AN ACT Relating to water resource funding; adding a new section to chapter 43.33 RCW; adding a new section to chapter 43.27A RCW; and creating a new section.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that:

6 (a) The provision of safe drinking water to the citizens of this 7 state is of the highest priority in maintaining the quality of life in 8 this state;

9 (b) Protecting and preserving the quality of the state's surface 10 and ground waters is essential to the health of its citizens and the 11 maintenance of the state's environment and natural resources;

(c) State and local governments, as well as other affected groups of citizens, have identified a need for capital expenditures to provide and preserve safe and high quality water in this state that far exceeds the current ability of state and local governments to meet; 1 (d) Existing funding sources from state agencies for water resource 2 related projects and activities, and particularly those for water 3 quality and drinking water supply, have not been developed in a 4 comprehensive and integrated fashion that properly reflects current 5 water resource planning processes and capital needs in this state;

6 (e) Existing funding sources and programs administered by state agencies for water resource related projects have a wide variety of 7 funding cycles, grant and loan criteria, project priorities, and other 8 9 elements in their application and funding processes that may create 10 unnecessary confusion, duplication, and inefficiencies in the 11 allocation of such limited resources by the agencies involved; and (f) Current and future regional water resource planning efforts 12 13 will require a comprehensive and coordinated plan for providing funding 14 for identified needs.

15 (2) The legislature intends that:

16 (a) A comprehensive approach to water resource related funding be 17 undertaken by all agencies and programs that provide such funding, in 18 order that the available money be utilized in the most efficient 19 fashion;

20 (b) Agency priorities with regard to the use of such funds be 21 developed within the limits of statutory authorization so that they are 22 used in a flexible fashion that meets current needs;

(c) New sources of potential funding for water resource relatedprojects be identified; and

(d) Additional funding be provided to address the most urgent current needs, including those projects and activities that are identified as part of regional water resource plans.

28 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 43.33 RCW 29 to read as follows:

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The state finance committee shall prepare and submit to the 1 2 appropriate legislative committees a written report no later than December 1, 1991, addressing the capital needs of water resource 3 related projects for the state, the ability of state and local 4 governments to meet those needs, and alternative methods of providing 5 б new capital funding for such needs. The alternative methods shall include local government bonding pools, utilization of existing funding 7 sources as revolving loan funds, private partnerships, and any other 8 9 methods that may be feasible. The office of financial management shall 10 provide information and assistance as needed by the state finance committee, and shall utilize the data and recommendations developed in 11 any recently completed studies or reviews of capital needs and 12 available financial resources. 13

14 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 43.27A RCW 15 to read as follows:

16 (1) There is created the interagency committee for water resource funding, consisting of the directors of the departments of community 17 18 development, ecology, fisheries, wildlife, and agriculture, and the secretary of the department of health, or their designees; the 19 20 chairperson of the utilities and transportation commission, or designee; and, by appointment of the governor with the advice and 21 22 consent of the senate, five members from the public at large who have 23 a demonstrated interest in, and commitment to, the issues of water 24 resources, public water supply, or public financing. The terms of the 25 members appointed from the public at large shall commence on January 1st of the year of appointment and shall be for three years or until a 26 27 successor is appointed, except in the case of appointments to fill 28 vacancies, which shall be for the remainder of the unexpired term. The initial members at large shall be appointed as follows: One member for 29

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one year, two members for two years, and two members for three years.
 The governor shall designate one of the members at large as the
 chairperson of the committee for the duration of the member's term.

4 (2) The committee shall:

5 (a) Have the authority to hire a director to provide management and
6 assistance for the operations of the committee;

7 (b) Have the authority to apply to any appropriate agency or 8 officer of the United States for participation in or receipt of any 9 funding from any program regarding water resources or public water 10 supply not specifically designated for any other fund or agency, and to 11 enter into any contracts or agreements and otherwise maintain such 12 records and information as may be necessary to receive such funding;

13 (c) Have the authority to receive gifts, donations, and grants from14 any source;

15 (d) On an annual basis, prepare and submit to the appropriations and revenue committees of both houses of the legislature by December 16 17 1st the state's proposed plan for distribution of water resource related state funding during the fiscal year beginning on the following 18 19 July 1st, and the priorities underlying such proposed distribution; the 20 plan shall also include recommendations to the legislature for any changes in state law as to priorities, eligibility, and distribution; 21 (e) Request, as needed, assistance from the departments of the 22 member state agency for the analysis and review of any proposed plans 23 24 and projects; and

(f) Expend such funds for water resource related programs as it isauthorized to by the legislature.

(3) Any public body or any agency of state government authorized to expend, or desiring to expend, state funds for water resource related funding shall first submit such a request or proposed expenditure to the committee for review and approval, and shall not expend such funds,

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1 except in emergencies, until the committee has reviewed and approved 2 the expenditures. Such requests shall demonstrate that they are part 3 of a long-term capital program, are consistent with other comprehensive 4 planning processes of the state, and are in compliance with the 5 priorities for such funding.

6 (4) The director shall have the power to:

7 (a) Obtain and supervise the administrative operations of the8 committee and staff;

9 (b) Administer any funding programs directly operated by the 10 committee, and provide technical assistance to state and local 11 agencies;

(c) Prepare and update a strategic capital plan for the management, maintenance, and enhancement of the water resources of this state, and for the protection of the quality of the state's waters and of its drinking water supply, which shall be prepared in coordination with the office of financial management, relevant federal, state, and local agencies, Indian tribes, private sector interests, and the general public;

(d) Represent the interests of the state and the committee on waterresources funding issues;

(e) Enter into such agreements as are authorized by the committee;and

(f) Encourage and provide opportunities for interagency and regional coordination and cooperative efforts in the funding of water resource projects and activities.

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
