AN ACT Relating to the small business export finance assistance center; amending RCW 43.210.030; reenacting and amending RCW 43.210.050; adding new sections to chapter 43.210 RCW; adding new sections to chapter 43.131 RCW; creating new sections; repealing RCW 43.131.325 and 43.131.326; making an appropriation; and declaring an emergency.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds:

9 (1) The exporting of value-added manufactured goods, which for the 10 purposes of sections 1 through 5 of this act shall include processed 11 food and agricultural products, from Washington state and the Pacific 12 Northwest region to international markets is vitally important for the 13 public good, for maintaining our high standard of living, keeping our 14 business community competitive in global markets, and in providing 15 secure family-supporting jobs for our citizens. 1 (2) Comprehensive export assistance programs should be managed in 2 a proactive, aggressive, and consistent manner to provide small 3 manufacturers with easily accessible contacts, information, and 4 services.

5 (3) Washington state must improve the coordination of various 6 export promotion programs and develop new, targeted, trade promotion 7 services.

8 (4) International marketing education, language training, and 9 cultural awareness are vitally important for the success of 10 international export initiatives.

(5) Impediments to the entry of many small and medium-sized manufacturers into export markets have restricted growth in exports from Washington state and the Pacific Northwest region.

14 (6) Small and medium-sized manufacturers relatively new to exporting with gross annual revenues less than twenty-five million 15 dollars require a comprehensive public export assistance program 16 17 designed specifically to devise and manage complete introductory export 18 strategies and secure export financing and credit guarantees. This 19 comprehensive program for small and medium-sized manufacturers shall 20 complement existing export assistance services offered by the department of trade and economic development and the Washington state 21 department of agriculture by working with them in a close, cooperative, 22 23 and strategic manner to promote the sale of Washington state products abroad. 24

(7) There is a need for a Pacific Northwest export assistance project which will specialize in providing comprehensive export assistance to small and medium-sized manufacturers relatively new to exporting throughout the state in acquiring international business information, designing and managing introductory export strategies, and

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in securing company specific financing and credit guarantees for
 exporting.

(8) The economic health of our neighboring states and provinces has 3 4 а direct impact on commercial activity in Washington state. Washington's ports, private export management firms, commercial banking 5 6 institutions, business community at large, and consumers rely on strong exporting sectors in our neighboring states and provinces to stimulate 7 business activity in Washington state. It is in the best interest of 8 9 Washington state, and each state and province in the Pacific Northwest 10 region, to work cooperatively in building a strong and competitive exporting base of value-added manufacturing businesses. 11

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. (1) The Pacific Northwest export assistance
13 project is hereby created for the following purposes:

(a) To assist small to medium-sized manufacturers relatively new to exporting with gross annual revenues less than twenty-five million dollars with comprehensive services for designing and managing introductory export strategies and in securing financing and credit guarantees for export transactions;

(b) To provide, in cooperation with the export promotion services offered by the department of trade and economic development and the Washington state department of agriculture, information and assistance to businesses with gross annual revenues less than twenty-five million dollars about the methods and procedures of structuring company specific export financing and credit guarantee alternatives; or

(c) To provide information to their clients about opportunities in organizing cooperative export networks, foreign sales corporations, or export trading companies under the United States export trading company act of 1982, for the purpose of increasing their comparative sales volume and ability to export their products to foreign markets.

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1 (2) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project is a separate 2 branch of the small business export finance assistance center for 3 accounting and auditing purposes.

4 (3) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project is subject to 5 the authority of the small business export finance assistance center, б under RCW 43.210.020, and shall be governed and managed by the board of directors, under RCW 43.210.030. 7

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) The small business export finance 9 assistance center has the following powers and duties when exercising its authority under section 2(3) of this act: 10

(a) Solicit and accept grants, contributions, and any other 11 financial assistance from the federal government, federal agencies, and 12 13 any other public or private sources to carry out its purposes;

14 (b) Offer comprehensive export assistance and counseling to manufacturers relatively new to exporting with gross annual revenues 15 16 less than twenty-five million dollars. As close to ninety percent as possible of each year's new cadre of clients must have gross annual 17 18 revenues of less than five million dollars at the time of their initial 19 contract. Counseling may include, but not be limited to, helping clients obtain debt or equity financing, in constructing competent 20 proposals, and assessing federal guarantee and/or insurance programs 21 that underwrite exporting risk; assisting clients in evaluating their 22 23 international marketplace by developing marketing materials, assessing 24 and selecting targeted markets; assisting firms in finding foreign 25 customers by conducting foreign market research, evaluating distribution systems, selecting and assisting in identification of 26 and/or negotiations with foreign agents, distributors, retailers, and 27 28 by promoting products through attending trade shows abroad; advising companies on their products, guarantees, and after sales service 29 HB 1990

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requirements necessary to compete effectively in a foreign market; 1 2 designing a competitive strategy for a firm's products in targeted 3 markets and methods of minimizing their commercial and political risks; 4 securing for clients specific assistance as needed, outside the center's field of expertise, by referrals to other public or private 5 6 organizations. The Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall focus its efforts on facilitating export transactions for its clients, 7 and in doing so, provide such technical services as are appropriate to 8 9 accomplish its mission either with staff or outside consultants;

10 (c) Sign three-year counseling agreements with its clients that provide for termination if adequate funding for the Pacific Northwest 11 export assistance project is not provided in future appropriations. 12 13 Counseling agreements shall not be renewed unless there are compelling 14 reasons to do so, and under no circumstances shall they be renewed for more than two additional years. A counseling agreement may not be 15 renewed more than once. The counseling agreements shall have mutual 16 17 performance clauses, that if not met, will be grounds for releasing 18 each party, without penalty, from the provisions of the agreement. 19 Clients shall be immediately released from a counseling agreement with 20 the Pacific Northwest export assistance project, without penalty, if a client wishes to switch to a private export management service and 21 produces a valid contract signed with a private export management 22 service, or if the president of the small business export finance 23 24 assistance center determines there are compelling reasons to release a 25 client from the provisions of the marketing agreement;

(d) May contract with private or public international trade education services to provide Pacific Northwest export assistance project clients with training in international business. The president and board of directors shall decide the amount of funding allocated for educational services based on the availability of resources in the

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1 operating budget of the budget of the Pacific Northwest export 2 assistance project;

3 (e) May contract with the Washington state international trade fair 4 to provide services for Pacific Northwest export assistance project 5 clients to participate in one trade show annually. The president and 6 board of directors shall decide the amount of funding allocated for 7 trade fair assistance based on the availability of resources in the 8 operating budget of the Pacific Northwest export assistance project;

9 (f) Provide biennial assessments of its performance. The Pacific 10 Northwest export assistance project is an innovative program for the promotion of international trade. As such, the project personnel shall 11 work with the department of revenue and employment security department 12 to confidentially track the performance of the project's clients in 13 14 increasing tax revenues to the state, increasing gross sales revenues and volume of products destined to foreign clients, and in creating new 15 jobs for Washington citizens. A biennial report shall be prepared for 16 17 the governor and legislature to assess the costs and benefits to the 18 state from creating the project. The president of the small business 19 export finance assistance center shall design an appropriate 20 methodology for biennial assessments in consultation with the director of the department of trade and economic development and the director of 21 the Washington state department of agriculture. The department of 22 revenue and the employment security department shall provide data 23 24 necessary to complete this biennial evaluation, if the data being 25 requested is available from existing data bases. Client-specific information generated from the files of the department of revenue and 26 27 the employment security department for the purposes of this evaluation 28 shall be kept strictly confidential by each department and the small 29 business export finance assistance center;

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(g) Take whatever action may be necessary to accomplish the
 purposes set forth in sections 1 through 5 of this act; and

3 (h) Limit its assistance to promoting the exportation of value-4 added manufactured goods. The project shall not provide counseling or 5 assistance, under any circumstances, for the importation of foreign 6 made goods into the United States.

7 (2) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall not,
8 under any circumstances, assume ownership or take title to the goods of
9 its clients.

10 (3) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project may not use any Washington state funds which come from the public treasury of the state 11 of Washington to make loans or to make any payment under a loan 12 guarantee agreement. Under no circumstances may the center use any 13 14 funds received under RCW 43.210.050 to make or assist in making any 15 loan or to pay or assist in paying any amount under a loan guarantee agreement. Debts of the center shall be center debts only and may be 16 satisfied only from the resources of the center. 17 The state of 18 Washington shall not in any way be liable for such debts.

19 (4) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall make20 every effort to seek nonstate funds to supplement its operations.

(5) The Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall take 21 whatever steps are necessary to provide its services, if requested, to 22 the states of Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, and the Canadian 23 provinces of British Columbia and Alberta. Interstate services shall 24 not be provided by the Pacific Northwest export assistance project 25 26 during its first biennium of operation. The provision of services may be temporary and subject to the payment of fees, or each state may 27 28 request permanent services contingent upon a level of permanent funding 29 adequate for services provided. Temporary services and fees may be negotiated by the small business export finance assistance center's 30

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president subject to approval of the board of directors. The president 1 2 of the small business export finance assistance center may enter into negotiations with neighboring states to contract for delivery of the 3 4 project's services. Final contracts for providing the project's counseling and services outside of the state of Washington on a 5 б permanent basis shall be subject to approval of the governor, appropriate legislative oversight committees, and the small business 7 export finance assistance center's board of directors. 8

9 (6) The small business export finance assistance center may receive 10 such gifts, grants, and endowments from public or private sources as 11 may be made from time to time, in trust or otherwise, for the use and 12 benefit of the purposes of the Pacific Northwest export assistance 13 project and expend the same or any income therefrom according to the 14 terms of the gifts, grants, or endowments.

15 (7) The president of the small business export finance assistance center, in consultation with the board of directors, may use the 16 17 following formula in determining the number of clients that can be reasonably served by the Pacific Northwest export assistance project 18 19 relative to its appropriation. Divide the amount appropriated for 20 administration of the Pacific Northwest export assistance project by the marginal cost of adding each additional Pacific Northwest export 21 assistance project client. For the purposes of this calculation, and 22 only for the first biennium of operation, the biennial marginal cost of 23 adding each additional Pacific Northwest export assistance project 24 25 client shall be fifty-seven thousand ninety-five dollars. The biennial marginal cost of adding each additional client after the first biennium 26 of operation shall be established from the actual operating experience 27 of the Pacific Northwest export assistance project. 28

29 (8) All receipts from the Pacific Northwest export assistance30 project shall be deposited into the general fund.

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. The department of trade and economic
 development shall adopt rules under chapter 34.05 RCW as necessary to
 carry out the purposes of sections 1 through 5 of this act.

The business 4 NEW SECTION. Sec. 5. small export finance 5 assistance center fund is created in the custody of the state 6 treasurer. Expenditures from the fund may be used only for the purposes of funding the services of the small business export finance 7 8 assistance center and its projects under this chapter. Only the director of the department of trade and economic development or the 9 10 director's designee may authorize expenditures from the fund. The director of the department of trade and economic development shall not 11 withhold funds appropriated for the administration of the small 12 13 business export finance assistance center and its projects, if the small business export finance assistance center complies with the 14 provisions of its contract under RCW 43.210.050 and section 2 of this 15 16 act. Funding appropriated by the state of Washington shall not be used to provide services to other states or provinces. The fund is subject 17 18 to allotment procedures under chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation 19 is required for expenditures.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. Sections 1 through 5 of this act are each 21 added to chapter 43.210 RCW.

22 Sec. 7. RCW 43.210.030 and 1985 c 231 s 3 are each amended to read 23 as follows:

The small business export finance assistance center and its branches shall be governed and managed by a board of ((seventeen)) <u>nineteen</u> directors appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate. The directors shall serve terms of six years except that two

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of the original directors shall serve for two years and two of the 1 2 original directors shall serve for four years. The directors may provide for the payment of their expenses. The directors shall include 3 4 a representative of a not-for-profit corporation formed for the purpose 5 of facilitating economic development, at least two representatives of б state financial institutions engaged in the financing of export transactions, a representative of a port district, and a representative 7 of organized labor. Of the remaining board members, there shall be ((a)8 9 representative of the governor,)) one representative of business from 10 the area west of Puget Sound, one representative of business from the 11 area east of Puget Sound and west of the Cascade range, one 12 representative of business from the area east of the Cascade range and west of the Columbia river, ((and)) one representative of business from 13 14 the area east of the Columbia river, the director of the department of trade and economic development, and the director of the Washington 15 state department of agriculture. One of the directors shall be a 16 17 representative of the public selected from the area in the state west the 18 Cascade mountain range and one director of shall be a 19 representative of the public selected from that area of the state east 20 of the Cascade mountain range. One director shall be a representative of the public at large. The directors shall be broadly representative 21 of geographic areas of the state, and the representatives of businesses 22 shall represent at least four different industries in different sized 23 24 businesses as follows: (a) One representative of a company employing 25 fewer than one hundred persons; (b) one representative of a company employing between one hundred and five hundred persons; ((and)) (c) 26 27 ((two)) one representative((s)) of companies employing more than five 28 hundred persons; (d) one representative from an export management 29 company; and (e) one representative from an agricultural or food processing company. Any vacancies on the board due to the expiration 30 HB 1990

of a term or for any other reason shall be filled by appointment by the
 governor for the unexpired term.

3 Sec. 8. RCW 43.210.050 and 1985 c 466 s 64 and 1985 c 231 s 5 are 4 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

5 The small business export finance assistance center formed under RCW 43.210.020 and 43.210.030 ((is eligible to receive consideration б for)) shall enter into a contract under this chapter ((from the)) with 7 8 the department of trade and economic development or its statutory 9 The contract shall require the center to provide export successor. 10 assistance services, ((may not have a duration of longer than two years,)) consistent with sections 1 through 5 of this act, shall have 11 a duration of two years, and shall require the center to aggressively 12 13 seek to fund its continued operation from nonstate funds. The contract 14 shall also require the center to report ((at least twice)) annually to 15 the department on its success in obtaining nonstate funding. Upon 16 expiration of the contract, any provisions within the contract applicable to the Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall be 17 18 automatically renewed without change provided the legislature 19 appropriates funds for administration of the small business export 20 assistance center and the Pacific Northwest export assistance project. The provisions of the contract related to the Pacific Northwest export 21 22 assistance project may be changed at any time if the director of the 23 department of trade and economic development or the president of the 24 small business export finance assistance center present compelling 25 reasons supporting the need for a contract change to the board of 26 directors and a majority of the board of directors agrees to the 27 changes. The department of agriculture shall be included in the 28 contracting negotiations with the department of trade and economic development and the small business export finance assistance center 29

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when the Pacific Northwest export assistance project provides export 1 2 services to industrial sectors within the administrative domain of the Washington state department of agriculture. The department of trade 3 4 and economic development, the small business export finance assistance center, and, if appropriate, the department of agriculture, shall 5 6 report annually, as one group, to the appropriate legislative oversight committees on the progress of the Pacific Northwest export assistance 7 8 project.

9 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 9.** The following acts or parts of acts are 10 each repealed:

11 (1) RCW 43.131.325 and 1985 c 231 s 10; and

12 (2) RCW 43.131.326 and 1985 c 231 s 11.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 10. A new section is added to chapter 43.131
14 RCW to read as follows:

15 The Pacific Northwest export assistance project shall be terminated 16 on June 30, 1996, as provided in section 11 of this act.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 11. A new section is added to chapter 43.131
18 RCW to read as follows:

19 The following acts or parts of acts, as now existing or hereafter 20 amended, are each repealed, effective June 30, 1997:

21 (1) Section 1 of this act;

22 (2) Section 2 of this act;

23 (3) Section 3 of this act;

24 (4) Section 4 of this act; and

25 (5) Section 5 of this act.

1 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 12. The sum of dollars, or as much 2 thereof as may be necessary, is appropriated for the biennium ending 3 June 30, 1993, from the general fund to the small business export 4 finance assistance center fund, under section 5 of this act, for the 5 small business export finance assistance center of which 6 dollars are provided solely for the Pacific Northwest export assistance 7 project for the purposes of this act.

8 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 13. This act is necessary for the immediate 9 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 10 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 11 effect immediately.

12 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 14. If specific funding for the small 13 business export finance assistance center, referencing this act by bill 14 number, is not provided by June 30, 1991, in the omnibus appropriations 15 act, this act shall be null and void.

16 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 15. If any provision of this act or its 17 application to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the 18 remainder of the act or the application of the provision to other 19 persons or circumstances is not affected.

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
