987, or becoming 4 eligible for such assistance thereafter, due to an alcohol or drug-5 related incapacity, shall be referred to appropriate assessment, 6 treatment, shelter, or supplemental security income referral services as authorized under chapter 74.50 RCW. Referrals shall be made at the 7 time of application or at the time of eligibility review. Alcoholic 8 9 and drug addicted clients who are receiving general assistance on July 10 26, 1987, may remain on general assistance if they otherwise retain 11 their eligibility until they are assessed for services under chapter 74.50 RCW. This subsection (6)(a)(ii)(B) shall not be construed to 12 13 prohibit the department from granting general assistance benefits to 14 alcoholics and drug addicts who are incapacitated due to other physical 15 or mental conditions that meet the eligibility criteria for the general assistance program. For the period from July 1, 1992, until June 30, 16 17 1993, the determination of incapacity under this subsection 18 (6)(a)(ii)(B) shall be based on medical criteria as otherwise required 19 in this section and shall not include consideration of vocational 20 factors, including work history, age, training, or education. After July 1, 1992, and until June 30, 1993, assistance provided under this 21 subsection (6)(a)(ii)(B) shall be discontinued if the person received 22 this assistance for any twelve months within the prior twenty-four 23 month period unless the person, in the discretion of the department, 24 appears to be eligible for federal supplemental security income 25 benefits and the person's application or administrative appeal is 26 pending. If the application and any administrative appeal is denied, 27 28 the department may continue assistance under this subsection 29 (6)(a)(ii)(B) for an additional six months from the date of denial if

- 1 the department determines that further appeal is likely to result in
- 2 eligibility for supplemental security income;
- 3 (iii) Are citizens or aliens lawfully admitted for permanent
- 4 residence or otherwise residing in the United States under color of
- 5 law; and
- 6 (iv) Have furnished the department their social security account
- 7 number. If the social security account number cannot be furnished
- 8 because it has not been issued or is not known, an application for a
- 9 number shall be made prior to authorization of assistance, and the
- 10 social security number shall be provided to the department upon
- 11 receipt.
- 12 (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (6)(a)(i), (ii),
- 13 and (c) of this section, general assistance shall be provided to the
- 14 following recipients of federal-aid assistance:
- 15 (i) Recipients of supplemental security income whose need, as
- 16 defined in this section, is not met by such supplemental security
- 17 income grant because of separation from a spouse; or
- 18 (ii) To the extent authorized by the legislature in the biennial
- 19 appropriations act, to recipients of aid to families with dependent
- 20 children whose needs are not being met because of a temporary reduction
- 21 in monthly income below the entitled benefit payment level caused by
- 22 loss or reduction of wages or unemployment compensation benefits or
- 23 some other unforeseen circumstances. The amount of general assistance
- 24 authorized shall not exceed the difference between the entitled benefit
- 25 payment level and the amount of income actually received.
- 26 (c) General assistance shall be provided only to persons who are
- 27 not members of assistance units receiving federal aid assistance,
- 28 except as provided in subsection (6)(a)(ii)(A) and (b) of this section,
- 29 and will accept available services which can reasonably be expected to
- 30 enable the person to work or reduce the need for assistance unless

- 1 there is good cause to refuse. Failure to accept such services shall
- 2 result in termination until the person agrees to cooperate in accepting
- 3 such services and subject to the following maximum periods of
- 4 ineligibility after reapplication:
- 5 (i) First failure: One week;
- 6 (ii) Second failure within six months: One month;
- 7 (iii) Third and subsequent failure within one year: Two months.
- 8 (d) The department shall adopt by rule medical criteria for general
- 9 assistance eligibility to ensure that eligibility decisions are
- 10 consistent with statutory requirements and are based on clear,
- 11 objective medical information.
- 12 (e) The process implementing the medical criteria shall involve
- 13 consideration of opinions of the treating or consulting physicians or
- 14 health care professionals regarding incapacity, and any eligibility
- 15 decision which rejects uncontroverted medical opinion must set forth
- 16 clear and convincing reasons for doing so.
- 17 (f) Recipients of general assistance based upon a finding of
- 18 incapacity from gainful employment who remain otherwise eligible shall
- 19 not have their benefits terminated absent a clear showing of material
- 20 improvement in their medical or mental condition or specific error in
- 21 the prior determination that found the recipient eligible by reason of
- 22 incapacitation. Recipients of general assistance based upon pregnancy
- 23 who relinquish their child for adoption, remain otherwise eligible, and
- 24 are not eligible to receive benefits under the federal aid to families
- 25 with dependent children program shall not have their benefits
- 26 terminated until the end of the month in which the period of six weeks
- 27 following the birth of the recipient's child falls. Recipients of the
- 28 federal aid to families with dependent children program who lose their
- 29 eligibility solely because of the birth and relinquishment of the
- 30 qualifying child may receive general assistance through the end of the

- 1 month in which the period of six weeks following the birth of the child
- 2 falls.
- 3 (7) "Applicant"--Any person who has made a request, or on behalf of
- 4 whom a request has been made, to any county or local office for
- 5 assistance.
- 6 (8) "Recipient"--Any person receiving assistance and in addition
- 7 those dependents whose needs are included in the recipient's
- 8 assistance.
- 9 (9) "Standards of assistance"--The level of income required by an
- 10 applicant or recipient to maintain a level of living specified by the
- 11 department.
- 12 (10) "Resource"--Any asset, tangible or intangible, owned by or
- 13 available to the applicant at the time of application, which can be
- 14 applied toward meeting the applicant's need, either directly or by
- 15 conversion into money or its equivalent: PROVIDED, That an applicant
- 16 may retain the following described resources and not be ineligible for
- 17 public assistance because of such resources.
- 18 (a) A home, which is defined as real property owned and used by an
- 19 applicant or recipient as a place of residence, together with a
- 20 reasonable amount of property surrounding and contiguous thereto, which
- 21 is used by and useful to the applicant. Whenever a recipient shall
- 22 cease to use such property for residential purposes, either for himself
- 23 or his dependents, the property shall be considered as a resource which
- 24 can be made available to meet need, and if the recipient or his
- 25 dependents absent themselves from the home for a period of ninety
- 26 consecutive days such absence, unless due to hospitalization or health
- 27 reasons or a natural disaster, shall raise a rebuttable presumption of
- 28 abandonment: PROVIDED, That if in the opinion of three physicians the
- 29 recipient will be unable to return to the home during his lifetime, and
- 30 the home is not occupied by a spouse or dependent children or disabled

- 1 sons or daughters, such property shall be considered as a resource
- 2 which can be made available to meet need.
- 3 (b) Household furnishings and personal effects and other personal
- 4 property having great sentimental value to the applicant or recipient,
- 5 as limited by the department consistent with limitations on resources
- 6 and exemptions for federal aid assistance.
- 7 (c) A motor vehicle, other than a motor home, used and useful
- 8 having an equity value not to exceed one thousand five hundred dollars.
- 9 (d) All other resources, including any excess of values exempted,
- 10 not to exceed one thousand dollars or other limit as set by the
- 11 department, to be consistent with limitations on resources and
- 12 exemptions necessary for federal aid assistance.
- 13 (e) Applicants for or recipients of general assistance may retain
- 14 the following described resources in addition to exemption for a motor
- 15 vehicle or home and not be ineligible for public assistance because of
- 16 such resources:
- 17 (i) Household furnishings, personal effects, and other personal
- 18 property having great sentimental value to the applicant or recipient;
- 19 (ii) Term and burial insurance for use of the applicant or
- 20 recipient;
- 21 (iii) Life insurance having a cash surrender value not exceeding
- 22 one thousand five hundred dollars; and
- 23 (iv) Cash, marketable securities, and any excess of values above
- 24 one thousand five hundred dollars equity in a vehicle and above one
- 25 thousand five hundred dollars in cash surrender value of life
- 26 insurance, not exceeding one thousand five hundred dollars for a single
- 27 person or two thousand two hundred fifty dollars for a family unit of
- 28 two or more. The one thousand dollar limit in subsection (10)(d) of
- 29 this section does not apply to recipients of or applicants for general
- 30 assistance.

- 1 (f) If an applicant for or recipient of public assistance possesses
- 2 property and belongings in excess of the ceiling value, such value
- 3 shall be used in determining the need of the applicant or recipient,
- 4 except that: (i) The department may exempt resources or income when
- 5 the income and resources are determined necessary to the applicant's or
- 6 recipient's restoration to independence, to decrease the need for

- 24 (D) At the time assistance is authorized, the department files a
- 25 lien without a sum certain on the specific property.
- 26 (11) "Income"--(a) All appreciable gains in real or personal
- 27 property (cash or kind) or other assets, which are received by or
- 28 become available for use and enjoyment by an applicant or recipient
- 29 during the month of application or after applying for or receiving
- 30 public assistance. The department may by rule and regulation exempt

- income received by an applicant for or recipient of public assistance 1 which can be used by him to decrease his need for public assistance or 2 3 to aid in rehabilitating him or his dependents, but such exemption 4 shall not, unless otherwise provided in this title, exceed the exemptions of resources granted under this chapter to an applicant for 5 6 public assistance. In determining the amount of assistance to which an applicant or recipient of aid to families with dependent children is 7 entitled, the department is hereby authorized to disregard as a 8 9 resource or income the earned income exemptions consistent with federal 10 The department may permit the above exemption of requirements. earnings of a child to be retained by such child to cover the cost of 11 special future identifiable needs even though the total exceeds the 12 exemptions or resources granted to applicants and recipients of public 13 14 assistance, but consistent with federal requirements. In formulating rules and regulations pursuant to this chapter, the department shall 15 define income and resources and the availability thereof, consistent 16 17 with federal requirements. All resources and income not specifically 18 exempted, and any income or other economic benefit derived from the use 19 of, or appreciation in value of, exempt resources, shall be considered 20 in determining the need of an applicant or recipient of public assistance. 21
- 22 (b) If, under applicable federal requirements, the state has the 23 option of considering property in the form of lump sum compensatory 24 awards or related settlements received by an applicant or recipient as 25 income or as a resource, the department shall consider such property to 26 be a resource.
- 27 (12) "Need"--The difference between the applicant's or recipient's 28 standards of assistance for himself and the dependent members of his 29 family, as measured by the standards of the department, and value of

- 1 all nonexempt resources and nonexempt income received by or available
- 2 to the applicant or recipient and the dependent members of his family.
- 3 (13) For purposes of determining eligibility for public assistance
- 4 and participation levels in the cost of medical care, the department
- 5 shall exempt restitution payments made to people of Japanese and Aleut
- 6 ancestry pursuant to the Civil Liberties Act of 1988 and the Aleutian
- 7 and Pribilof Island Restitution Act passed by congress, P.L. 100-383,
- 8 including all income and resources derived therefrom.
- 9 (14) In the construction of words and phrases used in this title,
- 10 the singular number shall include the plural, the masculine gender
- 11 shall include both the feminine and neuter genders and the present
- 12 tense shall include the past and future tenses, unless the context
- 13 thereof shall clearly indicate to the contrary."
- 14 "Sec. 913. RCW 86.26.007 and 1991 sp.s. c 13 s 24 are each amended
- 15 to read as follows:
- The flood control assistance account is hereby established in the
- 17 state treasury. At the beginning of each biennium the state treasurer
- 18 shall transfer from the general fund to the flood control assistance
- 19 account an amount of money which, when combined with money remaining in
- 20 the account from the previous biennium, will equal four million
- 21 dollars. During the 1991-93 biennium, the legislature may direct the
