## HOUSE BILL 2095

## State of Washington 52nd Legislature 1991 Regular Session

**By** Representatives R. Johnson, McLean, Anderson, Jones, Kremen, Braddock, Valle, Wineberry, Franklin, Day, Pruitt, Rayburn, Roland, Spanel and Prentice; by request of Department of Veterans Affairs.

Read first time February 22, 1991. Referred to Committee on State Government\Appropriations.

1 AN ACT Relating to counseling veterans and their dependents; adding 2 new sections to chapter 43.60A RCW; creating a new section; making 3 appropriations; and declaring an emergency.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that over fifteen 5 б percent of the troops deployed in the Middle East war, operation 7 dessert storm, are members of reserve and national guard units. Of the reservists and national guard members currently on active duty, over 8 three thousand seven hundred are from Washington state. Further, the 9 10 legislature finds that a significant percentage of individuals exposed 11 to armed conflict during our nation's wars, and their families, suffer 12 long-term psychological and social disorders that require professional assistance to permit them to return to normal, productive lives. 13 14 Additionally, the legislature finds that over the years the state's 15 department of veterans affairs has developed a large body of knowledge

and professional expertise in treating persons exposed to war stress
 and combat-related disorders, including post traumatic stress disorder
 also known as PTSD.

NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. The department of veterans affairs, to 4 5 the extent funds are made available, shall: (1) Contract with professional counseling specialists to provide a range of direct 6 treatment services to war-affected state veterans and to those national 7 8 guard and reservists who served in the Middle East, and their family 9 members; (2) provide treatment services to Washington state Vietnam veterans for post traumatic stress disorder, particularly for those 10 veterans whose post traumatic stress disorder has intensified or 11 initially emerged due to the war in the Middle East; (3) provide an 12 13 educational program designed to train primary care professionals, such as mental health professionals, about the effects of war-related stress 14 and trauma; (4) provide informational and counseling services for the 15 16 purpose of establishing and fostering peer-support networks throughout the state for families of deployed members of the reserves and the 17 18 Washington national guard; (5) provide for veterans' families, a 19 referral network of community mental health providers who are skilled in treating deployment stress, combat stress, and post traumatic 20 21 stress.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. The department shall coordinate the 23 programs contained in section 2 of this act with the services offered 24 by the department of social and health services, local mental health 25 organizations, and the federal department of veterans affairs to 26 minimize duplication. Programs and activities contained in section 2 27 (3) and (4) of this act, shall conclude thirty days after cessation of 28 the war in the Middle East.

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. The department of veterans affairs shall
 give priority in its counseling and instructional programs to treating
 state veterans located in rural areas of the state, especially those
 who are members of traditionally underserved minority groups, and women
 veterans.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. The department of veterans affairs shall 7 design its post traumatic stress disorder and combat stress programs 8 and related activities to provide veterans with as much privacy and 9 confidentiality as possible and yet consistent with sound program 10 management.

11 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 6. Sections 2 through 5 of this act are 12 each added to chapter 43.60A RCW.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. The sum of:

14 (1) Ninety thousand dollars, or as much thereof as may be
15 necessary, is appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1991; and
16 (2) Three hundred thousand dollars or as much thereof as may be
17 necessary, is appropriated for the biennium ending June 30, 1993;
18 from the general fund to the department of veterans affairs for the
19 purposes of this act.

20 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. This act is necessary for the immediate 21 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the 22 state government and its existing public institutions, and shall take 23 effect immediately.
