HOUSE BILL REPORT SHB 1496

As Amended by the Senate

Title: An act relating to the license fees of real estate brokers, real estate salespersons, and professional engineers.

Brief Description: Changing the disposition of professional license fees.

Sponsor(s): By House Committee on Revenue (originally sponsored by Representatives O'Brien, Holland, Morris, Brumsickle, Leonard and Vance).

Majority Report: That Substitute House Bill No. 1496 be substituted therefor, and the substitute bill do pass. Signed by 15 members: Representatives Wang, Chair; Fraser, Vice Chair; Holland, Ranking Minority Member; Wynne, Assistant Ranking Minority Member; Appelwick; Belcher; Brumsickle; Day; Leonard; Morris; Morton; Phillips; Rust; Silver; and Van Luven.

Background: The Department of Licensing (DOL) collects a variety of fees related to the licensing of occupations. The majority are deposited in the General Fund-State (GFS). However, some fees are split between the GFS and other accounts. Of each license fee on real estate brokers and salespersons, and professional engineers, 20 percent is deposited in the GFS. The remainder of the real estate fee is deposited in the real estate commission account, while the remainder of the professional engineer license fee is deposited in the professional engineers' account. In addition, 100 percent of the interest earnings on the real estate commission account and the professional engineers' account are deposited in the GFS.

Summary of Bill: All real estate and professional engineer license fees are deposited in their respective accounts.

EFFECT OF SENATE AMENDMENT(S): Language referring to the deposit in the general fund of interest earned in the professional engineers' account is restored.

Fiscal Note: Available.

Effective Date: July 1, 1993.

Testimony For: The bill would remove an inequity in the way architects' and engineers' fees are treated. The fees should be used for education programs and regulation of the professions from which they are collected, and not for general fund purposes.
