## ENGROSSED SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1330

## State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

**By** House Committee on Appropriations (originally sponsored by Representatives Locke, Silver, Spanel, Inslee, Morton and Holland; by request of Governor Gardner). Read first time April 5, 1991.

AN ACT Relating to fiscal matters; making appropriations and authorizing expenditures for the operations of state agencies for the fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 1991, and ending June 30, 1993; amending RCW 43.10.190, 43.19.1923, 43.33A.160, 43.160.070, and 43.51.280; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) A budget is hereby adopted and, subject to the provisions set forth in the following sections, the several 8 amounts specified in the following sections, or so much thereof as 9 10 shall be sufficient to accomplish the purposes designated, are hereby 11 appropriated and authorized to be incurred for salaries, wages, and other expenses of the agencies and offices of the state and for other 12 specified purposes for the fiscal biennium beginning July 1, 1991, and 13 14 ending June 30, 1993, except as otherwise provided, out of the several 15 funds of the state hereinafter named.

(2) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the definitions
 in this section apply throughout this act.

3 (a) "Fiscal year 1992" or "FY 1992" means the fiscal year ending
4 June 30, 1992.

5 (b) "Fiscal year 1993" or "FY 1993" means the fiscal year ending 6 June 30, 1993.

7 (c) "FTE" means full time equivalent.

8 (d) "Lapse" or "revert" means the amount shall return to an 9 unappropriated status.

(e) "Provided solely" means the specified amount may be spent only for the specified purpose. Unless otherwise specifically authorized in this act, any portion of an amount provided solely for a specified purpose which is unnecessary to fulfill the specified purpose shall lapse.

Courthouse facilitators may 10 not represent litigants. Counties receiving moneys under this 11 subsection shall provide courthouse facilitators with office space, 12 13 equipment, supplies, and administrative support.

1 (c) attorney general overhead and central support costs charged to the 2 agency for the billing period; (d) direct legal costs, such as filing 3 and docket fees, charged to the agency for the billing period; and (e) 4 other costs charged to the agency for the billing period. If requested 5 by an agency receiving legal services, the attorney general shall 6 provide the information required in this subsection by program.

7 (4) \$200,000 of the general fund state appropriation is provided 8 solely for one-time grants to law enforcement agencies and local 9 jurisdictions to establish or expand crime stoppers programs to increase public awareness and assistance in solving crimes. 10 The attorney general shall not provide a grant under this subsection to any 11 law enforcement agency or local jurisdiction that received a crime 12 13 stoppers grant from the attorney general during the 1989-91 biennium. (i) Four certificated administrative staff units for each one thousand full time equivalent kindergarten through twelfth grade students excluding full time equivalent handicapped enrollment as recognized for funding purposes under section 509 of this act;

(ii) 52.3 certificated instructional staff units for each one thousand full time equivalent students in kindergarten through third grade, excluding full time equivalent handicapped students ages six through eight; and

(iii) Forty-six certificated instructional staff units for each one
thousand full time equivalent students in grades four through twelve,
excluding full time equivalent handicapped students in those grades;
(b) For school districts with a minimum enrollment of 250 full time
equivalent students, whose full time equivalent student enrollment
ESHB 1330
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count in a given month exceeds the first of the month full time 1 equivalent enrollment count by 5 percent, an additional state 2 3 allocation of 110 percent of the share that such increased enrollment would have generated had such additional full time equivalent students 4 5 been included in the normal enrollment count for that particular month. 6 (c) On the basis of full time equivalent enrollment in vocational the superintendent of 7 education programs approved by public 8 instruction, 0.92 certificated instructional staff units and 0.08 certificated administrative staff units for each 17.075 full time 9 equivalent vocational students, except that for skills center programs 10 the allocation ratios shall be 0.92 certificated instructional staff 11 12 units and 0.08 certificated administrative staff units for each 16.67 13 full time equivalent vocational students;

(d) For districts enrolling not more than twenty-five average annual full time equivalent students in kindergarten through grade eight, and for small-school plants within any school district which have been judged to be remote and necessary by the state board of education and enroll not more than twenty-five average annual full time equivalent students in kindergarten through grade eight:

(i) For those enrolling no students in grades seven and eight, 1.76 certificated instructional staff units and 0.24 certificated administrative staff units for enrollment of not more than five students, plus one-twentieth of a certificated instructional staff unit for each additional student enrolled; and

(ii) For those enrolling students in grades seven or eight, 1.68 certificated instructional staff units and 0.32 certificated administrative staff units for enrollment of not more than five students, plus one-tenth of a certificated instructional staff unit for each additional student enrolled.

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1 (e) For specified enrollments in districts enrolling more than 2 twenty-five but not more than one hundred average annual full time 3 equivalent students in kindergarten through grade eight, and for small-4 school plants within any school district which enroll more than 5 twenty-five average annual full time equivalent kindergarten through 6 eighth grade students and have been judged to be remote and necessary 7 by the state board of education:

8 (i) For enrollment of up to sixty annual average full time 9 equivalent students in kindergarten through grade six, 2.76 10 certificated instructional staff units and 0.24 certificated 11 administrative staff units; and

12 (ii) For enrollment of up to twenty annual average full time 13 equivalent students in grades seven and eight, 0.92 certificated 14 instructional staff units and 0.08 certificated administrative staff 15 units.

(f) For districts operating no more than two high schools with enrollments of less than three hundred average annual full time equivalent students, for enrollment in grades nine through twelve in each such school, other than alternative schools:

(i) For remote and necessary schools enrolling students in any of grades nine through twelve but no more than twenty-five average annual full time equivalent kindergarten through twelfth grade students, four and one-half certificated instructional staff units and one-quarter of a certificated administrative staff unit;

(ii) For all other small high schools under this subsection, nine certificated instructional staff units and one-half of a certificated administrative staff unit for the first sixty average annual full time equivalent students, and additional staff units based on a ratio of 0.8732 certificated instructional staff units and 0.1268 certificated ESHB 1330 p. 92 of 181

administrative staff units per each additional forty-three and one-half

8 (g) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more 9 than seventy annual average full time equivalent students and less than 10 one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-8 program or a grades 11 1-8 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional 12 staff unit.

(h) For each nonhigh school district having an enrollment of more than fifty annual average full time equivalent students and less than one hundred eighty students, operating a grades K-6 program or a grades le 1-6 program, an additional one-half of a certificated instructional staff unit.

(3) Allocations for classified salaries for the 1991-92 and 1992-93
school years shall be calculated using formula-generated classified
staff units determined as follows:

(a) For enrollments generating certificated staff unit allocations under subsection (2) (d) through (h) of this section, one classified staff unit for each three certificated staff units allocated under such subsections.

(b) For all other enrollment in grades kindergarten through twelve, including vocational but excluding handicapped full time equivalent enrollments, one classified staff unit for each sixty average annual full time equivalent students.

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1 (c) For each nonhigh school district with an enrollment of more 2 than fifty annual average full time equivalent students and less than 3 one hundred eighty students, an additional one-half of a classified 4 staff unit.

5 (4) Fringe benefit allocations shall be calculated at a rate of 6 21.11 percent in the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years of certificated 7 salary allocations provided under subsection (2) of this section, and 8 a rate of 18.84 percent in the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years of 9 classified salary allocations provided under subsection (3) of this 10 section.

(5) Insurance benefit allocations shall be calculated at the rates specified in section 505 of this act, based on:

(a) The number of certificated staff units determined in subsection(2) of this section; and

(b) The number of classified staff units determined in subsection (3) of this section multiplied by 1.152. This factor is intended to adjust allocations so that, for the purposes of distributing insurance benefits, full time equivalent classified employees may be calculated on the basis of 1440 hours of work per year, with no individual employee counted as more than one full time equivalent.

(9) For the purposes of RCW 84.52.0531, the increase per full time equivalent student in state basic education appropriations provided under this act, including appropriations for salary and benefits

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1 increases, is 5.1 percent from the 1990-91 school year to the 1991-92 2 school year, and 3.7 percent from the 1991-92 school year to the 3 1992-93 school year.

(10) For each school year, the funding provided under subsection 4 5 (2)(a) of this section shall be based on a ratio of 52.3 certificated instructional staff per thousand students in kindergarten through grade 6 three only if the district documents an actual ratio of at least 52.3 7 full time basic education certificated instructional staff per thousand 8 9 full time equivalent students at those grade levels. For any school district documenting a lower ratio, the funding provided under this 10 section shall be based on the district's actual K-3 ratio achieved in 11 12 that school year, or the statutory minimum ratio established under RCW 13 28A.150.260(2)(c), if greater.

14 (11) A maximum of \$24,093,000 is provided for block grants that may 15 be used to fund nonemployee related costs. 4 (c) "LEAP Document 12" means the computerized tabulation of 1990-91 5 salary allocations for basic education certificated administrative 6 staff and basic education classified staff and 1990-91 derived base 7 salaries for basic education certificated instructional staff as 8 developed by the legislative evaluation and accountability program 9 committee on March 29, 1991, at 17:00 hours.

10 (3) The incremental fringe benefits factors applied to salary 11 increases in this section shall be 1.2047 for certificated salaries and 12 1.1534 for classified salaries in the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years. 13 (4) The increase for certificated administrative staff units and 14 for classified units provided under section 502 of this act are as 15 follows:

16 (a) For the 1991-92 and 1992-93 school years, the allocation for each certificated administrative staff unit shall be increased by 4.0 17 18 percent, and the allocation for each classified staff unit shall be 19 increased by 4.4 percent, of the 1990-91 state-wide average certificated administrative salary and the state-wide average 20 classified salary, respectively, shown on LEAP Document 12, multiplied 21 by incremental fringe benefits. 22

staff unit computed under subsection (1)(a) of this section, adjusted
for incremental fringe benefits; and

(ii) The district's 1992-93 average certificated instructional

10 (6) In addition to the salary amounts otherwise provided in this 11 section, an educational expense payment of no less than \$2,000 per 12 school year shall be provided to teachers who have zero, one, or two 13 years of service.

#### PART IX

#### MISCELLANEOUS

3 NEW SECTION. sec. 901. The appropriations contained in this act 4 are maximum expenditure authorizations. Pursuant to RCW 43.88.037, 5 moneys disbursed from the treasury on the basis of a formal loan agreement shall be recorded as loans receivable and not as expenditures б 7 for accounting purposes. To the extent that moneys are disbursed on a loan basis, the corresponding appropriation shall be reduced by the 8 amount of loan moneys disbursed from the treasury during the 1991-93 9 10 biennium.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 902. Agencies shall comply with the following 12 requirements regarding information systems projects when specifically 13 directed to do so by this act.

14 (1) The agency shall produce a feasibility study for each 15 information systems project in accordance with published department of 16 information services instructions. In addition to department of 17 information services requirements, the study shall examine and evaluate 18 the costs and benefits of maintaining the status quo.

19 (2) The agency shall produce a project management plan for each The plan or plans shall address all factors critical to 20 project. 21 successful completion of each project. The plan shall include, but is not limited to, the following elements: A description of the problem 22 23 or opportunity that the information systems project is intended to 24 address; a statement of project objectives and assumptions; definition 25 of phases, tasks, and activities to be accomplished and the estimated 26 cost of each phase; a description of how the agency will facilitate responsibilities of oversight agencies; a description of key decision 27

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points in the project life cycle; a description of variance control 1 2 measures; a definitive schedule that shows the elapsed time estimated 3 to complete the project and when each task is to be started and 4 completed; and a description of resource requirements to accomplish the 5 activities within specified time, cost, and functionality constraints. 6 (3) A copy of each feasibility study and project management plan 7 shall be provided to the department of information services, the office 8 of financial management, and appropriate legislative committees. 9 Authority to expend any funds for individual information systems projects is conditioned on approval of the relevant feasibility study 10 and project management plan by the department of information services 11 12 and the office of financial management.

13 (4) A project status report shall be submitted to the department of information services, the office of financial management, 14 and 15 appropriate legislative committees for each project prior to reaching 16 key decision points identified in the project management plan. Project 17 and evaluate project management, status reports shall examine accomplishments, budget, action to address variances, risk management, 18 19 cost and benefits analysis, and other aspects critical to completion of 20 a project.

21 Work shall not commence on any task in a subsequent phase of a 22 project until the status report for the preceding key decision point 23 has been approved by the department of information services and the 24 office of financial management.

25 (5) If a project review is requested in accordance with department 26 information services policies, the reviews shall examine and of 27 System requirements specifications; evaluate: scope; system 28 architecture; change controls; documentation; user involvement; 29 training; availability and capability of resources; programming ESHB 1330 p. 168 of 181

1 languages and techniques; system inputs and outputs; plans for testing, 2 conversion, implementation, and post-implementation; and other aspects 3 critical to successful construction, integration, and implementation of 4 automated systems. Copies of project review written reports shall be 5 forwarded to the office of financial management and appropriate 6 legislative committees by the agency.

(6) A written post-implementation review report shall be prepared 7 8 by the agency for each information systems project in accordance with 9 published department of information services instructions. In addition 10 to the information requested pursuant to the department of information services instructions, the post-implementation report shall evaluate 11 the degree to which a project accomplished its major objectives 12 13 including, but not limited to, a comparison of original cost and benefit estimates to actual costs and benefits achieved. Copies of the 14 15 post-implementation review report shall be provided to the department 16 of information services, the office of financial management, and appropriate legislative committees. 17

18 NEW SECTION. Sec. 903. The department of information services 19 shall act as lead agency in coordinating video telecommunications services for state agencies. As lead agency, the department shall 20 develop standards and common specifications for leased and purchased 21 22 telecommunications equipment and assist state agencies in developing a 23 video telecommunications expenditure plan. No agency may spend any 24 portion of any appropriation in this act for new video 25 telecommunication equipment, new video telecommunication transmission, 26 or new video telecommunication programming, or for expanding current 27 video telecommunication systems without first complying with chapter 43.105 RCW, including but not limited to RCW 43.105.041(2), and without 28

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first submitting a video telecommunications expenditure plan, in 1 accordance with the policies of the department of information services, 2 3 for review and assessment by the department of information services under RCW 43.105.052. Prior to any such expenditure by a public 4 5 school, a video telecommunications expenditure plan shall be approved by the superintendent of public instruction. The office of the 6 superintendent of public instruction shall submit the plans to the 7 8 department of information services in a form prescribed by the 9 department. The office of the superintendent of public instruction 10 shall coordinate the use of video telecommunications in public schools by providing educational information to local school districts and 11 12 shall assist local school districts and educational service districts 13 in telecommunications planning and curriculum development. Prior to any such expenditure by a public institution of postsecondary 14 education, a telecommunications expenditure plan shall be approved by 15 16 the higher education coordinating board. The higher education 17 coordinating board shall coordinate the use of video telecommunications 18 for instruction and instructional support in postsecondary education, 19 including the review and approval of instructional telecommunications 20 course offerings.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 904.** Except as provided in subsection (6) of 22 this section, appropriations in this act used to acquire equipment 23 under chapter 39.94 RCW are subject to the following conditions and 24 limitations:

(1) The total principal value of new equipment acquired by the
 state, as defined in RCW 39.94.020(4), during the 1991-93 biennium and
 financed pursuant to chapter 39.94 RCW through payments from the
 general fund shall not exceed \$50,000,000. For purposes of this
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section, equipment financed with payments from sources additional to
 the general fund shall be valued in proportion to the ratio of general
 fund payments to the total payments.

4 (2) Subsection (1) of this section shall not apply to contracts 5 entered into by the state treasurer to refinance equipment acquired 6 before July 1, 1991.

7 (3) The state treasurer and the office of financial management
8 shall establish procedures to ensure compliance with subsection (1) of
9 this section

10 (4) The office of financial management shall ensure that the 11 state's accounting system provides for the reporting of financing 12 contract payments by state agencies at the subobject level.

13 (5) The state treasurer shall report by September 1 of each year to 14 the fiscal committees of the house of representatives and the senate on 15 the outstanding principal amounts and annual payment obligations of 16 state agencies acquiring equipment under chapter 39.94 RCW.

17 (6) The state finance committee may waive the limit on equipment 18 acquisitions established in subsection (1) of this section for specific 19 agencies and for specific equipment acquisitions if the committee finds that acquiring the equipment under chapter 39.94 RCW offers a 20 substantial financial advantage and serves a compelling need. 21 The state finance committee shall report any waiver granted under this 22 23 subsection to the fiscal committees of the house of representatives and 24 the senate.

25 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 905. Appropriations in this act used by a state 26 agency to print and distribute newsletters, reports, or other 27 publications are subject to the following conditions and limitations:

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(1) Beginning July 1, 1992, all newsletters, reports, or other 1 publications shall be printed on recyclable materials and, if bound, 2 3 bound with materials that are either recyclable or easily separable 4 from the recyclable components. For the purposes of this section, 5 "recyclable materials" means materials that maintain useful properties after serving their original purpose and for which viable recycling б systems are operating. The department of general administration shall 7 8 adopt guidelines to assist agencies in complying with this subsection.

9 (2) Each state agency shall, on an annual basis, update each active mailing list used to distribute newsletters, reports, or other 10 publications. The state agency shall notify persons and organizations 11 12 on each mailing list of their presence on the list, and shall request 13 confirmation indicating whether the person or organization wishes to continue to receive the publication. Persons or organizations not 14 15 affirmatively indicating a desire to continue to receive the 16 publication shall be removed from the mailing list. The department of 17 general administration shall adopt guidelines to assist state agencies 18 in complying with this subsection.

19 (3) For purposes of this section "state agency" is defined as provided in RCW 43.19.504(1). 20

21 Sec. 906. RCW 43.10.190 and 1979 c 151 s 96 are each amended to 22 read as follows:

23 In cases where there are unanticipated and critical demands for legal services or where there are insufficient funds on hand or 24 available for payment through the legal services revolving fund or in 25 26 other cases of necessity, the attorney general may request payment for 27 legal services directly from agencies for whom the services are performed to the extent that revenues or other funds are available. 28 ESHB 1330

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Upon approval by the director of financial management, based on a 1 finding by the director of an unanticipated and critical demand for 2 3 legal services, the agency shall make the requested payment. The 4 payment may be made on either an advance or reimbursable basis as 5 approved by the director of financial management. Beginning July 1, 6 1991, the attorney general shall notify the fiscal committees of the house of representatives and senate of any proposed direct payment for 7 8 unanticipated and critical legal services. Notification shall be provided concurrently with the initial submittal of information 9 concerning the direct payment to the office of financial management. 10

11 Sec. 907. RCW 43.19.1923 and 1987 c 504 s 17 are each amended to 12 read as follows:

13 There is created within the department of general administration a revolving fund to be known as the ((-)) central stores revolving 14 15 fund((")), which shall be used for the purchase of supplies and 16 equipment handled or rented through central stores, and the payment of 17 salaries, wages, and other costs incidental to the acquisition, 18 operation, and maintenance of the central stores, and other activities 19 connected therewith, which shall include utilities services. Disbursements from the fund for the purchasing and contract 20 administration activities of the division of purchasing within the 21 22 department are subject to appropriation and allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW. Disbursements for all other activities within the 23 central stores are not subject to appropriation. The fund shall be 24 credited with all receipts from the rental, sale or distribution of 25 26 supplies, equipment, and services rendered to the various state 27 agencies. Central stores, utilities services, and other activities within the central stores revolving fund shall be treated as separate 28

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operating entities for financial and accounting control. Financial
 records involving the central stores revolving fund shall be designed
 to provide data for achieving maximum effectiveness and economy of each
 individual activity within the fund.

5 Sec. 908. RCW 43.33A.160 and 1985 c 57 s 32 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) The state investment board shall be funded from the earnings of 8 the funds managed by the state investment board, proportional to the value of the assets of each fund, subject to legislative appropriation. 9 10 (2) There is established in the state treasury a state investment board expense account from which shall be paid the operating expenses 11 12 of the state investment board. Prior to November 1 of each evennumbered year, the state investment board shall determine and certify 13 to the state treasurer and the office of financial management the value 14 15 of the various funds managed by the investment board in order to 16 determine the proportional liability of the funds for the operating 17 expenses of the state investment board. Pursuant to appropriation, the 18 state treasurer is authorized to transfer such moneys from the various 19 funds managed by the investment board to the state investment board 20 expense account as are necessary to pay the operating expenses of the investment board. All earnings of investments of balances in the state 21 22 investment board expense account shall be credited to the state 23 investment board expense account.

(3) The legislature may appropriate specific amounts from the state
 investment board expense account to be used by the board for critical
 and unanticipated expenses incurred in exercising the board's fiduciary
 responsibilities associated with managing public trust and retirement
 funds. Before expending any amount under this subsection, the board
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1 shall authorize the expenditure by amount and purpose, and shall 2 designate the fund or funds with respect to which the expenditure is 3 authorized. The state treasurer shall transfer such amounts as are 4 necessary to fully reimburse the state investment board expense account 5 from the fund or funds with respect to which the expense is incurred to 6 the state investment board expense account.

7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 909. No state agency seeking to fill a vacant 8 position within the agency may use the appropriations in this act to contract with an individual or organization outside of state government 9 10 for assistance or advice in filling the vacancy. State agencies are encouraged to utilize the staff of the recruitment division, and in 11 12 particular the executive search specialist, in the department of This section shall not apply to institutions of higher 13 personnel. education, or to judicial or legislative branch agencies. A state 14 15 agency may apply to the director of the department of personnel for a 16 waiver of the prohibition in this section. If a waiver is granted, the 17 director shall file a report with the office of financial management, 18 the senate ways and means committee, and the house appropriations 19 committee, stating the reason the waiver was granted and the expected dollar amount of the contract. 20

21 **Sec. 910.** RCW 43.160.070 and 1990 1st ex.s. c 16 s 802 are each 22 amended to read as follows:

(1) Public facilities loans and grants, when authorized by theboard, are subject to the following conditions:

(a) The moneys in the public facilities construction loan revolving
fund shall be used solely to fulfill commitments arising from loans or
grants authorized in this chapter or, during the ((1989-91)) 1991-93

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fiscal biennium, for economic development purposes as appropriated by the legislature. The total outstanding amount which the board shall dispense at any time pursuant to this section shall not exceed the moneys available from the fund. The total amount of outstanding loans and grants in Pierce, King, and Snohomish counties shall never exceed sixty percent of the total amount of outstanding loans and grants disbursed by the board.

8 (b) Financial assistance through the loans or grants may be used 9 directly or indirectly for any facility for public purposes, including, 10 but not limited to, sewer or other waste disposal facilities, 11 arterials, bridges, access roads, port facilities, or water 12 distribution and purification facilities.

(c) On contracts made for public facilities loans the board shall determine the interest rate which loans shall bear. The interest rate shall not exceed ten percent per annum. The board may provide reasonable terms and conditions for repayment for loans as the board determines. The loans shall not exceed twenty years in duration.

(d) Repayments of loans made under the contracts for public
facilities construction loans shall be paid into the public facilities
construction loan revolving fund.

(2) When every feasible effort has been made to provide loans and loans are not possible, the board may provide grants upon finding that unique circumstances exist.

24 **Sec. 911.** RCW 43.51.280 and 1987 c 466 s 2 are each amended to 25 read as follows:

26 There is hereby created the trust land purchase account in the 27 state treasury. Any revenues accruing to this account shall be used 28 for the purchase of the property described in RCW 43.51.270(3)(a), to ESHB 1330 p. 176 of 181

include all reasonable costs of acquisition, and a fee interest or such 1 2 other interest in state trust lands presently used for park purposes as 3 the state parks and recreation commission shall determine and to reimburse the state parks and recreation commission for the cost of 4 5 collecting such fees beginning with the 1973-75 fiscal biennium. Any funds remaining in the account shall be used for the renovation and б redevelopment of state park structures and facilities to extend the 7 8 original life expectancy or correct damage to the environment of state 9 parks and for the ((maintenance and operation of state parks)) 10 administration, maintenance, and operation of state parks and other 11 state parks programs in the ((<del>1981-83</del>)) <u>1991-93</u> biennium. Thereafter, 12 the funds shall not be used for such purposes until the money in the 13 account satisfies the payment required to be made in the contract for 14 sale of lands in RCW 43.51.270(2), the acquisition of the property described in RCW 43.51.270(3)(a), those amounts necessary to pay for 15 16 the remaining trust assets of timber situated on the lands described in 17 RCW 43.51.270(2), and for the acquisition of the property described in 18 RCW 43.51.270(3) (b), (c), (d), and (e) and 43.51.270(4) on a schedule 19 satisfactory to the board of natural resources. Payments may be 20 delayed for property described in RCW 43.51.270(3) (b), (c), (d), and (e) until the existing contract for purchase of lands in RCW 21 43.51.270(2) has been paid off. Payments for the property in RCW 22 23 43.51.270(4) may be delayed until contracts for purchase of lands and timber described in RCW 43.51.270 (2) and (3) have been paid off. 24 25 Payments from the account for those parcels included in RCW 43.51.270(4) shall be established on a schedule which is mutually 26 27 acceptable to the board of natural resources and the parks and 28 recreation commission. All earnings of investments of balances in the trust land purchase account shall be credited to the general fund. 29

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 912. When preparing allotments for the 1991-93 1 2 biennium, the office of financial management shall ensure that the 3 total state-wide expenditures for personal services, as defined in 4 chapter 39.29 RCW, by agencies receiving appropriations in this act do 5 not exceed the total expenditures for personal services incurred during the 1989-91 biennium. For the purposes of this section "agencies" б means any state office or activity of the executive and judicial branch 7 8 of government, including state agencies, departments, offices, 9 divisions, boards, commissions, and educational, correctional, and other types of institutions. 10

NEW SECTION. Sec. 913. Whenever allocations are made from the governor's emergency fund appropriation to an agency that is financed in whole or in part by other than general fund moneys, the director of financial management may direct the repayment of such allocated amount to the general fund from any balance in the fund or funds which finance the agency. No appropriation shall be necessary to effect such repayment.

18 NEW SECTION. Sec. 914. Such 17 amounts may be expended as a part of the original appropriation from 18 fund to which it belongs, without further or additional the appropriation, subject to conditions and procedures prescribed by the 19 20 director of financial management, which shall provide for determination 21 of full costs, disclosure of such reimbursements in the governor's 22 budget, maximum interagency usage of data processing equipment and 23 services, and such restrictions as will promote more economical 24 operations of state government without incurring continuing costs 25 beyond those reimbursed.

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1 Sec. 918. The appropriations of moneys and the NEW SECTION. 2 designation of funds and accounts by this and other acts of the 1991 3 legislature shall be construed in a manner consistent with legislation enacted by the 1985, 1987, and 1989 legislatures to conform state funds 4 5 and accounts with generally accepted accounting principles. If any provision of this act or its application to any person or circumstance 6 is held invalid, the remainder of the act or the application of the 7 8 provision to other persons or circumstances is not affected.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 919. This act is necessary for the immediate 10 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 11 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 12 effect July 1, 1991.
