(1) All moneys collected as warehouse license fees, fees for 1 weighing, grading, and inspecting commodities and all other fees 2 3 collected under the provisions of this chapter, except as provided in subsection (2) of this section, shall be deposited in the grain 4 5 inspection revolving fund, which is hereby established. treasurer is the custodian of the revolving fund. Disbursements from 6 the revolving fund shall be on authorization of the director of the 7 department of agriculture. The revolving fund is subject to the 8 9 allotment procedure provided in chapter 43.88 RCW((, but)). Except 10 during the 1991-93 biennium, when an appropriation may be provided for 11 departmental administrative expenses, no appropriation is required for 12 disbursements from the fund. Any moneys in any fund retained 22 by the department on July 1, 1963, and derived from hop inspection and 23 grading shall be deposited to this hop inspection fund. 24 25 purposes of research which would contribute to the development of superior hop varieties and to improve hop production and harvest 26 27 practices, the department may expend up to twenty percent of the moneys 28 deposited in the hop inspection fund during the fiscal year ending June 30th immediately preceding the year in which such expenditures are to 29

- 1 be made. No expenditures shall be made under the provisions of this

- 7 Sec. 915. RCW 43.23.230 and 1988 c 254 s 1 are each amended to
- 8 read as follows:
- 9 The agricultural local fund is hereby established in the custody of
- 10 the state treasurer. The fund shall consist of such money as is
- 11 directed by law for deposit in the fund, and such other money not
- 12 subject to appropriation that the department authorizes to be deposited
- 13 in the fund. Any money deposited in the fund, the use of which has
- 14 been restricted by law, may only be expended in accordance with those
- 15 restrictions. The department may make disbursements from the fund.
- 16 The fund is not subject to legislative appropriation except that during
- 17 the 1991-93 biennium, an appropriation may be provided for departmental
- 18 <u>administrative expenses</u>.
- 19 **Sec. 916.** RCW 70.146.080 and 1991 sp.s. c 16 s 923 is amended to
- 20 read as follows:
- 21 Within thirty days after June 30, 1987, and within thirty days
- 22 after each succeeding fiscal year thereafter, the state treasurer shall
- 23 determine the tax receipts deposited into the water quality account for
- 24 the preceding fiscal year. If the tax receipts deposited into the
- 25 account in each of the fiscal years 1988 and 1989 are less than forty
- 26 million dollars, the state treasurer shall transfer sufficient moneys

- 1 from general state revenues into the water quality account to bring the
- 2 total receipts in each fiscal year up to forty million dollars.
- For the biennium ending June 30, 1991, if the tax receipts

- 21 The flood control assistance account is hereby established in the
- 22 state treasury. At the beginning of each biennium the state treasurer
- 23 shall transfer from the general fund to the flood control assistance
- 24 account an amount of money which, when combined with money remaining in
- 25 the account from the previous biennium, will equal four million
- 26 dollars. During the 1991-93 biennium the legislature may direct the
- 27 transfer of amounts from the account to the general fund. Moneys in

- 1 the flood control assistance account may be spent only after
- 2 appropriation for purposes specified under this chapter.
- 3 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 918. SEVERABILITY. If any provision of this
- 4 act or its application to any person or circumstance is held invalid,

- 7 NEW SECTION. Sec. 919. EMERGENCY CLAUSE. This act is necessary
- 8 for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety,
- 9 or support of the state government and its existing public
- 10 institutions, and shall take effect immediately.
